Now that the prices have reached such a high level, there is an opportunity for Australian and New Zealand butter being imported to Canada, as it can now be sold here at remunerative prices even after paying the duty; in fact, it is common reject, that some of these butterwards. paying the duty; in fact, it is common re-port that some of these butters were al-ready on the way across to Montreal. This has been confirmed by two local dealers, one house having a shipment en route from Ireland and the other a shipment from New Zealand.

The arrival of this butter will certain
