MEXICAN TROOPS HAVE A CLASH WITH BANDITS

American Soldiers are Guarding the Border Between Mexico and Texas-Mexicans Fight With Bandits in the Mountains.

Monterey, Mexico, June 30.—Troops of the seventh regiment, which left Matamoros Sunday, in pursuit of the bandits who attacked that town, encountered them after several hours' pursuit. No details of the fight have been received.

San Antonio, Texas, June 30.—By order of the war department, Federal troops of the Department of Texas, under command of Brigadier General Meyer have been ordered to proceed without delay to the Mexican border for the purpose of preserving to neutrality law between the United States and Mexico.

Monterey, Mexico, June 30.—A despatch from the News from Matamoros, says the special correspondent of the News has just returned from a trip to Visca, which is the 10th Regiment from Mexico City composed of 250 men under command of Brigadier General Juan N. Duran. At the station of Galita information was received that a band of insurgents had passed through there burning the bridge and demolishing the telegraph wires.

AT ODDS OVER THAW'S FUTURE One Judge Thinks Thaw is Dangerously Insane While Another Holds Opposite View.

New York, N. Y., June 29.—Justice Dowling of the supreme court, who presided at the second trial of Harry K. Thaw, denied today Thaw's application to be removed from the asylum for the criminal insane at the Poughkeepsie institution, on the ground that Thaw was a dangerously insane person, not to be punished but to be kept under restraint that he might not injure himself or anyone else.





A PROHIBITION PLANK WANTED IN THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM

Temperance Men are Likely to Put Up a Lively Fight for This at the Denver Convention--Southern and Western Delegates Will Favor It.

Denver, Col., June 29--The fight over the anti-liquor plank in the Democratic platform is not the only struggle in which the committee on resolutions and possibly the convention itself may be involved. It developed today that the prohibition question is to be brought forward from the fact that a desperate effort will be made to have a plank declaring in its favor placed in the platform. The prohibition plank is a declaration of the General James B. Weaver, of Iowa, who demanded of the recent Democratic convention of the state, that the party should favor prohibition. General Weaver and his followers were not successful in their efforts in their own state, but they are determined to bring the matter up before the Democratic national convention. They claim, moreover, to have strong backing from a number of delegations from the southern states which have recently passed prohibition laws and it is declared confidently by General Weaver's adherents that if the Democratic national platform does not contain a prohibition plank, it will only be for the reason that the hardest of fighting has been unable to secure its adoption.

The anti-liquor plank continues to provoke a large amount of discussion among such party leaders as have already arrived for the convention. While opinions differ as to the exact nature of the plank which should be adopted, all are of one mind in saying that it shall be a definite and specific statement. Such members of the national committee as have discussed the matter are a unit in saying that the wording of the anti-liquor plank shall leave no possible doubt in the mind of any reader as to where the party stands on this question. It is now generally believed, however, that the anti-liquor resolution will not provide for trials by jury in case of contempt of court, or favor in any way measures which might be construed as interfering with the prerogatives of the federal courts.

NEW POLICE FORCE FOR FREDERICTON

Chief Winter's Command Will be Composed of New Men.

Fredericton, June 29--Geo. H. Vroom, Dominion government fruit inspector, arrived here this evening, and tomorrow, in company with S. B. Hatheway, secretary of the New Brunswick Fruit Growers Association, will go to Gagetown to hold a number of orchard meetings.

It is said all members of the present force will be replaced. Those mentioned for places on the force are "Hub" McDonald, Fred Stevenson and Oliver Smith. LONGBOAT TO HAVE 130 COMPETITORS IN OLYMPIC RACES

No Doubt Now That the Canadian Indian is Eligible for the Big Event. Montreal, June 29--The Star's London correspondent cables: I have been officially informed that Longboat's entry has been received this morning in proper form and that there is absolutely no doubt as to the eligibility of the Canadian for the Olympic games. He will be pitted against a hundred and thirty competitors, representing at least ten nations, Belgium, Bohemia, Finland, France, Germany, Holland, Hungary, Italy, Norway and the United Kingdom.

CANADIAN GOLF CHAMPIONSHIPS

Albert Murray of Outremont, Montreal, Leads in First Stage of Match at Dixie. Montreal, June 29 (Special)--The first thirty-six holes of the match for the open golf championship of Canada were played at Dixie today and when the afternoon had been turned it was found that Albert Murray, the young professional of the Outremont Club, Montreal, led with 148, one stroke ahead of the score of Sam Cumming, of Toronto. The fight for senior honors seems to lie among these three. The second 36 holes will be played tomorrow.

CHILD LABOR DOOMED IN UNITED STATES AND CANADA

This is the View of Factory Inspectors in Convention Last Week in Toronto--Ohio, Quebec and Kansas Cited. (Toronto News.) Child labor is doomed in Canada and the United States. Such is the consensus of opinion among the factory inspectors in convention in Toronto, interviewed by The News yesterday. A strong and growing sentiment exists in all civilized communities which does much to make the laws enacted both here and permanent. Within the past decade laws have been put upon the statute and continually supplemented and reinforced by additional amendments.

STRICT IN QUEBEC

"Quebec is grappling firmly and effectively with the problem of child labor," said Mr. Louis Guyon, chief inspector of factories for that Province. In addition to the strict laws now enacted, the inspectors are given full power, in event of their noting during their inspection any child who seems weak or unwell, to order an examination of the child by a Government-appointed physician, and its removal from work at the factory if the physician's report is not favorable.

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
