



Ottawa, Jan. 26—Under the guise of moral motives, Hon. George E. Foster thade an attack on the government today. Patronage in the administration was the peg upon which he hung his attack, and he demanded reforms for abuses which, in many cases, do not exist.

Hugh Guthrie, who replied from the government side, pointed out that Mr. Foster knew all about patronage, for he had learned his lesson well while a minister of the crown at the head of a department, which carried on the patronage system as it had never been carried on since.

The resolution which Mr. Foster asked the house to endorse intimated that a system of party patronage now prevails, and that it constitutes a menace to honest and efficient government, leads to waste of resources, extravagant expenditure, to corruption and lowers the tone of public morals, and should be forthwith eliminated.

Mr. Foster did not give specific instances but confined his remarks to generalities. He said that the government made a wide-spread application of the patronage system which he declared plagues the legislator and plunders the country. To the minister and his supporters it gives untold worries, in one way or another, it uses minety-nine per cent of a minister's time and eventually leads to the defeat of government.

He declared that senators should be chosen for reasons of personal fitness only; that judges should be appointed without regard to past party services; that all civil servants should be chosen as the result of competitive examinations, and that the money should be all spent in the best public interest.

Hugh Guthrie declared that Mr. Foster had made his usual use of extravagant language and exaggerated statement, and it was evident that the resolution was a veiled partizan attack on the present government.
