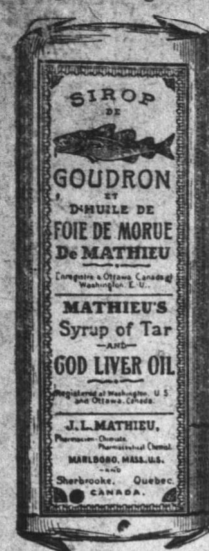

Amateur Athletics Popular.

That the revival of the Olympic
Games has led to a big increase in the
interest of the public for athletic
sports, is certain; for though the con-
ditions were very unfavourable, up-
wards of 8,000 people supported the
Amateur Athletic Association Cham-
pionships on Saturday.
The meeting was brimful of interest
and seldom have any events produced
so many exciting finishes. F. E.
Ramsdell, the athletic giant from Tex-
as, was feeling better than at Wol-
verhampton the previous week, but
he informed the writer that the cli-
mate and the hard season he had put
in, left him feeling none too fit for a
big effort. R. E. Walker, the dapper
little South African, said he felt fine
and after he and Ramsdell had won
their heats of the "100" in 10 2-5 secs,
it looked as though the former would
retain his title, as he ran with more
dash than the American. Ramsdell,
however, proved the better in the fin-
ish, as he drew up to Walker (who
started well), at the half-way mark
and won by six inches in 10 1-5 secs,
real good running on the wet track
and against a slight wind.
Later in the day Ramsdell had an-
other great struggle with E. W.
Hayley in the 220 yards, the American
getting the verdict. It was a very
close race and the writer, who was
a yard past the tape, is certain Rams-
dell just won, though there were
others who were not so sure. The
American must have felt proud as he
walked back amidst the cheers of the
crowd, and it is also worthy of men-
tion that the Stars and Stripes was
hoisted to the top of the flag pole,
with the Union Jack underneath. At-
tention is drawn to this because the
English Athletic Association was
blamed for the absence of the Ameri-
can flag on the opening day of the
Olympic Games in 1908, although the
body name was not responsible, the
decorations being carried out by the
Exhibition authorities.
Two Americans have now won Eng-
lish championship honours since 1908
and they can assert that British
sportsmen have given them a cordial
greeting, in spite of unfortunate in-
cidents at the last Olympic Games.
This makes one hopeful for the future
and if American Athletics will try to
forget the past, there is no reason
why the representatives of the two na-
tions should not "pull together" when
they meet at Stockholm in 1912.

BOXING.

English sportsmen were consider-
ably surprised at the odds betted on
Jeffries for his match with Johnson.
Fast history teaches one that old
champions cannot "come back" after
years of retirement, while a very
heavy man is at a still further disad-
vantage, reducing weight being a
weakening task. The victory of John-
son was generally expected on this
side of the Atlantic; though of course,
the success of Jeffries was hoped for.
One cannot help but feel it was a pity
Jeffries made the match, and the re-
sult is bound to be harmful in its
bearings regarding the color ques-
tion all over the world. Johnson
ought to be capable of retaining his
laurels for some time, and the only
white man who appears to have any
reasonable chance against him, is
Tommy Burns. The latter was cer-
tainly stale on Boxing Day of 1908,
while the lucky upper-cut Johnson
got home at the start had a lot to do
with the result, and yet Johnson did
not knock out the plucky Britisher.
Now that the accredited champion of
the white race has met Johnson and
been vanquished, it is no use "put-
ting the shutters up." On the con-
trary, no stone should be left un-
turned to find a white man capable of
beating the present champion.

CYCLING.

The British Empire Cycling Cham-
pionships at Exeter, on Saturday,
produced some very unexpected re-
sults.
W. J. Bailey's success in the "quar-
ter" was anticipated, and when he
stood down for the "mile," the honour
was expected to go to Victor Johnson,
of Birmingham. Half way through
the race, however, McNeely, of Ire-
land, slipped his rivals who paid no
heed until he had obtained a lead they
were unable to regain. Payne being
six lengths behind the winner at the
finish. The ten miles completed the
programme and in this Meredith
Meredith punctured, while W. J. Bai-
ley did not start. This made the task
easier for D. Flynn, of Scotland, who
beat Johnson after a great finish;
England, Ireland and Scotland thus
each scoring a win.

CRICKET.

The inter-Varsity cricket match at
Lord's, this week, served to intro-
duce another wonder to the cricket
world. This is P. R. Le Couteur, who
virtually won the match for the Ox-
ford side. Matters looked none
too good with 4 wickets down for 30
runs, but Le Couteur (160) and C. V.
L. Hoornans (61) altered the look of
things and the total reached 315. The
Light Blue batsmen cut a sorry figure
against the bowling of Le Couteur and
R. O. Lagden, who took six wickets
for 20 runs, and 3 for 26, respectively,
the side being all out for 76. The
Cantabs again failed on following on,
Le Couteur, 5 for 46, and A. J. Evans,
4 for 7, being responsible for the
small total of 113. Thus Oxford won
very easily and once more upset the
"predictions of the prophets." Le Cou-
teur is a Rhodes scholar from Mel-
bourne, and his score is the third
highest in the history of Oxford vs.
Cambridge matches. J. F. Marsh
(Cambridge) 172 not out in 1904 hold-
ing the record.

WONDERFUL RHODES.

Wiffred Rhodes has never done any-
thing better than he accomplished in
the Yorkshire vs. Surrey match at
Stratford, this week. Surrey made
58 and then got Yorkshire out for
36, Smith taking 5 wickets for 35, and
Abeel 3 for 25. Rhodes came to the
rescue, however, by taking 6 Surrey
wickets for 38, the total stopping at
87. Following this, he opened the
second innings for Yorkshire and was
not out with 88 to his credit when
the necessary 157 runs were knock-
ed off for the loss of 5 wickets, two
of his hits being 6's and eight 4's.
More fine bowling was shown by
Deane, 11 for 67, and Huddleston, 9
for 38, in the Lancashire vs. Worcester-
ster match, whilst the batting of K. L.
Hutchings (144) and Woolley (117)
was the feature of the Kent vs. Sus-
sex fixture. The winning of this
match gave Kent a percentage of 72.72
in the county championship competi-
tion; Middlesex, 60, coming next.
The American cricketers from
Haverford College had an exciting
struggle with Marlborough College
during the week. H. A. Furness, the
visiting team's captain, played a
splendid innings of 131, he being not
out at the finish. W. F. Shielham
rendered able assistance for Marl-
borough, he also carrying his bat
through the innings for a capital score
of 108; which enabled his side to
gain an exciting victory.

GENTLEMEN vs. PLAYERS.

The oval fixture between the Gen-
tlemen and Players has not produced
anything sensational so far. Hobbs
(56) topped the score for the pros,
while R. H. Spooner's 33 was a capital
effort in a total of 163. As to the bow-
ing, W. B. Burns, of Worcester, took
7 for 58; while Smith took 7 for 61 on
behalf of the Players.

more, is by giving their children in-
dustrial and homemaking courses in
the public schools rather than by set-
tlement work and philanthropy.
These things have their place of
course, but they merely water the
branches, while the school training
goes straight to the roots.
I think this course in babyology
ought to be instituted in the schools
of every large city of the land and
I think it ought to be supplemented
by many more scientific homemaking
courses.
In Boston a group of young society
girls, made up of the graduates from
a domestic science school, have for-
med themselves into a club called the
"Boston Homemaking Club." Their
purpose is to translate what they have

A Question of Seeing and Believing.

Our morning contemporary is not pleased with the suggestion that his rosy picture of the floating of the Morris Loan last week but one was coloured by expectations in connection with the vacancy in the Savings Bank. He must pardon us for our pleasant suggestion, even though it is personal. After all, the temptation to find a plausible reason why our m. c. joins in the shout of joy, where there is no joy, and where there is nothing to rejoice about, was by no means small. Our m. c. must also pardon us for pointing out that he himself gave the whole case away on Saturday, when he expressed the belief that as a matter of fact the Morris loan was underwritten months ago but only floated last week but one.

It will be remembered that the passage of praise began to be sounded last week, and that in connection therewith a message was published from the Premier at the Hague, dated July 19th. In it Sir Edward expressed the belief that the whole of the loan had been floated the week before.

Following the publication of this message came the publication of the congratulatory cables between the Executive Council and the Premier. The Premier's message on the 19th refers in the clearest terms to what had been done during the week beginning the 11th. It is now in order to refer to what had been done.

On the 11th the subscription list opened, and on the 14th it closed. In emphatic terms the Premier tells us the whole of the loan had been floated. Our m. c. tells us that the underwriting agreement was made months ago. It is clear, therefore, the laudation had no reference to that proceeding. He distinguishes the underwriting from the flotation. The laudations were thus associated definitely with the doings of the flotation week. Now what was there to rejoice at in the proceedings of that week? Many thought there was much.

Many thought that the Premier in his cable message was conveying the impressions that the public had bought the whole of the £800,000 bonds issued. The true state of the case was not disclosed until the Evening Telegram published the Windermere message. Then we learnt that the shout had been vain, that the rejoicings had been premature, that the re-echoing, mentioned by our evening contemporary, had put a different complexion on what had been accomplished.

What was there in the proceedings of that week to laud? Were the Government supporters throwing up their hands because the public had only bought £56,000 of the £800,000 issued? Was that a subject for joy? Were they in ecstasies because the underwriters had been left burdened with £744,000 out of the £800,000 issued? Was that a matter for jubilation?

It was an occasion for sorrow, not one for joy.

After this the public naturally began to be curious about the terms on which the underwriters agreed to hold the £744,000 bonds. They want a sight of the terms of the agreement.

The message of the Premier, the exchange of laudatory messages, the press, all made an erroneous impression which the Windermere message helped to correct. The public are not satisfied yet. They want to make certain of the terms of the underwriting, and they will not be convinced that the underwriters have guaranteed 96 clear for the loan issued at 97½ until they have a sight of the text of the agreement.

King George V. Gets Less Than Three Millions.

His Pay is not Half That of German Emperor, and is Less Than King of Italy's.

The report of the Select Committee for settling the King's Civil List has again fixed the total of the British Sovereign's income at £470,000 (\$2,350,000) the sum paid yearly to King Edward.

The British King is poorly paid, says the London Express. He receives less than half the sum paid to the German Emperor, £310,000 less than the income of the Austrian Emperor, and considerably less than the King of the comparatively poor kingdom of Italy.

The royal income is divided into six sections. During the last reign the division was as follows:—

Privy Purse	£110,000
Salaries	125,800
Expenses	193,000
Works	20,000
Alms	13,200
Unappropriated	8,000
Total	£470,000

The salaries are paid to a vast army of officials engaged in the departments of the Lord Steward, the Lord Chamberlain, and the Master of the Horse, and to a smaller body of officials who work with the Keeper of the Privy Purse. These officials form a great army stretching from the heads of the Household, appointed by the Government of the day, down to the footmen, the cooks and the housemaids.

Household Servants.

Under the Lord Steward are a Treasurer, a Comptroller, the Master of the Household, the Paymaster of the Household, several accountants, the many cooks and kitchen servants, the Gentleman of the Cellars, who is in charge of the King's wine, and so on.

The department of the Master of the Horse, which is practically presided over by the Crown Equerry, Sir Henry Ewart, comprises the Equerries, the Pages of Honor, Superintendents of the Royal Stables, storekeepers, veterinary surgeons, and numberless coachmen and grooms.

The Lord Chamberlain is responsible for the condition of the royal palaces, and for the stage management of all the King's receptions. His officials include a Comptroller, a Paymaster, the Master of Ceremonies, the Lords and Grooms in Waiting, the Gentlemen Ushers, Inspectors of Palaces, and so on. In addition, the Lord Chamberlain superintends London theatres; and the Examiner of Plays, the Post Laureate, the Marine Painter, the Keeper of the King's Armory, and the Librarian of Windsor Castle are under his sway, together with the Bargemaster and the Keeper of the Swans.

The £125,000 spent in salaries is certainly cut up among a sufficiently large number of persons, and when it is remembered that it has become the custom of the Royal Household to provide generous pensions for old and faithful servants, it must be perfectly obvious that it must be frequently necessary to make contributions from the Privy Purse.

the maintenance of Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, and any private residences which the Sovereign may own.

The somewhat indefinite name of "Expenses" covers the necessarily enormous household bills of the Court in London and elsewhere. The housekeeping of King George and Queen Mary at Marlborough House was always careful, thorough and economical.

It is not generally realized that the Sovereign, whose duty it is to travel up and down the country laying foundation stones and opening town halls, pays the full prices for the railway travelling of himself and his suite. He has also to meet the expenses of entertaining foreign Royal visitors as well as to pay for those Continental tours which have during the last few years been instrumental in changing the whole aspect of international affairs and vastly

strengthening the position of this country.

The contributions to charities are far greater than the amount set aside in the Civil List under the heading of "Alms." The public knows that a royal contribution is never lacking to funds raised in cases of sudden sorrow and distress, but the public has no conception of the daily flow of bounties, small and great, to all sorts of deserving causes that come from the Privy Purse.

The Drawing Rooms.

Society demands the frequent giving of Drawing Rooms, which cost the King hundreds of pounds; the sporting world demands that the King shall race, and it is notorious that a racing stable is an exceedingly costly possession; the ruler of the Island Kingdom must own a yacht and must pay for its upkeep. He must support the theatre and the opera and literature at his own expense, and his encouragement to philanthropy must be actual as well as verbal.

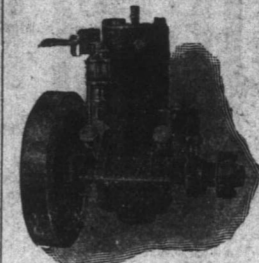
He must necessarily keep a wardrobe stuffed with British and foreign uniforms, and out of all proportion to his actual needs, and these he must pay for himself.

If he travels abroad he has to think of the dignity of his country as well as his own comfort, and special trains and special accommodation are only obtained, even by Kings, by the payment of very special prices.

In face of this enormous expenditure we treat our King in a niggardly manner, and this is the more apparent when it is remembered that the Crown Lands which were surrendered to the nation nowadays provide an income within £83,000 of the total payments by the nation to the Royal family. Outside the Civil List, the King has no income excepting the revenue of the Duchy of Lancaster, some £60,000 a year. The revenue of the Duchy of Cornwall, which is in possession of the Prince of Wales, is considerably larger. But in view of this, it is suggested that the nation should at present make no provision for the present Prince.

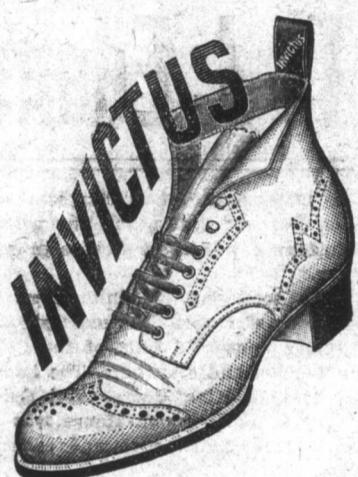

The Crippen Mystery.

Woman's Body in a Cellar— Search for Doctor and Typist— Police Narrative.

The mystery of the body found in a cellar at 39, Hilldrop-crescent, Camden Town, on Wednesday, resulted in a notice being issued by Scotland Yard yesterday that Dr. Hawley Harvey Crippen and Miss Le Neve are "wanted for murder and mutilation of a woman."

The following are the dramatis personae in the mystery:—

H. H. Crippen, American doctor, lived with his wife at 39, Hilldrop-crescent, had offices in Albion House, New Oxford-street, and Craven House, Kingsway; disappeared on Saturday with

Miss Le Neve, a typist, who had lived at 39, Hilldrop-crescent since February, when

Mrs. Cora Crippen, wife of Dr. Crip-

pen, known on the music-hall stage as Bella Elmore, disappeared. The body found in the cellar at Hilldrop-crescent may be hers. Dr. Crippen had inserted in the Era a notice of her death in California.

A French girl, who lived at 39, Hilldrop-crescent for the past fortnight apparently as a servant.

"DRESSED AS A BOY."

The following is the police notice. It will be seen that Scotland Yard says that Miss Le Neve may be dressed as a boy. Dr. Crippen is said to have purchased a boy's suit last week.

Although her friends were not satisfied with Crippen's story they did not inform the police until June 30th last, when a lady and gentleman friend of hers came to New Scotland Yard and gave information as to her mysterious disappearance to Superintendent Frost and Chief Inspector Dew. Every possible inquiry was made by the latter, who not being satisfied as to Mrs. Crippen's death, interviewed Crippen, who admitted that all his former stories were incorrect and that he had had a quarrel with his wife, who had gone away, saying that she should never see him again, and he believed she had gone to America.

On Saturday last Crippen and Miss Le Neve, whom he had told people he had married, disappeared together about 1 p.m. Chief Inspector Dew, with Sergeant Mitchell, continued the inquiry, made a thorough examination of the house and garden, and on Wednesday afternoon determined to make a still further examination of the garden and the house.

In making a close examination of the cellar, and on probing the brick floor, they found that they could move the bricks in some parts easier than in others, and decided to dig the whole cellar up, with the result that the Inspector, after digging some little distance down, came across what was evidently a portion of a human body, and later on the mutilated remains of a body were found. He communicated these facts to New Scotland Yard, when Sir Melville Macnaghten and Superintendent Frost attended and viewed the remains.

Crippen was born at Cold Water, Michigan, U.S.A., and was educated at Indiana and Los Angeles, Cal., completing his medical education at Michigan, Cleveland, and New York, and has practised at Detroit, San Diego, Salt Lake City, St. Louis, and Brooklyn, as ear and eye specialist, and has managed Munyon's business at Philadelphia and Toronto.

The public are earnestly requested to note the description of these two people and to communicate any information to New Scotland Yard.

THE BOY'S DRESS.

Police Denial of any Trace of the Girl.

Notwithstanding that various rumours to the contrary were circulated yesterday the police, it was authoritatively stated last night, have learned nothing which goes to show that either Dr. Crippen or Miss Le Neve have been seen since last Saturday. Some time ago Dr. Crippen rented a small office on the first floor of Craven House, Kingsway, the door of which bore the following inscription:—
H. H. Crippen, M.D., U.S.A.
The Aural Remedies Coy.
Hours 9-12.

But the man himself has not been seen there for a long time past. It will be noticed that in the official description of the "wanted" woman it is stated that "she may be dressed as a boy in dark-brown suit and grey hard felt hat." This possible contingency has been suggested to the police from the ascertained fact that on Wednesday or Thursday of last week Dr. Crippen bought:

Will go as Crippen's wife; age 27; height, 5ft. 5 in.; complexion pale; hair, light brown; inclined sandy; scanty and bald on top; long sandy moustache, rather straggly; may be clean shaven or wearing beard; eyes grey; flat on bridge of nose; false teeth; wears gold-rimmed spectacles; may be dressed in dark brown jacket suit, marked "Baker and Sons," and grey round felt hat ("Horne Bros.") inside; rather slovenly appearance; throws his feet out when walking; speaks with slight American accent; wears hat back of head; very plausible and quiet-spoken; speaks French; carries firearms; shows his teeth when talking, and

Ethel Clara Le Neve.

Will go as Crippen's wife; age 27; height, 5ft. 5 in.; complexion pale; hair, light brown; large grey eyes, good teeth; good looking; medium build, pleasant appearance, quiet, subdued manner; looks intently when in conversation; walks slowly; reticent; probably dressed blue serge coat three-quarter jacket; large hat; or may be dressed as a BOY in dark brown suit; grey hard felt hat; native of London; shorthand writer and typist.

ABANDONED COUPLE.

Yesterday Scotland Yard made a new departure of a most interesting character in their method of crime investigation. The authorities for the first time in their history took the Press into their confidence and issued the following official statement relating to the crime and the steps which led to its discovery:—

Mrs. Cora Crippen, otherwise Belle Elmore, or Belle Mackamotski, an American lady and music hall artiste, was married some years ago in New York to an American doctor named Hawley Harvey Crippen, alias Peter Crippen, alias Franckel, who for some years represented Munyon's remedies in London, was connected with the Drouet Institute, and has latterly carried on a dental business at Albion House, New Oxford-street, as the Yale Tooth Specialist. Mrs. Crippen was a very charming lady, and was very popular in the music-hall world, and was honorary secretary to the Music-hall Ladies' Guild. They have been in England for some years, and for the past four years they have resided, apparently very happy, at 39 Hilldrop-crescent, Camden-road.

On February 2 last Crippen circulated the report that Mrs. Crippen had left for America to transact business. Later on he said that he had received information from America that she was seriously ill with pneumonia, and later still that she was dead and had been cremated near San Francisco, and that the ashes were on the way to him.

exhaustive examination of the remains, which were still in the coal-cellar. It was clear that the body had been buried in quicklime, and all semblance to a human body had been destroyed. From the situation of the various parts it is practically certain that the body had been dismembered, as the central portion was found some little distance from the limbs. This central portion is the best preserved, and the organs will be subjected to a careful analysis.

Owing to the condition of the remains any attempt at identification would be hopeless, but Professor Pepper was able to state that they were those of a woman, and that the length of the limb corresponded to the measurements of the missing woman. The stomach has been removed to the Home Office laboratory.

Shortly after Mrs. Crippen's disappearance last February the secretary of the Music-Hall Ladies' Guild received a letter which was in Dr. Crippen's handwriting, and which purported to be signed on behalf of his wife. The signature was "H. H. Crippen, port Belle Elmore." The text of the letter was as follows:—

"To the Committee of the Music-Hall Ladies' Guild:

"Dear Friend,—Please forgive me a hasty letter, and my inconvenience I may cause you, but I have just had news of the illness of a near relative, and at only a few hours' notice I am obliged to go to America. Under the circumstances I cannot return for several months, and I therefore beg you to accept this as a formal resigning from this date of the honorary treasurership of the Music-Hall Ladies' Guild.

"I am enclosing the cheque-book and the deposit book for the immediate use of my successor, and to save any delay I beg to suggest you should vote to suspend the usual rules of election and elect to-day a new treasurer. I hope some months later to be with you, and in the meantime wish the Guild every success, and I ask my good friends and pals to accept my sincere and loving wishes for their own personal welfare."

The persistence of the officials of the Music-Hall Ladies' Guild was really responsible for the discovery of the body. They suspected the first report of Mrs. Crippen's death, which appears to have been communicated to the Era by Crippen himself. It was an advertisement in the following words:—

ELMORE—March 23, in California, U.S.A., Miss Belle Elmore (Mrs. H. H. Crippen).

Mme. Ginnett, President of the Guild (who has a horse-training farm at New Jersey), was in London at the time. She and others caused inquiries to be made. It seems that a son of Crippen, by a first wife, who was in Los Angeles, California, replied to a question that he only knew of the death of his stepmother from his father. When Mme. Ginnett returned to America she wrote to the Health Department at Los Angeles asking for information as to the death of Mrs. Elmore. She received the reply (cables our New York correspondent) that they had never heard of such a woman. Then Mme. Ginnett notified Scotland Yard last month.

"MY DREADFUL LOSS"

The New York police says (says Reuter) in possession of a letter signed "Doctor," dated April 7, which was sent from London to Mrs. R. H. Mills, step-sister of Mrs. Crippen:—

"My dear Louise Robert,—I hardly know how to write to you. My dreadful loss shocks me so dreadful. I am hardly able to control myself. My poor Cora has gone, and to make the shock to me more dreadful I did not even see her at the last.

"A few weeks ago we had the news that an old relative of mine in California was dying, and to secure im-

portant property for ourselves it was necessary for one of us to go to put the matter in the lawyers' hands at once. As I was very busy, Cora proposed that she should go and, as it was necessary that someone should be there at once, that she should go straight through here to California, without stopping at all, and then return via Brooklyn so as to be able to pay all of you a long visit.

"Unfortunately, on the way out my poor Cora caught a severe cold, and not having while travelling a chance to take care of herself, it settled on her lungs later to develop into pleuro-pneumonia. She wished not to frighten me, so kept writing to me not to worry about her and that it was only a slight matter. I next heard by cable that she was dangerously ill. After I had cabled to know whether I should go to her, I had the dreadful news that she had passed away. Imagine, if you can, the dreadful shock to me never more to see my Cora alive and hear her voice again. She is being sent back to me and I shall soon have what is left of her here.

"Of course, I am giving up the house. In fact, it drives me mad to be in it alone. I shall sell out everything in a few days. I do not know what to do. Probably I shall find some business to take me travelling for months until I can recover from the shock a little, but as soon as I have a settled address again I will write to you again.

"As it is so dreadful for me to have to write this dreadful, dreadful news, will you please tell all the others with love to all, that I will write again soon and give you my address probably in France.

"DOCTOR."

MISSING WOMAN'S LIFE.

Dr. Crippen's office in Albion House, 59, New Oxford-street, was on the same floor (the third) as that of the Music Hall Ladies' Guild, and only three doors away from it. This Guild assists artistes who are in distress or out of employment. Miss Melinda May, the secretary, gave some particulars yesterday of the connection of Mrs. Crippen with the Guild of which she had been hon. treasurer.

"She was the sweetest, nicest woman you could hope to meet, and her disappearance was totally inexplicable to us. We knew Crippen as her husband. They always seemed to be on good terms, although I know that she used to complain to friends of his attentions to the young lady typist (Miss Le Neve) and say that she would have to leave. Her husband used to say that he could not dispense with her as she was his right hand.

had known Crippen about fourteen years. She was a Russian lady, her name being Morski. She spoke with a suspicion of foreign accent, but it was covered by her decided American "twang." Her last official act for the Guild was to sign a cheque in her stage name, "Belle Elmore," on January 26, and she signed the committee minute book on January 31.

On February 3 we were very much perturbed to receive the letter, signed on her behalf, announcing her resignation and departure. (The letter is printed above.) Our suspicions were aroused, especially when we saw an announcement in the Era of her death in California. Crippen said that she had been ill with pneumonia, and had died, and had been cremated. We had in the meantime become aware that Crippen took frequent trips to the Continent and appeared at one of the professional dinners (the Railway Artists' Association) in the company of the typewriter. We caused inquiries to be made in California, and finding that Miss Elmore had not been heard of there we put the matter in the hands of the police authorities.

Reuter's New York correspondent stated yesterday that the police there have learned that Belle Elmore was the daughter of a Polish nobleman and that her maiden name was Cora Belle Makomaski. It is her stepfather, Frederick Marsinger, who lives in Brooklyn. Dr. Crippen was associated in Philadelphia with Professor Munyon from 1894 to 1899 in the manufacture of patent medicines.

LAST TRACE OF CRIPPEN.

On doors 59 and 60 of Crippen's office in Albion House appeared: "American Dental Specialists—H. H. Crippen, G. M. Rylance—Reception Rooms. Please walk in." Mr. Rylance caused Crippen's name to be erased yesterday. On the next door, 58, was: "Yale Tooth Specialists, Private."

Mr. Rylance yesterday said that he was never a partner of Mr. Crippen, but merely got him to help with advertising and other business. "Crippen used to come here every day," added Mr. Rylance, "and he had a few letters addressed here. I never knew of his connection with the Drouet Institute, or I would have had nothing to do with him; but I knew he had various businesses, including a skin specialist's in the neighbourhood of Oxford-circus.

"I last saw him on Saturday morning, when he came here and changed his clothes and boots. He left the old ones here. The police have them now, and I have given a full description of the new ones."

Dr. Crippen lived very quietly in the large house at Hilldrop-crescent, making no friends in the neighbourhood, although he was a well-known figure to the tradespeople. One of these, the managers of Messrs. Hyslop and Sons' dairy in Brecknock-road, recalled that he visited the shop on Sunday, May 29, in company with a boy apparently between fourteen and sixteen years old. "He was wearing a cap and an Eton collar," she said, "but there was nothing to lead one to think that it was a woman."

The authorities at Scotland Yard have spread a world-wide net in the attempt to catch Dr. Crippen and Miss Crippen and Miss Le Neve. Shortly after midnight on Wednesday, when the body had been found, telegrams giving a description of the wanted persons were despatched to the "Yard" detectives who are permanently stationed at the various English and Continental ports, to the police authorities of every English country, to shipping offices and railway stations, and to the several Continental and American police bureaux. Every vessel which leaves England is being closely watched and every passenger who reaches the Continent or America during the next few days will be narrowly scrutinised.

The whole resources of Scotland Yard are being devoted to the search. Sir Melville Macnaghten, assistant commissioner, the famous head of the Criminal Investigation Department, with Detective-Superintendent Frost, the Executive chief, and Chief Inspector Dew, is in charge of the investigation. Yesterday the description of the missing persons was read out in the various divisions to every member of the Metropolitan Police Force. —The Daily Mail, July 15.
