TRAPPERS ARE TO BE LOOKED AFTER

To Prevent Illegal Sending of Furs Out of This Province.

Federicton, Nov. 16.—In view of the number of reports reaching the chief game warden regarding the custom of resident trappers of the province smuggling pelts across the line for sale in the State of Maine, it has been decided by the game authorities of Maine and New Brunswick to cooperate in suppressing this practice.

The game laws of New Brunswick provide a penalty of \$100 or thirty days' jail for convictions under this section when resident trappers smuggle pelts which have had no royalty paid on them and for which no license has been taken on.

DEATH OF W. D. DUNCAN

Prominent Citizen Passes Away Monday Evening After Short Illness.

Tuesday morning citizens generally were grieved to learn of the death of W. D. Duncan, Esq., which took place about 9 o'clock Monday evening. Although Mr. Duncan had been ill since last March it was not until a few days ago that a serious turn for the worse was noticed.

The deceased who was in his 63rd year, was one of Campbellton's most honored citizens, always having the interests of our town at heart, and devoted much of his time to its advancement.

He was born at Glencoe, Restigouche Co., and spent his boyhood days there. Some twenty years ago he purchased what is known as Long Island, which he has successfully farmed since taking it over. While at Flatlands Mr. Duncan was a member of the Board of School Trustees for that district. For years he held the office of Justice of the Peace, and shortly after the death of the late W. A. Trueman was appointed Stipendiary Magistrate for the County of Restigouche, which position he held up until a year ago. In both these offices he gave good satisfaction. He was a consistent member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church holding the responsible position of elder. Several years ago he represented Ward III at the Town Council Board, and at the time of his death represented the Parish of Addington at the County Council Board, having been returned by acclamation in September last, this being his second term at that Board.

He was also an active member of the Campbellton Board of Trade and as a member of that organization was generally appointed a delegate to interview the governments upon all important matters in which this district was interested.

He was pre-deceased by his wife some six years ago, and devoted to mourn the loss of a kind and devoted father, one daughter, Margaret, and two sons Melville and Balfour. He is also survived by two sisters one in the West, and Miss Nellie Duncan of Campbellton, to whom the heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended in the great loss they have been called upon to bear.

The funeral will be held this afternoon from his late residence.

HOW IT WORKS UNDER MEIGHEN

A Fine Example of How Canadian Business Is Being Depressed.

(St. John Telegraph).

To the Editor of the Telegraph:—

Sir—

So far, I have been indifferent to the political situation, but I had an experience to-day, which I consider an injustice and I propose to lay it before the public for consideration. Thus I decided to buy a little plant for domestic comfort, and wanted to find out what it would cost me. I asked the agent for the same if I could not buy a Canadian plant and save exchange and duty. He told me he could sell me a Canadian or an American plant. He being a friend of mine, said buy the American, you will get better satisfaction. I said I will have to pay exchange and duty. He said there is nothing in that. The Canadian is up to the same price with duty added as the American. I next asked the man re fixtures. He advised me to buy American. "They are cheaper than Canadian, although the duty of seventy per cent is added," he said. I went to the customs house and asked them what it would cost me to bring into St. John this plant. This is the answer:

Cost of plant in U. S. \$500. They add exchange at nine per cent, \$45, a total of \$545. Then they add duty on plant 27 1/2%, also on exchange, \$149.87 or \$694.87 in all. Then the Government adds on sales tax and duty a four per cent exchange tax or \$27.79, a total of \$722.66. In all the plant cost \$500. The Government takes from me \$222.66 making a total of \$722.66. The freight is not here.

We don't want free trade. We have to have a revenue and also to foster our industries, but this - I think is prohibitive, not protection.

This is said with no bias, and I ask any fair minded voter "do we want the taxes revised?" Before this I was doubtful how I would cast my vote, I have no doubt now.

JAMES MURDOCK MAKES CHAIR

Declared Board of Commerce Was Interfered With in Duties.

Port Credit, Ont., Nov. 12.—Answering the challenge that he make public officials who he had said had used their influence to prevent the Board of Commerce from "shackling alleged Canadian profiteers," James Murdock, former member of the board, at the public meeting here last night in the interests of W. J. Love, Liberal candidate for Peel county, named Right Hon. George E. Foster, Hon. C. J. Doherty, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne and Hon. James Calder.

He also asserted that Premier Meighen, while a member of the Unionist cabinet in 1918, 1919 and 1920, was "somewhat connected with the treasury" of the Board of Commerce being prevented from properly functioning.

On Dec. 19, 1919, Mr. Murdock declared, a cabinet minister gave him a fatherly sort of talk for about an hour and a half to the effect that as a member of the Board of Commerce he must be careful not to hurt the big interests. This was the Minister of Justice. Mr. Murdock said he was given this advice in a "nice way, indeed."

"There is one gentleman who has done more than any other in preventing the people of Canada getting a square deal, as I saw it, and that is Right Hon. George E. Foster," said Mr. Murdock.

Although a kindly gentleman, who would not harm anyone in Canada individually, he declared, Mr. Foster "had the greatest disregard for the interests of the public of any member of the present or any other government."

SAYS EVERYBODY WAS FOOLED

Except the Cabinet—Mr. Murdock Making it Interesting.

Toronto, Nov. 16.—"Everybody was fooled into the belief that there was going to be something doing, but the Cabinet of Canada knew otherwise. Why the advice of a Minister of the Crown was that the Board of Commerce was intended to increase prices instead of decreasing them. The interests knew that with that dose of chloroform handed to the people they were free to go as far as they liked and get all that they could and they proceeded to do it," declared James Murdock at Kenwood Hall last night, in returning to the charge against the Meighen Government for appointing the Board of Commerce and then preventing the Board from functioning.

Sir George Foster, Hon. C. J. Doherty, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Sir Henry Drayton and Hon. Arthur Meighen were singled out as some of those who placed their influence between the people of Canada and lower prices and gave power to their monied friends to dep the Board and to proceed with their plundering of the purses of the public.

FATHER POINT



Father Point Lighthouse, Foghorn Station and Keeper's House.

Father Point is a little Quebec cape jutting out into the St. Lawrence where it is still an ocean. It is here that the immigrant from European countries during the summer months gets his first human touch with Canada and Canadians. Father Point would not appeal to the ordinary tourist or holiday maker. It is off the beaten track and only reached by car from Rimouski. Its charm is merely that of hundreds of other French Canadian villages which are more accessible. The fresh breezes blow from off the St. Lawrence as they do upon countless other fishing villages along the river shore. This place is a haven for the tired, the brain-taxed, the over-worked and neurotic in its meditative calm and brooding hush.

The great interest in the little hamlet is for those who go down to the sea in ships. Near the extremity of the point a modern lighthouse has been erected which each night flashes its warning light across twenty miles of water. In close proximity is the great foghorn blasting its message when fog enshrouds the light. Upon the hill stands a wireless station which receives advice of every vessel entering the Gulf before it proceeds

BIG INCREASE IN GAME LICENSES

Province Gets \$56,000 During Past Season—North Shore Provides Most.

The present season for big game hunting is reported to be the best ever experienced as far as concerns the receipts paid into the provincial treasury from license-fee paid by hunters. A great influx of non-resident hunters is the cause of the record total. Col. T. G. Loggie, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, stated today that the receipts from the sale of game licenses had totalled \$56,000. The increase was about seven thousand dollars over total of the preceding year.

The total announced for the fiscal year is not the total for the game season as the end of the financial year of the province comes on October 31st which is in the middle of the game season. November will provide a considerable number of game-licenses sales thus increasing the total.

McAdam is looming large as a place of sale of game licenses as many of the parties from the United States purchase their licenses at the place immediately after entering the province. North Shore points also are reporting heavy sales of game licenses. That is accounted for by the fact that an increasing number of parties from Middle Western States enter the province at those points, the ticket agents in the United States routing them over the C.N.R. via Moncton.

The revenue received by the province from the Crown Lands in spite of the depressed state of the lumber market, have reached a most gratifying total. Some payments have come in since October 31st but as the books of the province close on that day they will not be shown. The total from stumpage was about \$1,100,000. Fredericton Mail, Friday.

Among the floral tributes at the funeral of Private Armand Comeau, whose body was brought home from France by the American government for burial was a handsome wreath from American Consul Woodward, who saw to it that all honor was paid this Canadian who enlisted in the American Army in May, 1918. The entire expense of bringing the remains home and of laying them to rest at St. Anne de Restigouche, the deceased's former home, was borne by the American government, and American Consul Woodward in seeing that the U. S. flag also the flags of the American vessels in port, were flying at half mast, as well as placing his services at the disposal of the bereaved family is evident of the faithful manner in which this official is performing his duty for the government he represents.

NEW RICHMOND CENTRE.

Again the angel of death visited our neighborhood and bore from our midst a venerable and much respected resident in the person of Joseph Hardy, at the advanced age of eighty-two. The late Mr. Hardy's parents came from Miramichi after the fire of 1825 and settled at Collins Brook, where the deceased was born.

He was a member of St. Andrew's Church and took a deep interest in all church work, and conducted the singing Sabbath School for years. He is survived by his wife, and one daughter Mrs. John W. McCool and one sister Mrs. J. Woodman and a number of grand-children, all of whom have the heart felt sympathy of the community. The impressive funeral service, which was conducted by Mr. McKay assisted by Rev. J. F. McCurdy and Mr. Vint, was largely attended, showing the esteem in which the deceased was held.


But this method did not work out well, and after a vain endeavor to make a choice, it was resolved to take a ballot, and the ballot chose Montgomery.



on a new lease of life. Industries boomed, immigrants flowed into Canada. Great public works were undertaken and almost overnight Canada became a nation. And all under Liberal rule.

Now, why this distinction in favour of this Company? Is it not enough that these vested interests are protected through the heavy tariff that is in existence, without having the Company still further protected, pursued and paid, in this way? Would not many citizens this year and last year under the financial difficulties that they have had to bear, have been very glad to pay their Tax with a note? This is something that the Government Candidate may try to explain. His explanation will be interesting and will be awaited with interest.



EX-SERVICE MEN GIVEN PASSAGE? In the British House of Commons, recently, Sir W. L. Wood, permanent under-secretary of state for the colonies, replying to Charles Edwards, Labor, stated that the ex-service men who had proceeded overseas under the government's emigration scheme, 25,000 had settled in Canada, 20,000 in Australia, 10,000 in New Zealand, 5,000 in South America and 2,000 elsewhere.

Thirty-five thousand had received free passage. The total included dependents and also ex-service women and the average cost to the exchequer was twenty-six pounds each.
