



The cavalry are reckoned at 12,000, the engineers at 6700, the foot guards and infantry of the line at 189,000, the Army Service Corps at 3500, the Medical Staff Corps at 2400 and the Ordanace Store, Armourers and Ordanace Artificers Corps at 1200; the remainder of the enrolled regular troops being made up of the West India, Maltese and other special corps raised locally for service in the crown colonies.
