They had already organized ten institutes in Canada, and were extending their sphere of influence into .Newfoundland and the West Indies. Dr. Hall further stated that one of the amendments to the agreement of co-operation which the sailors' institutes desired was that granting a return to the time-honored program of appeal to the public purse, which had been carried out by this association until its co-operation with the Navy League. This amendment was refused. "It just looks as tho the Navy

League was trying to annihilate us, and we are not going to stand further dictation by commodores or ther dictation by commodores or anyone else." concluded Dr. Hall. Mr. Justice Craig, who is also vice-president of the Navy League, stated that there was no sort of trouble or antagonism between the two as-sociations, but it was evident that they could not harmoniously work together, the two bodies apparently having diverse interests. "When the Navy League sprang up with its appeal in the in-terests of the empire during the great war we decided to join hands," said Judge Craig.
