

FEW CHANGES IN THE TARIFF

Financial Statement Shows
that Canada is in a Prosper-
ous Condition

LARGE SURPLUS

Ottawa, May 12.—A fifty-five million dollar surplus, a billion-dollar commerce, general prosperity and a few tariff changes were announced to-day by Finance Minister White in the budget speech.

The financial statement had been announced for this week but had not been expected so early. The mother of the finance minister is critically ill and on that account he desires to leave the capital. The speech was delivered to-day by agreement between the two parties.

There is little striking in the measure in the way of tariff changes. Hon. Mr. White stated that the government had come to the conclusion that a general tariff revision was not required this year.

There were some changes in lines, cocoa and other products of the south, consequent upon the West trade agreement.

Sugar refiners are cut off from their present privileges of importing from foreign countries at preferential rates, twenty per cent of the raw sugar they require.

The duty on cement is cut from 43½ cents per barrel to 35 cents; type-setting machines and traction-ditching machines are put on the free list along with some scientific articles.

There is nothing done respecting steel or shipbuilding, woollens, tin or any of the other interests that have been pressing for changes.

The speech required two hours in delivery.

A. K. MacLean adjourned the debate and will reply to the statement probably to-morrow.

A TALE OF PROSPERITY

Hon. W. T. White, minister of finance rising at 3.40 p.m., was cheered by the government supporters and at the outset he thanked the opposition for allowing him to introduce the budget without notice, and explained that he was obliged to ask this indulgence on account of having to leave the city through the serious illness of a member of his family circle.

He recalled the fact that the budget speech of 1912 was delivered on March 13 of that year and stated that as the fiscal year ended March 31, it would be necessary for him following the usual practice, to review the result of 1911-12 as disclosed in the completed accounts of the auditor-general.

The total receipts for the year, ended March 31, 1912, reached the sum of \$186,009,000, being a little over \$1,000,000, more than his estimate given to the house, and the increase over the revenue of the previous year of over \$18,000,000.

This large increase represented about fifteen and a half per cent of the revenue of 1910-11, and was fairly evenly distributed over the several months of the year.

The minister gave some figures for the two years, 1910-11 and 1911-12, showing the total revenue for the former year was \$117,780,409, and for 1911-12, \$136,108,217.

HEAVY EXPENDITURES

The minister of finance dwelt at some length on the expenditure of 1911-12, pointing out that a considerable portion of it had been on public works, so that, although it looked heavy, that fact must be taken into consideration and that it would cover generations.

Coming to the fiscal year ended March 31 of this year, the minister said that would prove even more satisfactory. When the books of the fiscal year 1913 are closed it will

CLAIMS GOODS STOLEN ON G.T.R.

Trainmen Under Arrest at
Montreal in Connection with
Missing Merchandise

LOADS OF STUFF FOUND

For some time past heavy claims for missing goods in transit have been put into the I. C. R. by the Grand Trunk Railway, but at last, it is reported, the mystery surrounding the disappearance of the greater portion of the stuff, at least, has been cleared up. As the result of police investigation at Point St. Charles, the point where the I. C. R. takes charge of goods shipped over the G.T.R. for the Maritime Provinces, seven or eight Grand Trunk trainmen are under arrest charged with theft, and several more have skipped out to avoid arrest.

Special Agent A. J. Tingley, of the I. C. R., arrived home last night in connection with this matter. He informs the press that during the last three or four days Special Agent Hodges, of the G.T.R., and I. C. R. Inspector Moore, who was acting with the Grand Trunk official, succeeded in establishing the fact that the breakage of seals on cars and the theft of goods in transit was done at Point St. Charles, the terminal point where the I. C. R. takes delivery of the goods from the Grand Trunk. On Saturday last, the railway police, acting upon information they had gleaned, arrested five G.T. R. conductors and three brakemen, while three other conductors and one brakemen, for whom warra is had also been issued, had skipped out.

Special Agent Tingley, who went to Montreal on Sunday, says they searched eight houses around Montreal and St. Charles and found great quantities of goods that had been missing from railway cars. Altogether they located a couple of team loads of goods, including 100 pairs of boots, many shirts, towels, bath robes, travelling bags and all kinds of toilet articles. The goods were taken charge of by Special Agent Hodges of the G.T.R., and taken to his office.

Some of the men accused of stealing this stuff from the railway were brought before the court on Monday, and the rest will be brought up on Friday.

This is considered one of the mysterious disappearance of goods en route to the Maritime Provinces is important from more than one standpoint. The Grand Trunk has been making claim for goods alleged to have been handed over to the I. C. R. at Point St. Charles in good order, with the result that there was the suspicion that the missing articles were taken while passing over "The People's Railway." The facts brought to light at Point St. Charles, however, proves that the trouble was on the C.T.R. end and not on the I. C. R.

be found that the total revenue will have reached the stupendous total of \$168,250,000, an increase over the year 1911 of \$32,000,000.

Some indications of the magnificent growth of the dominion may be gleaned from the fact that this increase of revenue during this one year almost equals the entire revenue of the country twenty years ago.

Mr. White said that this revenue was mainly derived from customs and excise, but also from post office, railway and other sources of income.

So far as the ordinary running expenses were concerned the increase was, as expected, considerable. The estimates for the year had made generous provision for public works, provincial subsidies and works for which there was special legislation.

SURPLUS OF \$55,000,000

Notwithstanding these facts, however, the ordinary current expenditure which in the previous year amounted to \$98,161,440, will be found not to have exceeded \$113,250,000, leaving a surplus of \$55,000,000 against outlays upon capital and special accounts—that is upon public works, such as the N.T.R. On these undertakings, the expenditure will be found not to have exceeded \$33,000,000, so that bearing in mind the expenditure of consolidated funds our sinking fund will amount to \$1,300,000. The result of the financial operations of the year will be the reduction of the debt of Canada by about \$22,300,000.

FIRST MEETING OF ALDERMEN

Stirring Address by Mayor
Montgomery.—Fire In
Wood Pile

SOCIAL NEWS

Dalhousie, May 15th.—The first meeting of our newly elected town council was held on Wednesday evening when Mayor Montgomery delivered a brief but stirring address. The following is a condensed report of his remarks:—

"Gentlemen, Knapwags of the Town of Dalhousie, it again becomes my pleasure to thank you for electing me Mayor by acclamation, and I can assure you I appreciate your confidence in again trusting you with the reins of my hands, more especially this year when there is to be large expenditure of money, and constant attention required for town affairs."

I also congratulate you on your choice of Aldermen and consider the magnificent vote you elected them by, a token of the manner in which you appreciated their services in the past, and an unmistakable voice of your opinion regarding a progressive Council for your town.

Your vote plainly shows that no Aldermen who are opposed to all modern improvements and encouragement to new industries for the town, need seek election, and that you will pay no heed to those who told you that installing a modern and up to date Water System and Electric Light plant meant ruin and taxation.

You have the Water System now self-maintaining, and can judge for yourselves if it meant ruin or protection. You can look back to the election where you gave us the mandate to install that water system, which saved your town from the ruinous day of the 1907 fire, and which has since saved your industry, and brought you yourselves on your decision."

I trust and feel assured that you will reap the same benefit from your Electric Light system for which all our streets are now lit, and which will be in operation in a few days."

This will bring the town up to the standard of all progressive towns, and with our natural advantage, having the best harbor in the Atlantic and Northern New Brunswick, and our citizens working together in the interest of town at large, and making proper arrangements for new industries and modern conveniences for new residents, you will see a marked change in progress, which has not been so bad, as our population has doubled in the last ten years.

One industry that I would ask you all to bear in mind is the Pulp and Paper industry, which is bound to be the future of our lumber industry. The Restigouche River with its numerous branches, together with the Nouvelle and Esquimaux Rivers will furnish raw material for two or three of these mills, and we should use every effort to have the first one located within our town limits, and with your co-operation, all working together, there is no reason why we should not succeed. Thanking you again for your hearty and strong support, I can assure you on behalf of the Council and myself that we will do any

The parish of St. John Evangelist is very large with a noble and laborious population of over 3000 souls, under the religious direction of our venerable and energetic pastor the Rev. J. O. Drapeau who has lived among us over 23 years. Let us note also that we possess, we might say, one of the most popular mer-

chants of the County of Bonaventure in the person of Mr. George Frenette, mayor of our Municipality, secretary-treasurer of the School Commission and post master of the largest post office of this parish. All find in Mr. Frenette an intimate friend. Commercial travellers also find there the most perfect accommodations. We have also here a residing physician, Dr. J. A. The brave farmers in that vicinity earnestly desire that their petitions to the government would have special attention for the completion of works begun in the year 1911.

HANDS UP

Shot by Fellow-Student at Essex School—Would Not Box

Once more the danger of young people being in possession of firearms has been demonstrated. The practice nearly ended in the death of Manuel Coello, a Spanish student at Forest House School, Woodford, when Frederick Sauri, sixteen, a Mexican, also a student at the school, was charged with attempted murder. Inspector Ellis saw the injured boy lying on a table, with a bullet wound in his stomach, and a doctor was attending him. In consequence of what he was told, he informed Sauri that he would be arrested on a charge of attempted murder, and when they walked into the latter's bedroom he said:

"We were playing here with boxing gloves, and I said, 'Shall we box?' and he said, 'No, no.' I said, 'Hands up! Hands up!' I took the revolver from the top of my desk and put it close to his stomach. I said, 'I will kill you.' I had no intention of shooting, but the revolver went off. The revolver fell on the floor, and he began to cry. I took hold of him around the waist and assisted him to the nursery. I am very sorry, as he was my best friend."

The inspector added that Sauri also told him that he purchased the revolver for \$5 about three months previously, and the revolver in question—an automatic one—with three live cartridges in it, was handed to him by one of the masters at the school. On the door in the prisoner's bedroom was a spent cartridge, and also a live one.

In opening the case, Mr. Baines (prosecuting) said the scholars in the school were mostly foreigners, who resided there. Coello and Sauri went out for a walk, and Sauri alleged that Coello had played some tricks on him, and he would "have it back on him in some way." Sauri tried to induce Coello to box, but he would not, and Sauri said, "You won't fight I'll take my pistol and kill you. Whether that was said out of bravado or not he would not say, but it was certain that the pistol was loaded, and that it was fired by Sauri. Coello had since been at the London Hospital, where the bullet was extracted.

Coello, a youth of sixteen, said when they got back to the school they went into Sauri's room and put on boxing gloves. Sauri wanted him to box, but he would not, and took off the gloves. Sauri then said, "I'm going to shoot you," and picked up a pistol, which was loaded, and "took aim." He then unloaded the pistol, "because he did not want to shoot me," and believing there was no other cartridge in the revolver, pulled the trigger.

Mr. Melville (defending) said, having heard the evidence of the injured lad—for they could not call him a prosecutor—he felt that there was no evidence to show that the affair was other than an accident. After it occurred somebody appeared to have lost his head and sent for the police. The case was dismissed.

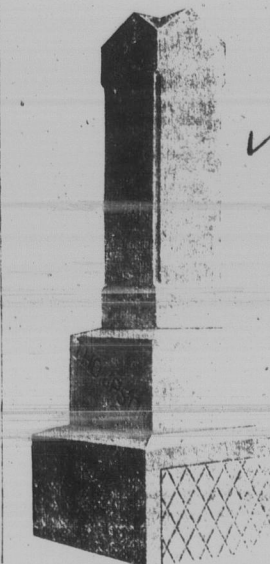

THE CIGARETTE

The Montreal Gazette in an editorial on the above says—

The Woman's Christian Temperance Union is working for the prohibition of the cigarette, and a bill with this end in view, it is promised, will be introduced at the next session of Parliament. The measure, it may be predicted, will hardly pass. No Parliament could, with reason, abolish the cigarette and leave the more solid and far stronger pipe and cigar.

The great objection some women have to the cigarette is that it is a favorite with juveniles. That objection has in a measure been removed in most communities since laws have been passed forbidding the sale of cigarettes to boys 16 years of age and under. Such should not smoke at all, and there are people who would raise the age limit to 18 years. The strict observance of the law with respect to juveniles should be sufficient for the enemies of tobacco, unless it is to be barred in every form. For the cigarette is the mild est to m in which the weed can be smoked. Every smoker knows that.

The solid fellows who smoke pipes and cigars would exchange neither the one nor the other for a ton of the paper covered smokes that are enjoyed by young fellows, and that are growing in favor with girls who believe a woman has just as much right to drink intoxicating liquors and make a chimney out of herself as a man. These girls smoke cigarettes because they can't smoke anything else. A pipe or a cigar would send them reeling to bed after a few puffs of what makes rough fellows so contented and mild that they feel like joining the peace society that Mr. Andrew Carnegie occupies part of his time with. Cigarettes are resorted to sometimes, also, by the real smokers. They come in handy between acts at the theatre when escort and buyer of tickets of admission sneaks out to the lobby or sidewalk. They are also useful during waits at rural railway stations, when the baggage men are putting off barrels of beer and taking on tubs of butter and cases of eggs. To light a cigar under such circumstances, and to have to throw it away after a few draws and satisfied grunts would be a crime that no veteran would indulge in. He respects the pleasure-giver to much. It is almost as good as his pipe. The temporary substitute he casts aside without a qualm of conscience when the conductor shouts "Halt! Board!" or the man in the theatre presses the button that makes the bell ring in the bar as a sign that the curtain will be drawn up inside of two minutes. To him it is a mystery why people attack the mild cigarette and ignore the pipe and cigar, which he knows are many times stronger than the persecuted article. The whole three are luxuries; not one of them is a necessity. They can be done without by men just the same as candy and ice cream sodas can be done without by women. They are as unnecessary as silk stockings or vegetables and fruits from the tropics in or out of season. They give transitory pleasure to men, that is all. It is unreasonable to condemn one as the other. Let all three be kept from growing lads and they will do very little harm.

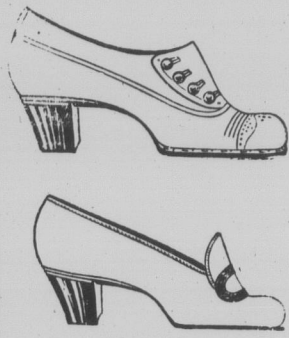

The following are excerpts from an article by Elbert Hubbard which appeared in the last number of the "Cosmopolitan". Coming from such a source, they are worthy of careful attention.

"I hate drunkenness, but I do not hate the drunkard.

If any man should have our friendship it is the man who has failed to be a friend to himself.

The fact is, the victim of strong drink often has all the virtues—including high intelligence and a tender, sympathetic heart—and yet when the Demon Drink clutches him, his will is paralyzed, and Satan is in the saddle.

"The worst about strong drink has never been told. It cannot be told. It escapes the limitations of language.

But I think we err in despising the drunkard. Our hearts should go out to him in pity.

A part of his hallucination often is, that he is not a drunkard. "I can quit any time," he says. But he who says that seldom quits until Death stops his mouth with dust.

And the truth is, any man who deliberately turns his glass down, and declines to drink anything but pure water, when the others order "Scotch", will always have the respect of "the others." Not only this, but he will have the respect of himself.

Prize your health, prize your word; prize your reason! Hold fast to the resolve, "Touch not, taste not, handle not," and work, and you will be pointed out as a distinguished person. GIRL GOES OVER MACHIAS' FALLS

Tragic Death of Miss Beatrice Allen, a Calais Girl

Machias, May 9.—A tragic drowning accident—one of the most heart-rending which Maine has ever known—occurred here Thursday afternoon, when Miss Beatrice Allen, the 19 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Allen, of Calais, and a student of the Washington Normal School, fell into the mill pond from a boom while crossing the river after school. The swift current in the river sweep her toward the falls. She paused for a moment at the brink, catching tightly at a plank which had been thrown to her. On Thursday night, after school was over, Miss Allen, together with Ruth Bridgman, another student and her closest friend, started for the post office from Mrs. David Perkin's house at Grove and Water streets. A boom of logs stretched across the mill pond, and it is frequently used as a short cut. Beatrice usually made the trip by way of the bridge, but on Thursday night the girls were in a hurry and they started over the boom instead. A plank, which had been nailed into the boom broke and Miss Allen went into the water. A number of people rushed to the scene but were powerless to render assistance.

WHY WOMEN LIVE LONGER THAN MEN

Do Not Expend Their Vital Strength Unnecessarily—Their Figures Are Changing

Statistics prove that women live longer than men. From this point arises an extremely interesting physiological question—how is it to be accounted for that the sex which always has been considered physically stronger than men should in the majority of instances outlive men?

If we are to believe the latest authorities on the subject, we find that women are much more tenacious of life and resist disease much more readily than the average man. She is in many respects the superior of the two.

As a rule, she does not expend her vital strength unnecessarily, while the majority of men either in work, in play, or in pleasure are literally prodigal of their store.

One writer has turned out some instructive comparative figures with regard to the liability of men and women to disease and death. He says from 3 to 35 years of age the death rate between the sexes remains about even, but afterwards the scale turns in favor of women. At 40 a woman has seventy-eight chances to one against dying, while man has only forty-nine chances to one. At 60 the odds are nearly twice as large in favor of woman, and at 80 they are five times as great.

Prof. Sargent of Harvard says their figures are changing to resemble more the men: More height, deeper chests, smaller hips.
