The shore fishery is, up to date very poor, and the trapping season is rapidly drawing to a close on many sections of the coast. In case of its failure, what is to be done by our people? The Humber and other plants cannot supply the necessary labour. Must we again have recourse to pit-props?

Surely the last two years have shown us the folly of destroying our woods and getting practically no returns. Numbers of cords have been taken by the fishermen and burnt. and while we do not wish to appear as upholding the breaking of the eight commandment, yet it seems as if the breaking in this case was a good instead of an evil, for it preserved other wood from destruction and often saved wood that would otherwise have rotted on the bank. (The time elapsing between cuts and delivery making it unfit for purposes intended.)

Judging dispassionately by results we are confident that we would be better off had the pit-prop account been expended in some more immediately useful, and less ultimately destructive manner. Fortunately, the season is, as yet young. and we can look forward with hope, trusting that the turning point is at hand, and that the day of better times for Newfoundland is near.



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
