

The influence which a good citizen exerts among his fellows is incalculable. A citizen who has acquired influence in a public way and in public office should ever be guarded in his actions, in his speech, and in his writings lest the latter should beguile others in error or false doctrine. In stirring times this is to be the more desired ince many men learn to lean on others' opinions and declarations.' To none is it of more importance than to that portion of the people who are entering upon the duties of full citizenship. To them it is of the first importance that prominent public men should be above suspicion in all affairs of Government, in speech, and their own conduct.

For the inexperienced in matters relating to government may be easily deceived by specious reasoning. Specious reasoning is to be deprecated at all times, but when it is indulged in by, and in the behalf of, designing poli-ticians, men in public life, for the purpose of beguiling the unwary voter it should be severely condemned.

A young man will often vote as he feels, until he learns by experience to distinguish the sheep from the goats, the true statesman from the false braggadocio, the honest man from the Charlatan. To draw such distinctions may sometimes be difficult-and will be whilst chicanery obtains-but there are occasions when the charlatan is so conspicuous that he does not require to be labelled.

True instinct is all that most men need on such occas-

"mates made of the likely extent of these branch-"es. Some differ from me and think my mileage "too high. I do not think so. But to be perfectly "safe I will put the estimate at 250 miles. 

That Voter talks common sense; but he decides that Premier Morris is perhaps only a bungler in figures, and is not big enough for his position.

And that Voter, making due allowance for the exigen-cies of political emergencies, decides to probe the question as to whether Premier Morris is an honest man. Does he speak the truth? And he takes up another important matter-which all knowing men have considered and dimatter-which all knowing men have considered and digested-that matter relating to his Minister of Justice. "Let me see," says the Voter, "how Premier Morris ac-quitted himself there."

He reads the articles in the newspapers. He sees it written in plain words: how the Hon. D. Morison had a timber property for sale; how that Minister wrote to R. W. If men in public life, occupying the highest positions of trust, whose integrity is the only guarantee against wrong-doing, can be guilty of such wilful deception, what possibilities, aye, what probabilities of harm repose in them? Do they ask for votes? Yes. And can you vote for them?


That is the question before the men of Newfoundland to-day. That is the question that concerns all men, and the vital interests of the country. It concerns the old and the young. But more particularly does it concern the young voter who will, perhaps, cast his first vote on the thirtieth of October. His career is before him; he will now for the first time perhaps exercise the full rights of citizenship; his ideals are of manly fibre-the sort that expects of men high in public life more than is expected of men in private life—and his ideals will assuredly demand integ-rity in our public men. If the people do not get that they get nothing. Worse still, the continuance in office of men having base ideals of honour and common honesty is sub-versive of law, of stability, of common decency.

If what is done may not be undone, let not designing, unscrupulous men be commended, rather let them be con-demned, lest a worse thing befall this country at their hands.







Of the Late Rev. Dr. Rogers --- An **Immense Congregation and Worthy** Tribute to a Good and Beloved

Memorial Service

Pastor.

'Servant of God well done,

The earthly warfare's past, The battle's fought, the race is run, And thou art crowned at last." —Charles Wesley. It has been said that the world honurs a good man, and pays tribute to character and homage to worth. This statement was fully demonstrated last night at Gower Street Methodist Church by the vast congre-gation which assembled at the Memor-ial Source of the last of the last strength of rvice of the late Rev. Dr. Jabez Ayre Rogers.

At an early hour the sacred edifice was filled to its utmost capacity by people from different denominations, all of whom had come to pay their last tribute of respect to the life-work and memory of a good man. The scene drapery of the church was a reminder that death had visited the congrega-

The service was conducted by the Revs. Drs. Fenwick and Cowperthwaite in a very feeling manner; and devotional exercises were over and the Scripture lessons read, the congregation was well prepared to listen to the sermon.

The preacher was the Rev. Dr. Cowperthwaite, and the text chosen was from the Book of Isaiah, chap. 32 and 2nd verse: "And a man shall be as an hiding place from the wind." The speaker began his discourse by comparing the opinions which modern men, and sages, and philosophers hold of life, with those of the prophet and showed that while they agreed in principle, the prophet had behind his assertion the important and funda-mental truth of inspiration, and thereore gave the best interpretation life and its possibilities. In coming more directly to the sub

ject of the evening the preacher paid a high tribute to the work and zeal and heart-felt devotion of the Rev Dr. Rogers, the late loved and re-spected pastor of Gower Street Church. For forty years they had been fellow labourers together, and had during all that long period of time enjoyed the benefits of unsullied friendship. Many who had laboured friendship: Many who had laboured with them in the Provinces of Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, and in Newfound-

land had passed to their reward, to a higher life, the life of immortality; but he and Dr. Rogers were among the few who had been spared to such long ser-

vice. But now the call had come the latter, and in the midst of a useful ach distress will go. No indigestion. and busy pastorate his work ceased.

bas passed to his reward. Dr. Rogers was an esteemed man in a distinct sense, and his career in St. John's, his native city, was that of the refined gentleman and sincere Christian. His citizenship was an asset to any community, and his presence in the homes of his flock was a benediction indeed.
