

Home Suggestions

PARE CARE OF YOUR SHOES.

Nothing adds more to the general pearance than a nicely kept pair of shoes. But footwear of any kind speedily loses its pleasing effect un-

Most of you know, of course, that when not in use, shoes should always be kept on trees, and that the trees must be of the correct size and shape for the shoes.

But do you know also that shoes which are standing by must be polished from time to time? This is very necessary, as dust is destructive to shoes, while the boot-polish nourishes the leather and prevents it from

After you have been out in the rain. take off your shoes directly you get n, remove the mud with a damp cloth -this helps to prevent "weather stains"-and then place the shoes on the trees to dry. Leather or suede shoes should never be placed near the fire to dry when they have become

Patent-leather shoes should always be kept in a warm place, and they should also be warmed slightly before being put on. A good way to warm one's shoes is to rub the hand over hem a few times just before slipping

Warming the shoes prevents them from cracking quickly. It is advisable also, with the same object, to rub into hem, from time to time, a small amount of vaseline.

For cleaning suede shoes, and shoes which have cloth uppers, a little petrol is very useful, while evening shoes of satin and the like, can also be cleansed with the same agent. Some Useful Hints.

When an umbrella is wet, it should not be left standing upright, in the usual position. If left thus, there is the risk that any water on the handle may trickle down inside, and rust the wires and joints and rot the silk. Nor should it be opened and left in that position to dry, as this state causes the silk to stretch, and then the umbrella will not fold neatly. The best way is to stand the umbrella upside down, and so leave it to drain.

Wear Gloves When Working, If you do housework you will know low difficult it is to keep the hands mooth and attractive-looking. But it is not really so difficult keep the hands nice if you make a

point of wearing gloves whenever

possible while doing your work. When sweeping or dusting, for in stance, it is almost impossible to avoid getting some of the dust ingrained into the hands unless they are protected. And the same remark applies therefore it is a good idea to keep out when the cleaning of grates, cutlery the dust and make washing unnecesor other cleaning work is in progress sary. grip on the article to be washed. You needn't buy special gloves for any other of your jobs, of course. Any old kid, suede or chamois gloves will do admirably. You will find that you can wear gloves while doing almost every kind of domestic work-then you will find how easy it is to keep our hands nice.

Washing Delicate Ornaments.

Most of us have a few delicate china or, glass ornaments which we value very much. As considerable care is necessary in handling such ornaments to prevent the danger of breaking or chipping, here are one or two hints worth bearing in mind.

When washing the ornaments always place a folded teacloth in the bottom of the bowl, and another cloth on the draining board. These cloths profect the articles from danger of being chipped.

Ornaments that have raised patterns upon them are cleaned more thoroughly with an old toothbrush not, of course, rub too vigorously.





ELECTION CAMPAIGN BY RADIO.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3. A far flung network of radio stations took command of the air to carry to the country the final pre-election admonitions of President Coolidge delivered from his study in the White House, and of John W. Davis speaking from a radio studio in New York City. Momentarily the radio affair jostled out of the public mind the loud and persistent claims of headquarters of all parties. t overshadowed for to-night even -morriw's election itself, at which he nation will choose between Coolidge. Davis and LaFollette, will elect a new Congress, and will fill a Governor's seat in each of the thirty-four States. Both the President and his Democratic opponent chose the occasion to say a word for a full poll of voting strength, an objective which kept the party managers great and small busy throughout the day and far into the night. A forecast of fair weather for virtually the entire country with dry roads in the agricultural section of the Middle West led to predictions that to-morrow's vote would be by far the largest ever recorded in a Presidential election. On election day President Coolidge will remain at work in the White House. having sent his ballot by mail to his home voting district in Northampton, Mass. Mr. Davis will be at his home on Long Island, and Senator LaFollette, the third entry in the three cornered poll contest, will cast his vote in Madison.

Difficult Work. In the first month of the present season a number of them obtained by digging out and sifting the boulders and stiff clay where they were exposed at the holes, and as the excavations were deepened and extended so that divers could squeeze themselves right underneath the wreck more gold was discovered several feet from the tiers and beneath continuous plating. The explanation of this anomaly is that what we have called the carpet of plating had been settling and creepwere passed through the rents, and had come to cover up many of them. Work in the dark beneath the wreck was difficult and not too safe, so the was decided to cut all this last layer of that part of the wreck into sections and raise it to the surface piecemeal. A very fine spring and early summer favoured the undertaking, and eventually about 2.000 square feet of the sea bed was uncovered and thoroughly searched with most satisfactory re-

With the late summer bad weather set in, and soon the disturbance of the surrounding wreckage, due to the heavy seas running on the surface, caused stones and shingle to sween into and over the working place faster than it could be cleaned out, and now any gold that is left there is buried several feet deep. The result of the struggle has been the recovery of 129 of the 154 bars, a value of about £200,000. When the news reached London of the loss of that great consignment of treasure in 20 fathoms of water, off an exposed and stormy coast, few can have expected that anything approaching 99 per cent. of it would ever be salved.





Running Twenty Miles a Minute!

Years ago a well known naturalist ecorded that these moths congregated in myriads in the isolated granite rocks in a particular district which he visited during November, Decemper and January.

What was the object of these asemblages it would be difficult to say. The natives, however, turned the oc-cas on to their own advantage, and came from far and near to collect the moths. After removing the wings they ate the bodies, or powdered and smoked them to preserve them for

The bodies of the Bugong moths bound in an oil, and have a nut-like flavor. When first eaten they cause iolent sickness. After a few days, owever, this wears off, and the nave who chooses this peculiar diet egins to get fat.

I propose to consider these objections separately, but where it seems alleged Grand Jurors drawn in the to me that any two or more of them are related or inter dependent I shall consider them together.

First, as to the first, second, eighth ons whose names were first drawn and ninth objections, these objections Grand Jurors with the revised list, and as to drawing the second objections were not observed, had been strictly followed in every detail, the fact that certain cards bearing the names of some of the persons, were not in the box from which the names of the grand jurors were drawn, as alleged in the eighth and ninth objections, would have been discovered and the omission remedied. I shall therefore consider these four objections together. Evidence has been produced before us in regard to the allegations of fact made by the accused in these objections. I think the evidence establishes the following facts and circumstances. The annual revised list of Grand Jurors for the month of December 1923, previous to the opening of the winter session of this Court, that revised list contained the names of all persons qualified to serve as Grand Jurors for the year 1924. Sometime between the time the list was received by the Sheriff and the commencement of the Winter Session of the Court, the names of all persons on the revised list with their respective occupations and addresses were written on separate cards, and before the opening of the Session on the 5th of January the Sheriff attended with these cards before the Deputy Registrar of the Court, who compared them with the revised list of Grand Jurors and the cards were put into the jury box in the presence of the said Deputy. 


