most he expires. Happy creatures, who so easil, woid suffering by death! Happy creacondition of its being have accepted life on condition of its being happy ! The respeet shown these animals by the Peruvian Indian amounts absolutely to superstitious reverence. When the Indians load them, two approach may not see the burden on his back; if he did, he would fall down and die. It is the same in unloading. If the burden exceeds a certain weight, the animal throws itself down and dies. The Indians of the Cordilleras alone possess enough patience and gentlenoss to managn the llama. It is doubtless from
this extraordinary companion, that he has this extraordinaty eompanion, tha
learned to die when overtasked."
