The stock of the Western Assurance company sold in considerable quantities yesterday as low as 149½. It was 155 the day before, and on December 20th last it was 160. In 1881 it was away up above 200. The cause of the drop is that the annual report, dated Tuesday, shows that the company had lost money in its United States business, as much as \$75,000, in the year, and on its whole business about \$43,-

Iolanthe has indeed some finely sarcastical and telling points which, unlike Pinafore, is conveyed in the wording of the opera only, not in the musical combinations, as in their first production. Evidently the composer has let his own music run riot in this production, for no less than twelve airs are thrust into the score in extracts from all their operas, as also a selection from Mozart's "Twelfth Mass." "When I went to the Bar" is so essentially "Pinafore" that its prominence is most marked in music and wording, and seems to hit very closely the legsl profession, as in the following:—

Cider. Beef-tea and Oysters. Until recently a person could get a glass of sweet cider in the saloons for five cents. Cider, properly cured, is about the only "aoft stuff" that is fit to drink with safety. Beef tea was also lately added to the tem erance list. But that is being dropped

now. The saloon-keepers say that they cannot make a cent on it at five cents per glass, and people won't pay ten for it. It costs them 75 cents per two-ounce pot wholesale. Cider was not much called for after the introduction of beef tes, and many of them have quit selling it. There is no ioss, however, on unsold cider. 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
