Will Not Reintroduce Irish Council Bill

Landlords Prefer to Sell Their Lands to the Tenants, But Ask High Prices.

LONDON, Feb. 3.—All doubt that the government is planning the introduction of legislation looking to home rule for Ireland in the present session of parliament was set at rest today when Herbert T. Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer, declared on behalf of the premier that the government had no intention of re-introducing the Irish council bill.

The Earl of Dudley, Conservative, who was lord lieutenant of Ireland in 1905, created somewhat of a sensation among the Unionist benches of the house of lords this evening by dissociating himself entirely with the policy of coercion in Ireland.

Formerly there was a duty of 25 per cent, and the few Canadian-built vessels are largely the result of that protection. Then a fleet of British ships came in and the duty was removed. Consistency with the policy of building up Canada requires, it is clear, that either the duty should be restored, or a bounty granted to the home ship-builders.

BRITAIN NOT TO INTERFERE. MADRID, Feb. 3.—The despatch of a cruiser to Lisbon is explained by the fact that the warships are to be put at the disposition of the Spanish minister.
