ONTARIO WILL NOT CHANGE ITS POLICY

Major Tolmie Says Bilingual Situation Is One of Drifting.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, March 25 .- 7:45 p.m. - Herert C. Hoover, chairman of the American commission for relief in Belgium, who returned to London from Paris today announced that the negotiations for feeding 2,500,000 French civilians who are behind the German lines have been completed. The arrangements were settled between Mr. Hoover and French delegates from the north, whom the Germans permitted to journey to Paris, by way of Switzerland, to attend

For the last two months the comeission has been reluctantly extending the distribution of relief farther and farther southward from the Belgian frontier into France, and for the last month has been feeding over 500,000 French persons between Maubeuge and Sedan. The condition of these people, chiefly women and children, is desperate. Old age and infant mortality have increased with extraordinary rapidity under the very restricted supply, and the coarse character of the food avail-

Requires \$2,500,000 a Month. "The French Government," said Mr. Hoover, "was unable to come to the assistance of these unfortunate people, the commission arranged a series of banking credits on behalf of the various communal authorities which are cut off from the rest of the country by the German army. The French delegates estimate that in addition to such stores as still remain, they can keep their people alive on a ration of 6 1-2 ounces of flour, one ounce of beans, one ounce of rice and one ounce of bacon per day, together with a sufficient supply of condensed milk and cocoa for extremely young children. The total cost is estimated at from \$2,500,000 to \$3,000,000 per month, and the commission is now n a position to state that it can see its way clear to carry on this work for the next two months.t





MINE SWEEPERS **WORK ALL NIGHT**

Their Labors In Dardanelles Hindered By a Violent Storm.

[Canadian Press.]

Paris. March 26 .- Mine sweeper continued their operations in the Dardanelles all of Wednesday night, according to dispatches from Tenedos received yesterday by the Athens correspondent of the Havas Agency. They were protected by the guns of cruisers from the allied fleet, but their work was made difficult by a violent storm.

BRITISH PROTECTORS.

London, March 26 .- The British bat-Meships Queen Elizabeth and Agamemnon and the cruiser Cornwall entered the Dardanelles Straits Wednesday night to protect mine-sweepers, according to a dispatch to Reuter's Telegram Company from the Island of Tenedos dated Thursday. At 10 o'clock Turkish artillery at Erenkul fired five shells, and the forts at Kilid Bahr also fired. The British vessels replied with twenty rounds. To this the Turks made no

From midnight until morning the mine-sweepers continued their work without disturbance, the correspondent says, and with very satisfactory results.

MINES SAVED STRAITS.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 26 .- British naval officers who participated in the operations last week in the Dardanelles, cables the correspondent at Athens, of Reuter Telegram Company, expressed the belief that but for floating mines the Narrows of the Dardanelles would have been forced March 18, the day the allied fleets so successfully bombarded the forts.


