taken up following the debate on disarmament.

CITY OF WINNIPEG IN SPLENDID FINANCIAL SHAPE, SAYS MAYOR-ELECT ED. PARNELL

Ex-Londoner On Flying Business Trip to London.

IS CONGRATULATED

On Election by Many Friends in This City-Speaks of Unemployment Situation.

"Winnipeg is in a splendid financial condition," said Edward Parnell, recently elected mayor of that city in a short interview with The Advertiser today. Mr. Parnell, who is a former Londoner, and on a flying business trip to this city, was busy this morning receiving congratulations from many London friends on his recent success at the

in the great western metropolis, Mr. Parnell declared that the city had little or no unemployment situation to deal with except as it related to returned soldiers. soldiers.

"It is estimated that we have about 2,500 returned men, but at least 1,500 are men who are more or less disabled and unable in many cases to support themselves," he said. "The opinion that we have up there," he continued, "is that men unable to work and who have served King and country at the front should be taken care of by the federal, provincial and municipal governments. Up to the present time there has been no real distress that hasn't been taken no real distress that hasn't been taken care of. Generally speaking there is a spirit of optimism which leads us to the belief that conditions in Winnipeg are of a character that precede a period of

real progress.
"This has been reflected in a recent issue of bonds, which brought 102. Winnipeg is in splendid financial condition,"

"During the war a sinking fund com nission cleared off seven and a half mil-ions of our debt, and we have a sinking and of about ten and a half millions inrested in securities of a high grade. INTO CORK FIRES

GREENWOOD'S ATTITUDE

Repeats That Auxiliary Police Were Not Equipped With Incendiary Bombs.

swept the city of Cork on Saturday night and Sunday was expected to be completed there today. Major-General Strickland, commander of military forces in Ireland is the head of the commission, and the taking of evidence began yesterday. The mayor of Cork and two Sinn Fein members of parliament have been called to explain allegations they have made in a dispatch sent to various foreign ambassadors here relative to outrages which they declare to have been perpetuated in Cork during the past week.

Announcement of the commission's finding was awaited with keen interest by the people of London today, as the question of who was responsible for the fires in Cork has assumed great importance since the conflagration. In the absence of clear evidence, rival elements have been doing their utmost to fix the blame on the auxiliary police or the Irish extremists, respectively.

Truce Prospects Blasted.

Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary of Ireland, speaking in the House of Commonse last night asserted that the auxiliary police did not start the fires and pointed out they were not equipped with incendiary bombs, which, news dispatches assert, were used to spread flames in Cork.

Prospects of a truce in Ireland appear to have been blasted by the most recent events in that island declared Sir Hamar, so far as the representatives of the Irish are concerned. He talked with a young lady who was employed in the store, and got off the car on Wellington street. He imagidately took another car going in the conductor, got off at the Union station. A gentleman, to whom he was known personally, reported seeing Mr. Hammill on a train between Aylmer (Quebec) and Breckenridge going toward Fort Coulonge.





A happy, prosperous Europe is necessary to continued world peace and international good feeling, but it can never be attained with millions of children reaching maturity stunted physically and mentally. If, upon arrival in Canada, this element finds that work and prosperity are not immediately at hand there will assuredly be a tendency to restlessness and disorder. PROGRESS OF SOCIAL SERVICE IS OUTLINED BY PROFESSOR DALE

the subject of an illuminating address delivered at the Normal School yesterday afternoon before the Women's Canadian Club by Prof. J. A. Dale of the Social Service Bureau of Toronto University. His main endeavor was to show how social service work, which has long been concerned with the doing of kind and benevolent work to relieve distress where it existed, is now progressing towards a wider work, the main purpose of which it to analyze conditions and look for preventatives, rather than means of giving relief.

"The Good Samaritan' is really the fount of all real social work today," he declared, "but the troubles that cause our social service problems today are infinitely more complicated than merely offering kindly help. What social service wants today is the stoppage of the flow of those who want to bear the burden, has often been the only one who was innocent.

Breach Not Awful.

"When we study the question, not merely set it aside, we see that after all marriage is a social convention, man-made, legalized by man and generally accompanied by a religious ceremony, merely as a means of recognizing a natural state which must exist at any event.
