We have not heard anything of late about the new railway station, nor have we seen anything in the Government newspapers that would indicate the slightest move in the direction of having this much needed public work started.

Two by-elections for the Ontario Legislature were held on Tuesday of last week, and the result leaves the strength of parties in the House the same as before the vacancies were created.

It was pointed out the other day that the government proposes to construct a railway half way across the continent, and for nearly the whole distance far from an unoccupied country, at a cost of some \$20,000 or \$25,000 per mile.

less the Government are, unless they have a big bribing scheme as in the case of the "Soo". Another constituency, North Renfrew, is vacant much longer than either of those in which the elections were held last week, but there is no sign of an election there.

British Columbia has another political sensation. Certainly the Pacific Province is a record breaker in the matter of peculiar political situations.

The suit of Frank J. Kimball, a New York lawyer, against Pres. Alfred S. Hayes of the Plant Steamship Co., Frederick J. Daggett and Geo. E. Gale and Capt. P. E. Boston, during two days, concluded on Thursday last the decision being reserved.

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Belfast Railway is the Hillsboro Bridge at Southport. The structure, which is both a railway and highway bridge, was authorized by the Dominion parliament in 1899.

Shocking Railway Accident.

A special train bearing students of Purdue University, was wrecked on the 1st inst., near Riverside Park at the edge of Indianapolis, Indiana. Sixteen dead were taken from the wreck and forty passengers were injured, twenty-four of them seriously.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

GEORGE Casey, formerly Liberal member for West Elgin, but defeated has been appointed to a position in the Parliamentary Library, Ottawa.

THE Convent of the Sacred Heart, at Metaghah, N. B. was destroyed by fire last Monday night. Only a small portion of the furniture was saved.

THE Schooner Wellman Hall, was burned to the water's edge at Hantsport, N. S., the other day. The crew barely escaped with their lives.

THE prices of produce in the market yesterday were little changed from what they were last week, as will be seen by reference to our Market "Prices."

YOKOHAMA advices of Oct. 30th, say that forty-five persons were drowned as the result of the sinking of the steamer Takai Maru which collided with a Russian steamer.

MCCOBBILL, the newly appointed Provincial Treasurer of Quebec, was elected at Bromes by about 500 majority. The vacancy was caused by the death of Provincial Treasurer Duffy.

TWENTY-one men and three women and a ten months old babe were burned to death in New York in a fire which started Monday morning in a five story tenement house on Eleventh Avenue.

A new plot against the murderers of King Alexander and Queen Draga has been discovered at Belgrade and Capt. J. Larjuncic, brother of the late Queen, and General Magdelenes have been arrested.

THOMAS Dunlap, the senior member of Dunlap, Cook & Co., and President of Dunlap Brothers and Company, Amherst, died suddenly at Truro Friday of paralysis. He was seventy years old and a native of Truro.

It was decided at the Cabinet meeting at Ottawa to offer the South African Colonies the tariff preference 3 1/2 per cent now granted to the Mother country in return for the preference contained in the Customs tariff of South Africa.

WHILE the steamer Coban was docking at the Acadia wharf Sydney on Monday of last week she ran into the wharf, damaging the wharf below, by high water mark and knocking it out of horizontal eight feet. The damage is estimated at \$300.

EMMA Booth Tucker, daughter of General Booth, died at Kansas City on Thursday last, the result of the Santa Fe train wreck. Others were killed or injured. She was on her way to Chicago to meet her husband, accompanied by Col. Holland, who was also killed.

Word comes from Victoria B. C., that John S. Barpee, formerly of St. John, now assistant postmaster at Bonanza, near Dawson has been arrested charged with tampering with the mails. Many registered letters were found in his rooms which had not been opened. No explanation.

AT Springvalley near Kensington, on Wednesday morning last, James Duncanson, 24 years of age, died under such circumstances that a coroner's jury returned a verdict to the effect that in their opinion deceased came to his death from Staphylococcus administered by his own hand.

We are indebted to the Blackwell Lithographing and Printing Co., Montreal for a very handsome calendar, the first of the season. The calendar is printed and mounted by a most beautiful colored engraving of Canada's coronation arch, erected at Whitehall, London, in 1902, on the occasion of the King's Coronation.

GREAT excitement has been caused by an attempt on the life of President Diaz who was the guest of the State Government during the festivities at Ottawa, Quebec. The President was passing by Casagor garden in a street car when a man of the lower class named Goscaco approached his car shouting and fired five shots from a revolver. None of the shots took effect.

A sad drowning accident occurred at Clifton Wharf a few days ago. John Pickering the ten year old stepson of John Currie fell out of a dory and was drowned. His brother Willie had just left him and went home. Returning in about an hour he found his cap but no sign of the boy. Search being made at once his body was found near the wharf quite near his own home.

Mr. W. S. Mangles of the Department of Marine and Fisheries Ottawa, has been appointed a commissioner to investigate the claims of the shippers of fish and meat, who are asking for compensation from the Dominion Government for damages caused during the detention of the winter steamers last winter. He commenced his investigations at the Marine and Fisheries office in this City, on Saturday last.

A very sad accident happened at Donaldson, about two miles from Bedford, Wednesday last. It appears Mrs. John Morris a highly respected resident of the community, while taking a milk can from a puncheon of water sunk in the ground, fell in head-first, and about one hour later her dead body was found by the servant man. Needless to say the sad event has cast a gloom over the entire settlement. Mrs. Morris who was formerly Miss May McIntrath of Covehead was only twenty-eight years of age and had been married four years. A husband and three small children are left to mourn.

A terrible accident occurred at the wheel pit of the Canadian Niagara Power Company's works Niagara Falls, Ont., on Wednesday of last week in which three men were killed and two others badly injured. A bucket containing Geo. Hiller, pumpman, and five Hungarians, laborers, was being lowered into the pit. When half way down the bucket was stopped to allow a man to get off on to a cross bridge and some one in the bucket gave the signal to lower, when the bucket caught on the cross bridge, dumping Hiller and four Hungarians out. They fell on the solid rock below, some 50 feet. Two Hungarians were killed immediately. Hiller's both arms and legs were broken; he was also internally injured and died promptly to the hospital. The other two Hungarians are still alive but their recovery is doubtful. The fourth Hungarian escaped with a broken leg and bruises. The fifth Hungarian clung to the bucket and escaped.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

ARTHUR Murphy, ex-Mayor of Quebec and ex-M. P., is dead at the age of three score years and ten.

ALBERT Power, while walking the street at Halifax yesterday, was struck by a plank falling from a new building and fatally injured.

REV. F. C. Kelly of Lapeer, Mich., arrived here on Saturday evening last. He lectures in the Lyceum on Friday evening. Be sure to attend.

In the Mayoralty election in greater New York yesterday, McEllan, Tammany and Democratic candidate, defeated Mayor Lowe, by about 70,000 plurality.

PERLEY Corkum aged fourteen, was shot dead at Hantsport, N. S. Saturday night by Trueman Tretry, while celebrating Halloween.

JACK McDonald and Dan McDonald, met a horrible death on Saturday at the Dominion collieries near Glace Bay, C. B. They fell a thousand feet into the mine.

POLICEMAN Barron, who was shot in Montreal by a burglar, died Wednesday night in the hospital. The city council has offered a reward of \$500. for the identification of the guilty parties.

THE schoer, Martha A. Bradley, which went ashore long ago at New London Harbor was sold at auction Saturday. Vessel and fittings brought \$125.00. Capt. Doucette and Joseph Gallant of Boston were the purchasers.

CONY Island was swept on the last night by the most disastrous fire in its history. 250 buildings were destroyed entailing a loss of one hundred thousand dollars. No lives were lost but several persons are seriously injured.

DURING the twelve pound hammer throw at the Western University field sports at London Ont., on Thursday last, a medical student threw the hammer to one side. It struck a seven-year-old son of Mr. Broderick, Manager of Molson's Bank, on the head, and the lad died a few hours later.

THE Militia Department, Ottawa, has been informed by Lord Strathcona that the Marquis of Lansdown received a cable from Col. Swayne in Smallland, East Africa, saying that Major R. G. Leckie, Canadian officer with the force, was badly injured by a leopard and was in a dangerous condition.

H. Yerkel Syrcyn, a passenger on the train from Winnipeg to Edmonton died suddenly on Sunday and his son claimed that three passengers forced whiskey down his father's throat. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of death from alcoholic poison administered by his companions.

THE Steam tug Henry Hooper was run down and sunk off York Redoubt Halifax Monday afternoon by the Gloucester fishing schooner Victor. The crew of the tug five in number including the captain saved their lives by clinging over the bow of the schooner. The yacht nothing but what they stood in, the tug going to the bottom five minutes after the collision.

FORTY McGill students crossed from Montreal to Longueil on Saturday and started a disgraceful Halloween disturbance. The fire alarm called out the villagers who, armed with weapons of all kinds, assailed the students. Several were injured and eight had to be taken to the hospital. The remainder were driven to the wharf and kept there until the boat arrived.

REPAIRS to the Charlottetown post office began Saturday morning. Among the changes to be made will be the removal of the partition now separating the public from the Savings Bank. The partition containing the P. O. boxes will also be moved forward, and the boxes will also be extended around to the south side. The postmaster's office will be moved from the southeast to the northeast corner of the building.

MONTREAL advices of the 3rd. say: The Canadian Pacific Railway on Saturday laid off eighteen per cent, of its working force at the Delorimier avenue shops. General Manager McNichol stated that the lay off was only part of a general scheme extending all over the system. A despatch of the same date from Toronto indicates that P. O. boxes will also be moved forward, and the boxes will also be extended around to the south side. The postmaster's office will be moved from the southeast to the northeast corner of the building.

FIVE hundred men including a sheriff's posse augmented by volunteers from the ranches adjacent are searching the country in the vicinity of Lightning Creek and Eastern Wyoming for a band of Indians which on Saturday afternoon fought a battle with Sheriff Miller's posse killing the sheriff and his deputy Fossenburg. Latest advices are to the effect that a second battle was fought and a number of Indians killed and captured, but their report is not verified. So says a Denver despatch of the 3rd.

A Seaman named Peter Kelly, belonging to the Schooner Vivian was knocked down, rendered senseless and robbed, in this city on Sunday night. He is now in the hospital suffering from the effects of the assault. He states that about nine o'clock Sunday evening he was going down Queen Street, intending to board his vessel. He saw a number of toughs at the corner of Queen and Water Streets, who had previously dunned him for money. To avoid them he started to go through a lane from King to Water streets, behind Riley's tobacco factory. He saw no one in the lane, but all at once he was struck on the forehead with either a brick or a bottle, and rendered senseless. He remembered nothing after that. Some time afterwards he was discovered, as if dead with his pockets turned inside out and all his money, \$45 gone. The police were notified and the injured man removed to a place where medical aid could be procured and was afterwards taken to the Charlottetown Hospital. This is a pretty serious piece of business and we hope the perpetrators of the dastardly deed will be discovered and punished as they deserve.

DIED

Suddenly at his home on Weymouth Street, Wednesday 25th October, Augustus Morris aged 73 years. In Montreal on Thursday, October 29th, 1903, Honoria M. Thresher, relict of the late Mr. J. W. Morrison, in her 85th year.

Fire in the Vatican Palace.

At half past eight o'clock on Sunday evening feast of All Saints, fire broke out in that portion of the Vatican containing the Hall of Inscriptions, where the Pope gives his audience and which is adjacent to the famous Pinacotes, or gallery of pictures. The alarm caused much confusion and excitement in the Vatican. Strenuous efforts were made to control the flames, and the firemen of Rome were called to lend their help. At a quarter past eleven the fire was under control. No lives were lost. No idea of the damage can yet be obtained. The Pope came to the scene in person and remained until the arrangements to fight the fire were completed. At a little after eleven o'clock the fire was under control. The museum of inscriptions, the room of Father Ehrle, part of the library and the printing-presses were entirely flooded with water. Many things that escaped the flames were injured by water, especially the precious library of Pope Leo, which Father Ehrle was in the midst of rearranging in accordance with the last wish of the late pontiff. The fire caused greater sensation in Rome than has any other event since the death of Pope Leo. The outbreak of flame in such a conspicuous place wherein were many celebrated treasures brought out great numbers of anxious people, in spite of a torrential rain. The safety of the Pope was the first thought in everyone's mind, but this was soon assured. The first intimation of fire was had when smoke was seen issuing from the apartments of M. Marle, the celebrated French restorer of ancient manuscripts and illuminated books. The famous Bramante staircase leads to the part of the Vatican where the fire broke out. The gardener broke in the doors of M. Marle's apartment and found him in a heavy sleep. It is supposed that he retired and forgot to take proper precautions with his kitchen fire, which probably blazed up and ignited some nearby hanging. The fire rapidly assumed such proportions that the gardener gave an immediate general alarm. News of the fire was immediately conveyed to the Pope, who was found kneeling in his chapel for his usual evening prayer. He insisted upon going at once to the scene notwithstanding the fact that he was begged to first think of his own safety. When he arrived at the fire the gravity of the situation was seen by him and he ordered that the firemen of Rome be called. Meantime the flames had begun to break out the windows of M. Marle's apartment and were destroying the roof. They lighted up the entire district and gave the impression that nothing could stop the fury. The Pope withdrew as soon as he saw that everything possible was being done to fight the fire.

Socialism from Many Points of View.

Rev. Thomas Ewing Sherman, S. J., son of the late Gen. W. T. Sherman, preached a forcible sermon recently at St. Patrick's Church, Cedar Rapids, Iowa. His subject was "Socialism," and needless to say, that it received a most careful and exhaustive treatment.

The preacher drew a distinction between socialism and communism and even anarchism. His easiest way of illustrating the subject was to come down to a level that all persons could stand upon. He, therefore, gave an idea of what the government of a country, the United States especially, would be if socialism were to reign and if socialists were to be in power.

The first contention of the socialist government would be exemplified in a law that would make all the land belong to the State. The farmer would have to sow, labor, and reap for the benefit of the State, that is to say for his neighbors, with whom he would have to divide the product of his labor.

Then speaking directly to his hearers Father Sherman asked: "Would the farmer of Iowa be willing to hold his eighty acres, his half section or section as a trustee for the state and share the profits of his soil between 50,000 inhabitants of a China province where, either because of soil that was not fertile or because of lack of industry among the people; the output was less than his own state? The Chinaman could claim that the soil belonged just as much to him, as to the Iowa farmer and the state run on socialist principles could not deny him.

"Our cities, towns and villages with their churches and schools are results of the labor of the farmers—the landholders. Under the rule of socialism the farmer would not cultivate the soil only that others might reap the benefit of his labor. Even now the farmer will not start the plow across the furrow unless the chances are a hundred to one that he will reap the benefit of it."

We need not quote all the examples given by the preacher, but the following is too striking to omit: "The socialist would have all machinery, all tools being productive capital, in control of the state. Two women might be arrested for having sewing machines in their possession, the one who was rich and made articles for her own household and not to sell, would be set free; the poor woman who sewed garments to sell for a living would be imprisoned for using an attribute of the government in having productive capital in her possession. Such a state of affairs could result only in a war—the great sewing machine war, the first of a thousand such dissensions under government ownership of machinery and tools."

And carrying matters into details, of daily life, we can scarcely imagine a state of affairs such as is pictured in the next passage, yet it is the logical outcome of the adoption of the principle of socialism: "Under the socialistic form of government the government will be compelled to do all the producing as well as the distributing, the government would have to do everything instead of a half a dozen things or so that it does now. But the cost of the present government is a billion dollars a year, under socialism, the government doing all the producing, all the manufacturing, all the distributing would cost a million times a billion dollars. This is where social democracy would break down. Suppose a woman wanted a particular shade of blue ribbon for her baby

in long clothes and the captain of the ribbon department in Cedar Rapids had no authority from the government to sell such a shade; if she were persistent she would appeal to the brigadier of the ribbon department at Des Moines, then to a higher officer at Chicago, and finally to the highest at Washington. She might finally get the shade of ribbon she wanted after two years, but the baby would then be out of long clothes and she would not want the ribbon. It would be the same in all small affairs of life. Institutions do what is their purpose and nature to do; it is the purpose of government to govern, not to make things, to perform the duties of the individual."

After proving that socialism would wipe out the home, make woman the instrument of man, and reduce the race to the condition of a herd, he pointed out that, while socialism appeals to the laborer, and is seducing him by making him believe that because he makes a thing he owns it, he shows that the laborer owns nothing and makes nothing. He is paid the value of his labor. He does not make the material with which he works. At the root of the evils of socialism is the fallacy that all evils now suffered spring from capital. "Socialism would result in reducing us all to slavery, to a common herd."

In conclusion, Father Sherman lays the blame for the evils of socialism at the door of atheism. "The socialist leaders are atheists," and it is this disbelief in God that Father Sherman thinks responsible for the views of socialists.

In that conclusion he is certainly right; for as long as the idea of God prevails there is that of a primal authority to sway man; but to reduce the human race to a level that will recognize no authority it is necessary to begin by wiping out the idea of God; as long as God exists there can be no absolute equality—and this the socialist knows.—True Witness.

Power of a Good Book.

A young man of good parentage had graduated from high school. He was to become a lawyer, and therefore entered college. His pious mother trembled at thought of the many dangers which threatened his faith and morals, and considered what she could do to preserve his virtue. She herself could not accompany him to the great metropolis, but as a talisman she gave him a small book, the "Imitation of Christ," entreating him never to part with it.

The student, having promised to fulfill his mother's wish, accordingly took his precious book in hand every evening. It reminded him of her love for him, and of her anxiety for the preservation of his innocence. But soon the young man was surrounded by evil friends. They captivated him by description of their feasts and pleasures. He allowed himself to be influenced, so that they soon had complete control over him. Religious duties became irksome, and after a while were entirely neglected. The talisman given him by his mother now became a burden. He even begrudged it the small amount of space it occupied, for its presence recalled to the mind of the prodigal son the years of virtue and innocence spent under the parental roof.

Whenever he indulged in forbidden pleasures the little book became his accuser. To remove it from his sight he cast it into the farthest corner of the room. From there it wandered into an old chest where all useless articles were kept. But the humble instrument of God's mercy had yet to fulfill its mission.—One day our student was looking for paper with which to cleanse his razor. By a singular coincidence he came across the "Imitation of Christ." "It makes no difference," he said, and tore a leaf from the book. After a few days it was again used for the same purpose, until, from week to week, the poor little book lost many of its gilded pages. But each time a sentence of the torn leaf caught the young man's eye, and disturbed the forced peace of his conscience.

Walking by a church, one morning, into which a funeral procession was just passing, he paused to hear some one remark: "What a misfortune! He was the only son of wealthy parents, and but eighteen years old. He fell from his horse and was killed instantly." Then the verse on the page of the "Imitation of Christ," he had torn from the book the day before suddenly occurred to the wayward son, "How foolish of you to promise yourself a long life, when you are not even sure of the morrow." Deeply agitated at thought of what the words implied, he followed the funeral into the church. The ceremonies and hymns awakened the suppressed voice of his conscience and compelled him to reflect on the sinful state of his soul. In the course of a few days he cast himself at the feet of a priest to implore his aid in making his peace with God. Thus the piety of the mother was rewarded and in this instance the conversion of her son due to a page of the "Imitation of Christ."—Translated for "The Filio" from the Freslauer Sountagsblatt, by Mary Schueckamp.

The Ignorance of the Cultured.

It is curious how people will demand harmony, definiteness, and correctness in music and art and literature, but are content with vagueness and obscurity in religion. Here are our friends the Unitarians: They pride themselves on their culture, on their breadth of vision, on their superiority over all who believe that Christ was God. Many of them are people of education, of the student habit which investigates and finds out and makes sure of most of the subjects which exercise the minds of men. But as to religion—why, that great and most important question need not be bothered about. "Be good and you will be happy," seems to be the basis of their religious belief, and they care no further. Mrs. Emily Fifield, herself a Unitarian, tells of this Unitarian indifference to definite ideas regarding religion, in a recent issue of the Christian Register. She says:—

"This very summer I have been sitting on a hotel piazza with a group of delightful, cultivated men and women, most of them Unitarians, and not one of them was able to say why he was a Unitarian or what Unitarians believed. The children of these Unitarians were on the green opposite. If they had been questioned concerning their church, a well bred stare of incomprehension would have been the answer.

"In my visits among the women of our Alliance, I have felt sorry to find how little real knowledge of the distinctive doctrines of our body exists.—Low little is known of the history and traditions of our form of faith and the place it now holds in the religious world.

"A whole winter is spent—pleasantly, to be sure,—in reading 'The Idyls of the King,' or in trying to understand 'The Ring and the Book,' and the vital principles of religious belief are left on one side."

We have no doubt that such delightful, cultivated men and women, looking from their hotel piazza, would consider as a very ignorant person indeed the student, level headed, Irish laborer passing by who never heard of the 'Ring and the Book,' and to whom the 'Idyls of the King' would suggest (if they suggested anything) the do-nothing courtiers of King Edward VII.; yet in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred, such a man could give a clear, consistent and logical reason for the faith he possessed. Gazing from their hotel piazza the group of cultured Unitarians might wonder pitifully if this laborer had any knowledge on the most stupendous fact in all the Universe would be far more wide, far more copious, far more accurate, far more definite, far more correct than theirs. He might not know Browning, or Tennyson, or Emerson, but he would know God; and Jesus Christ the Son of God has declared this knowledge to be "eternal life."—S. H. Review.

We Will Produce Good Music.

Under the title "The Signs of the Times," Dr. Osartelli, the new Bishop of Salford, England, and one of the ripest scholars among the clergymen of that country, has issued a pastoral letter, his first since assuming the episcopal office, in which occur the following interesting passages: "It has been stated that when our Holy Father Pope Pius X., after his

elevation to the Papacy, first met the Maestro Porosi, he greeted him with the words: "Faremo della buona musica" ("we will produce good music"). And his Holiness is credited with an intention to prosecute with vigor at no distant date the much-needed reform of sacred music. This will be a day for which many, both clergy and laity, have long been anxiously looking. The "signs of the times" seem really to indicate that ecclesiastical musical reform will be one of the chief features of the early twentieth century, just as ecclesiastical architectural reform was of the early and middle nineteenth.

"It is a matter of general concern and regret that so much of our church music is still of such a theatrical style, unworthy of the house of God. High Mass and Benediction, especially on great feast days, are too often turned into little better than concerts, where people go "to hear the music" and (as they admit) find it impossible to pray.

"Many Masses are objectionable owing to the meaningless repetition of the words of the sacred liturgy, which is surely a serious violation of both the respect due to these sublime utterances and the obedience due to the deacons of the Church. And in any case, the excessive length of many Masses is much to be deplored. Apart from musical considerations, these long Masses are exceedingly trying to the celebrant, particularly as in this country the custom prevails of having the sermon at the sung Mass and sometimes a priest in a single handed mission, who has to rise early, say two Masses and preach, is kept to a very late hour without food, under severe physical strain. Such a custom is a fruitful source of ill-health and frequently leads to ultimate breakdown of the health of the clergy.
