New American Steamship Line,
[New York Press.]

It is reported from Philadelphia the President Griscom, of the Inman Steamsh Line, is prepared to give an order in the shippards of that city for the construction of three ocean racers like the City of Paris and City of New York, when the bill which passed the lower branch of Congress on Tuesday shall become a law. The measure provides for the admission of the two great ships named to American registration when two similar ships of American manufacture shall have been put affoat, to be operated sinps named to American registration when two similar ships of American manufacture shall have been put afloat, to be operated in conjunction with them as an American line from New York to England. The possession of such a line of steamships in American registry would be an additional protection to American shipping on the high seas, since they can be promptly taken by the United States Government for cruisers in any event of war involving ocean operations. The Navy Department discovered during the Chilian and Italian controversies that we were weak in this direction, and the present movement has undoubted merit on that account. It will not injure the protected shipbuilding industry of the country, but will immediately set in active motion large forces of men for the creation of the new steamships.

Destructive Dynamite Explosion.

New York, May 12.—A Caracas, Venezuala dispatch says: This city, for the third time since the revolt against Palacio was actively begun, was startled and terrified Tuesday night by a dynamite explosion. It was the most deafening and destructive yet experienced. It occurred at a time when the streets were filled with people. They were panie-stricken, and fied in all directions, seeking the nearest shelter. The police and soldiery came quickly dashing up, but the bomb thrower had escaped. The bomb was exploded alongside the residence of Minister of Finance Mattos, who had recently advanced Palacio a large sum of money said to have been supplied by Guezman Blanco, a relative of Mattos, on condition that the last named was to take the customs receipts until the loan should have been repaid. No one was injured by the bomb, but considerable damage was done to Matto's house and the French Consulate which adjoin it. In searching one of the neighboring houses for traces of the dynamiters yesterday, the police came across a dozen bombs, six flasks of vitricl and a large number of rifles.
