POTATO SUGAR.

Sir, -In France, Germany and other parts of Europe, sugar for the manufacture of wine is now produced at wonderfully low prices from potato starch, and although it is not as pure as the cane sugar, it is superior to the best refined cane sugar for the improvement and production of wine.

Take two chickens; cut up as if to stew; put in a stew-pan with a little gravy and a few onions. Take half pound pepper, pour the seeds, and pour on boiling water a steam for ten or fifteen minutes; pour off the water, and rub them in a sieve until all the juice is out; add the juice to the chicken; let it cook for half an hour; add a little butter, flour, and salt.
