

Chosen Friends.

TORONTO, Feb. 14.—The Grand Council of Chosen Friends was convened at Richmond Hall, Ald. James Dixon, Hamilton, grand councilor, in the chair. The annual grand councilor, in the chair. The annual reports of the various officers showed satisfactory progress during the past year. There were issued 1,027 certificates, and insurance to the amount of \$2,568,000 was carried by members. In the sick benefit 201 certificates were issued and claims to the amount of \$897 50 were paid. Twenty-six councils were organized with a charter membership of 585. The receipts on account of the relief fund during the year were \$10,569 55 and the payments \$6,130 90. The receipts on general fund account reached the sum of \$2,955 62, while the expenditure on the same account was \$2,520 84. In the sick benefit department the receipts amounted to \$1,098 50 and the payments to \$897 50. The death rate was one and a half per 1,000.

An application has also been made to the Dominion Government to proclaim a full pardon to any of the party who should turn Queen's evidence, other than the actual murderer.



Indications that the Arrested Saddler is the Murderer of "Carrotty Nell."

London, Feb. 14.—Another man has been arrested in Whitechapel on suspicion of being the murderer of "Carroty Nell."

When taken into custody blood was found on his olothes. The prisoner was seen in company with the murdered woman about a quarter of an hour before the crime was committed.

London, Feb. 16.—The man arrested on suspicion of having murdered "Carroty Nell" is a saddler. He has been absent from England for eighteen months, or about the period which has elapsed since the last Whitechapel murder. A woman detained as a witness asserts she saw the prisoner quarreling with the murdered woman narly in the evening before the orime was committed. A policeman has identified the prisoner as man he met about a quarter of an hour after the murder. The policeman noticing the man had blood stains on his clothes stopped him and asked several questions regarding the blood stains. The man replied that he had been assaulted while in the neighborhood of the docks. The policeman not being aware that a murder had been committed, was satisfied the man was telling the truth, and so allowed him to pass. The prisoner's face is badly scratched, as if by a woman's finger nails. The prisoner stoutly denies having at any time met the murdered woman. He was lately a fireman on board the steamer Fez, from Turkey. A formidable-looking knife has been traced to his possession.
