America's Latest Note.

latest note, in reply to Germany's insolent, evasive and insulting declaration regarding submarine warfare, presented in Berlin on Friday was made public at Washington the same night. This note informs the Imperial German Government that any repetitio by the commanders of German naval vessels of acts in contravention of American rights, will be regarded by the United States as "deliberately unfriendly." Germany is told that the United States will continue to contend for the freedom of the seas "from whatever quarter violated, without compromise and at any

In official and diplomatic quarters the President's communi cation is regarded as the strongest and most emphatic pronounce Washington Government since the beginning of its correspondence with the belligerents of Europe.



Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending

Dities-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of bree years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sis-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price

Duties-Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empfion six months in sach of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty A homesteader who has oxhausted

his bomestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchasd homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Must reside dix months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
