Agricultural.

Farm Notes.

All crops that do not require heavy manuring and very close planting, are most easily tilled by horse-power, and should, if possible, be placed where a horse can be used in tilling them. If the owner does not keep a horse, it will pay him to hire one for the purpose, if he tills only one or two acres, rather than to do the work with forked teams. Such crops as can be tilled to best advantage by the horse, are potatoes, peas, corn, squashes, cucumbers, melons, celery, cabbages, asparagus, rhubarb, and some others. Then remember that the early peas, corn, and potatoes, will come off in time to follow them by squashes, celery, cabbages or turnips, and make suitable provision of plants or seed of these latter crops. The early peas will usually be followed with best advantage by squashes, cabbages or turnips; the corn by turnips; the potatoes by celery, squashes or cabbage. Celery requires very strong, rich land, which will be best adapted to potatoes or onions as early crops. Let the rows of these vegetables run about at right angles with the roadway or headland at one side of the piece, and let this headland be either sod or else kept thoroughly tilled, otherwise it will become a nursery of weeds, and a nuisance.

There are, however, many garden crops which require close planting for profit, and very heavy manuring. Such crops should be grown only on soil free from stones, so that the tillage can be done readily with a scuffle hoe, a tool that requires tolerable smooth land. These crops are onions, beets, radishes, lettuce, garden greens, etc., followed by celery, squashes, melons or spinach. Where this close planting is practised, it will pay to be very particular about keeping the land free from weeds. The strawberry bed, if over a quarter of an acre, will be tilled best by horse; smaller patches can be tilled well enough by hand, and may be placed in such corners of the garden as are too small for turning a horse conveniently.—*New England Farmer.*

Lord Beaconsfield's Funeral.

LONDON, April 26.—The funeral of Lord Beaconsfield took place to-day at Highbury Manor. The following was the order of the funeral procession from Highbury Manor to the church:—Mr. Frederick Baum, his Lordship's confidential valet, carrying the insignia of the Order of the Garter. The body borne by eight laborers of the estate. Mr. Disraeli, Mr. Coningsby Disraeli, Lord Rothschild, Lord Salisbury, Sir N. M. de Rothschild, M. P., and Sir Philip Rose, Bart. Prince of Wales, Duke of Connaught and Prince Leopold. General Sir Henry Ponsonby, Viscount Bridport, Colonel the Honorable W. J. Colville, representing the Duke of Edinburgh, and Captain Elliot, representing Prince and Princess Christian, Colonel Tyrwhitt, C.

B., representing the Duke of Cambridge. Ambassadors and Ministers of foreign Powers two and two. Colleagues of the deceased nobleman during the administrations of 1868 and 1874.

Friends of the deceased.—Mr. Algernon Turner, Mr. James F. Daly, Mr. W. M. Van Baerle, late private secretary.

MOURNERS AT HUGHENDEN.

From early this morning railway trains arrived at Wycombe bringing large numbers of people of all classes for Hughenden to be present at the obsequies of Lord Beaconsfield. The weather was rather showery. The Prince of Wales, the Duke of Connaught and Prince Leopold, the latter bearing a large wreath from the Queen, left Paddington about one o'clock. The same train took the Duke of Richmond, the Marquis of Hamilton and a number of the members of the late government. The Marquis of Hartington left Paddington somewhat later. Flags were at half mast and other signs of mourning were displayed in various towns throughout the country. It was expected many persons who intended to be present were probably deterred by the occasional sharp showers of hail. The Princess of Wales sent a wreath.

When the burial service was completed all the principal mourners entered the vault and placed wreaths on the coffin, and before the vault was closed it was literally crammed with flowers.

A Ferry-Boat Capsized.

Chicago, April 28.—A special from Elgin, Ill., says that as the ferry was crossing Fox River this morning and was in the middle of the stream it capsized suddenly. The passengers, of whom probably 35 were little girls, were swept down the current, uttering heart-rending cries for assistance. Several were rescued with boats. The body of John Crichton's daughter, aged 12, was recovered, and the said ferry-boat was 75 by 15 feet and when first used, yesterday was condemned by the public at once. The accident occurred between eight and nine o'clock this morning. The boat was carrying a load of hay, and was being towed by a man named John Smith. The boat was capsized by a sudden gust of wind, and the passengers were swept down the river. The bodies of several children were recovered, but the bodies of many others have not yet been recovered. There is intense excitement in the city.

LATER.

Elgin, Ill., April 28.—Latest reports entirely confirm the former estimate of the number of the drowned, which cannot be less than 12. No bodies have been recovered, though every effort is being put forth.

LONDON, April 28.—The Post says:

We have reason to believe that, in view of the eminent talents, mature experience and signal public services of Sir Stafford Northcote, and in deference to the desirability of having a leader of the Opposition in the Commons, he will succeed Beaconsfield as leader of the Conservatives. In the House of Lords the Duke of Richmond will probably lead the Conservative party at present.
