In commenting upon the proposed Insolvency Act The Shareholder says: Objection has been made in some quarters to the limitation of the application of the act to traders, and it is contended that it should not be so limited, but should apply to farmers and professional men—in fact, to everyone who is unable to pay his debts and is entitled to compromise with his creditors. The objection is not a new one, but, on the contrary, one that has been worn threadbare on every occasion that an insolvency act has been under discussion. Farmers are not likely to lose anything from bad act has been under discussion. Farmers are not likely to lose anything from bad debts. As a general rule they sell for cash, although they may buy on credit. The object of an insolvency act is to discourage extravagance or the conduct of trade in an unbusiness-like manner. Farmers are not subjected to loss from the causes which affect men in business, and to extend the operations of the act to this class which, as a general rule, keep no books, would only serve to encourage extravagance or recklessness, the detection of which would be impossible in the absence of that system of bookkeeping which is the tell-tale of the business man's weak points. Traders whose books are not properly kept run a risk under an inproperly kept run a risk under an in-solvency law which could not be incurred by those who do not and could not be exby those who do not and could not be expected to indulge in the luxury of keeping books. The draft bill, as a whole, is an improvement on the act of 1875, and one which, if adopted, will go a long way to meet the requirements of the mercantile community, and will at the same time do away with the diversified, conflicting and unfair provincial enactments which now


