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THE FALL OF LARISSA

Turkish Troops Gained an Important Victory
The Fall of Larissa.
Athens, April 24, 6.30 p.m.—Larissa has been completely evacuated by the Greeks, who spiked their guns in position and carried away all the military stores. The wounded remain at Larissa under the protection of the Red Cross flag.

Midnight despatches received from the frontiers assert that the Turkish army has received the news of the Greek victory. The Greeks retreated in good order on Karadag, where they are entrenched. From Larissa to the Greek coast, the Greeks in force from Larissa had, and still have, a strong and well-organized force. The Greeks were assisted by thousands of irregulars, who were as well as participated in the general engagement. The Greeks had an overwhelming superiority in numbers. They had constructed earthworks, and trenches everywhere, and in and around these awaited the attacks of the Greeks.

On the whole they clung tenaciously to their defenses, while the Greeks looked on in well-earned admiration. Most desperate bravery, in spite of the furious attacks made upon them, the Greeks continue to hold the Revent and Nereus Passes. At this time the Turkish army is practically a drawn battle.

Will the Powers Intervene?
London, April 24.—A despatch to The Observer from Athens says that the Cabinet is of the opinion that after the first pitched battle between the Greeks and Turks in which large forces are engaged the powers will intervene and secure an armistice.

Is Russia in it Now?
Berlin, April 24.—It is reported here to-day in well-founded circles that the Russian Government has asked permission of the Sultan for the Russian Black Sea fleet to pass through the Dardanelles. The Baltic fleet is also ready to start under similar orders.

All Greeks called out.
Athens, April 24, 6 p.m.—The Turks today tried to capture the post of the Frontal Hill on the road to Tyrnavo, but they were repulsed.

Reinforcements called for.
Constantinople, April 24.—The sitting of the military committee has been postponed since yesterday at the Yildiz Kiosk. It is reported that Edhem Pasha has ordered for 40,000 reinforcements, and that orders have been sent to Salonica to hasten the despatch of the reserves to the frontier.

Headquarters of the Greek Army.
Larissa, April 24.—The latest advices from Larissa are that the Greek army that on Sunday the Turks made a sortie from the town and attacked the Greek position at Douglou Pass, and Sideropolis. After severe fighting the Greeks drove the Turks on the Greek side across the frontier, with a loss of five guns.

Greece sends a Mission to the East.
Athens, April 24.—A special mission from the Greek Government passed through the city yesterday en route to St. Petersburg.

Greece holds its own.
London, April 24.—A despatch to The Daily Chronicle from Athens says that the Greeks have held their own in their positions and destroyed the Turkish cavalry at Mal. German officers were seen fighting with the Turkish German uniforms.

Greek Citizens Massacred.
London, April 24.—According to a special despatch from Athens, several hundred Greek citizens have been massacred at the village of Otricoli. The Greek troops, it is added, have stormed the village occupied by the Turks.

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Paris, April 24.—A special telegram that all the necessary measures have been taken at St. Petersburg for the eventual intervention of Russia in the war between Turkey and Greece.

Where the Navy Is.

Athens, April 23.—Among the wounded who arrived here are several who state that a number of the Greek wounded at Gritzo, unable to follow the Greek retreat, were shut up in a small church by the Turks, who set fire to the buildings and burned them to death.

General Mills Called Out.
Athens, April 23.—It has been decided to call out several companies of Landwehr, or militia, in Greece, all sub-borneo males from 21 years of age and upwards, to be called upon for military service.

OBMAN TAKES COMMAND.
Edhem Pasha Replaced by the Old Hero of Plevna.
Constantinople, April 23, afternoon.—An additional force of Redifs or army reserves has been called out of Plevna to force the Turkish troops operating against the Greeks here.

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ON CARVING IN CLAY.

ART WORK THAT MAY BECOME A DELIGHT TO LADIES.

How to Proceed to Make Elegant Vases, Decorated Tiles, Etc.—All About the Various Methods of Carving in Clay.

The London Gleaner informs its readers as to an interesting art, carving in clay. The following is reprinted, retaining the original illustrations, and is reproduced herewith:

The thickness of the clay forming the sides of a vase might be a trifle greater or than that desirable for perforating, quarter-inch limit should, however, be ample for all ordinary purposes.

Suggesting, as it does, a comparison of the various methods of carving, we point out that the cardinal points of the clay carving differs from that of the pottery.

Granting our clay in suitable condition, we begin by making a rough sketch of the simple shape of the vase at the head of page (figure 1), an eye leaf. To get an impression of this upon the clay the following simple method is available.

On a piece of tracing paper, with a B or HB pencil, outline firmly on the design, then, reversing it, go over the outline again with the same soft black ink. Apply this to the damp clay with a hair pencil round the outline; by this means we shall obtain a very clear impression of the outline ready for cutting.
