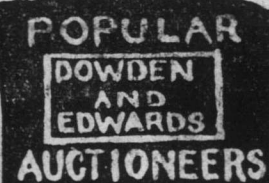

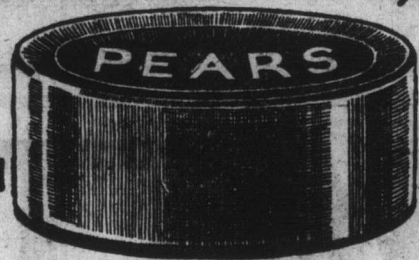
His eyes turned up toward her, and he said, with the weak, halting tone of the dipsomaniac who wants to tell a lie well and does it badly:

War Declared on Britain.

Turkish Rebels Spoiling for Fight -- Heavy Casualties Among Japs and Bolsheviks -- Enthusiastic Welcome for Prince at Panama -- New Chief Secretary for Ireland -- Polar Explorer Heard From

JAPS AND BOLSHEVIKS FIGHT.

HONOLULU, April 1. (By the A.P.)—Seven hundred Japanese troops and civilians were killed in a two-day battle with Russian Bolshevik forces at Nikola-Evsk, Siberia, according to a Tokyo cable despatch received by the Japanese newspaper Nippon Jiji here.

TROOPS ACTING SEPARATELY.

WASHINGTON, April 2. Troops on the Rhine are subject to the orders of the President of the United States as commander in chief of the army, President Wilson said in a message to Congress today in response to a resolution of inquiry adopted by the House. Field Marshal Foch has no authority over American troops, the President said. Major General Allen, commanding the forces, has full au-

thority to utilize his troops for policing of the occupied district, the preservation of order, and to repel any attack which may be made upon him.

JAP TROOPS TO REMAIN IN SIBERIA.

HONOLULU, April 1. General Baron Yuehara, chief of the military general staff, announced today that Japanese forces would be retained in Siberia for the protection of life and property of Japanese subjects, as well as for national defence.

TURK REBELS DECLARE WAR ON BRITAIN.

MONTREAL, April 1. A London cable to the Montreal Star says Mustafa Kemal, leader of the Turkish Nationalist rebels, has declared war on Great Britain, a des-

patch from the Constantinople correspondent of the Morning Post said today.

ITALY WILL SUBMIT TO WILSON.

TRIESTE, April 2. The Italian Government has notified Gabriele D'Annunzio that it will have to accept President Wilson's project for the settlement of the Adriatic question. An envoy from Premier Nitti has been to Fiume, where he made this decision known to D'Annunzio.

AMUNDSEN AGAIN HEARD FROM.

MONTREAL, April 1. A London cable to the Montreal Star says, after being held up for two years by ice, Capt. Roald Amundsen's expedition, long wrapped in the silence of the north, expects to push on to the Pole during the coming summer. A message from Amundsen has been received in Christiania today stating that he was wintering at Aoln Island, Siberia, and telling of plans for the summer.

N.Y. FERRYMEN STRIKE.

NEW YORK, April 2. A general strike order, effective immediately on all railroad boats except ferries, was issued by the marine workers on the ferry boats of the railroad companies were ordered to quit work at eight o'clock to-night. The Union announced that five thousand men would obey the order, and that the strike would tie up forty per cent. of the total harbor traffic.

GREENWOOD SUCCEEDS MACPHERSON.

LONDON, April 2. Sir Hamar Greenwood, Under Secretary for Home Affairs, has been appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland, succeeding Ian Macpherson, who resigned yesterday. Frederick Kellaway, Secretary to the Minister of Munitions, will succeed Sir Hamar Greenwood in the Overseas Trade Dept. Macpherson has been appointed Minister of Pensions, and Sir Laming Worthington Evans has been made Minister without portfolio.

[Sir Hamar Greenwood, who has been appointed Chief Secretary for Ireland, in succession to Ian Macpherson, resigned, was born in Canada 50 years ago being educated at the Public School, Whitby, his birthplace. He was for eight years a Lieutenant in the Canadian Militia. From 1914 to 1916 he served as a Lieut.-Col. in the Great War, when he became attached to Lord Derby's staff at the War Office. Sir Hamar Greenwood, who has represented Sunderland in Parliament since 1910, has been Under Secretary of State for Home Affairs since the beginning of 1919. He is a Liberal.—Ed.]

GEORGIA NOT FOR WILSON.

Atlanta, Ga., April 1. The name of President Wilson, which had been entered by petition in the Georgia presidential primary, has been withdrawn by the action of a number of signers of the petition. The time limit for entries expired today, and official announcement of the candidates who had been certified revealed that President Wilson was not among them. Attorney General Palmer, Thomas Watson, former candidate for President on the Populist ticket, and Senator Hoks Smith, were the only candidates whose names will appear on the ballots.

SOCIALIST MEMBERS EXPELLED.

ALBANY, N.Y., April 1. Five socialists, Louis Waldman and August Claessens, of New York, Charles Solomon, of King's, and Samuel A. DeWitt and Samuel Orr, of the Bronx, the entire delegation of their party in the New York Assembly, were expelled from membership in the Lower House of the Legislature early today.

THE PRINCE'S TOUR.

PANAMA, April 1. Great crowds lined the streets and enthusiastically cheered the Prince of Wales as he went to the executive

mansion to pay a formal call on President Lefevre yesterday. So large were the throngs that surged through the thoroughfares that the progress of the Royal visitor's car was often impeded. Upon arrival at the President's home the Prince was forced to go to the balcony from which he bowed his acknowledgements to the crowd. Later the Prince inspected the Pacific defences of the Canal and reviewed discharged British West Indian soldiers.

PANAMA, April 2.

The Prince of Wales sailed today for San Diego, California, after his visit to the Canal zone. It developed that the Renown suffered damage to her starboard propeller in the Culebra cut on Tuesday. The British cruiser Calcutta, which accompanied the Renown here, has returned to Barbados.

REPLY TO HUNGARY DECIDED UPON.

PARIS, April 1. The Council of Ambassadors has virtually completed its examination of the objections filed by the Hungarian plenipotentiaries to the proposed treaty of peace with Hungary, and the general terms of the Allied reply have been decided upon by the ambassadorial body. The reply will probably be handed to the Hungarian delegation at an early date.

"He Is Risen."

"Hail! Festal Day to Endless Ages known;
When Christ o'er death victorious gained His Throne."

THE Birth of our Lord was heralded with celestial splendour and magnificence, fit proclamation for Him who was to be King of Kings, when the portals of high Heaven were thrown wide and through them issued the angelic choir, which amidst supernatural radiance, announced in joyous melody the nativity of the Son of God. To those who witnessed the wondrous phenomena, the revelation of the manifestations of the Omnipotent Creator in the giving of His only Son to mankind, there was something awesome and strange, and it is not to be wondered at that the leader of the heavenly chorus adjured the people who both saw and heard to "Fear Not." The Messiah was born on earth, while squadrons of the hosts of heaven wheeled and circled in the ethereal spaces, and the evangel was sounded within the hearing of the then known world. The glad tidings were made known to all mankind, amid scenes never before dreamed of by humanity, and wise and simple hastened to do homage and worship at the manger of Bethlehem. The news of the birth of a Saviour was brought to earth at night and many were apprised of it.

But how different was the announcement of the Resurrection. Made by an angel to two lone women who had early in the morning come to the tomb to seek their loved Master's body, and bear it away, to be embalmed with spices, "He is not here, He is Risen." A simple statement of a marvellous fact. "He is not here. He is Risen." Thus was the fact of the resurrection and the redemption stated. Seven words told of the most sublime, the most important, the most tremendous, the most transcendent, the most epochal occurrence in the history of the universe. Christ had risen from the dead as He said He would. But there were no celestial demonstrations here: there were no witnesses to the great event. Two forlorn women were made the first custodians of the triumph of their Lord over the grave. "He is not here. He is risen." Nothing could be more plain? Theologians may twist and turn it how they desire, but the mighty fact remains undeniable. The accomplishment was real. Nothing can detract from the direct utterance of the tomb's celestial guard, and with sublime faith the women, "Mary Magdalene and that other Mary" went their way sorrowing in that they had not seen their Lord, but with hearts elated because of the marvel of the thing that had come to pass. Their stupendous secret could not be kept for long. Others were waiting to share in it, and they had been enjoined to communicate it to Peter and the Disciples, with the promise that afterwards they all should see their Lord. They had no doubt. Their faith was great. He had risen as He said.

From Bethlehem to Calvary: from the Manger to the Cross: from Death to the Resurrection, triumphing over the grave and winning for man immortality. Upon these events are built the whole structure of the Christian Faith. Inexplicable scientifically, the Resurrection of Christ is nevertheless of one piece, and quite in harmony with the altogether unique and extraordinary life of our Lord. Its omission from the fabric of the Christian Faith would leave the world "with an example of unparalleled fortitude in the face of terrible trial, with a splendid vindication of the supremacy of truth and righteousness, but with no power, no living Christ, no Intercessor, no atonement for sin, no authority to carry on in His Name, no certitude of commission, no assurance of His presence and no Holy Ghost." With the Resurrection an accomplished fact, with Christ victorious over death and triumphing over the grave, we possess all these, and in their possession we can hold fast to the faith once delivered to the Saints. Easter is for all a season—the season—pregnant with the power of our Lord. All the solemnity of Lent has departed. The darkness hanging over the land from the ninth hour on Good Friday was dispelled by the dawn of Easter, when unseen by the gaze of mankind, Christ, by the Almighty strength with which He was endowed, rose from the dead to die no more. Death's dominion over Him had ended, and He had become "the first fruits of them that slept." With the clouds of doubt dispersed, Christians put off their sadness and on Easter Day greet their risen Lord, and each heart.

"Is now a fane where love can find
Christ everywhere embalmed and shrined."

M. C. L. I.

That the dual standard (different for male and female) of remuneration for service, is unchristian and rests on the justice of man was the resolution submitted for debate at the M. C. L. I. Thursday night. A large number of members was present. The speakers for the evening were. Affirmative Messrs. Fred Gushue, E. Winter and R. Gushue, Negative; Messrs. Clarence Scott, A. Pilley and J. Fowler. The affirmative contended that the right of women to enter every field of endeavor was gaining universal recognition, and that to-day we have female lawyers, doctors, parliamentarians, engineers, and lady principals of great commercial and industrial establishments, and that the female sex were capable of sustained concentrated effort, and that whenever the results of female labor equalled the results of male labor, under similar conditions then it was only fair and just that the female should receive remuneration for her services equal to that of her male counterpart. And the affirmative also contended that to place the female at the disadvantage of doing the same work as men for less wages was unfair, unchristian and a reproach to the sense of justice and fair play. The negative pointed out, that woman's place was primarily and essentially in the home though not necessarily to be a slave to the interest of domestic life—that no one else could do her place in the home, and that about her no homes could be established, and that if women's claim to employment in every avocation, on equal terms with men were conceded the Divine order of the universe would be reversed and thrown out of gear. It was also pointed out that thousands of men who had served the front during the war, were out of work and were unable to obtain employment because of the number of women who are clinging to positions which the stress and strain of war conditions opened to them. The negative also pointed out that the dual standard of remuneration for service was justified because of woman's physical disability to endure the severe strain of long hours and strenuous efforts, that are at times inseparable from every line of endeavor, and that woman works in the main to supply her own needs, while the man in ninety nine cases out of one hundred works for others. It was further shown that an employer was within his rights in paying higher wages to a male than a female performing the same work, because he hopes to make of the former a life long partner in his business but he knows the latter will in the natural order of events retire from his employ to take her inevitable place in the home, for which sacred and noble purpose she was, in the main, created, while upon man—the stronger—devolves the equality sacred duty and privilege of becoming the chief source of maintenance and support of that home.

The debate was most interesting and helpful. When the vote was taken the affirmative argument were sustained by a small majority.

Next Thursday night the annual meeting will be held when the election of officers takes place.

Thursday night's discussion completed the programme of debate for the 1920 session which was from point of interest and attendance one of the most successful of recent years, and the President, Mr. C. C. Pratt, is to be congratulated upon the success of his efforts to make the 1920 session worthy of the best traditions of the Methodist College Literary Institute, which rang down the curtain of its 53rd consecutive session on Thursday night.—W.D.

A SCRAP OF PAPER.
LONDON, April 2.
A despatch to the Daily Mail from Dusseldorf, dated Friday, says, "Government troops, disregarding the Munster arrangement of yesterday, are advancing rapidly. They have beaten back the Red troops from Wesel, southward, and have captured Mambarn. They are expected here to-morrow. Red troops are handing in their arms all over the Ruhr district, according to agreement. Two coal mines are reported to have been already destroyed."

AN UNDRESSED SERMON.
LONDON, April 2.
"In the good old days ladies dressed for dinner, now they undress for it," declared Rev. Bernard Vaughan, the widely known Jesuit Father in a sermon assailing the prevailing fashions in women's gowns. Women, in their mad craze for what are known as "emotional gowns," sin against every Canon of good taste," he said. Such dresses are unhealthy, immodest and as ugly as they are expensive."

IN THEIR OWN TIME.
HONOLULU, April 2.
Premier Hara, of Japan, has officially announced that the Japanese forces in Siberia will not be withdrawn until the situation clears, according to a Tokio cable to-day to a Japanese newspaper here.

FRENCH FOR CANADA.
DUBLIN, April 2.
The Freeman's Journal, in an article to-day, advances the belief that Field Marshal Viscount French is to resign his post as Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and that he will be succeeded by Lord Decies. The newspaper says French will probably go to Canada as Governor-General.

MUST LEAVE BERLIN.
BERLIN, April 2.
Prince Joachim Albrecht, of Prussia, cousin of former Emperor William, who was recently arrested and incarcerated in the Moabit prison, charged with having fomented an attack on members of the French Commission in the dining-room of Hotel Adlon, was released from prison yesterday. The Prince has been forbidden to reside in Berlin.

BOLSHEVIK PROPOSAL REJECTED.
WARSAW, April 2.
The Polish Government has rejected a counter proposal by the Russian Soviet Government for an armistice along the entire battle front, during the proposed peace negotiations between Poland and Soviet Russia. It was in their note, rejecting the Armistice proposal, that the Poles also opposed the holding of the Peace Conference in Estonia, as had been proposed by the Bolsheviks in answer to the acceptance of Peace pourparlers by the Poles, who suggested Borisov as a seat for the negotiations.

POLES DETERMINED.
WASHINGTON, April 2.
Rejection of the Bolshevik proposal for an Armistice is considered by Polish officials here, as an indication that the Polish general staff is confident of its ability to withstand Russian attacks.

CANT STOP 'EM.
WASHINGTON, April 2.
Efforts of the State Department today to have the Washington police authorities break up the picketing of the British embassy, by women favorably to an Irish Republic, failed. The police said that in light of the decision of Federal case of the suffragettes who picketed the White House two years ago, they were powerless to act, unless there was a discovery. Women began picketing this morning, a dozen of them marching up and down the sidewalk in front of Embassy on Connecticut Avenue, displaying banners criticizing the British Government. This fact was brought to the attention of the State Department and officials immediately conferred with the district of Columbia Commissioners and police authorities.

CUNARD CAPTAIN KNIGHTED.
NEW YORK, April 2.
The title of Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire has been conferred upon Capt. Charles, Commanding Officer of the Cunarder Aquitania, during the war, according to cable advices received by the Cunard Line to-day.

QUIET REIGNS.
DUSSELDORF, April 2.
Control by Workmen's Councils ceased theoretically at noon to-day throughout the Ruhr district, upon peace terms ratified last night at Essen. To-day, being Good Friday, religious ceremonies were strictly observed. The turning over of Councils' duties to the police in various cities is expected to be a gradual process. The general strike was called off this morning and resumption of work will take place to-morrow. The street cars, however, were operating in most places to-day.

STRONG BUT PEACEFUL RESISTANCE.
COPENHAGEN, April 2.
Organisers of the strike are preaching a strong policy of resistance. Nevertheless they are emphasising upon their followers the importance of an orderly conduct of the strike. Last night the streets and public places of Copenhagen were filled with crowds, but there were no untoward incidents. In the Town Hall Square at midnight thousands of persons cheered Danish and Swedish speakers, who demanded the establishment of a republic.

Shaw and H. Hayter, was totally destroyed. The loss to the building and contents is estimated to be between seventy-five and one hundred thousand dollars.

OTTAWAS ARE WORLD'S CHAMPIONS.
TORONTO, April 2.
Ottawa defeated Seattle last night by six to one in the Stanley Cup, emblematic of the world's professional hockey championship. For two periods the battle was close, and until Row, star Seattle defence player, was injured the Westerners had an edge on the west coast team, completely to pieces in the last twenty minutes, and Ottawa ran in five straight goals.

WEST CIVILIZATION SCHEME.
CALGARY, Alta., April 3.
A million and a half dollar colonization scheme, which aims to place good settlers on western lands and assist them in getting their property located, was launched under the auspices of the industrial development association at a conference here yesterday of prominent business men of the west. Eastern Canada offices are to be established in Toronto and St. John, and these offices will direct inter-provincial colonization, and supply information regarding western lands opportunities.

THE BOYCOTT SPREADING.
VANCOUVER, B.C., April 3.
Labor here, as represented by the International Trades' Labor Council, on Thursday night, joined hands with the Army and Navy Associations, in boycotting Aerican made goods from the west. There is an accumulation of twenty thousand foreign mail bags to be gone through and assorted. Public order prevails throughout Portugal.

Shannahan and Tucker on Calamity Howlers.

Every man in this world has a grievance, says Tucker, every man must have his growl about one thing or the other, or he wouldn't live. But in this country we all growl about the Municipal Council. About a hundred men have been elected to the Council since the old Water Works Department was wiped out of existence, and not one of them have pleased the crowd. The crowd, the taxpayers or non-taxpayers, whatever you like to call them, are the queerest bunch that it is possible to run up against. For the most part they are a conglomeration of human beings who have not sufficient interest in the cleanliness of the city to pick up a tub and put it away out of sight. If they would start in to learn that every citizen has a duty to perform in helping to keep the city clean, we would not waste as much time in grumbling. On the contrary no one

seems to understand this duty, or, if they do realize that they have a duty to perform, they fail to perform it. If a woman has an old feather bed to get rid of, instead of burning it up in the kitchen stove, she fires it out on the street to await the arrival of the sanitary man. If a woman goes papering, instead of burning up the old paper, she places it out in the drain, and the first gust of wind that rambles along drives it down the street, across the square and into another street, and thus it keeps on going its rounds till a rainstorm comes and melts it away. Every citizen owns a dog. You must have a dog if you are a citizen, that seems to be the rule. But no one has any control over a dog. He can ramble all over the city, knock down ash pails, eat the haunches of horses, and frighten the life out of children, and every one grumbles at the other fellow's dog; but fails to tumble to the fact that while he is grumbling, his dog is in some other part of the city performing similar feats of annoyance. Two-thirds of the dog

owners let their dogs out at large at night. No one owns a dog house, or takes the least trouble to see that his mongrel is barred up at night. Result: Dismal howlings the whole long night, interspersed with several rows in which every dog in the neighborhood takes an active part. This is a great town for iron and wire hoops. Just start in and count the number of hoops you will see on the streets during the next week. How many of them will you pick up and fire over the nearest fence? 'Tis not your business. Well, perhaps not, but don't blame the Council if returning home in the dark you walk on one and are conveyed to the hospital in the ambulance. Tucker says the man who fires iron hoops on the thoroughfare is usually the man that makes the best speech denouncing the Mayor and Councillors. A housekeeper wants to get rid of dirty water; not always, but seven times out of ten, she will stand in her doorway and fire the contents of the pail in the drain, or as near the drain as proficiency in the art of

dumping enables her to do so. Occasionally a man on his way to dinner has a narrow escape from drowning, but remembering that his daughter has time and again been guilty of a similar offence, says nothing and feels thankful that he escaped so well. And so it goes on from day to day. Everyone does as he pleases, and the result is as we see it. Tucker offers no suggestions on improvement. He realizes 'twould be as useless to do so as to try to solve the booze question. No law will make angels out of men if they don't want to be angels, and no Council will make the city clean if the people themselves don't want it to be clean. TIM SHANNAHAN.

WHEREAS we have learned with the deepest regret of the sudden and unexpected death of the Rt. Rev. Michael F. Power, Bishop of St. George's;

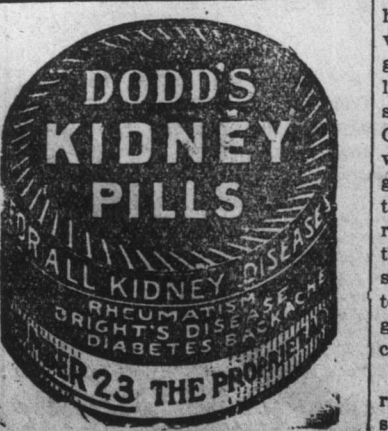

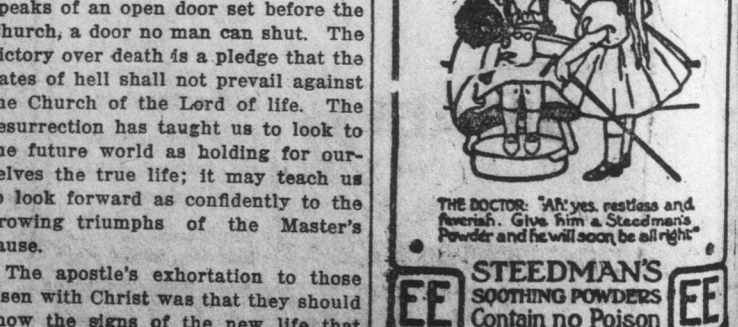
Easter and the World's Conquest.

Easter has a personal message for each one. For Mary and for Peter, for Thomas and for James, the risen Saviour had a special word. It is so still. Insect Items.

Spiders have eight eyes. There are 170 different species of bees in Great Britain. A single pound of the finest spider webs would reach round the world. Bees weighing one pound in weight comprise over five thousand insects. A fly walks—in proportion to its size—thirteen times as fast as a man can run. The speed of the house-fly is usually 25 feet a second. But when pursued it attains a speed of 150 feet a second. Grasshoppers in South America are the largest known. In that country they attain to a length of five inches, and their wings spread out ten inches. Wasps' nests are said to take fire very often because of chemical action of the wax upon the material of the nest itself. This might explain many of the mysterious fires up and down the country. Insects which spend most of their lives in a torpid or semi-torpid condition are seldom injured and never killed by being frozen. There are numerous instances of travellers in mountain regions having found beetles and butterflies above the snow line which were stiff, frozen, and apparently dead. When carried down to the warmer air in the valleys, however, they revived in a very short time.

Gry Goods Store Badly Gutted.

G. T. Hudson's Premises Damaged by Fire—Much Destruction and Little Insurance.

The dry-goods store of Mr. G. T. Hudson, Duckworth St. West, was badly gutted by fire at 2.30 this morning. As a result of this fire—Mr. Hudson's loss will be thousands of dollars, as little insurance was carried.

The regular weekly session of the Municipal Council took place Thursday. The Mayor presided and all the Councillors were present.

The Horwood Lumber Company can erect an elevator for Bishop Sons & Co., provided it is erected of fire-proof materials. Wood sheathed with iron will not be allowed. Subject to removal at any time. Thos. C. Noel can erect a structure in Cornwall Avenue.

A letter was read from W. Noseworthy, in which he notified the Council he wished to install an underground tank, Water and Buchanan Streets, and erect a curb pump to retail gasoline. It was granted, subject to the approval and direction of the City Engineer.

Wilfred Pippy applied for the position of Assistant Engineer. Ordered he be informed the appointment was made before his application came in. Ordered that Mr. Phil Blide be told the Council are not aware of the necessity of an assistant Harness-maker.

The meeting then adjourned.

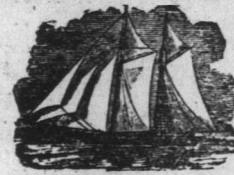

Easter: The Heart's Hope.

THE hope of immortality is the sweetest hope of the human heart. All through the ages, from generation to generation, it has been the inspiration of the noblest deeds, the loftiest sentiments, and the purest lives. It is the most imperishable hope of the human heart. Since the first mother looked upon the face of the first dead, it has lit the eyes of the soul upward and named the heart to the sweetest songs. This hope of eternal life is like and unlike the stars, whose light the sailors sail by and yet never reach. By the light of this hope we make the voyage of life, and somewhere, at some time we shall bathe our souls in its effulgent light.

Love that will not let me go, Rest my weary soul in thee, Give thee back the life I owe, That in thine ocean depths its flow May richer, fuller be.

Light that followed all my way, Yield my flickering torch to thee, Thy heart restores its borrowed ray, That in thy sunshine's blaze its day May brighter, fairer be.

The word "life" was often on the lips of Christ. He is the Lord of life. His mission to earth was to give life, full, rich, abundant. He gave new life to the leper. The dead heard His voice and awoke. Saul became Paul. The "son of thunder" became the apostle of love under His touch and by the inspiration of His love. Jesus did not come as a crown-wearing monarch, a brilliant statesman, a meretricious philosopher, a conquering general, a great inventor. He came to give life here and hereafter. "He that hath the Son hath life." Jesus came to call us from the temporal to the eternal, from the transient to the permanent, from the seen to the unseen, from the perishable to the imperishable. He became human to make us divine. He lay in the grave to take us to glory. He was born in a manger that we might have a manger. The Son of God became the son of man that the sons of men might become the sons of God. Light came forth to take us to heaven. He died on the cross to bring us to the throne.

"I am the life." These are the ringing words of Christ. "Come forth." These are the words He spoke not only to Lazarus and the leper, but to constitutions, to parliaments, to England, to America, to literature, to Christian hymnology--to the mind and heart of man. "In Him is life." Darkness is the absence of light. Cold is the absence of heat. Sickness is the absence of life. Spiritual death is the absence of Christ. "He that hath the Son hath life." The flower plucked up and thrown in the sun and sand--death! The birdling fallen from the nest--death! The fish out of the water--death! The soul taken from the body--death! The soul removed from Christ--death here and hereafter! "Life, eternal life!" cried the pilgrim as he began his Christian journey. How sweet is life here! Walk out some night under the open heavens. Look up and behold the "orbs of light" as they move in the fields of space. The tuned ear catches "the music of the spheres." The "open eye" sees the "glory of God." Walk down a street some May morning when the sun rests like a benediction on the fair fields, when the dew-drops hang like pearls on the sweet-scented flowers, when life is rich and full and friends are dear.

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"O Joy that seekest me through pain, I cannot close my heart to thee; I trace the rainbow through the rain And feel the promise is not vain That morn shall tearless be.

O Cross that liftest up my head, I dare not ask to fly from thee; I lay in dust life's glory dead, And from the ground there blossoms red Life that shall endless be."

Methodist National Campaign.
IN CONNECTION WITH THE INTER-CHURCH FORWARD MOVEMENT.

We submit to-day synopsis of addresses delivered before the Empire Club in the city of Toronto by Mr. T. H. Gundy, a leading Methodist Financier and Canon Cody of the Anglican Church. Both of them occupy a prominent place in the life of the Dominion, and are held in the highest esteem, therefore, carry conviction whenever they address any audience. The Toronto Globe says:
Strong addresses on the Inter-church Forward Movement, dealing with it from the angle of the clergyman and the business men, were made at the regular meeting of the Empire Club. The speakers were Hon. Dr. H. J. Cody and Mr. J. H. Gundy. Both were warmly applauded at many points in their speeches.
"It is always easier to destroy than to build," said Mr. J. H. Gundy, the fire speaker. Although the Prussian machine had been destroyed the world was not safe for democracy, for the spirit of selfishness remained and was a curse wherever it existed. "Only one man has found the recipe for making the world safe for democracy, and He is the Man of Nazareth."
"If the world is to be a safe place it has got to be a Christian place," he continued. "The standards that have made Canada a safe place to do business must be set up throughout the world."
In putting their money into the work which would do this Canadians were making a good investment, he declared. Canadians are piling up wealth, and in doing so were facing the danger faced by any country experiencing a sudden influx of wealth which gave comforts and ease injurious to the boys and girls.
The Best Investment.
"There is only one place to invest this surplus capital—that is in the unselfish establishment of Christianity in Canada and throughout the world," said Mr. Gundy. "The money you give to that will not harm your children, although what you give them may."
So far as the business men were concerned their task in the campaign was two-fold, he concluded, after reference to the financial aims of the movement. Firstly, they were to organize ability at disposal of this campaign. If they did the latter there would be no doubt of the result, he declared.
"We have learned a new scale of giving and a new sense of the stewardship of property," said Dr. Cody, after reference to the lessons learned during the war, which, he said, we would do well to remember. We had learned something of the relative values of things, putting comforts behind us and choosing discomforts to accomplish an aim; we had put the immaterial higher than the material, the spiritual higher than the physical. We had learned that there was no place for the unadulterated idler, and we had learned the lesson of thrift.
"We saved that we might give and make it possible for our country to work through to victory," he declared. In future we could not regard our possessions as held in fee-simple; they bore the hall-mark of the blood of the men who went in jeopardy of their lives. The keynote of life in the war was service.
"What the whole world has learned as a result of the war is simply this: the indispensableness of Christ and Christian principles," said Dr. Cody. "Everything else proved weak. The only thing that did not prove so was Christ and the example of His living and dying."
After-war Fever.
To-day the world was suffering from the fever that followed nervous strain, he continued. There are criticism of everything, turmoil and chaos, as in Russia, imperilling the welfare and safety of the world. Many methods of amelioration were offered, but no ultimate success could be found short of the evangel of Jesus Christ.
"I believe with all my heart that he who can spiritualize democracy can save the world, and no one else," declared the speaker. Many needs existed, and every need spelled an opportunity, he pointed out. Many necessary and beneficial schemes held over during the war were pressing on us now. The world had become a neighborhood, and the moral conditions of other countries affected all, just as a plague of disease. For this there were needed religious leaders, who must be adequately paid, for no one could work under low spirits. The branches of the Church must have adequate equipment if they were to represent worthily the institutions behind them. He recognized no incompatibility between the spiritual and the financial, but regarded the latter as an exercise of the former.
"All those who are wasting what they have made, who are flaunting it in the face of the poor, are the true anarchists," he declared, after describing the Church as the nation's conscience, and asserting that it was making the greatest contribution to human brotherhood and world peace. "It is for us to use our money wisely and unselfishly."
"There are many people who are going to reconstruct everything in this world, except themselves," he concluded. "I want to put in a plea for the reconstruction of individuals on which shall be reared the beautiful fabric of a fairer Canada."
