

The picture represents one of th Paris, Aug. 23.—Five passengers this year by forest fires. It is rare carried on Canada's timber resour ces, as the menace of careless cam pers, smokers, fishermen and trappers is yet too serious. The thou sands of villages in close promimity to the forests must share the penalty of burning up the timber and don of adequate insurance because of the severe hazard. The experien ce of New Brunswick is fairly repre sentative of other provinces. There the forest fire losses on the average kill more timber than would build 5000 large homes and half of the fires are set by the gross negligence of those who build camp-fires and se cigarettes, cigars and matches. In a recent speech to a large body of Quebec City business men, Mr. bson Black, Manager of the Canadian Forestry Association, declared:-"Every forest fire this yea exchanged valuable public-owned timber lands for worthless wastes of charcoal and fireweed. It is shee usiness stupidity, as inexcusabl as the exchange of pounds for paper roubles at par."

FATHER DELORME **DECLARED SANE**

Montreal -The whole question of Adelard Delorme's mental condition will be opened in the Superior Court August 30 at the continuation of hearings on interdiction proceedings instituted by a Delorme family counsel, following a report made by Dr. D. Brocheu, medical superintendent of St. Michael Ayslum, Beauport, where Delorme is interned, that his patient is sane enough to administer

Dr. Brockeu will be called to give evidence supporting his report. It is considered likely that the crown and defence alienists, whose evidence in the Delorme criminal trial led the jury to pronounce the Abbe incapable of standing trial on the charge of mudering his half brother, Raoui, will be called in rebuttal of Dr. Brocheu's testimony.

The upshot of the whole affair may be that the Provincial Government may order a mental examination of Delorme by a third set of expert alienists to decide once and for all whether the Abbe is not in condition to face the murder charge, or whether he is sane, should be transferred from the asylum to Bordeaux jail once more to appear in the Court of King's Bench on the merits of the cause celebre.

Railway News in Brief

Edmonton.-Grain is still coming Edmonton.—Grain is still coming into Edmonton in large quantities from towns along the line of the Edmonton, Dunvegan & British Columbia Railway. From the Berwyn extension and from other northern points, the movement has been of sufficient volume to tax the accommodation in the way of freight cars to the limit, and there is no indication that this large movement will not continue. Much grain is still being loaded in preparation for shipment.

Winnipeg.—Stimulated by special rates from Eastern Canada and the United States tourist traffic to the Coast will be fairly good this summer, in the opinion of C. E. Mac-Pherson, assistant passenger traffic manager, Canadian Pacific Railway, with headquarters in Winnipeg. There will be no general reduction of passenger fares over the Canadian Pacific, Mr. MacPherson thinks. Special round trip tourist tickets should make their appearance about the middle of May.

Calgary.—P. L. Naismith, manager of the Department of Natural Resources of the Canadian Pacific Railway at Calgary recently visited Montreal in connection with the proposed bringing of members of the Royal Irish Constabulary to settle on Alberta lands. In connection with this matter a meeting will be held in Winnipeg at the end of March. Amongst those who will attend this meeting are Sir Augustus Nanton, D. C. Coleman, Colonel J. T. Dennis, and Mr. George Walker, solicitor, Calgary. It is expected that some decision will be reached at this meeting.

Invermere. — Mr. Conrad Kain, Alpine guide at present residing at Wilmer, has received a flattering offer to join the second expedition which is being formed to ascend Mount Everest, the giant peak of the Himalayas. Before coming to this section Mr. Kain was an official guide in the Austrian Tyrol. He was brought out here by the C. P. R. as one of the qualified persons te lead Alpinists in their climbs in the peaks of the Canadian Rockies. He has climbed peaks in all parts of the world. Owing to personal reasons he is unable to accept the tempting offer which has been made to him.

St. John.-With a total of 9,455,-St. Jehn.—With a total of 9,455,—860 bushels of grain shipped from West St. John by the C. P. R. last week, and 1,500,000 in the elevators, besides 94 carloads on track, prospects are that the total volume of cereal exported from the West Side this season will not be less than 12,000,000 bushels. The grain handled this season will not be seen than 12,000,000 bushels. The grain handled ntipe of the season includes all varieties with the exception of flax and peas. A small quantity of buckwheat has been handled. Last season, to date, 6,227,297 bushels of grain were exported and for the whole season, which lasted until June, 9,004,160 bushels were shipped.

Vancouver. — The new Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Australia," it is announced, will be placed in service early this summer. Her first trans-Pacific trip is scheduled to start from Hong Kong for Vancouver and Victoria for the Orient on July 27.

The "Empress of Australia" is practically a new ship, having been in the builder's hands at the outbreak of the war. She has lately been converted into an oil-burner, and is similar in equipment and standard to the "Empress of Scotland." A twin-screw steamship of 19,300 gross tons, 590 feet in length, 75.2 in breadth and 41.5 in depth, the "Empress of Australia" will prove a notable addition to the company's Pacific fleet, which already maintains the quickest time across the Pacific with the well-known 16,850-ton liners "Empress of Russia" and "Empress of Asia." She is expected to maintain a speed of 22 knots, and will be able to accommodate 410 first class, 130 second class, 330 third class and 1,000 Asiatic atterage passengers. tic steerage passengers, ___

NORTHCLIFFE AND BEAVERBROOK

The Credit for Making Lloyd George Premier

In an article on Viscount Northcliffe, in the New York Times, Isaac F. Margosson, an American writer

In connection with Lord Beaver brook are several Northcliffe revela ions. Most people believed that Northcliffe made Lloyd George Prime Minister. This is not entirely true. Northcliffe conducted the press campaign that uprooted Asquith, but it was Beaverbrook, who was then Sir Max Aitken and who had risen from a struggling Canadian bank clerk to be one of the most influential men in England, who really did the job. Beaver brook was Bonar Law's most intin ate friend, and Bonar Law held the balance of power. The five historic meetings at which the new deal was fremed were held at Beaver work's house, near Leatherhead, in Surrey have read the private memoranda of these meetings, prepared by Beaverbrook for his son.

As a result of these conferences a real coalition was effected, but with one condition, namely, that Northcliffe should not have a place in the Cabinet. I believe that this fact is now being disclosed for the first time. It showed that even then Northcliffe had aroused hostility and jealously in the Whitehall district. It was a useless precaution, because Northcliffe never aspired to rutlic post as such, although there were various times later on when he could have had one. Lloyd George once offered him the Air Ministry, which was promptly declined. As Director of Propaganda in enemy countries and head of the British-War Mission he felt that he was doing a patriotic service and not "hold ing office."

There was no envy in the North cliffe make-up, for his success was so complete that he got pleasure out of the progress of others. Concerning Lord Beaverbrook, however, he had a tiny feeling of what almost amounted to resentment because of his projection into London journalism. In conjunction with R. D. Blumenfield, Beaverbrook bought The Daily Express, which was galvanized into life. Although The Daily Mail was Northcliffe's pride and joy, he always regarded the acquisition of The Times as a great achievement. He felt, to use a war phrase that it consolidated and dignified his jouralistic standing.

In 1917, and upon my return from Russia, I crossed the Atlantic to New York with Northcliffe. He was then coming over to head the British War Mission. The German submarines were at their worst and Northcliffe realized that they would go to any extremes to "get him." One day, as we were walking on deck, he said: "If I should die on this trip, your friend Beaverbrook will own The Times within a week."


