**PARLIAMENT PROLOGUE.**  
Senate Chamber Yesterday Afternoon Graced by Many Women.

Ottawa, May 15.—Parliament was prorogued this afternoon by the Governor-General. The Senate floor was occupied by handsomely gowned ladies, and the galleries were filled with spectators. His Excellency was escorted to the Senate by the Esquimaux Mounted Guards and received at the House of Commons by a guard of honor from the Foot Guards.

**STRIKE IN SWEDEN.**  
Democratic Party Favors Suffrage Bill and Ties Up Business.

Stockholm, Sweden, May 15.—The general strike decreed by the social democratic party in support of the suffrage bill, the debate on which was carried out as arranged, and the tie-up of business has been practically complete since this morning. Traffic generally is suspended. The street cars, cabs, vans, carts and steamers are not running and no work is going on in any of the factories or shops. The printers also have joined the strike, which will last through the parliament debate.

**OBJECT TO THE CHANGES.**  
Manufacturers Think Shippers Should Be Consulted Before Freight Classifications Are Made.

**WILL BANQUET LORD BRASSEY**  
And Other Delegates From London Chamber of Commerce—Painters for Sir Wilfrid.

Various matters relating to Canada's industries were discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the Executive Council of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday afternoon. President Robert Munro occupied the chair.

In the report of the Commercial Intelligence Committee it was announced that provision had been made for increased facilities in securing financial and trade reports from foreign countries. The meeting endorsed the recommendation of the committee for appointment of representatives in Belgium, South America and the Transvaal. The Exhibition Committee reported that they had taken steps in conjunction with the government to make the exhibits of the Dominion at the St. Louis and Osaka Japan Exhibitions as widely representative as possible.

A complaint was made that changes were being made from time to time by the Joint Freight Classification Committee without first consulting the shippers. The committee on the Railway and Transportation Committee.

Lord Brassey and other members of the London Chamber of Commerce on their visit to Toronto in November. The Board of Trade will be asked to cooperate with the association in making the shipping schedule for the season from the St. John Board of Trade, favoring preferential tariff, and a resolution was passed to take over the asking that mutilated coins be called in, and favoring the subsidizing of the shipping schedule.
