#### GERMANY'S FOOD.

(New York Journal of Commerce.) That food supplies are scarce for the people in their homes is practically proclaimed by this government action, and it can hardly be that the army supplies are liberal. There eems to be little chance of getting much grain by importation, and between now and the next harvest there is likely to be a scanty supply of food at the front and in the rear of the armies, while the ranks of the cultirators of the soil have been depleted to filt the ranks of those fighting for the Me of the nation. Under the circumstances the government is hardly to be criticized for using its authority to the utmost to conserve the food of the nation and see to its equitable distribution, instead of leaving that to a cruel competition between those who have and those who have not, though it seems like a policy which has had no precedent since the days of Joseph in Egypt, when it was justified by famine instead of war. What effect this lack of food may have on the duration of the struggie is an interesting and rather melancicly juestion.





### **Pope Intoned Prayer** for Peace.

Rome, Feb. 7.—There was an im-ressive scene in Saint Peter's this fternoon when Pope Benedict inton-

The great edifice was thronged with worshippers when the Pope, surround ed by twenty-two cardinals, mounted to the Papal altar. Standing between the four richly gilded spirals of the dernini canopy, Pope Benedict intoned the prayer, which was repeated by the kneeling multitude, whose voices echoed throughout the great temple. The prayer was to "God of All Mercies, King of Peace."

The Pope, on arriving and departing was accorded an ovation. As he was leaving after the ceremony, there were many cries of "Long live the Pope," and "Give us peace."

Despite the downpour of rain at three o'clock this afternoon, all the bells of the four hundred churches in Rome pealed out, calling the people to services to implore the ces-sation of the war, and the establishment of peace among the nations of the world. Over sixty thousand per sons gathered in St. Peter's.





In his lecture on Tuesday night Rev. Mr. Hemmeon spoke of the sentence of imprisonment passed recently on a lad of 13 years, deploring the situation which made this immature boy a companion of hardened crimin als instead of being sent to a Reforma tory or industrial school, where the necessary correction and development could take place. The question of a Reformatory is a hardy annual with the Grand Jury, just as the Board of Trade Report is hardly complete without reference to the Telephone sys-

But yet nothing can stir the Government to action in the matter, and we have in the present instance a boy of 13 who was too young to understand the sentence passed on him and who became hysterical with awful fright when it was explained to him and he realized the separation it meant from his home. Now, it seems to me that this is another matter for the Civic Commission to take up and provide some place which would turn those boys into decent citizens instead of letting the prison turn them into jailbirds or corner bums.

The 'morale' of the people is or should be just as much the concern of the Council as clean streets, and the establishment of a Reformatory seems a much greater need than the problematical necessity of spending an en-

ormous sum on new water mains. It is really a blot on our city that we have no more regard for juvenile offenders than we have for a dog that steals a bone and the guilt in each case is much the same and caused only by the way they have been

brought up. And a flogging after all doesn't correct much. 

BRITISH NAVAL EXPERT INCLIN-ED TO BELIEVE VON TIRPITZ.

London, Feb. 1.-The Daily News' naval expert says: "There is nothing particularly striking in fact that the German submarine U-21 should have

been so far from her home ports, and

up in calm, shallow waters so that the crew could rest. "The U-21 was the first of the new and greatly improved type of German submarine and was launched in 1913. Her displacement is 800 tons, her speed 17 knots on the surface and 12 when submergeed, and besides being equipped with four torpedo tubes and two 3-inch 14-pounder quick-firing

guns, all those parts which show above the surface when cruising awash, are armored with Krupp plating. The other boats numbered from U-11 to U-29 carry only one gun. "The actual strength of the German Navy in completed submarines is unknown. The last official British return showed that twenty-one were in service at the beginning of 1914, while fourteen boats, from U-25 to U-38, with 'further numbers uncertain,

were under construction. In the autumn of 1911 the German press was

making confident boasts that they

#### would possess at least fifty submarines in 1914." A British Base?

The Daily Chronicle's naval correspondent says: "The German submarine U-21 is believed to have sunk the Pathfinder on Sept. 5 and she it was that sank the Malachite off Havre on Nov. 23, and the Primo three days later. They were said to have been destroyed by gunfire, but more probably it was by portable mines with the fuses so placed as to blow holes below the water line. This is reported to have been the procedure in the sinking of the Linda Blanche." The Durward, which was sunk by a submarine near the Maas Lightship on Jan. 22, is believed to have been torpedoed, and this, of course, was the case in the loss of the battleship Formidable. The captain of the submarine will be sparing in his use of these costly missiles, for he will pro-bably not carry more than five or six

route by which the U-21 reached the scene of her latest exploits. We cannot suppose that she has been in western waters ever since she destroyed the two ships off Havre. She must have returned to her base, otherwise we should have to imagine her establishing a base of her own in some rewhere on our own coats. German submarines, as we know, have recently gone as far west as the strait, and they have from time to time been heard off the north coast of Scotland. where one was sunk in November.

"German submarines lately have been reported in Norwegian waters, and it is possible that they have nnknown to the Norwegian Government. found resources there. They could then pass down the west coast of Scotland, hoping to do damage off the Clyde, and then through the North Channel to reach the Irish Sea. There are great shipyards on the Clyde and at Barrow, where warships are built, and perhaps the very enterprising captain of the U-21 may hope to do damage among them."

#### RUSSIAN SUCCESSES ARE REPORTED IN THE EAST.

Petrograd, Feb. 4.-Important successes for the Russians in East Prussia and Northern Poland are announced in an official statement issued here to-day. In East Prussia the Czar's troops, despite desperate resistance by the Germans, have succeeded in crossing the Angerap river and captured fortified positions, while in Northern Poland they have captured the town of Skempe, only 33 miles from the great fortress of Thorn.

West of Warsaw, in the vicinity of Bolimow and Gouimane, the Germans are continuing their terrific attacks upon the Russian lines.

In their operations there the Germans are using about 42,000 men in their furious attacks. The Germans are suffering heavy losses, but are bringing up fresh troops to replace

Fighting is still going on in the Carpathians, the Germans helping the Austrians there have also been rein-


