Sultan's Forces Have Made No Offer of Surrender Despite Rumors That Tripoli Has Fallen-Besiegers Find Bodies of Garrison in the Batteries. Tripoli, Oct. 5.—No offer to surrender had been made by the Turks this morning.
Following yesterday's bombardment by the Italians the cruiser Guiseppe Garibaldi entered the harbor and landed two officers.
The officers visited the Hamidien battery, which had been dismantled by the guns of the warships. The battery had been evacuated by the Turks, who had removed the breach locks of the guns. The bodies of three of the Turkish garrison were found in the fort.







Gift Placed in Scotch Church in Memory of His Father. Edinburgh, Oct. 5.—The King and Queen, accompanied by Princess Mary,



Paris, Oct. 5 .- The campaign against dear food is proceeding in the north with unabated vigor. The mayor of Roubaix has found it necessary to issue an order closing the saloons at half-past 8 in the evening. There are riots in the town almost every Bands of manifestants stone who attempt to disperse them. Barri cades have been erected with paving

cades have been erected with paving stones, wire stretched at either side of the streets, and the rioters take refuge in the yards of houses until they are dislodged by the troops. In the course of the disturrances several soldiers have been wounded.

Things are in a bad way at Denian, where the mayor, who is a socialist deputy, and his assistants have resigned. In this town, besides a hundred gendarmes on duty, there are six companies of infantry, and four squadrons of mounted troops. A regiment of colonial infantry has been sent to strengthen this force.

In Lille, too, the outlook is threatening. At a meeting of 3,000 people a resolution aiming at the destruction of the produce of those peasants who will not conform to the tariff was passed.

At Epernay a number of market gardeners refused to hapack then vegetables and fruits. A crowd of women threatened to lay hands on the goods. The police intervened and pointed out that the market gardeners would be expelled if they did not unpack their produce.

There has been further trouble in Paris, too. As a protest against the high cost of provisions, crowds of people have invaded the markets. The police, so far, however, have been sufficiently strong to prevent riots.

Publish Prices Daily.

The president of the municipal council suggests that to avoid trouble the prices of provisions should be published daily, so that the public would know what articles of food had gone up. The purveyors have agreed to draw up reports giving forecasts of food prices and the practical measures to be taken in view of increases.

Secretary Wilson is of the opinion that the administration of these laws does not properly come under his department, where all netivities should be concentrated in the promotion of agriculture.
