BROKERS URGE CAUTION IN THE STOCK MARKET

Investment Advised But Marginal Trading Dangerous--How Commission Houses Analyze Events of Last Week and the View They Take of Future.

Responsible brokers adhere to a cautious policy. No matter how cheap stocks may be as investments current conditions are so unsettled that margins are liable to be wiped out within an hour; therefore, customers are urged to keep out.

There is nothing in the near future, according to most views, which could encourage other than conservative investment buying, and against this it is logical to expect reduced dividends even where earnings at present appear to justify 4 and 5 per cent on the best issues.

There are not many who believe that the falling off may be far less than we see in the gloom caused by our troubles, expect. At all events our prices have discounted a great deal. No doubt the scarcity of capital is the cause. We continue to believe that a great factor in this scarcity was the tying up of liquid capital by bankers who underestimated the effect of cheaper gold production in reducing the price which bonds would sell to investors, and underwrite issues at too high prices.

"Through all these disclosures there is one gleam of encouragement and that is that public opinion is aroused and will insist upon clean, as well as capable management. Eventually these disclosures will result in the raising of the standard of corporate management, but meanwhile the public is deterred by these disclosures and wonders what next financial inquiry will be brought to light.

"With every new outburst of liquidation and short selling we are tempted to urge our customers very strongly to stick to their holdings--provided always that they are in a position to pay outright for or strongly protect what they buy. On every fresh decline we see evidence of the strongest investment buying. Not for a point or two but actual laying out in substantial sums which makes the best foundation for a continued advance when the tide once turns.

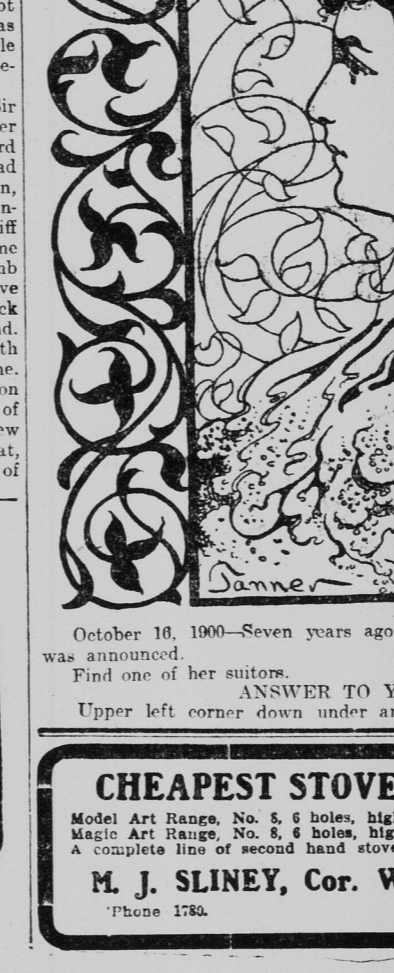
