GRATUITIES SYSTEM MAY BE EXTENDED

GERMANS ARE AIDING REDS

Ignace Paderewski Says That Germans Are Helping Bolsheviki in Every Way to Embarras Poland-Germany Hoping to Win in East What She Lost in West.

Paris, Sept. 5.—"Germany, defeated on the west, has turned to the east, where she is waging a battle with the hope of achieving the victory she could not win on the other fronts." said Ignace Jan Paderewski, Polish premier, today to the Associated Press, while discussing Polish conditions. M. Paderewski will appear before the supreme council of the peace conference to discouncil of the peace conference to dis council of the peace conference to cuss the critical situation in Tes and Silesia. critical situation in Tescher and Silesia.

"In Upper Silesia. East Prussia, Lithuania, along the Bolshevik front in the vicinity of Minsk and along the Ukrainian front, Polish armies are forced to face armed enemies," he continued. "Where these enemies are not Germans, they are aided by Germans, who are urging the Bolsheviki forward in every way to embarrass Poland. Our new Government, with limited supplies and little clothing for its army, finds the situation desperate.

Germans are fomenting disorder and lending assistance to the Bolsheviki. On all sides we are forced to face this new war that Germany is waging against the Alled cause. She is determined to conquer Rusia at any cost and is making every effort to hamper us in our battle against disorder. German propagandists are twisting every clash between our troops and the Bolsheviki into Jewish pogroms. "We must rely on our friends to refute slanders and keep faith in us. Our people have resisted the blandishments of Bolshevism so far, but there is a limit to human endurance. We hope for a speedy ratification of the treaty, and pray for the steadying influence of Allied troops in harassed districts where plebiscites are to be held to determine the future status of those regions."

PEACE TERMS RECEIVED BY AUSTRIANS WITH GREATEST SURPRISE AND INDIGNATION

DOMINION-WIDE STRIKE IS NOW THREATENED UNLESS MEN HELD AT WINNIPEG ARE LIBERATED

Secretary of Mineworkers Declare Gigantic Walkout Will Tie Up Every Industry From Coast to Coast Unless Bail Is Granted to Labor Leaders by September 17.

Sydney, N.S., Sept. 5.—Unless the Winnipeg strike leaders now imprisoned in the West are released on bail before the 17th of this month, Canada will be tied up from coast to coast by a gigantic strike, embrac ing every industry under union control, according to a statement made to the Canadian Press by J. B. MacLachlan, United Mine Workers' district secretary. Mr. MacLachlan represented the situation as serious in the extreme, unless the authorities grant the Winnipeg men bail. The threatened strike will tie up the coal mines of this district and practically close down industry in Sydney. A gigantic mass meeting of district 26 is being arranged for Sunday next at Glace Bay, to be addressed by R. F. Blackstone of San Francisco and Mr. MacLachlan. It is probable that on the same day a meeting will be held in Sydney to discuss the Winnipeg situation. The proposed strike is the most gigantic menace of the kind which ever threatened industry in Canada. If the plans of union officials, as stated by Mr. MacLachlan, are carried out, and the western authorities prove inflexible, there will hardly be a wheel turning across the whole breadth of the country from Vancouver east after the 17th

BECK'S STATEMENT IS **DECLARED INCORRECT** BY GUELPH MAYOR

J. E. Carter Characterizes the Talk About Holding Up the Line As "All Rubbish."

ANOTHER VOTE COMING

Says Hydro Minister Has No Intention of Building Road.

Toronto, Sept. 5 .- "That is absolutely ncorrect," declared Mayor J. E. Carter of Guelph, Ont., over the long-distance telephone today when asked about the statement made by Sir Adam Beck at the meeting of the Ontario Hydro-Radial Association yesterday that Guelph was holding up the Toronto to London radial by its delay in signing the agreement to provide the additional amount necessitated by defeat of the bylaw in four other municipalities. The mayor said he had no authority

The mayor said he had no authority to sign away \$74,000 of the people's money, in addition to the \$734,000 already voted for the project.

"That's all rubbish about Guelph holding up the line," said Mr. Carter. "Sir Adam Beck has no intention of building the road. He said so on the public platform—that we wanted the Grand Trunk Railway, and did not want to parallel the lines. He made the statement here that the Grand Trunk was going to be taken over. All he wants it signed for is to bluff the Government, and we don't believe in that kind of stuff."

Mr. J. M. Taylor, president of the Guelph Chamber of Commerce, agreed with the mayor that he could not sign away the people's money without a sanctioning vote. "We are asked for ten per cent more," he said. "and the people will vote on it."

The mayor added that the people would vote next January regarding the additional money required.







People of this continent who think of the Chinese in terms of mental and moral darkness and of general indifference to the progress of the world will be interested to learn that a bureau of public information has been established at Shanghai, not by the Government, it is true, but by merchants and students who appreciate the importance of foreign opinion and of foreign trade. It is the function of this bureau to enlighten befuddled America, and an effort to this end is being made by means of printed matter sent to the newspapers.





COAST TENNIS STAR WINS SINGLES TITLE FROM PHILADELPHIA

W. M. Johnston Is World's Greatest Player as Result of Victory.

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 4 .-California is again supreme as the home of the world's greatest tennis player for the season of 1919. On the courts of the West Side Club here this afternoon William M. Johnston, of San Francisco, defeated William T.
Tilden II.. of Philadelphia, in straight sets in the final match for the national turf singles championship.

In eliminating the towering Philadelphian by scores of 6-4, 6-4, 6-3, Johnston placed himself upon a tennis pinnacle seldom reached by racquet players. With Tilden, he was the soie survivor of 128 players who began the struggle for the title on August 25. This field contained the famous Australian team, winners of the English championships at Wimbledon as well as American players, conquerers in the A. E. F. tournaments abroad. Thus Johnston's victory this afternoon stamps him unquestionably as the best tennis player competing in the game in any part of the world this year.

The point score and stroke analysis, while not indicating with their cold figures the brilliancy of the tennis battle, give an illuminating insight into the effectiveness of the rival racquet work.

Johnston won three sets to none, 18 San Francisco, defeated William T.

Johnston won three sets to none, 18 games to 11 and 109 points to 82.

Johnston was guilty of 26 outs to Tilden's 39; 30 nets to Tilden's 38; while the loser was charged with 5 double faults to Johnston's 1. The new title holder scored almost twice as many placements as the loser, the score being Johnston, 33 placements; Tilden, 17, while on the other hand Tilden drove through eight clean service aces to three for Johnston.



Pelee. The old dummy foundation on the west side of the shoal south of Point Pelee is being gradually destroyed by the waves and is now only two or three feet above water. Mariner are cautioned not to rely on this mark, as it may disappear at any time.



PRESIDENT OPENS HIS SPEAKING TOUR AT COLUMBUS, OHIO

To Make Report To Fellow-Countrymen.

ADDRESS IS CHEERED

Says Treaty an Attempt To Right the Wrongs of Europe.

COLUMBUS, Sept. 4.—President Wilson, who arrived here shortly after 11 o'clock, opening his country-wide speaking tour for the peace treaty, declared in an address here today that his purpose was to "go out and report to my fellow countrymen."

The president said it also seemed "increasingly necessary" that he should make such a report because he had read many speeches about the treaty and was unable to gather from them much of what the treaty contained. Speaking to a crowd estimated at 4.000, the president's declarations frequently were interrupted by cheers. The president began by saying that he had "chafed at the confinement of Washington," and was glad to get out to make his report to the people.

"In the first place," he said the treaty undertook to punish Germany, but that there was no thought to overwhelmingly crush any great people.

"Restraint has been exercised," he said, and there was provision for making the reparation no greater than Germany could pay.

The League of Nations, the president declared, was formed in fulfillment of the promise that the United States was fighting this war to "end business of that sort" for ever. Not to establish the league, he said, would be "unfaithful" to those who had died.

MAY TRY THE FINAL DASH FOR THE POLE IN AN AEROPLANE

Amundsen Took Two Aircraft With Him.

AFTER SCIENTIFIC DATA

Stefansson Believes Norwegian Now North of Western Siberia.

Seattle, Sept. 4. — Bound for the North Pole. Roald Amundsen. Norwegian discoverer of the South Pole, is at present drifting in his ice-locked schooner. The Maud, somewhere north of western Siberla, according to beliefs held by the Seattle Norwegian vice-consulate, and Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Canadian Arctic explorer. consulate, and Vihjalmur Stefansson.

Canadian Arctic explorer.

In planning the trip, the explorer said he expected, after reaching the pole, to return either to Grant Land, west of Greenland, or Melville Island, which lies in the Arctic Ocean north of Canada. Should he reach Melville Island be probably would journey by sea to Nome Alaska, or overland to Dawson Nome, Alaska, or overland to Dawson,

Yukon Territory.
Two airplanes, it is believed, formed part of the Maud's equipment when she left Norway last fall and sailed through the White Sea, bound for the icy north. The final dash to the pole may be made in one of the planes. Amundsen, it is believed, may also fly back to civilization in one of the machines.

No Word for Year.
Nothing has been heard from Amundsen since September 1, 1918. At that time the Maud was reported taking oil for her motors at Dixon Island, a White for her motors at Dixon Island, a White Sea point. After taking the oil she sailed northeast into the rapidly-freezing waters of the Arctic Ocean.

From the White Sea Amundsen expected to drift east with the ice to the New Siberian Islands, which lie in the Arctic off Siberia. At the New Siberian Islands, it was believed, the drift would carry the boat forward, if not across, the pale. Amundsen intended to use
