The quality of the grain crops this year is much above the average. The term "metre centners" is an Austrian expression for hundredweights measured by metres as the grain lies in the wagons.

The President throws out no suggestion, but some action is certainly necessary. It is probable that the problem which the United States has to solve may lead, not to bimetalism, but to more mature and unbiased consideration of the possible uses of silver. Progress of the Great Irish Conciliatory Measure. Its Objects Most Laudable and Likely

to Benefit the Empire. Chamberlain's Ambition and the Late Scene in the

Commons. The Lords and the Bill, the People and the Lords.

The interest taken in the progress of the Home Rule Bill in the British House of Commons has been universal throughout the English speaking world. The discussion on the measure in committee has given rise to various startling contingencies. It has displayed Chamberlain vividly in his role of "Judas;" it has precipitated one of the most disgraceful scenes ever witnessed in the first deliberative body of the world; and, now that practically the consideration stage is past, it has started innumerable prognostications regarding the probable action of the House of Lords. An ADVERTISER representative called upon Hon. Dåvid Mills, and was successful in getting him to talk upon these, as well as upon other points connected with an en-

grossing question. grossing question.

"What do you think of the position of the Home Rule Bill?" observed the scribe. "I think the position of the Home Rule Bill," answered Mr. Mills, "at the present time, is, on the whole, satisfactory. It has been pushed through the House of Commons as rapidly as the cause in question would negmit.

been pushed through the House of Commons as rapidly as the cause in question would permit.

"Of course, I am a Home Ruler. Such a policy is a step in the direction of a federal union of the different parts of the United Kingdom which must at no distant day be adopted. As long as the work of legislation was limited to comparatively few and simple measures, a legislative union, or, as Mr. Gladstone calls it, an 'incorporate union,' the present system might be made to work fairly well; but the demands for legislation are so great, foreign and imperial affairs have grown to such enormous proportions, that they are alone quite adequate to occupy the attention of Parliament for five or six mouths every year. Indeed, the duties of Parliament have so outgrown the available capacity to overtake its work that the present unwieldy system cannot possibly last much longer. And so I think that a measure of home rule for Ireland is one, not only of great consequence to Ireland, but it is a very important initial step in the direction of necessary constitutional reforms.

I have followed the debates on the home rule question pretty closely, and I think during the present session Mr. Chamberlain has done more to lower the tone of parliamentary discussion and to degrade the moral tone of Parliament than all others put together. He has been the cause of more mischief than he will ever be able to repair. I do not think Mr. Chamberlain's success in likely at all to be equal to his abilities. The change in his conduct is not, in my opinion, due to conviction but to personal pique and disappointed ambition. And, so, there are others who will presumably have more trust imposed in them. He is no more likely to be Prime Minister in a new Tory Government than he was as leader of those whom he has deserted."



In Jackson Park

Attractive Features of the Forestry Building.

Choice Specimens of Trees and Timber From All Parts of the Globe.

Gladstone's Axe in a Glass Case-Ap Inkling of Ontario's Splendid Forest Resources—Exhibits From the Dominion at Large.

World's Fair, Jackson Park, Chicago,
Aug. 9.—The coolest correr I have been
able to find in the White City is the
forestry building. Close to the ceaseless
lapping of the waves on the shore of lake
Michigan, in the extreme southeastern
part of the park, there is always a grateful
breeze playing through its piney portals.
Beautifully situated, it is one of thei most
unique and interesting buildings of the
World's Fair, both for its style of architecture and the highly attractive exhibits
it contains.

Rustic in design and detail, the forestry building is probably the most expensive of that particular kind ever erected in America. It cost \$100,000. The sides are made of slabs with the bark removed. There is a wide veranda encircling the whole building, the columns of which, supporting the roof, are all of varied tree trunks. They are bunched in groups of three, one of which will be from 16 to 20 inches in diameter and the other two companions smaller. They are all 25 feet in height and neatly labeled. The dimensions of the building are 528 by 208 feet. Inside are all sorts of wood, both in the rough and manufactured state, from every clime—plain, mountain, seashore, river bottom, swamp and jungle have all contributed to the display.

The central exhibit in the building is a grand pyramid built of specimens of wood from all over the world. Verily it is a universal congress of blocks. California's contribution, a cutting fourteen feet in diameter of red wood, 475 years old when Columbus landed under the scant shade of the paim trees of San Salvador, forms the base of the pyramid. Around and upon it

Columbus landed under the scant shade of the palm trees of San Salvador, forms the base of the pyramid. Around and upon it are grouped ching-chang from Siam, bamboo from Japan, teak wood from India, birch wood from Ontario, and specimens from all other countries.

And there is a real, sure enough axe in a glass case that figures as a sort of frontispiece to this wonderful wood-grouping in the central exhibit. It is Gladstone's axe, the very axe the Grand Old Man used in cutting out the undergrowth at Hawarden

the very axe the Grand Old Man used in cutting out the undergrowth at Hawarden when in training to knock out Salisbury in the political arena. Some of the specimens in the exhibits attract special attention. There is a mammoth red wood plank 16 feet 5 itches wide, 12 feet 9 inches long and 5 inches thiek, cut from a California tree 35 feet in diameter, and supposed to be 1,500 years old. A beautiful carved door, made of teak wood from British India, is much admired; and a very large birch knot from Peterboro county, Ontario, attracts no end of attention. There are collections of wood from 25 of the States, representing numberless varieties of forest

attracts no end of attention. There are collections of wood from 25 of the States, representing numberless varieties of forest growth. Sixteen foreign nations and 31 individual exhibitors, domestic and foreign, and among them the Province of Ontario, make a very creditable showing, and withal a very practical one.

The Ontario section is on the main aisle, south of the Dominion court, and occupies a floor space of 1,000 square feet. It is fronted by a handsome Corinthian archway, over which is the sign "Ontario" in large gold letters. The whole is surmounted by Canadian flags and emblems. The Ontario exhibit tends to show the splendid forest resources of the Province in a manner that arouses the greatest interest, especially among practical lumbermen, builders, wood and cabinet workers. There are 66 exhibits in the log and squared blocks, comprising all the valuable woods, such as red pine, spruce, cak, ash, beech, maple, birch, etc., all neatly arranged, and relieved at intervals with sample boards, beautifully polished.

An attractive feature is a case of polished wood specimens sent by the Hon. A. S. Hardy, Commissioner of Crown Lands, some 30 different kinds of wood begin represented. A pyramid of blocks ornaments and the surface of the surfa

some 30 different kinds of wood being rep-resented, A pyramid of blocks ornamentsd with carved Indian hunting scenes from D. S. Hill of the Six Nations Indians, also attracts much attention. There are par-ticularly fine specimens of black cherry and white pine.

Mr. Geo. Harte, of Saltfleet, Ont., is the very efficient and courteous superintendent of this section. Mr. Mathew Gaetz, who is here to meet and interest German visitors.

in the exposition, is a valuable acquisition to the staff of the Ontario commission.

The other 2,000 feet of space allotted to The other 2,000 feet of space allotted to Canada is divided between Quebec, British Columbia and the Northwest Territories. The Dominion has a large collection of photography of living trees, contributed by the Geological Survey Museum, Ottawa. The photographs are shown in frames made of the wood represented in the picture.

picture. Chief Buchanan is said to have expressed Chief Buchanan is said to have expressed the opinion that the exhibit of commercial timber made by Ontario is the best in the building. However that may be as regards the fir woods, the birch, beech, cherry and other fine hard woeds capable of brilliant polish cause great admiration.

No less than 600 inquiries by letter have already been received as the first fruits of this wonderful display of Canadian woods. The value to the Dominion of this advertisement of its forest wealth will presently be appreciated at its true worth.

LONDON'S WATER SUPPLY-WHAT MUST BE DONE IMMEDIATELY.
Once and for all, let it be understoo

hat it is not scarcity of water in the nagnificent springs from which the city of London draws its supply that is the cause of the present troubles. There is plenty of water in the springs, and, if there were not, there is abundance of water running to waste, on both sides of the river, near Springbank, to add to the quantity available as soon as the needs of the city demand

The trouble is in the pumping capacity, and even it would be sufficient if we could always trust to have a moderate fall of rain throughout the summer and autumn months with which to replenish the river and supply the pumping force for the hydraulic machinery.

What the city needs and must have is ncreased steam pumping power that will be available at all times to take the place of the hydraulic pumps, and prevent the annoying periodic inconvenience arising

from shortage. +++ The steam pumps were designed to pump 2,000,000 gallons (imperial) in 24 hours at 40 revolutions per minute. This speed has been increased to 50 revolutions per minute, since an additional boiler was added to the equipment, giving 2,500,000 gallons per day. The hydraulic machinery was designed to pump 3,000,000 gallons per day at a speed of 22 revolutions per minute. Since the new crank was put in two years ago, the pumps can safely be run to force that quantity up. The steam pumps have been going night and day, but now and again they should have a rest, and when the boilers are to be cleaned-as happens to-morrow - they have to be stopped Owing to the low state of water in the river, caused by the drought, the hydraulic river, caused by the drought, the hydraulic should be removed at once. And would pumps can only be operated five or six it not be a good thing for the railway comhours a day, and this makes all the differ ence in the world in the total quantity that reaches the reservoir. On an average with the lawn service restricted to the morning, the daily consumption of water in the city is 3,750,000 gallons, but the pumping power available is only able to produce about 3,300,000. This is the case in a nutshell, and to meet this defect every energy of the water commissioners must now be directed. Engineer Findlay informs us that, though this is an exceptionally dry summer, taxing the energies of the machinery at his command to a much greater extent than any

To do this it will be necessary to duplicate the main to the city, and to increase the pumping capacity very materially. Steam power not much short of 4,000,000 gallons a day and hydraulic power to the extent of 5,000,000 or 6,000,000 gallons a day should be provided. Then come dry weather or come wet, the city will be able to fulfill its contract with the taxpayers and remove all apprehensions of machinery breaks or of bursts in the main. The strength of the additional machinery suggested may appear to be great, but its cost will not be much more than that of pumping apparatus of smaller capacity.


