

We have risked all dangers to Portugal, Spain and Italy with our sailing vessels, although Canada and the United States have prohibited their sailing vessels from crossing the Atlantic.

The articles of Produce which we require space for are as follows:

1st-Salted Codfish in Casks:

This is wholly an article of food and is selling for about half the value of an equivalent weight of meat and pork shipped from Canada and the United States.

2nd-Cod Oil:

This is used entirely for Tanning Leather and there is no substitute anything ilke as good. British firms working on contracts for Boots and Shoes for Army and Navy as well as Harness and Saddlery for the Cavalry will be delayed in their work, and their product will be an inferior article unless Genuine Cod Oil is used in the manufacture of this Leather.

3rd-Cod Liver Oil: This is used entirely for Medicinal purposes and is absolutely ne-

cessary for both rich and poor. The British Government has paid as high as 28 - and 30 - per gallon for thousands of barrels of the similar Norwegian product to prevent its exportation to Germany.

During the past season the Norwegian Government took control of their own output for the manufacture of Butterine and Food Products for their own people. Market Notes.

CODFISH - Several cargoes consigned to European markets have left different ports in the island since last writing, and it has been learned that the S. S. Seal will be ordered to Italy with her load, in order to test the market conditions there. A telegram to the Board of Trade from a Genoa concern last week asks for inspection of all shipments to that port and a guarantee (certificate) of quality given by authorised inspectors before any demand is made for payment. The suggestion has been made that the Board of Trade send competent men. The Spanish market is very dull and Italy has supplies for the present. No price has been named by Greek buyers but advice cables are expected any day.

COD OIL-The market has been very dull, one of the conditions helping this being the efforts of United States buyers to bear prices. An improvement may be looked for shortly. English markets are about exhausted, and some are inclined to think that these should be given the preference. The correspondence between the Board of Trade and the London Chamber of Commerce shows just how much the British Shipping Ministry valued the Newfoundland products in the Cod Oil line during the past six months, and how eagerly they placed ships at our disposal to get them to market.
