Herring-There was very little hering fishing in Humber Arm and Middle Arm, but the storm that came on interfered and destroyed a lot of gear. The herring are a good size and are the kind that find a ready market. The schooner "Donald T. Silver" is there taking a salt bulk cargo. There is a good demand for frozen herring, but the weather generally has been too mild to prepare them this way, M. J. F. Murphy, who returned from New York last "Rosalind" advises those who are putting up herring for that market to pack none but large. Prices are down as compared with other years and the demand is poor. Scotch Pack fetch only \$14.00.

Cod Oil-What applies to Codliver Oil is true of Cod Oil, viz:-There is nothing doing. The quantity exported this week to New York, 12.512 gallons: is the result of contracts secured early in the fall. There is no demand, local buyers are taking oil from their dealers only. Until the business situation improves both in Great Britain and the United States, especially, in regard to labor troubles, there is small hope of improved prices.

Codliver Oil-The market both here and abroad is in a condition of extreme dullness, unequalled since 1914. It is difficult to quote prices as there are no transactions, except in the cases where suppliers are taking in oil from their dealers. It is believed that conditions will improve in the New Year, especially in the United States. At the present time there is no demand worth while. The export this week-all to New York was 4,650 gallons to fill orders made early in the

Pork-The Pork market is quiet but firm. Local trade has been inactive this week, as the outport demand has been already supplied. The city trade is confined to Spare Ribs, of the various cuts, as Jowls, Family Mess and other popular pork products are not obtainable in sufficient volume at present. The outstanding feature of the Pork trade this fall was the abnormally large outport of Mess Pork, the low prices of which caused it to supplant Fat Back and other grades, which were formerly so much in demand Prices this week are, Original Mess \$38.00; Fat Back, \$45.00; Ham,

Beef-Boneless Beef is now scarce in the local market. Owing to the depression in trade this fall the Beef importers "went slowly," with the result that stocks of all grades were short. The market is strong at the recent advances according to latest reports from the United States. The recent advance of two points on Amerivance of 60 to 80 cents per barrell on Beef and Pork, and future imports will be influenced accordingly. The quotations to-day are, Boneless, \$34; Family, \$36; Special Family, \$39.50



A Famous Scottish Sculptor.

Sir Joseph Noel Paton, the famous scluptor, historical artist, archaeologist, and poet, was born at Dunferm line, Scotland, on December 13, 1821, and although his art education was of the most desultory kind, the circumstances of his childhood and early youth tended in no ordinary way to the development of his artistic perceptions. His father, a Fellow of the Scottish Society of Antiquaries, and well known in connection with the damask manufactures of Dunferm line, and as a collector of Scottish antiquities-surrounded his children from their earliest years, with old books, old prints, old pictures, casts from the antique, and whatever objects could stimulate the imagination and expand the mind. The locality in which the family resided, "Wooers Abbey." a small but secluded, and singularly picturesque spot, one of the bends of the glen wherein stand the venerable ruins of the Abbey and Royal Palace of Dunfermline, with its burn, rocks, and thickets-was-cal culated to encourage romantic habits of thought, and to foster a passion for the minuter beauties of inanimate nature, which it is evident, to a considerable extent tinged all his productions. Through his mother, also a lady of great nobility and unselfishness of character, Sir Noel could claim close kinship with the chiefs of one of the most ancient and chivalrous clans of the North, whose deeds of daring in the Jacobite ranks supplied the earliest subjects for his childish pencil. In 1845 he gained the premium in the Westminister Hall competition for his fresco, "The Spirit of Religion," and later became Limner for Scotland to Queen Vic toria, who, in the following year conferred on him a knighthood. He won great success by his well-known pictures, "The Pursuit of Pleasure" and "Mors Janua Vitae"; but it was not only as an artist that he won his reputation, for his two published books, "Poems by a Painter" 'and "Spindrift," were both most favourably noticed by the press in England and Scotland. He died in 1901.

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
