UNITED STATES ENGINEERS IN IT.

American Engineers have again been in the throes of flerce conflict, which they have done excellent work in transportation. German cavalry in small numbers has been in action, but thus far it has been used merely to harass the British during their withdrawal.

Early this morning the Germans again hurled great numbers of infantry against the British line near Ervillers, but at the latest reports the onrushing troops had been unable to force their way through the inense artillery barrage which the British maintained. HEAVY BATTLE PROCEEDING.

A heavy battle also has been proceeding today on the British right lank, where the enemy had succeeded in forcing his way across the Somme and the canal south of Ham. The Allies were delivering counterattacks with the purpose of pushing the invaders across the waterway. GERMANS ARE WEARY.

There seems small doubt but that the German attacking troops are dog-weary, fighting under great strain; but this is mentioned merely as an interesting sidelight, and not for the purpose of sounding a note of optimism. Harder fighting than has yet occurred undoubtedly will

The British have been fighting with traditional stubbornness, and at many points they have held the Germans back time after time, although hemselves greatly outnumbered. Washington, March 25 .- President Wilson today cabled Field Marshal Haig congratulating him on the British stand against the German offensive and predicting a final Allied victory. The president's message read:
"May I not express to you my warm admiration of the splendid steadfastness and valor with which your troops have withstood the German onset, and the perfect con-fidence all Americans feel that you will win a secure and final victory."

Berlin, March 25 .- German headquarters reports that Bapaume was captured during the night. In the evening Nesle was taken by storm, the statement adds. British, Americans and French were thrown back through a pathless wooded country.

More than 45,000 prisoners and more than 600 guns have been captured, the statement says.

Bapaume is on the northern part of the battlefront, where the British line for the most part has been held. It is one of the larger towns on the fighting front, from which a number of roads radiate. The official German statement of Sunday night sald a gigantic struggle was taking place for the town. It is 13 miles below Arras.

A Gallant Defence.

South of St. Quentin, a number of strong British redoubts made a gallant defence and it was nightfall before the last of them, with their machine gunners, had been reduced. The end of the first day found the British behind the St. Quentin canal.

Friday morning the enemy renewed his assault with increasing vigor, and after desperate fighting in the region of La Fere, succeeded in getting across to the British side. Further north the British also with-drew from the Nolnon wood. The Germans then drove at Ham, which had been cleared of civilians, and Sat-

irday morning, after obtaining a cross-ng of the canal, drove southward into the British positions.

Drive Against High Land.

In the other main theatre of operations—between Arras and Bapaume—the Germans made their first drive against the high ground between the Cojel and Sensee Rivers. The German preliminary bombardment was terrific and their infantry outnumbered the British eight to one in some cases.

Paris, March 25 .- The Matin says one of the shells fired in the direction of Paris yesterday by the Germans struck a church in the suburbs. Several of the persons who were attending a Palm Sunday service were killed.

British Last Night Repulsed Heavy Attacks Near Bapaume and Drove Portion of the German Troops Across River-Fresh Attacks Developing, With Bapaume As the Storm Centre.

FRENCH TAKE OVER FRONT FOR THE HARD PRESSED BRITISH

London, March 25 .- Fresh attacks by the Germans have developed northward and southward of Bapaume, the war office announces. The British repulsed powerful attacks yesterday afternoon northward of Bapaume.

The British drove back to the eastern bank of the Somme bodies of German troops which had crossed the river between Licourt and Brie, south of Peronne.

ENEMY ATTACKS STOPPED. The statement follows: 'The battle continues with great violence on the whole front. Powerful attacks delivered by the enemy yesterday afternoon and evening north of Bapaume were heavily repulsed. Only at one point did the German infantry reach our trenches, whence they were immediate thrown out. Elsewhere the enemy's attacks were stopped by rifle, n chine gun and artillery fire in front of our positions, and his troops

were driven back with great loss. "During the night and this morning fresh hostile attacks have again developed in this neighborhood and also to the south of Bapaume. "South of eronne, bodies of German troops who had crossed the river between Licourt and Brie were driven back to the east bank b our counter-attacks.'

FRENCH ON BATTLEFRONT.

Paris, March 25 .- The French on Saturday went to the assistance of the British and took over a sector of the battlefront, the war office announces.

In the region of Noyon and on the right bank of the Oise heavy fighting with the Germans is in progress. The statement follows: "French troops began to intervene on March 23 in the battle now being fought on the British front. They relieved certain of the Allied forces and took up fighting themselves on this sector of the front.

FIGHTING FOR RIVER BANK. "At the present time they are engaged in heavy fighting in the region of Noyon, and they are disputing the heights of the right bank of the Oise with important German forces. "Northwest of Rheims there has been a violent artillery action in the region of Courcy and Loivre. In the Champagne two German surprise attacks east of Suippes resulted in failure. He went over the situation thoroughly with Sir Adam Beck, chair-man of the Ontario Hydro Commission, on Saturday and the latter agreed that the situation was, if anything, worse,

As for the light users of the London Electric, the only hope for them at any stage of the situation is that the London Electric be ordered to continue operation for the time being. It is considered not unlikely that the United States fuel commission would agree to supply the local plant with coal on the same basis as it will be supplied to the Toronto Power Company.

What are we, each one of us, prepared to do to insure that Food supply?

Germany, by her submarine campaign, has seen that great Armada, the British Mercantile Marine, shrink in volume.

Germany has seen South America, Australia, New Zealand, India and far away outposts of the Empire practically cut off from supplying food to the Motherland because of the lack of

Forty million Allied men and women having been put on war work, food production has dangerously decreased in Europe.

These forty million consume more food than when they were in ordinary occupations, and there are fewer men for farming. Hence an increased demand and decreased supplies.

The harvest of France was one-third less in 1917 than 1916, and this year must be smaller still, owing to lack of fertilizers, which cannot be supplied through shortage of shapping.

The world's decrease in live stock, as compared to 1913, is approximately 115,000,000 head.

Herbert Hoover Says:

"Our European Allies are dependent upon us for greater quantities of food than we have ever before exported. They are the first line of our defence. Our money, our ships, our life blood, and not least of all, OUR FOOD supply, must be of a common stock.

"In pre-war times, Britain, France, Italy and Belgium yearly imported more than 750,000,000 bushels of grain, plus vast quantities of meats and fats.

"The submarine destruction of shipping has made it necessary to abandon the hope of bringing food from South America, Australasia and India.

"Food must, therefore, be shipped from Canada and the United States—the nearest and

"Canadian and United States supplies are normally 350,000,000 bushels short of the Allied needs. By greater production and conserva-

tion Canada and the United States must combine to increase the export of grain by 150,000,000 bushels.

The Canadian people must recognize that Our Allies have the first claim on our food supplies.

As the shipping situation makes the Allies dependent upon the North American continent for food, it is vitally necessary that Canada should increase her production of food in order to take a larger part in providing for the Allies' requirements. This is especially urgent as the maintenance of a large United States army in

the European field will cause a very heavy drain on that country's food resources.

There must be no peace without victory.

For nearly four years Germany has been struggling against the powers of law and order. She has failed so far to make good her escape with her booty by superior strength and skill. And now she is attempting by intrigue, suggestion, device and propaganda to divert the attention of her antagon-

ists from the struggle itself, and thus to gain her ends by relaxing the strength and skill of her antagonists.

What she can gain from these tactics is plain to all the world in the sorrowful experience of

Russia.

Germany's most dangerous weapon is not her Zeppelin—that is obsolete. Not her submarine—that can be overcome. Not her machine-like army—that has been repeatedly hurled back by the living armies of freemen. Her most dangerous weapon is her propaganda of peace.

While with her hands she murders and despoils, with her voice she invites to parleys.

"You will never be able to dictate terms to Germany has is beaten. The argument you mention is founded on the dangerous fallacy that because Germany is sick of this war she is sick of war in general. She isn't. I doubt if her Government is even sick of this war. You've read the speech of that old brigand, Hertling. Is there any sign of repentance in that speech? Is it a chastened speech? Is it the speech of a statesman who wants disarmament and a league of nations? No! Germany is back in her mood of 1914. She believes she is winning the war. She believes she has won now. And if we talk of peace she HAS won it. Why, it would be better a thousand times that every man in England should be dead than that Germany should issue from this war with the feeling of a conqueror. You hear people use the phrase, 'to the last man, and the last shilling,' and you think it is only a bit of rhetoric, but to my mind it's the most

solemn and absolute truth. I mean when I say it that it would in very truth be a million times better for the people of these islands to be dead, every one of them, rather than live on as the serfs of a triumphant Prussia."

How can any lover of liberty remain insensible to this peril?



PRAYERS FOR THE **ALLIES OFFERED IN** LONDON'S CHURCHES

Efficacy of Prayer on Behalf of Soldiers Urged.

Fervent prayers were offered up in the churches of the city yesterday on behalf of the fighting men of Canada, of the whole of the Empire and of the Allies, in the face of the great crisis of the present. On Saturday, Rev. Byron Snell, secretary of the Ministerlal Alliance, on request of the president, Rev. J. H. Boyd, called attention of the members of the Alliance to the call to prayer to the women of Canada issued by the National Council of Women.

The call to prayer, sent on from the corresponding secretary of the National Council, to the president of the local Council of Women, Mrs. H. A. Boomer, was read at the morning services in a large number of churches, In practically all churches, reference was made to the big offensive launched by the Germans. In St. Paul's Cathedral, in addition to the usual prayers for the war, special prayers were offered yesterday. In St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, a large portion of the evening congregation waited for a special prayer service on behalf of the soldiers on west front and the cause of the Allies, which followed the regular service. Announcing the special service, Rev. D. C. MacGregor urged the importance and efficacy of prayer, recalling the manner in which the children of Israel turned to God in time of trouble, and the deliverance which again and again followed fervent, persistent prayer.
