THREW A BOMB IN A CAFE.

Twenty Persons Wounded in Paris By an Anarchist.

SHOT AN OFFICER WHO CHASED HIM

"The More I Killed the Better I Would Be Pleased."

The bomb a sardine box filled with chloroform powder and scrap iron. The ceiling and floor were riddled with holes. One of the four people in the cafe was injured. The bomb was thrown from the cafe.

PARIS, Feb. 12.—Eden Breton, 24 years old, threw a bomb in the cafe of the Hotel Terminus at the St. Lazare railway station this evening. The bomb exploded in the middle of the room and wounded 20 persons. An instrumental concert began in the cafe, which is on the ground floor of the hotel, at 8 o'clock.

Shortly before 8 o'clock a pale, thin young man with a light pointed beard passed a drink which he had taken at a table in the middle of the room and started to leave. When near the door he turned suddenly, drew a bomb from his coat and threw it toward a group of persons who had gathered to him. The bomb struck an electric light fixture, then fell on a marble table and exploded.

The great hall and station were rocked by the shock. The mirrors, windows and doors were blown to atoms. The ceiling and floor were riddled with holes. A dense offensive smoke filled the cafe for four minutes and the obscurity the bomb-thrower escaped.

When the smoke cleared away five persons were found severely wounded. The dead aught injuries. The bomb had been filled with bullets and rough bits of iron which had riddled the furniture and walls and inflicted most of the wounds.

Shot a Policeman Who Chased Him. After leaving the cafe the bomb-thrower started down the street on a run. Three policemen had just passed in an omnibus when the explosion occurred. They were going on duty, and jumped to treat the men who they saw the fugitive. The young man turned on them as they called to him to stop and fired five shots.

Policemen Poleson and Leclerc, who were pursuing him, were hit in the chest and arm. The other three policemen were not hurt. The young man fled in the direction of the Rue de Valenciennes.

His Prisoner Died. The young man, who was named Breton, was taken to the Hotel Terminus, where he was attended by a doctor. He died at 11 o'clock.
