

Shop the meat from a cold chicken, add the cooked brains, chop again until they can be chopped no finer. Season with celery salt, pepper and minced parsley. Mix in one-half cup of softened butter and one cup of rolled, sifted cracker crumbs. If too stiff to shape into cones or cakes add a little thick cream. Now shape and roll in bread crumbs that have been rolled and sifted. Place on ice until the butter in the mixture gets hard and so makes them firm. Din in egg and bread crumb



P. Morgan to run it for the benefit of the financial bandits in control. Thus the revenues of the road would be dissipated in the purchase from Morgan and his associates of undesirable junk in the shape of trolley and steamship lines, whose acquisition would be made the pretext for stupendous stock and bond insues. All over the United States valuable railway properties were looted by methods of high finance. The Wall street men, obtaining control, enriched the selves by segregated assets, illic commissions, stock melone and the like, depreciating the property and adding to its debt, fleecing the public and the stockholders at the same time.

Of course the stockholders were told that their shares were dropping in value and their dividends growing smaller, or disappearing altogether, because of unreasonable governmental regulation. Congress and the legisletures were denounced and public utilities commissions were held up to the execuation of the stockholders. But it was not governmental regula-

SPECIAL REPORT NOW IS ORDERED

McConkey's Case Will Be Secret of Long Life is Found Looked Into by License Inspector.

New Year's Was Voting Day Garlic, Cold Water, Vinegar and Covered by Separate

The fact that E. S. McConkey received the minimum fine of \$40 for allowing the consumption of liquor on his restaurant premises beyond the legitimate hour of sale on New Year's Eve will be made the subject of a special investigation by the provincial license department. A report will be submitted by License Inspector Burroughs.

According to reports, the jollifications on that date extended into the early hours of the following day, and in that event the case would assume some further aspects to be considered. The judgment handed out by Magistrate Denison, according to the license regulations, was based only on the sale after 11 o'clock on the evening in question. The penalty followed a first offence, to which Mr. McConkey pleaded guilty.

Some of the other considerations which might be taken note of, if a blanket charge were disregarded, include the fact that, if liquor were consumed after midnight the enactment regarding disposal or consumption on voting day comes at once into question. The same situation would bring as a consequence a charge that the restricted hours of the second day were violated, as well as those of the first. The hour of midnight would divide the offences.

It is understood that there is some ground for holding that a licensed proprietor who sells on restricted holidays puts himself into the position of one selling without a license, The penalty provided in the act for such a violation is \$500 as a maximum.

If any action develops, it will likely take the usual course, with Crown Attorney Corley taking charge of the prosecution.

"As a matter of fact," he says, "the population of Bulgaria eats or drinks very little 'kiselo milisko,' as sour milk is known there. But they eat great quantities of garlic—three times daily. "Tscheschnakova tschorba,' or garlic soup, is the favorite dish. It is prepared with grated garlic, cold, water, vinegar and paprika, or pepper.

"The Bulgarians are strictly orthodox. They have many and long periods of fasting, during which products of animals may not be eaten. These fasts are rigidly kept, and during that time garlic and garlic soup is their principal dish.

"As a result of my five years' investigation in Bulgaria I have come to the firm conclusion that the remarkable health and long life of the Bulgarians are due to nothing else than to their eating of so much garlic."

The Croatian specialist attributes the beneficial results of garlic to the antiseptic effects upon the intestinal tracts and promotion of digestion.

SYNOPSIS OF DOMINION LAND

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the Dustrict. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Dutles: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead-on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain Districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent, and cultivate fifty acres extra.

WINNIPEG'S WATER **PLAN IS OPPOSED**

Kenora Asserts Drain on Lake of Woods Would Injure Municipal Plant.

WASHINGTON. Jan. 13 .- (Can. Press.)-Arguments were made today before the international joint commission against granting authority to the City of Winnipeg, Canada, to obtain its water supply from the Lake of the Woods, which has a watershed of some 26,000 square miles in the United States and the Dominion. Both the Canadian and United States

Governments have assented to the Winnipeg water project, but under the treaty, the commission has the right to overrule these decisions if it finds the plan detrimental to boundary waters or to the people who live upon

the plan detrimental to boundary waters or to the people who live upon them.

Objection was made to Winnipeg's request today by representatives of the City of Kenora, at the mouth of the Lake of the Woods. They asserted that if Winnipeg was granted permission to tap the Lake of the Woods, their municipal plant would be injured. The Winnipeg plan would take about 100,000,000 gallons a day from the Lake of the Woods, and transport in McMurrich School this evening at 8 o'clock.

CREATING DISCORD

U. S. Delegates Opposed to Proposal That Disputes Be Arbitrated.

LONDON, Jan. 13.—(Can. Press.)-The international conference on Safety of Life at Sea, which has been holding its sessions here since last November is in danger of splitting on the same rock that wrecked the first international commission, called in 1899, to settle the complications arising from the Alaskan boundary.

In the boundary case, the American Canadan and English commissioners found red on the question of arbitration, and the same disturbing element menaces the fate of the present com-

mission.

S. to allow any foreign nation to arbitrate the right of the courts of America to execute the laws of that nations

Lord Mersey, the presiding officer, then proposed that all disputes be sent to the international court of arbitration at The Hague, but this also was opposed by the American accounts.

America Always Wins.

The French and German representatives also opposed this plan on the ground that: "America always wins her contest at that tribunal thru the desire of the other nations to preserve peace and harmony with her."

The French and Belgian committeemen suggest a conciliation board, reserving to America the right to resort to the courts if the results of the board appear to be purposely or violently wrong. This middle ground for a compromise now is under debate, but its progress practically is barred by the American opposition to the arbitration feature, and by the insistence of the United States delegates that any violations of the convention or treaty must be treated by the American law and punished accordingly.




