HURRAH FOR STIRTON & GOW!

At the close of the Polls last night, the candid majorities of 290 for Stirton, 271 for Gow were announced amid mutual congratulations and cheers of the Reformers. They had done a no-day's work. They had completely and scarcely been seen—only one or two left wandering about the streets in most disconsolate manner.

The Reform Committees, along with a large number of Messrs. Stirton and his supporters met at Casey's Hotel this evening. Mr. Stirton arrived at 8 o'clock, and was borne into the hall in triumph, where he and Mr. Gow were greeted with the most enthusiastic cheers. Both gentlemen made short speeches, in which they tendered their most thanks to their friends, and gratulated them on the noble victory which had secured to the Reform cause.

Mr. McGee has been defeated in the County of Kent by Mr. Stephenson, by a majority of 77. Smith for the Local had a majority of 65 over McMichael.

In East Elgin, Dobbie's majority over Mr. Burwell was 105; Mr. Luton over Mr. Nairn, 30.

Mr. Craig, Glengarry, has been elected by a majority of 281.

North Perth has elected Mr. T. M. Daly to stay at home, by a majority of 215 for Mr. Bedford. Mr. Monteth's majority over Mr. Hay was 413.

For the County of Russell, Mr. Grant has been elected for the Commons, and Mr. Craig for the Local.

Mr. McGee and Mr. Cartier have been elected for Montreal for the Commons. Mr. McGee's majority at the close of the first day's polling was 501, but on the second day it was reduced to 262.

Mr. Abbott, for Argenteuil has been elected by a majority of 99 over Hutchins.

North Renfrew elects Mr. Rankin by a majority of 108 over Mr. Murray; and Mr. Lupp by a majority of 471 over Mr. McAdam.

In South Huron, first day's polling, Mr. Cameron was 184 ahead of Ritchie and Mr. Carling 21 ahead of Gibbons.

Mr. Little, for South Simcoe, had a majority of 184 at the close of the first day's poll.

North Bruce gave a majority of 19 for Dr. Douglas at the close of the first day's polling.

Couldn't See Them.

The lecturers were anxiously looking yesterday for the "extras" which the *Advertiser* promised would be issued from that office every hour, but they couldn't see them. Many enquiries were made in town about the fate of his "union" candidates, but no response could be got from their disconsolate friend and supporter, who during the afternoon forsook the public thoroughfares, and took to back streets and out of the way places, and shunned the presence of the public. Indeed so badly did he take the defeat of his Tory candidates to heart that the publication of the "Evening" was suspended, the office shut up, and the insignia of mourning distributed to the members of the establishment. When last heard from the "ostensible" was tearfully inditing a lament over the defeat of his Tory candidates, which will be sung to-night by all the wire pullers, to the doleful strains of "Villikins and his Dinah," the ostensible leading off, and all the rest joining in the mournful chorus.

Disturbance in Montreal.

At the close of the poll yesterday in Montreal a disturbance took place at the Mechanics' Hall. A riot then commenced, a shower of stones being directed at the hall. Every pane of glass in the front windows was broken. A free fight in the street followed, but the mob was kept out of the hall where Mr. McGee was, by revolver shots. The riot lasted twenty minutes, when the police and cavalry arrived. One man was seriously wounded. A later despatch says several parties were very badly beaten with clubs—Seven or eight shots were fired. One man named P. Deneaud, was shot in the arm, not very seriously, and another in the heel. Five or six parties have been arrested for disturbing the peace, and will be arraigned to-morrow. The riot was quelled the same night.

The Elections Yesterday.

In East Hastings, Mr. Read's majority was 639. Mr. Corby's majority 241.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

Special Despatches to the Evening Mercury.

From San Francisco.
San Francisco, Sept. 6.—The democrats have carried the State Legislature and the Municipal tickets in San Francisco by overwhelming majorities. The entire Union State ticket defeated, and it is very doubtful if one Union member of Congress is elected.

From New York.
New York, Sept. 7th.—The Herald's Cleveland special says the Fenian Congress was called to order this morning. A committee was appointed to draft appropriate resolutions on the death of Mr. Thomas Francis Meagher. Various resolutions affecting the welfare of the Fenian brotherhood were received and referred to a committee, and among them was one expressing the feelings of the Congress in regard to the incarceration of American citizens in English dungeons. A letter was read from the acting Attorney General of the United States, to the effect that the Fenian arms in the hands of the Government had been ordered to be restored to the organization.

The Herald's City of Mexico letter, dated July 29th, says Juarez has completed the formation of his new Cabinet. The whole country has been laid off into military districts, to which Regulo Diaz Escobedo, Corona and Alvarez have been assigned to command. On the 15th July the President was accorded an informal reception, which was rather an indifferent affair. The people were conspicuously wanting in the usual Mexican enthusiasm. Diaz had almost a rupture with Juarez on the subject of the expected execution of 14 more prisoners of war, and it was through his efforts that they were released.

The Times' special says the result of the California election has produced much good feeling with the President and his immediate friends. Mr. Johnson looks upon it purely as an endorsement of his position and as marking the ebb-tide of the radical flood. Its effect will be to cause him to persist in his present course. The Tribune's special says the report of Secretary McCulloch will show that over one hundred and twenty millions of our public debt was paid off last year. At this rate it would all be paid off by July, 1887.

From Baltimore.
Baltimore, Sept. 7th.—A fire last night broke out in Jackson & Wilson's coal oil refinery, and extended to the American Company's refinery. Loss \$20,000.

From London.
London, Sept. 6.—Recent despatches received from Alexandria seem to discredit the reports of the release of the English captives in Abyssinia. In the meantime preparations for an expedition to Abyssinia are progressing.
