

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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called "The Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society."

II. The object of this Society shall be the preaching of the Gospel throughout Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, the assistance of feeble Churches, and the planting of new ones.

III. Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing five shillings and upwards, annually, to its funds. Any person contributing five pounds at one time, shall be a Life member. Any person contributing twenty pounds at one time, or whose contributions shall amount to that sum, shall be a Life Director. Every Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate for every five pounds so contributed; and every Baptist Church contributing annually to the funds of the Society, shall also have the privilege of sending a Delegate. Should the funds so contributed exceed five pounds, such church shall be entitled to send one delegate for every five pounds contributed.—*Provided*: That no Association, Auxiliary, or Church, shall be entitled to send more than five Delegates at one time.

IV. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society from among its members. V. The Society shall annually appoint a Board of Management, consisting of twenty-four members, seven of whom shall reside in the place designated, from year to year, as the location of the Board, or in its neighborhood, and seven shall constitute a quorum. The officers above named shall be *ex officio* members of the Board. The following shall be the duties of the Board, viz :-- To meet from time to time for the despatch of business, due notice of such meeting being given; to appoint Missionaries, and assign their respective spheres of labor; to expend the funds for the objects of the Society, provided that all amounts contributed for any specific purpose shall be faithfully applied, as far as possible, in accordance with the wishes of the donors; to employ agents for the collection of funds, and for the general advancement of the interests of the Society; and to furnish a report of the proceedings of the past year at the Annual meeting.

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VI. Every Auxiliary Society which shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of this Society, shall be entitled to receive Missionary labor in such field as it may designate, to an amount at least equal to its contribution; provided that such designation be intimated at the time of payment.

VII. The members of Auxiliary Societies shall be members of this Society. Life Directors shall be entitled to attend and vote at meetings of the Board.

VIII. The Annual meeting of the Society shall be held at such time and place as shall be determined upon at a previous Annual meeting. At that meeting, the officers of the Society for the ensuing year shall be appointed, and such other business transacted as the members then present shall deem expedient.

IX. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present at an Annual meeting.

Director. Every Association or Auxiliary, while controlled at moally to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate for every five pounds so contributed; and overy liquist Charge contributing nanually to the finds of the Society, shall also have the privilege of sending a Delegate. Should the finals so contributed exceed five pounds, such church shall be entitled to send cue delegate for every five pounds contributed.—Provided to That no Association. Auxiliary, or Church, shall be entitled to sound mays than five Delegates at one time.

IV. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-Presidenta. Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society from among its members.

FOURTH ANNIVERSARY

OF THE

THE Fourth Annual Meeting of the N.S. Baptist Home Missionary Society, was held at Guysborough, July 8th, 1861, at 4 o'clock, P. M.

After prayer by Rev. John Davis, the Report of the Board was read by Rev. Dr. Cramp, senior member of the Board

present. After remarks by Rev. James Reid, S. Selden, Rev. John Davis, D. A. Steele, Licentiate, and David Page, the Report was unanimously adopted, and ordered to be printed under the direction of the Board.

The officers and Board of Managers for the ensuing year were then appointed.

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REPORT.

On this the Fourth Anniversary of the N.S. Baptist Home Missionary Society, the Board of Managers regret that they have not a more favourable retrospect to take of the proceedings and progress of the past year. A year of such straitened means and limited operations in the Missionary field has not been experienced, we believe, in the Denomination for a long time past. Previous to the commencement of the year the Board had engaged the services of the Rev. I. J. Skinner, as their Agent and Secretary, in which capacity he continued to act to their satisfaction, until, owing to the constantly decreasing means of the Board, and the accumulation of heavy responsibilities to their Missionaries, they were compelled to dispense with the services of an Agent altogether, although they are convinced that such officer is greatly required for the efficient working of their Home Missionary system.

In reviewing the events of the past year, your Board have the melancholy duty of referring to the decease of their late Chairman, the Rev. Richard McLearn. It is not necessary for them to enlarge upon a loss, in which the denomination throughout the Province so deeply and so universally participate. Brother McLearn's long experience as a Christian minister, his sound judgment and ready tact for business, the unbounded confidence reposed in him by the denomination, and his-kind and conciliatory demeanour, so eminently fitted him for the situation, that they can scarcely expect to have his place adequately supplied. Bat He "who chose him to be a servant," knew best when to release him from the cares and toils of the flesh, and to translate him, we doubt not, "to the inheritance of the saints in light." May we be followers of his faith, his patience and his labours.

Brother J. W. Nutting, the senior member of the Board, has been appointed their Chairman, and Brother R. N. Beckwith their Secretary.

The following recapitulation of their operations during the year, within the sphere of their labours, will afford information to all es work

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tion to the friends of the Society and the public at large, in all essential particulars connected with the progress of the work entrusted to the Board.

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Bro. Joseph F. Kempton. by appointment of May 3, 1860, performed 12 weeks missionary labour at St. Margarets Bay. He reports 39 sermons preached, 8 prayer and 6 conference meetings attended, assisted, encouraged and advised in Sabbath Schools nearly every Lord's day. Upwards of 160 families visited, 350 miles travelled, and 758 pages of tracts distributed.

He writes to the C. Messenger, 12th September, 1860;— The Baptist field is a deeply interesting one; there are in it 2 separate churches, in which there are 4 regular preaching stations, in each of these there is a small Sabbath School. The field is sufficiently extensive to occupy the time of 2 faithful ministers of the Gospel. Strong, experienced, ordained men are actually needed. I feel assured that could the services of even one such labourer be secured, his heart would soon be made to rejoice in seeing many converted to God.

Bro. C. H. Corey, licentiate, laboured 10 weeks at Dartmouth, Truro Road, Tuft's Cove, Coal Harbour Road and Hammond's Plains. He reports about 40 sermons preached. Family visiting and distribution of Tracts have been constantly maintained. In Dartmouth the congregations are encouraging, the members of the church are apparently united, and if attendance on prayer and conference meetings is a favourable sign, we certainly may hope. The Sabbath School, under the efficient management of Bro. Evans, is increasing in numbers and interest. 1 has been baptized and 2 received by letter. The brethren at Tuft's Cove need help, and are willing to do something for the support of, and nearly all seem favourable to, Baptist preaching.

LUNENBURG COUNTY.

Bro. D. A. Stcele, Licentiate, spent 8 weeks in the service of the Board. Preached in the following places: Tancook, Northwest, New Cornwall, Martin's Brook, Sackville, and Oliver Settlement, and at each of the four stations in Margaret's Bay.

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Preached 23 sermons, held 2 Conference and 1 Prayer meeting, attended 1 Educational meeting, made 31 visits, distributed 900 pages of tracts.

He writes on the 12th July :- The Baptist interest in Lunenburg is good, but our people are scattered; an ordained Missionary in that County, together with faithful pastors for their destitute churches, would be the means, no doubt, of greatly extending the Redeemer's kingdom. I have endeavoured plainly and affectionately to preach the Gospel of Christ, and leave results to Him who alone is able to convert.

COLCHESTER AND CUMBERLAND COUNTIES.

Rev. 1. J. Skinner. by appointment of July 4, 1860, performed a Mission of 16 weeks in the above counties.

Travelled 1130 miles, preached 73 sermons, baptized 13, attended 26 meetings for prayer and conference, made 105 family visits. Visited Great Village, West Brook, River Philip, Glenville, Mount Pleasant, Greenville, Little River, Little Forks, Five Lslands, Spring Hill, Salt Springs, and East Branch.

He writes to the Board on the 28th Nov. :-- I desire to acknowledge with grateful teelings the infinite goodness of God in the preservation of my life and health, and the uniform kindness with which I have been received by the people with whom it has been my privilege to labour. In looking over this extensive County of Cumberland, with its population of more than 14,000, rich in its agricultural and lumbering resources, and seeing the moral and spiritual desolation which so largely prevails, my heart was stirred within me. There are no less than 13 or 14 Baptist Churches in the County and at present not one settled Pastor. This is indeed a fearful and deplorable state of things, and yet I am inclined to think that if the Churches themselves were more fervent and believing in prayer to the "Lord of the Harvest" for laborers, and more united, systematic, and energetic in their efforts to supply the needful for their support, it would do much towards supplying them with the ministry of the Word. May the Lord awaken his people to more active endeavours for the promotion of his cause and kingdom !

GUYSBORO.

Rev. John Whidden, by appointment of 8th August, 1860, fulfilled a mission of 2 months along the South shore, from Indian Harbour East to Cape Canso. Travelled 484 miles, preached 35 sermons, attended 13 meetings for religious worship, distributed 200 pages of Tracts, appointed 1 Sabbath Female Prayer Meeting, visited Indian Harbour, Holland's Harbour, Fisherman's Harbour, Becketon Harbour, New Harbour, For Bay, Cole Harbour, Seal Harbour, Island Harbour, Isaac's Harbour, Country Harbour, Coddles Harbour, Salmon River and Crow Harbour.

Rev. M. A. Bigelow, by appointment 12th October, 1850, laboured 16 weeks in the service of the Board at New Harbour, Indian Harbour, Locke Harbour, Crow Harbour and Coddle Harbour.

Preached 60 sermons, held 46 Prayer and Conference Meetings, visited 160 families, baptized 36, organized 2 churches and 2 Sabbath schools.

He writes :--- I trust God was with me, and I hope he has blessed my labours. At Crow Harbour I had the pleasure of seeing those who professed to be Baptists, reclaimed from a prayerless state in which I found them, and also of seeing sinners converted to God, 12 of whom I baptized, and with the aid of Brother Miller organized a Church, now numbering 36; they are poor, but are willing to do what they can.

Bro. Samuel B. Kempton, licentiate, spent 8 weeks in the

He writes ;-I found the people in Parrsboro destitute of Baptist preaching and very anxious to hear. The field is

rapidly becoming Baptist ground. The most of my time I

spent in the district of Parrsboro, only one Sabbath at Little

Forks and Spring Hill. I can report no case of conversion,

but I hope that seed has been sown that will eventually yield

Rev. James Reid, in the service of the Board, has per-

service of the Board at Parrsboro and vicinity. Preached 40 sermons, attended 5 other meetings, visited 70 families, disAt New Harbour met with a warm reception ; had some very interesting meetings, and trust good has been done.

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At Coddle Harbour I found a people who had not been visited by a missionary for 4 years. God, however, had not forgotten them, and in a few days after I arrived there, He manifested his power in the conversion of a number, 8 of whom I baptized, and, with 9 others who had been previously baptized, I organized a Church. Brother Porter has baptized 2 recently.

CAPE BRETON.

Bro. Wm. McPhee, Licentiate, spent 8 weeks in the service of the Board at Gut of Canso and vicinity.

Rev. George Richardson laboured five weeks on behalf of the Board between Strait of Canso and Tracadie. Preached 50 sermons, attended 3 Conference meetings, baptized 2, administered the Lord's Supper once.

He writes :---I hope this instrumentality has been owned and blessed of God.

Rev. Ronald McDonald by appointment of September 13, 1860, spent 4 weeks on the Island of Boulardrie and neighbourhood. Travelled 166 miles, preached 15 sermons, visited 38 families.

Rev. A. P. Shiels, by appointment of 5th July, 1860, performed a mission of 8 weeks in the Northern part of the Island, extending from Port Hood to Aspey Bay.

Travelled 485 miles, preached 39 sermons, delivered 18 addresses to a few families or persons within call of the house; visited 66 families, also visited boats, fish houses and fishing stands, talking of Jesus Christ and the fishermen of Galilee to anxious souls; distributed 1236 pages of Tracts, 20 English Bibles, 14 English Testaments, 6 Gaelic Bibles, 1 volume of Spurgeon's Sermons, 1 volume of Burder's Village Sermons, 1 volume of Boston's Four-fold State,—all gratuitous.

Under date 6th November, he writes to the Board :---These tours I have to take on foot as there are no roads to speak of. But the people generally received me cordially and conveyed me on my way, sometimes through dense forests, across trackless barrens, over huge mountains rising almost perpendicularly from 1000 to 1800 feet above the level of the sea.

The people expressed a willingness and desire to aid the

Board in sending the Gospel to them. One person said he would give \$12 per year, enother that he would give 2 acres of land in a convenient place for a meeting house, for one shilling and three pence, and a third declared he would give as a present not less than 20 acres of land for a mission house, My visits among them, I humbly hope and trust, were blessed of God. They everywhere listened with the greatest reverence, respect and interest, to the story of redemption.

Bro. Benj. Spencer, Licentiate, by appointment of March 7, 1860, performed a mission of 8 weeks on the Island. Visited Grandmira, Gabaroos, Forshu, Loisburg, Loren, N. West Arm, Glass Bay and Schooner Pond.

He reports :--Preached 41 sermons, travelled about 280 miles, visited and prayed with as many families as I conveniently could. Have endeavoured as much as possible to visit the destitute, and they are many. What good has been done, will be best known another day, but I have reason to hope that my labour has not been in vain.

P. E. ISLAND.

Rev. John Davis still labours at Charlottetown, and a portion of his time is spent on Missionary ground.

He writes to the Board under date 27th May :--Within my field I preach some four times every week, besides holding prayer meetings. The attendance is encouraging if not large. I have lately baptized 2 young persons in connection with the church in the city. On the whole, notwithstanding the formidable difficulties with which we have to contend in these parts, we are enabled to maintain our ground.

Rev. John Shaw reports a mission of 8 weeks to Dog River, West River, Long Creek, Cance Cove, Lot 49 and Grand River. Preached 52 sermons, visited 40 families, attended 1 Conference meeting and baptized 5 persons, one in Dog River and four in Grand River. Preached and visited in conjunction with Brother Ross for 4 weeks. A general awakening has been among the people of his (Bro. Ross) charge, especially the youth, and among other congregations in those regions. My mission has been very pleasing to myself and I hope beneficial to others. The final day will shew as a whole, I hope a prosperous one. This mission is self-sustained.
