**MANY IMMIGRANTS
 DURING LAST YEAR**
 Over One Hundred Thou-
 sand Have Entered Can-
 ada This Year.
TENDERS FOR BRIDGE.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 27.—The 10-
 tal immigration into Canada for the
 first seven months of the fiscal year,
 April to October inclusive, was 128,
 224, as compared with 109,546 for the
 same months of last year, an increase
 of 18 per cent. Immigration for
 October was 17,391, as compared with
 9,889 in October of last year. Arrivals
 at the port totaled 1,022,
 an increase of 24 per cent. Arrivals
 from the United States totaled 9,569
 an increase of 102 per cent, as com-
 pared with the same month of last
 year.

The Minister of Railways is pre-
 paring to call for tenders for the con-
 struction of the new Quebec bridge
 early in the coming year. A notice
 has been issued inviting contractors
 to visit the office of the board of en-
 gineers at Montreal after January
 the 25th and secure information as to
 plans for the new structure. These
 plans provide a 1,754 foot span, hav-
 ing a width of 88 feet.

The standing committee of the
 House of Commons met for organiza-
 tion purposes yesterday morning.
 The only change made in the selec-
 tion of presiding officers was in the
 case of the public accounts commit-
 tee. A. H. Clarke, chairman of the
 committee last session, resigned, ow-
 ing to pressure of work, and Mr.
 Walsworth of Prince Edward Island
 took his place.

The banking and commerce com-
 mittee of the senate decided yester-
 day morning to defer consideration
 of the insurance bill until after the
 Christmas holidays, when the repre-
 sentatives and arguments of the in-
 surance men and others will be heard.
 Full opportunity will be given all
 parties to be heard.

In the senate yesterday Sir Richard
 Cartwright, announced that the govern-
 ment desired to secure the ratifica-
 tion of the French treaty before
 the adjournment of the Christmas
 holidays. The treaty will then come
 into effect immediately on the formal
 exchange of ratifications between the
 two governments.

**MCBRIDE WINS
 B. C. ELECTIONS**
 Carries Almost Entire Province In
 General Elections
 Last Year
TWO IN OPPOSITION.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 26.—
 The provincial elections held through-
 out British Columbia yesterday have
 proved a veritable Waterloo for the
 Liberals. In only two of the forty-
 two seats so far heard from have their
 candidates been elected. The provin-
 ce with no exception since has been
 carried by the Conservatives. The
 only seats won by the Liberals were
 those of the cities of Vancouver and
 Victoria, with three Conserva-
 tive seats in the latter.

The time for posterity to make
 their annual contribution to the well-
 being of the poorer tribes has arrived.
 It is odd that with the multiplicity
 of new uses that have been found
 for rubber and the prices of that
 commodity soaring, no one has yet

**LOOKS BETTER FOR
 HATTER LEBLANC**
 Waltham Authorities Don't
 Believe That She is Slay-
 er of Glover.
MAY BE A DUPE.

WALTHAM, Mass., Nov. 27.—The
 legal procedure in the investigation
 of the murder a week ago of Clarence
 P. Glover in his laundry on the river
 bank of the Merrimack, has reached the
 final stage today. For a week the state
 and local officials have been using
 every effort to clear up the cloud of
 mystery which has enveloped the case.
 They have arrested Miss Hattie Le-
 Blanc, a Cape Breton girl employed
 as a domestic in the Glover family who
 was accused of the murder by Glover
 just before he died. The authorities
 however, have found too many incon-
 sistent to support Glover's state-
 ment, one of the most striking being
 that the bullets recovered don't fit
 the revolver which Glover claimed
 the young woman used in shooting
 him. For the past few days the po-
 lice have been looking in the direc-
 tion of some man, the identity of
 whom they have not discovered or
 refuse to disclose as the possible per-
 petrator of the crime.

FOUGHT FOR LIFE WITH BABOON
 Wild Animal Keeper in a Gruesome
 Battle
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 27.—Strug-
 gling for his life with an infuriated
 baboon, Fred Wilson, of Brazil Ind.,
 a trainer employed by an animal show,
 fought desperately for half an hour
 yesterday with a pink tailed baboon
 that attacked him in the cage. The
 beast clutched Wilson's throat, but
 as long as the trainer could keep on
 his feet he had the best of the fight.
 At length he fell exhausted from loss
 of blood and strain and the animal
 gnawed at his neck. A score of men
 keys in the cage kept up a shrill
 screaming during the progress of the
 fight and this finally attracted the
 attention of other employees who
 rescued Wilson. Wilson is in a pre-
 carious condition.

**CHINESE BOYS TO STUDY
 IN NEW ENGLAND**

 who is commissioner of the Chinese
 government to select and place the
 youths of his country in American
 schools and colleges, is in this city for
 a few days in connection with his
 duties. Mr. Olin says that he will
 be to America next summer 100 Chinese
 boys between 12 and 14 years of age
 of which 50 will be placed in New
 England schools, while the remainder
 will be distributed among schools
 and academies in other sections of the
 country. All of these boys will event-
 ually enter American colleges or
 scientific schools.

A PULPWOOD PROTEST

The American paper trust sends a copy of the Philadelphia Evening Item of Nov. 19, containing a long editorial saying that the Canadian government must not place an export duty on pulpwood. We quote a part:

Pulpwood is vital to American paper-makers under present methods of manufacture. While a change in method may be brought about at any moment, it would seem the part of good government for Canada to take the course described in this despatch that it will take.

For there is a big future before both American countries, and anything so serious as a direct interference with the material on which newspapers are printed, some British statesmen might think twice before tampering with it.

United States newspapers will live without exclusive dependency upon foreign supplies, regardless of any late foreigners may make.

Then this proposal to put prohibitive duties on pulpwood exports from Canada would be somewhat on a par with the United States prohibiting by like ways the export of our raw cotton into Canada, where we now ship about nine million dollars worth annually. Or similar prohibitive acts on our part against giving Great Britain any of our cotton, on the ground that the United States in such ways could force Canada and Great Britain to bring over all their cotton manufacturing plants and operate them in the United States.

That sounds absurd, of course, to talk about forbidding England and Canada obtaining our raw cotton.

But absurd as it is, it is not a whit more than that recommended movement for Canada to forbid our getting the raw material in order to restrict our paper manufacturers to locate their works in Canada.

Yet the province of Ontario, a part of Canada, has been doing just that thing. That province now effectively prohibits exportation by requiring all wood cut on crown lands to be manufactured in Canada. What we get is from private properties.

It is scarcely probable that the Dominion Government will take any action about pulpwood. The province will do as they please. Quebec will adopt the Ontario policy, compelling wood cut on crown lands to be manufactured at home. The item's reference to raw cotton would have more point if the American general tariff were as low as our own, or if the Americans did not put a prohibitive duty on Canadian paper.

LIGHTS BEING REPLACED

When the matter of the removal of the arc lights from the station platform was brought to the attention of our representative at Ottawa, that gentleman promised to take the matter up as soon as he returned to Ottawa. This, Mr. Reed has done and the result is a "renewal" in our last issue that the work of installing arc lights was now under way. The result of his personal interview with the department of Railways and Canals at Ottawa, Mr. Reed saw the Deputy Minister who, when the facts were clearly placed before him, recognized the justice of the demands and issued the necessary orders at once.
