


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
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

LIGHT HOUSES.

Board of Commissioners for the several Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.—Hon. Abner R. McClelan, Hon. Samuel L. Tilley, Hon. Charles Fisher, and Hon. Charles Connell, R. W. Crookshen, Esq., Secretary. George W. Smith, Accountant.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen on approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—a plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—a white light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a flash light—white—twenty seconds dark, and forty light, in each minute. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical, black and white.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.—This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W., 22 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. $\frac{1}{4}$ S., distance 7 miles. From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Note.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light, lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W., $\frac{1}{2}$ W., $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W., $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, via:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly.

" " Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., 12 miles.

" " Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. $\frac{1}{2}$ N.

" " Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

" " N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.

" " Little River Head, N. by W.

" " Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the ships' compasses should be well compared, and adjusted particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, (or $1\frac{1}{2}$ points,) it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. Ledge, is S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S.; but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North-East extremity of Campbell Island, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preaux Lights.—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they

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the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white, may be useful — both are fixed, and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full and twice dark in a minute. This light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. S. A plain white light. The house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide marks.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia), in lat. $43^{\circ} 39'$ N. long. $66^{\circ} 8'$ W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light—visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. $45^{\circ} 43' 14''$ N. Long. $64^{\circ} 37' 25''$ W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 60 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House are as follows:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. $61\frac{1}{2}$ W., 10 1-7 miles.

Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. 40 W., 6-10 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. 78 W., 2-10 mile.

Jones' Ledge, N. 10 W., 3-10 mile—it dries at low springs, and has about 21 fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. 15 W., 6-10 mile—it has 14 fathoms on its shoalest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow-Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from Base to Deck.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth orden. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 40''$ N., long. $64^{\circ} 48' 30''$ W. of Greenwich.

A White and Blue Pendant, for a Foreign Vessel.

A White Pendant [without a Ball], for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A Blue Flag, pierced white, for a Steamboat from St. Andrews or Eastport.

A Red Flag, pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby.

A Red Flag, with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston.

A Ball at the mast head—vessel is on shore, or in distress.

Established

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RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John—passed 3d August, 1848.

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship, or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steamboats or British Vessels, drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars; and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty five cents per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Le Preaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, One dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South South East, One dollar and Seventy five cents per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Two dollars per foot.

HARBOUR MASTER'S FEES.

On vessels of 30 and under 50 tons, 2s. 6d.; vessels of 50 and under 75 tons, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150, and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200, and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300, and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; decked vessels under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British vessels under that tonnage, trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from ports to the Northward of Cape Cod, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any port in Nova Scotia to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30, and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50, and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75, and under 80 tons, 10s.

Rates of Slippage at the Corporation Slips.

All decked vessels, same rates as for wharfage ; woodboats, or other boats, or undecked vessels, having standing masts, and all scows, and not lying at the wharves on either side of the Slips, to pay the following rates :

Every Woodboat of sufficient burthen to carry 10 cords of wood, or under,	60c.
Ditto ditto upwards of 10 cords, and not more than 15,	\$1.
Ditto ditto upwards of 15 cords, and not more than 20,	\$1.50
Ditto ditto upwards of 20 cords,	\$2.

The above to be paid each trip; and if any such vessel remains over six days, an additional duty to be paid of from 50c. to \$1 daily, according to the burthen. Other boats and vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all scows to pay 30c. each trip, and 30c. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

Rates of Ferriage Across the Harbour of St. John.

For every foot passenger, 4c; child under 12 years, 2c; horse, 5c; ox, or other large animal, 5c; elephant or camel, 25c; single waggon, not loaded, 4c; single waggon, with horse and one man, 10c; single waggon, with horse, load, and man, 12c; double waggon, not loaded, 12c; double waggon, with horses and man, 15c; double waggon, with horses, load, and man, 25c; barrel 2c; bag, containing two bushels, 2c; firkin, keg, or box, of the same size, 2c; cask of lime, 4c; pipe, hogshead, or puncheon, whether in wagon, cart, or sled, or other vehicle or not, except containing molasses, vinegar, rice, or sugar, 15c; every cwt. of iron, steel, or copper, whether in waggon, cart, or other vehicle or not, 2c. Carts, sleds, drays, and carriages, same as waggons.

The Ferry is leased from the Corporation for the space of ten years from July 10th, 1860, by Mr. John McSweeny. One boat runs at a time, and returns at night to the Eastern side. The boat runs from Ferry Landing, foot of Princess Street, on the east side, to Rodney Slip, Carlton, except at low water, spring tides, when the passengers are landed at Sand Point.

Rate of Tolls for Crossing the St. John Suspension Bridge

For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age,) 4c; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 7c each; elephant or camels, 50c; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled, or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught, with one person, with or without a load, 18c; horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 7c each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1c.

Time for going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is 5 cents; to England, 12½ cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Province, at a rate of 25 cents per lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 3 feet in length or breadth, and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Registration fee 5 cents. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamp. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

POSTAGE STAMPS.—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of 1 cent for Circulars; 2 cents for Drop Letters; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents per Cunard steamer, via Halifax; 17 cents via United States for England.

INTERESTING EXPLORATIONS.—Two French gentlemen have recently examined the Island of Spitzbergen in a very complete manner. They have measured the mountains, mapped the coast, examined the geological formation of the island, its vegetable products, and its meteorological phenomena. They found that the long day in summer, extending over several months, became intensely hot, on account of the unceasing heat of the sun, and that during this period vegetation sprung up with great luxuriance. The North Pole is but six hundred miles from Spitzbergen, and these explorers, with many other scientific men, think that the pole itself, and the sea supposed to surround it, can be reached without much difficulty from Spitzbergen. Large quantities of floating timber cover the waters of the bays and creeks of the island. With regard to the great heat of the sun at Spitzbergen during the summer, it may be remarked that when the French scientific expeditions were sent out to find the length of a quadrant of the meridian, upon which the French system of measurement is based, the party that went to the Arctic Circle complained of extreme heat, whilst the party that visited Quito, under the Equator, complained of extreme cold.

Cows who go to pasture early in the spring will make yellow butter, and so they will in winter if fed on early cut hay, if well cured. Land lying long in grass needs repeated dressings of manure.

AVERAGE YIELD OF LEADING CROPS IN THE UNITED STATES.—Corn.—The average yield of corn per acre, in 22 States of the Union, in 1864, was only $29\frac{1}{4}$ bus. The highest average was that of the State of Iowa, which was 36 bus. per acre; and the lowest, that of the State of Delaware, was $20\frac{1}{2}$ bushels per acre.

Wheat.—Of wheat, the average yield per acre, in 22 States of the Union, was 18 bushels. The highest average is that of Connecticut, which is given at $16\frac{1}{2}$ bushels; the lowest, Wisconsin, at $9\frac{1}{4}$ bushels.

Rye.—Of Rye, the average yield was $14\frac{1}{2}$ bus. The highest averages are those of Kansas and Rhode Island, which are given at 17 bus., and the lowest, that of Maine, at 12 bushels.

Potatoes.—Of Potatoes, the average yield is 105 bus. per acre. The highest was New Hampshire, 164 bus., and the lowest that of Missouri, 39 bus. per acre.

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THE MERCHANT MARINE OF BRITISH AMERICA.—No branch of industry has grown up in the Provinces to greater dimensions in the course of a comparatively short period of time, than the maritime interest. In 1863, no less than 628 vessels were built in British America; of which the aggregate tonnage was 330,312. The industry represented by these figures, shows an export value of nearly nine million dollars. On the 31st December, 1864, the figures were as follows:

THE DEPTH OF SPACE.—In 1837, Professor Bessel, of Germany, commenced a series of astronomical measures for getting the exact distance to the fixed stars, a thing which had never been done. The instrument which he used, in connection with a powerful telescope, in his experiments, was called a Helrometer (sun measure.) After three years hard labor, he was so fortunate as to obtain a parallax, but so minute that he could hardly trust his reputation upon it. But after repeated trials, and working out of results, he was fully satisfied that he could give the true distance to 61 Cygni. But who can comprehend this immense distance? We can only convey an idea to the mind of this distance by the fact that light, which travels 12,000,000 of miles in a minute, requires not less than ten years to reach us. Just let any one try to take in the idea. One hour would give 720,000,000 of miles; in one year, then—8,760 hours—this gives 6,307,200,000,000, and this multiplied by ten gives 63,072,000,000,000. This, according to Prof. Bessel, is the distance of the nearest fixed star to the sun. And all the astronomers confirm the correctness of Prof. Bessel's calculations. But this distance, great as it is, is nothing to be compared to the Milky Way. Sir William Herschel says that the stars or suns that compose the Milky Way are so remote that it requires light, going at the rate of 12,000,000 of miles in a minute, 120,000 years to reach the earth. And he says there are stars, or rather nebulæ, five hundred times more remote. Now make your calculations; 120,000 years reduced to minutes, and then multiply that sum by 120,000,000, and the product by 500. What an overwhelming idea! The mind sinks under such a thought; we can't realize it; it is too vast even for human comprehension. David says, Psalm ciii. 19: "The Lord hath prepared his throne in the heavens, and his kingdom [or government] ruleth over all."

ANOTHER TRIUMPH OF SCIENCE.—Recent experiments in England have given to the world another triumph of science, in the control and management of the dangerous explosive, gunpowder, more wonderful in its results than the use and domestication, as it were, of lightning, as applied to the magnetic telegraph. The announcement that gunpowder has been so put in control that in one minute a barrel thrown on burning materials will smother the fire, and in the next instant it can be so re-arranged that it will propel a cannon ball with undiminished force, will possibly draw largely upon the credulity of our readers, but it is stated to be a fact. The gunpowder is rendered innocuous, it is claimed, by admixture with glass crushed to an impalpable powder, which can again be separated from the gunpowder by sifting. Several experiments had been tried with it, such as inserting red-hot irons into the prepared powder, and throwing it in shovelfuls on a fire, but the London *Times* of June 23d gives an account of an experiment on a grand scale, which seems to be conclusive as to the value of the invention. The Government commission had three hundred and twenty-eight barrels filled with five tons of gunpowder, mixed with twenty-five tons of powdered glass, and placed in a condemned martello tower between Hastings and Rye. A charge of pure gunpowder was put into the barrels, and an attempt made to explode them by electricity. The charge of pure gunpowder exploded, blowing out the ends of the barrels, and scattering some of the contents; but on entering the tower no further damage was found, and the gunpowder treated with glass was cooling down. A pile of firewood was then laid on the loose modern floor, near the gunpowder, and as the barrels containing the powder burned, the contents falling on the fire, smothered it, burning towards the edges, however, like a bad port-fire. Two barrels of the mixture were then placed on a pile of blazing fagots, and as they burned and burst, the gunpowder falling on the fire rather deadened the flames, while in the tower the fire had by this time gradually died out, leaving a great part of the powder unconsumed. The advantages of this process are manifest.

HEALTHFULNESS OF APPLES.—There is scarcely an article of vegetable food more widely useful and more universally liked than the apple. Why every farmer in the land has not an apple orchard, where the trees will grow at all, is one of the mysteries. Let every housekeeper lay in a good supply of apples, and it will be the most economical investment in the whole range of culinaries. A raw mellow apple is digested in an hour and a half, while boiled cabbages require five hours. The most healthy dessert that can be placed on the table is a baked apple. If eaten frequently at breakfast, with coarse bread and butter, without meat or flesh of any kind, it has an admirable effect on the general system, often removing constipation, correcting acidities, and cooling off febrile conditions more effectually than the most approved medicines. If families could be induced to substitute apples—sound and ripe—for pies, cakes, and sweetmeats, with which their children are too frequently stuffed, there would be a diminution in the sum total of doctors' bills, in a single year, sufficient to lay in a stock of this delicious fruit for the whole season's use.

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THE ART OF DINING.—The mind has its diseases as well as the body, and I think vegetarianism is one of them. It is by practical experience that we learn what food is proper for us, and not by chemical analysis. Everything we eat, with the exception of salt, can be turned into charcoal; yet who can live on charcoal? An experiment has been made by the great chemist, Magendie. He fed geese with gum only, and they died on the 18th day; he fed some upon starch only, and they died the 24th day; he fed others on boiled white of eggs, and they died on the 46th day; he fed others on the three kinds mixed together, and they fattened instead of dying. So we must vary our food as much as possible, in order to supply the waste of every part of our system. In cooking vegetables, green vegetables, such as cabbage, spinach, etc., should be put into the water at its first boiling, with salt. Dry vegetables, like beans, peas, etc., should be put over the fire in cold, soft water, after having been soaked in lukewarm water—beans for twenty-four hours. Potatoes should be steamed, but never boiled. Steam with the skin on. Bear in mind that a potatoe must never be peeled; the part immediately under the skin contains the most nutriment. Cut out the germs or eyes, if any; if young and tender, the skin can be taken off with a scrubbing brush; if old, scrape the skin off, and then roast them. In selecting the potatoes, remember the smaller the eye the better the potatoe. By cutting a piece from the thickest end, you can tell whether they are sound. They must be either white or pink, according to the kind. Always select beans without spots. Milk and eggs partake of the nature of the animal as well as vegetable food. Fish is less nutritious than meat, containing only 20 per cent. of nutritious matter, but ought to be partook of at least twice a week. It contains more phosphorus matter than any other food, and is very good to supply the waste of our system, especially of the brain. The brain of an idiot contains about one per cent. of phosphoric matter, while that of persons of sound intellect contains from two to two and one-half per cent. The brain of a maniac contains three and one half per cent. We need have no fear, however, of losing our senses from eating too much fish. It supplies the waste, but does not augment the proportion of the phosphoric matter.

TOBACCO AND HEART DISEASE.—M. Decaisne, in a communication to the Academie des Sciences, exhibits another clause in the heavy bill of indictment against the use of tobacco. He states that in the course of three years, he has met, among eighty-three inveterate smokers, twenty-one instances of intermission of the pulse, occurring in men from 27 to 42 years of age, and not to be explained by organic lesion of the heart. The absence of such lesion or other condition of health capable of inducing intermission of the action of the heart, and the fact that, in nine of these instances in which the use of tobacco was abandoned, the normal action of the organ was restored, M. Decaisne believes will justify him in concluding that, in certain subjects, the abuse of tobacco may give rise to conditions which may be termed "narcotism of the heart," characterized by intermission in the movement of that organ, and the pulsation of the radical artery, and that in some cases a suspension or diminution in the practice of smoking is sufficient to cause the entire disappearance of this irregularity.

HOT WEATHER HINTS, BY PROFESSOR BLOT.—A remark or two on eating and drinking in hot weather will be in season. Green vegetables, properly cooked, are certainly healthful in warm weather; but it is a mistake to think that meat should be excluded from summer diet. The hotter the weather, the more the system wastes, and therefore the more we want supply.

In order to keep the body in a healthful condition, meat ought to be eaten at least once a day in the summer time. It would be well to vary this programme, by taking one meal of fish on every other day. Fat should be disused as much as possible. A very little good butter with your fresh radishes at breakfast, is as much fat as is necessary.

When weary, or cold, or warm, or exhausted, we drink in preference to eating, because we feel the effects instantaneously; while after eating even the most substantial food, we do not feel the effects for some time.

When exhausted, and when immediate relief is necessary, the best drinks are broth, chocolate, milk, or water sweetened with sugar. It is more than a mistake to drink wines or liquors at such a time; it is really committing slow suicide.

When only thirsty, without exhaustion, we ought to drink cold water with a teaspoon. When thirsty and heated, the first thing to do is to dip the hands in cold water; then dip a towel in the water, lay it on the forehead, and then drink cold water with a teaspoon. A few drops of vinegar or lemon juice may be added to the water. If exceedingly hot, keep your hands in cold water and a towel on your forehead for at least one minute before drinking.

BUTTER-MAKING.—Some persons, who know well enough how butter should be made, and possess all the appliances essential to success in the manufacture of it, fail to produce a good article, because of a too great greediness for gain. They seem to reason that a pound of buttermilk, left in the mass, is as good to them as a pound of the pure article; hence the little labor bestowed in working it. They may succeed in disposing of parcels of this character, but in doing so they are seriously impairing their reputation as manufacturers and dealers. Again, some reason that as salt is much less costly than butter, it is a capital good dodge to work in as large an amount of saline matter as possible, leaving it in lumps oftentimes, imparting a bitter taste to the butter, and thereby impairing its reputation with consumers. In the end this will prove, as it should do, to have been a short-sighted operation. The best policy with butter-makers, as with other producers, is honesty. Work your butter as clear of milk as can be conveniently done; salt no more than is necessary for its proper preservation; put it up down nicely, and your name will be ample assurance to those who purchase that they are not being cheated in the purchase they make.

HOW TO CURE A FELON.—As we often see friends suffer with these very troublesome things, we publish the following cure for them, which we have heard highly recommended. As soon as the parts begin to swell, get the tincture of *Is belia*, and wrap the part affected with a cloth saturated thoroughly with the tincture, and the felon is dead. An old physician says he has known it to cure in scores of cases, and it never fails if applied in season.

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COMPOSTING MANURES.—Every successful farmer has seen the good effects of composting manures. Cultivated plants are much like man himself in regard to their food; they like a mixture of different kinds. The bare shovelling over of the manure heaps serves to bring the various elements into better condition as food for plants. There is a mystery about the composting of manures which chemistry, with all its subtle refinements, cannot yet but partially explain. The bare shovelling over of a pile of muck effects changes in it which serve to improve its quality in a marked degree, while by mixing other ingredients with it, it becomes an active and valuable manure. We once took the old lime and refuse materials from an old house and piled them up by the side of the hog pen, and gave the hog a few bushels every day for him to work over, which he did most faithfully. The result was he had manure enough the next year for an acre of corn, by putting a shovelful in the hill. The corn was excellent, and so was the wheat the next year. A compost heap, made up of different materials, and allowed to decompose, will always be in place on any farm. A few loads of muck, with which to mix the droppings of the yard during the summer, is a very efficient method of improving the manure heap. We scarcely meet with a farmer who does not complain of the difficulty he has in making as much manure as he wants; hence the importance of saving it from every source, and rendering it as available as possible for the benefit of his crops. The man who is careless about these things, is sure to be a careless and unsuccessful farmer. Special effort in accumulating manure is almost always a safe investment.

VELOCITY OF MECHANISM.—Fan-blowers are frequently run with a velocity of 3,000 turns a minute, while the usual velocity of cotton spindles is between 6,000 and 7,000 turns per minute. These are the highest rotary velocities with which we are acquainted in ordinary mechanism; but M. Arago, in measuring the difference of light while passing through air and through water, wished to give a revolving mirror a velocity of 8,000 rotations per second. This he was unable to do. With the most delicate and perfect arrangement of cog-wheels, he was able to impart only 1,000 revolutions per second to his mirror. M. Foucault, by substituting for cog-wheels a delicate turbine, acted on by a steam jet, raised the velocity to 1,500 turns per second. M. Arago, by removing the mirror, and turning the spindle alone, achieved a velocity, even by cog-wheels, of 8,000 turns per second, equal to 480,000 turns per minute. That spindle, therefore, turned eighty times while an ordinary cotton-spindle is turned once. This is the highest rotary velocity of which we have any account.

BENEFIT OF BONES.—There is nothing that the farmer wastes that is so valuable as bones. The phosphorus contained in them is of the richest matter for farming purposes. They should never be thrown away. Save them always. Either break them up as fine as you can, and apply to the soil, or burn and pulverize them. Treated in this way, or reduced by acid or alkalies, they are the most direct stimulants the soil can have. They rank among the superphosphates. At least save your bones, and give them to your gardens in some form or other. They will tell in any form.

HOW TO CURE BUCKWHEAT.—No grain is more difficult to harvest without waste than buckwheat. There is no crop that ripens so unevenly—a portion of it being dead ripe—shelling out while the rest is ripening. Hence the difficulty of harvesting at the right time, in order to secure the largest possible amount of seed and in the best condition. The following remarks are to the point:—

Cut your buckwheat when most of the berry can be saved—that is, when the majority of the kernels are ripe, or sufficiently advanced to ripen in the stock when cut.

It will be seen by taking this view that the grain must be cut rather green—earlier than is commonly practiced—and that much milk and many white kernels must be cut down. Your grain will cut all the easier; your straw be the better, and the frost be more aptly robbed of his prize.

Cut early, then, and put up at once, when the grain is moist, either with rain or dew. You may avoid the wet. Put up in good sized stocks. The air will readily circulate through. And thus there will be no shelling: you will save all the grain.

To fully preserve the berry from the rain, we advise hay caps; for the heavy long rains drown the berry, and the flour loses that vivacity and whiteness which are native with the grain, but which are so rarely seen.

It is in this way alone that buckwheat can be properly secured—that the whole can be secured, and in the best condition. In such a case, buckwheat becomes one of our best brands of flour, if properly ground. It should not be dried to a crisp before grinding, as is often done. When well secured, as it should be, it will do to take to the grist mill from the fanning mill. Avoid grinding close, for remember the bran makes up what the flour loses, and makes one of the best feeds.

To REMOVE STUMPS.—A correspondent of the *Rural Register* states that Mr. John Barnes, of Baltimore, removed a troublesome stump from near his house in the following manner: "Last fall, with an inch augur, he bored a hole in the centre of the stump, seven inches deep, and into it put half a pound of oil of vitriol, and corked the hole up tight. This spring the whole stump and roots, extending through all their ramifications, were so rotten that they were easily eradicated." If true, the above would be a cheap method of removing stumps. The sulphuric acid can be bought for about five cents per pound.

THE SUN PHOTOGRAPHED BY A WOMAN.—Miss Beckley, daughter of the mechanical assistant at the Kew Observatory in England, has taken some admirable photographs of the sun. Careful examinations of these photographs have led the astronomers to the following conclusions: 1. When Venus is to the left, there is most atmospheric effect to the right. 2. When she is in conjunction or opposition, there is a tendency to equality. 3. When she is considerably to the right, there is most atmospheric effect to the left.

One drop of strong spirits of hartshorn will in an instant remove the pain caused by the sting of a bee, wasp, or hornet. It should be at hand in every family where there are children. The same article may be used for the removal of grease spots.
