These came a land playing the dead march, a firing squad of 10 members of the 22nd regiment in uniform, and a long line of carriers. The service was held at St. Francis Xavier's Church, where Father Devine celebrated solemn requiem mass. Father Devine presided at the church and the streets in the vicinity. Only the close friends and the military guard went on to the cemetery.
