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REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

A meeting of the Committee was held in Toronto on the 17th and 18th March, 1891, nine members present.

A communication was received, stating that a favorable site for the Port Simpson Home, consisting of two acres, had been purchased for \$400. The plans for the building, prepared by Mr. Hooper, architect, of Victoria, B.C., were considered, and, after some slight

changes, were accepted.

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A letter was read from Miss Wintemute, and an extract from the Minutes of the Council in Japan, in reference to the proposed new building at Kofu. It was resolved, "That having heard the action of the Japanese Council in regard to the new building at Kofu and Miss Wintemute's explanation thereof, we would express our appreciation of their careful consideration of the matter, and their unselfish action, and we hereby agree to leave the whole question to them for decision."

Communications were received relative to the establishing of an Industrial Orphanage at Kanazawa. It was decided to publish Mr. Saunby's letter in Guardian, Outlook and Wesleyan, appending the names of the Branch Corresponding Secretaries, to whom application for further information or offers of support may be made; and that when assurances of efficient funds for the support of the Orphanage for one year are received, the Corresponding Secretary shall have authority to notify the Missionary Council in Japan to proceed.

The applications of several missionary candidates were considered, and Miss Bertha M. Shoults, of Toronto, and Miss Sarah Spencer, of

Woodstock, were accepted for the work in Japan.

The request previously made by Miss Leake, that we would send a young lady to Victoria, who would learn the Chinese language, was urged by Miss Cartmell. It was decided that Miss Cartmell should remain, and that we would endeavor to secure, as soon as possible, a young lady who will learn the language and do evangelistic work among the women and children of Chinatown.

Having learned that the missionaries to be sent to China by the General Society would probably leave about midsummer, and as our Board had resolved to send two ladies at the same time, it was decided to advertise for missionaries. A committee, composed of the Corresponding Secretary and the members of the Executive residing

in Toronto, was appointed to consider the applications.

Information was received that the Auxiliaries in British Columbia desired to form themselves into a Branch. The Committee approved of the forming of a Branch there.

The Corresponding Secretary was instructed to write to our missionaries and request them not to accept money from Auxiliaries or Bands, but to ask such to send their donations through the Branch Treasurer. And if any Band, wishing to support a child in any of our Homes, will send a sum sufficient for that purpose through the Treasurer of the Society, it will be acknowledged in the Annual

The bills for the waterworks at the Coqualeetza Home were received. These amounted to \$429.81, being \$129.81 in excess of the appropriation for that purpose. Disapproval of the additional and unauthorized expenditure was expressed, but its payment was ordered.

The following resolution had been submitted to the Committee by correspondence, and carried: "The Executive Committee of the Woman's Missionary Society wishes to express its deepest regret over the editorial which appeared in the Woman's Department of the January number of the Missionary Outlook, reflecting ungraciously and unjustly upon the ministers of the Church, to whom the Society is so greatly indebted for the extension and support of its work. The article referred to was simply the personal expression of the Editress, with which article the Executive has no sympathy, and for which it bears no responsibility."

The Corresponding Secretary was instructed to request the Conferences to appoint one Sunday in the year to be devoted to the interests of our Society, and which shall be known as Woman's Missionary Society Sunday.

Mrs. Roberts, of Winnipeg, was appointed Organizer for Manitoba

and the Northwest Territories. Invitations for next annual meeting were received from the Auxiliaries of Dundas Centre, London, and Elm Street, Toronto. The invitation from Elm Street Church was accepted.

Miss Cartmell was appointed Treasurer in connection with the

new building at Port Simpson. An expenditure of \$60 had been incurred in travelling and rescue work in connection with the Chinese Home. The payment of this

In June, Miss S. Spencer, who had been accepted for Japan, withsum was authorized. drew, and Miss Minnie A. Robertson, of St. John, N.B., was appointed to that work.

In September, Miss Ross, of Port Simpson, tendered her resignation, which was accepted; the return of half her travelling expenses

being required. Miss Amelia M. Brown, of Aylmer, Ont., was chosen for the new mission in China, and sailed with Rev. Dr. Hart and party from Vancouver early in October.

After devotional exercises, which were conducted by the President, the report of the Executive Committee was read and confirmed.

It was a matter of sincere regret that Mrs. MacCoy, President of Nova Scotia Branch, was unable to be present. A resolution expressing deep sympathy with Mrs. MacCoy in her continued illness was carried by a standing vote.

Various memorials and resolutions were received from the Branches and separate Auxiliaries, and referred to the appropriate committees.

Reports from the Branches were read by the respective Corresponding Secretaries. Sincere gratitude for the increased progress and extension of the work in the Branches was expressed by singing the doxology, after which prayer was offered by Mrs. Carman.

A very encouraging report was received from each department of the Society's work. Reports and the Sup

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Reports of the Standing Committee on Literature and Publication and the Supply Committee were received and adopted.

The report of the Corresponding Secretary was read and adopted.

The Treasurer's report, which was presented by Mrs. Rosebrugh, and adopted, showed the receipts for the year to be \$31,698.96, an increase of \$6,138.20.

The report of the Editor of our department in the Outlook was

The Corresponding Secretary informed the meeting that the Auxiliaries in British Columbia had formed themselves into a Branch. The following resolution was carried unanimously: "That we have heard with joy and thanksgiving of the success of our sisters in British Columbia in the forming of a Branch of our Woman's Missionary Society. We most cordially and with much sisterly love welcome them into the sisterhood of Branches, and assure them that we shall most earnestly pray for their prosperity, and we desire them to join us in earnest prayer for the further success of the work our Lord has given us jointly to do."

The deed of the Port Simpson property had been received, and the Board decided to request Dr. Sutherland to allow it and other papers to be deposited in the safe at the Mission Rooms.

Letters were read requesting the Board to consider the question of undertaking mission work in Palestine, and an appeal was presented from Bagdad. It was resolved, "That in view of the fact that the parent Society has no missions in these places, and, as we have already assumed so much responsibility in other lands, we do not feel abe to enter these new fields."

A letter was read from Mr. and Mrs. Carlisle, of Peterboro', donating \$300 towards the proposed Orphanage in Kanazawa, or other work in Japan if thought better by the Board. Sincere thanks were expressed to Mr. and Mrs. Carlisle for their generous donation.

The report of the Memorial Committee was presented by Mrs. Sutherland as follows: From Brampton Auxiliary, Central Branch, asking that delegates to the Board of Managers be elected in the proportion of one to every four hundred members in the Branch. Committee recommended that this be entertained. Carried, with the addition of "and major fraction thereof."

From Central Branch, asking that in the Constitution for Mission Bands provision be made for a Corresponding Secretary, and that her duties be defined. Committee recommended that this be entertained, but as sufficient notice had not been given, it must be left over till next year. Carried.

rom the same, asking that Organizers be provided with an outfit.

Committee recommended that this be left to the Branches. Carried.

From Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Branches, asking that another lady, such as will meet the requirements of the Crosby Home, be sert to Miss Hart's assistance. Committee

recommended that this be entertained. Carried.

From New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, that this Board strongly urge upon all its agents the necessity of stating clearly, definitely and logically the need and use of special grants, and that this Board have power to formulate such plan as will best elicit the information required. Committee recommended that this be entertained, and that a by-law be framed in accordance with the spirit of this memorial. Carried.

From the same, asking (to define a disputed ruling) that every member of our Auxiliaries shall be eligible to election as Branch officers and Board delegates. After some discussion, it was decided that, as the Constitution already permits this, no change is necessary.

From three of our workers in British Columbia, asking that they be allowed to form themselves into a Council on a similar basis and having similar powers to the Council in Japan. On motion, it was

decided that this be left over for a year.

From British Columbia Branch, asking that a trained nurse be sent to assist the medical missionary and hospital department at Port Simpson. Referred to the favorable consideration of the Appropriation Committee.

From the same, asking that the Committee on Indian Work consider the difficulties incident to securing the regular attendance of Indian children at the schools, and to devise, if possible, some means of enforcing their attendance. Committee recommended that this be entertained. Carried.

From the same, expressing its appreciation of the work of the Woman's Missionary Society in the establishment of Boarding-schools and Homes in British Columbia, and calling the attendance of the Board to the desirability of extending this department of its work. The Committee recommended that this be referred to the Executive. Carried.

From the same, asking that the Branch annual meeting may be held the first week in September. Committee say the Constitution

already accords this privilege. Carried.

From New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, Eastern and Central Branches, and Zion Church, Winnipeg, asking that our department in the *Outlook* be continued, and that no new paper be established. The Committee recommend that this be entertained. Carried.

From Japan, stating the need of and the advantages to the general work, of the formation of a Woman's Missionary Conference, which would include native workers, giving the Constitution prepared for the government of the proposed Conference, and rules regulating the admission of Japanese candidates into the same, also submitting a place for the establishment of a Bible school, or training-classes, and giving the revised Council regulations, all of which were approved,

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with the exception of one clause of the Council regulations, for which the following was substituted and made a by law: "If any money be not required for the object for which it was appropriated, it may be used for any other purpose which the Council may recommend and the Executive approve, and any surplus funds from native sources may be used under the direction of the Council."

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The question was asked, "Have all memorials been presented?" A discussion ensued as to whether it was the duty of Secretaries to forward to the Board meeting resolutions or memorials relating to or affecting the general work of the Society which had been adopted by the Branch meeting, even if not ordered to be forwarded to the Board. The President ruled in the affirmative.

The following was made a by-law: "That all memorials sent to the Board of Managers be dated and signed officially."

The report of the Committee on Literature and Publication was presented by Miss M. Wilkes, and the following recommendations adopted:—

1. That a room be secured in Wesley Buildings, from which miteboxes, life-membership certificates, literature, etc., may be ordered; someone to be in charge.

2. That the Letter-Leaflet be enlarged to twelve pages. That someone be appointed in each Auxiliary to solicit subscribers and attend to its distribution. No Auxiliary to have more than two copies unless additional copies are paid for. In each issue a list of "leaflets for sale" to be printed, also notices from Supply Committee.

mittee.
3. That the total receipts from Branches be given in General Treasurer's report—omitting detailed statement from Auxiliaries.

4. That the Corresponding Secretaries' statistical reports be simplified

5. That as the subjects for prayer for the month and for the succeeding month are printed in the Letter-Leaflet, the prayer-card be not re-issued.

6. That an annual schedule be prepared by Mission Band Corresponding Secretaries for the use of Mission Bands.

7. That a specimen page be prepared for the use of Mission Band Secretaries as a guide in keeping correct records of their work. (Mrs. Whiston was asked to prepare same.)

8. That the Publication Committee be authorized to issue a small pamphlet entitled "Why Are We Protestants," written by Mrs. John Ross, of Montreal.

9. That it is desirable that the names of the authors appear on

all publications issued by the Society.

10. That a larger paper be substituted for Our Quarterly, which shall be suitable for both Bands and Circles, to be prepared by the

Band Corresponding Secretaries; Western, Central, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Branches, each to prepare

11. That in order to better utilize our space in the Outlook, Auxiliary Secretaries be asked to confine their reports to five printed

12. That the Standing Committee on Publication be empowered to issue any leaflet that may be helpful to our work and a source of

income to our Society.

13. That a Missionary Catechism be prepared for juvenile Bands, and that Mrs. W. E. Ross, Montreal, Mrs. J. D. Chipman, St. Stephen, N.B., and Miss Lewis, Truro, N.S., be a committee to prepare same.

The report of the Committee on Missionary Candidates was presented by Mrs. MacMichael. Committee recommended :-

1. That Miss Ellen Beavis be accepted for Port Simpson Home, as

sewing teacher or for domestic work. Carried.

2. That Miss A. Cushing (now in Tokyo) be accepted for work in Japan, with the recommendation that she be employed at half salary till further notice. Carried.

3. That this lady be recommended to continue her studies, leaving

her future to Providential direction. Carried.

4. That Miss Dowler be accepted on trial for a period of not less than three months in the Chinese Home, under the personal supervision of Miss Leake and Miss Cartmell; and at her suggestion she reside with friends.

5. That this lady be accepted by the Board when opportunity

offers in China. Carried.

6. That this lady be accepted by the Board for medical mis-ionary Not carried. work in China.

A letter was read from Miss Cartmell, stating that the traffic in Chinese girls had begun again, and that steps were being taken towards their rescue. A few moments were spent in earnest prayer for the success of these efforts.

The following resolutions were passed :-

"That our hearts have been deeply moved by the contents of the letter from Miss Cartmell, and we wish to assure her of our hearty sympathy with her efforts, and pray that the way may be opened for the rescue of these Chinese women."

"That this Woman's Missionary Society memorialize the Dominion Government to take such steps as shall prevent the importation into British Columbia of Chinese women for immoral purposes."

Whereas, Miss Cartmell asks that her duties be defined; Resolved, that Miss Cartmell be appointed Inspector of our Homes and Schools in British Columbia; that she visit these annually, giving our Board an Inspector's report, stating the condition and equipment of home and school; nature of discipline; what is needed for their full efficiency, and why needed; also that she continue her work among the Chinese as the way may be opened up, and, if the Japanese should

come into the country, she be permitted to undertake work on their behalf, as far as she may be able to give the time.

Dr. Withrow having offered the Woman's Missionary Society the use of a column in Onward to further the missionary interest, the following resolution was carried:-

That we have received with pleasure Dr. Withrow's letters assuring us of his hearty sympathy with our missionary work, and his desire that Epworth Leagues and Mission Circles work in loving harmony. We wish to convey to Dr. Withrow our desire that he will continue to impress upon Epworth Leagues the desirability of giving missionary work due prominence.

Among several questions submitted to the Committee on Questions,

the following is of most interest:

Question-If an Auxiliary, Band, or Mission Circle raise a sum over and above necessary membership fees, say to the amount of ten or twelve dollars, to what special object might they devote it; the desire for such special object being to inspire to more zeal for the work?

Answer-We think that Auxiliaries and Circles who cannot raise the amount required for the maintenance of a child in one of our Homes should contribute their funds in the regular way, as small donations to special objects would necessarily cause the Appropriation Committee much trouble.

Mrs. Burns stated that an application had been made to the Government for a grant towards the Port Simpson Home. The request had not been granted, but we were encouraged to believe it might be given next year.

It was resolved, that application be made to the Government by the Committee on Indian Work for increased aid to the Home at Chilliwhack, and also for a grant towards building and furnishing the Home

at Port Simpson. Resolved,—That this Board desires to express its appreciation of the valuable service rendered by Miss Hart, of the Crosby Home, during the last three years, and, their loving sympathy with her in the unusual and heavy responsibility that has rested upon her during the last three months.

The following was made a by-law:-

Any Branch may arrange for representation by proxy from the Branch within whose limits the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers may, from time to time, be held.

The Standing Committee of last year on Literature and Publica-

Sutherland and Potts were introduced as a deputation from the General Society, and presented its cordial greeting, expressing the deep interest and sympathy of the Board in our work in all its departments. Dr. Potts, in his usual happy manner, wished the Society increasing prosperity and usefulness. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to Drs. Sutherland and Potts for their cheery words.

On the hearty invitation of the Ladies of Elm Street Church, the delegates and friends remained to tea on Thursday evening, after which the public meeting was held. The pastor, Rev. J. E. Starr, occupied the chair. The address of welcome was read by Mrs. J. E. Starr, and replied to by Mrs. J. D. Chipman, St. Stephen, N.B. Greetings from sister societies were gracefully extended by Miss Inglis, from McAll Mission, Mrs. Humphrey, from the Baptist Women's Missionary Society, Mrs. W. B. McMurrich, from the Presbyterian Woman's Missionary Society, also a kindly letter of greeting from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union was read. Mrs. W. E. Ross, Montreal, and Mrs. McMechan, London, in some earnest words, addressed the meeting on the work.

The Committee on Courtesies moved the customary resolutions

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of thanks, and an especial one to the ladies who so kindly entertained the delegates at their homes and at the church on Thursday evening. The latter was carried by a standing vote.

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Each session was opened with devotional exercises conducted by different ladies. The testimony meeting was led by Mrs. J. A. Williams, and was of deep interest and profit.

The Tenth Annual Meeting was closed with an earnest prayer by the President.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

DEAR SISTERS,—Ten years ago the Woman's Missionary Society was organized, and it is a great satisfaction and pleasure, after the lapse of so many years, to meet again a goodly number of "the elect ladies" who composed the first Board of Management nine years ago.

"Preserved by powers divine, Again in Jesus' praise we join, And in His sight appear."

Often He has led us by a way we knew not. In comparing the position which the Society occupies to-day in the Church with that of nine years ago, there is much cause for thankfulness, but no room for boasting. At that time the membership was small. Reports were received from twenty Auxiliaries, and the income was less than \$3,000. Mission Bands have since been introduced, and they have proved to be a source of strength, as well as income. They are the means of enlisting the sympathy and co-operation of the young, and maintaining their active interest in the missionary cause. To no class in the Church of Christ does the cry, "Come over and help us," appeal more unmistakably than to the young women. The contrast between the surroundings of a Christian girl and that of her heathen sister, in all that makes life a pleasure and a joy, might, with advantage to both, be more widely explained and understood. In the home, the school, and in the Church, the Christian girl enjoys equal privileges with her brother. The study of science, art, and literature, are all possible to her. No such pursuits invite the girl born under heathen forms of religion. She is usually unwelcome at birth, uneducated in childhood, neglected in sickness, compelled to marry, divorced for trifles, accursed in widowhood, unlamented at death, and despised as unworthy of immortality. Her only hope is in the sympathy of Christian women, who are now recognizing the importance of a more practical observance of the "golden rule."

The question of how to increase the number of missionary candidates, demands careful consideration, though, up to the present time, there has been no special need for lady physicians. A knowledge of

medicine and nursing is always an advantage to a missionary; and now that China is to be occupied by our agents, there can be no more inviting sphere of usefulness than that of a medical missionary.

The Women's Medical College offers special rates to those studying with a view to medical missionary work; and it is hoped that many prayers will be offered this year to "the Lord of the harvest," for the laborers who will consecrate their lives to this eminently Christ-like service.

During the last ten years the conscience of the Church has been greatly quickened on the subject of missions, but no one will question the need which still exists for more prayer, consecration and liberality

before the "fields white unto the harvest" can be reaped.

The past year has been one of much anxiety, because the supply has not equalled the demand. The failure to send a medical missionary with the one who has gone to begin work among the women in China, was a great disappointment. The interruption to missionary operations in the empire may be temporary, and will, we hope, be overruled for the advancement of Christ's kingdom, and may serve as a lesson to teach all Christian people the danger of delaying to enter the doors that are open, lest they be suddenly closed. In the meantime it behooves us to be ready to do all we can to multiply the number of laborers according to our ability and opportunity.

Some of the home fields require strengthening and reinforcing. Two of our ladies who are entitled to a furlough, and need rest and change, will return home during the coming year. This must not be We have only a faint idea of the depressing considered lost time. atmosphere in which our agents often labor, separated from Christian Pray that their coming home may be fellowship and institutions. made a great blessing to themselves and to the membership of the Church, awakening a deeper interest and more prayerfulness on the subject of Christian missions. With this tenth anniversary of our existence as a Society come thoughts of the beautiful, natural, healthy growth which our God has given us. "It is of the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes." There is no room for boasting, but much reason to cause us to magnify the name of the Lord, who has so honored us as to permit us a share in the uplifting of our race by leading a few souls, here and there, to "the Lamb of God who taketh away the sin of the world."

Ten years ago the scattered Auxiliaries numbered only four or five, but the record since shows the wisdom of their then uniting to form the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church. They have now become 436, assisted by 183 Circles and Bands of young people, who are being trained to carry on more efficiently and with greater success the work begun in weakness, but yet in faith. Who can tell the effect on our own church life of this awakening to the Master's commission, "As Thou hast sent Me into the world, even so have I also sent them"?

The membership and the income have steadily increased year by year; and as to the purifying and ennobling influences on individual hearts and homes, once utterly ignorant of revealed truth, none but the All-seeing One can compute

The mite-boxes, in their humble, quiet way, have contributed \$2,033.96, while the sale of Annual Reports has added \$151.07, and the Literature Fund, \$352.68.

JAPAN.

The marvellous rush and pressure felt in this field a few years ago have subsided into a deeper, steadier flow, no less weighty and urgent though not so impetuous. New avenues are opening up quietly and gradually; it will devolve upon us to see that no hindrances obstruct this onward river of healing.

TOKYO.

The attendance in the Tokyo school has not increased, but it has been a satisfactory year in many ways. Three baptisms are recorded, and almost all the boarders have been found regularly in the class-meeting. There has been

a marked development of the Christian life, causing much thankfulness to the teachers who have carefully instructed and watched over these "babes in

Christ."

The return of Mrs. Large, after her sojourn in Canada, has been a source of strength and comfort to those who so faithfully and efficiently carried on the work, with all its responsibilities, during her absence; and here may be noted with gratitude the inspiration given by her presence and words in our home

SHIZUOKA.

This station has been one of special trial and difficulty, from the fact of a sort of partnership existing between our Society and the Japanese directors. The present agreement culminates this year, and a new one has been prepared which will give our ladies more liberty of action; and although costing more financially, yet it is expected that it will be more satisfactory.

KOFU.

Our school here has been growing in favor, the increase in attendance being gradual but steady. Thirty one students have been enrolled, twenty-eight of them being resident. Nineteen are Christians. One teacher requested baptism before Christmas, and another about Easter. The matron being also a believer

is a great comfort.

The new building, erected partly by the Japanese and partly by our Society, will be a great relief to our representatives, who have borne a good

deal of discomfort from inconvenient quarters.

Miss Wintemute, who has with such ability superintended this school from its opening, has now completed her five years' service, but will remain till next spring before taking her furlough.

EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Much hoped for has been realized and unknown good accomplished through this agency.

Fourteen women are either actively engaged or are preparing for future work. All are expected to go through a prescribed course of reading and study, on which they are examined; the results have proved very satisfactory.

Regular meetings for women are held in various places in four provinces, besides the work in Sunday-schools, which must be more efficiently done, owing to the fact of these Bible-women being better instructed than the average in the Word of God.

In Tokyo alone over 1,900 visits were made during the year, and thirtynine women received baptism. Similar results have been granted in Shizuoka,

Kofu and other places in their neighborhood.

The new field of Kanazawa, on the west coast, was entered during the year by Miss Cunningham, who has been favored with the divine blessing on her efforts, some having received the truth in their hearts. The time of furlough comes also to this worker during the next year.

FRENCH WORK.

In the Methodist Institute, Cote St. Antoine, Montreal, partially supported by our Woman's Missionary Society, there have been seventy-eight students in residence, thirty nine of them being girls. Of the whole number over thirty are reported as coming out on the Lord's side. All departments seem to have been worked satisfactorily, and the result has been gratifying.

Two day-schools in the city have been carried on, and two dissentient schools in the country have been aided, while two Bible-women have visited from day to day among the French, carrying with them "the word of life."

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INDIAN WORK.

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y supported students in over thirty eem to have dissentient have visited of life." The great interest at this point has been the preparation for and the erection of a new building, to be ready for occupation before the coming winter. No little thought has been spent on this enterprise, and it is earnestly hoped that this Home may be a centre of light and blessing to many hundreds for years to come. There are twenty-three girls now in the old Home.

COQUALEETZA HOME, CHILLIWHACK, B.C.

Prosperity has attended the work here, and the outlook is encouraging. Forty names are on the roll, half of them being boys. Seven have left and two have died, leaving the present number thirty-one.

It is the greatest reward to learn that these two who have passed away left behind them the testimony of the good life crowned by the consciousness in their dying hour of their acceptance in Christ.

Progress is being made in all departments, and prizes have been obtained in fairs at Chilliwhack and New Westminster, both for products of the garden and handiwork of the children. Twenty five are meeting in class, while temperance and Bible study are also made prominent.

M'DOUGALL ORPHANAGE AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, MORLEY, ALBERTA.

In January last those in charge of this Institution had the joy of moving into the new comfortable building provided by the Government. Very soon the numbers increased from nine to forty-two, necessitating a larger staff. There are now thirty pupils.

CHINESE WORK.

RESCUE HOME, VICTORIA, B.C.

This year has witnessed the largest number of inmates yet recorded, owing to the presence for a time of a mother and five children trying to escape from the cruelties of a husband and father; these, however, have moved away. Five of the girls have been married; there are now eight in residence, seven of whom have been baptized.

EVANGELISTIC.

Several attempts have been made to gain access to the women of Chinatown, with varying success. Of late there has appeared greater unwillingness to receive Christian visits, and we can only pray God to open the doors, and to keep faithful those who have received a little light.

Work in the Sunday-school has been continued, and seed sown in hope.

As to China, the first step has been taken of sending our pioneer missionary, Miss A. Brown, to that land, in company with Rev. Dr. Hart and his associates, who are now on their journey.

Our missionary force now numbers twenty, three of whom have joined the ranks this year. Noble, self-denying workers, they are deserving and needing our prayers, our sympathy and our support.

REPORT OF THE LITERATURE AND PUBLICATION COMMITTEE.

During the year now ending, 9,000 copies of the letter leaflet have been issued monthly. Of the Corresponding Secretary's report, "Origin and Work of the Woman's Missionary Society," "Ten Reasons why I should be a Member of the Woman's Missionary Society," 5,000 copies have been printed; "Duties of Auxiliary Officers," 3,000 copies; and 10,000 copies of the prayer card. At the meeting of the General Board of Managers last year, this Committee was authorized to issue a quarterly leaflet for the use of Mission Bands, which was to include an order of exercises for their regular meetings. This has been done, and the leaflet sent out in an attractive form bearing the name of Our Quarterly, containing each quarter a letter, written specially for it, from one of our mission fields, with the addition of such selections bearing on missionary topics, as the somewhat limited space would allow. The regular issue of this quarterly has been 2,500. In order to aid in the organization and management of Mission Bands, a free leaflet was prepared by a member of the Western Branch; 3,000 copies of this have been printed. Another recommendation was the selection of a new free leaflet for distribution in Auxiliaries, and for the use of Organizers. The Committee are pleased to report that a selection from leaflets already published was not necessary, as a member of our own Society, recognizing the talents given to her by God, was led to use them in this direction for the good of our work; and we believe that the account of "What Thomas Henry and I Learned at the Board Meeting," has already been made a blessing to many. Of this leaflet, 5,000 copies have been issued.

During the year the attention of the Committee was called to a scheme used by the Women's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church, under the name of Association of Scattered Helpers, whereby those who are prevented from attending Auxiliary meetings may be led to interest themselves in the work of the Society by contributing a certain sum each year, using the prayer card and taking a copy of the letter leaflet. By permission of the Presbyterian Society, and with the consent of the members of the Executive Committee, this was adapted for us in our Society, brought before each Branch at the annual meetings, and 3,000 copies of the leaflet, with 2,000 copies of membership cards, issued.

The thanks of this Committee are due to those who, from all the Branches, have given such efficient help in the preparation of the leaflet matter bearing on the monthly subjects for prayer. The Committee have given much thought and prayer to the work which has been before them, and have met twenty times during the year.

THE JAPAN WORK.

FOURTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE WOMAN'S MIS-SIONARY SOCIETY COUNCIL IN JAPAN.

Toyo Eiwa, Jo Gakro, September 1, 1891.

All the members of the Council were present. Mrs. Large in the chair. Miss Wintemute, on behalf of the Council, welcomed Mrs. Large on her return, and Misses Robertson and Shoults to our Council.

Mrs. Large replied briefly.

The financial reports were read and received.

The Chairman read an application to the Home Board from Miss Cushing,

to be taken on as one of their agents. A motion was passed, that we most heartily recommend Miss Cushing to the Woman's Missionary Society Board for acceptance, and especially can we do this, knowing the rich blessing that attended her labors since coming here; also the progress she has made in the language. We recommend the Home Board to allow her half salary, from September 1st until the time when she can enter full work. This is to be paid when she takes up full work.

Miss Cushing was notified of the terms on which we recommended her, and

accepted them.

The Report of the Committee on Bible Schools was read and accepted. On motion, it was decided that the Bible School shall be established in Komagomi District (Tokyo), but that, until arrangements can be made for it in Komagomi, it shall be opened in and carried on in the Azabu school building, and that Miss Lund and Mrs. Large be a committee to choose a place for it in

A motion was passed, that we recommend to the Home Board that the Komagomi. question of the establishment of an orphanage in Kanazawa be laid over for another year, and that Misses Cunningham and Hargrave be a committee to canvass the work, and to report at the second Council meeting of the next year

as to the best kind of new work to be taken up.

The Stationing Committee report was as follows:-

REPORT OF THE TOKYO SCHOOL.

It seems but a short time since I stood upon the threshold of the year, and wondered, somewhat fearingly, what it would bring to our school. Now, at its close, I look back and know God has been with us every step of the way.

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Though our numbers have continued to decrease (the attendance has ranged from 110 to 85), yet we all feel it has been a good year. The Christian girls have grown in grace and in love to God and their fellow-beings. During the year three more have received baptism, and several from among the non-Christians have asked permission to attend the class-meetings, and are showing by their daily lives that they are truly striving to learn of and follow Christ. At the end of June there were only ten of our boarders who did not attend class-meeting. Of these, five are very little girls, and three others had been in the school only a few weeks.

Owing to the absence of Mrs. Large, and the withdrawal of Miss Maud Cochran from the work, the time of the foreign teachers has been very fully occupied, and we have through the year called on the older of the supported girls to assist in teaching music and some of the easier English branches. Very efficient and willing helpers they have proved.

You will see that, though the expenditures have been lessened, the native receipts have also decreased, so that we have been obliged to draw upon the Society's funds more heavily than last year. We hope and believe, however, that this will not be a permanent state of affairs.

May God during the coming year abundantly bless His laborers in the dear home land and in the foreign fields.

REPORT OF THE SHIZUOKA SCHOOL.

In less than three months our school will be four years old. How many changes it has undergone, and yet, as I attempt to give the report for last year I feel how little variety there has been in the general work of the school. New pupils have come in, but not enough to fill the places of those who left, so that our attendance is seven less than last year; that decrease in a small school makes quite a difference.

I wrote you last winter that Miss Saito was to leave at Easter. We were indeed sorry to lose her, she had been in the school so long, and during the last two years her Christian example was felt by all around. But her health required a change. We had great difficulty in securing another Normal School graduate to take her place. It was June before one was engaged. She is not a Christian, but is an excellent teacher. May she, too, be won for Christ as Miss

In May, Mrs. Takase, our translator, was also obliged to withdraw from Saito was. the school on account of ill health. She required rest for some time. So you see we lost two Christian teachers in a very short time.

During my absence, Miss Hiraiwa, who graduated at Azabu last Christmas

in English and Japanese, was a wonderful help to Miss Hargrave. Last fall we introduced Japanese cooking into our curriculum, and while it has not yet been a means of drawing many new pupils, it has at least raised our school in the estimation of the people. We hope to give more time to both sewing and cooking next year, and also to add Japanese etiquette to our course. The longer I teach in the interior the more convinced I am that to make our country schools a success more prominence must be given to these subjects.

Eight of our pupils are baptized Christians; as many more desire to be; and

all are truly interested in Christianity. In November, the shareholders informed us that they could not any longer bear all the run salaries of the t the increase of end of October that will give s should continue their support.

This will account for the increase of expenditure over last year. Our present agreement expires the end of October, when, we have every reason to believe, we can formulate one that will give satisfaction to both sides, as the Japanese are anxious the school should continue, and several influential gentlemen in the province have promised their support.

The entire rest from work during the spring term, followed by our six weeks' sojourn among the mountains, has restored me to almost my usual health, and it is with deep gratitude to my Heavenly Father, and renewed interest in our work, that I look forward to the coming year. Pray that I may day by day be guided by Him who has said, "My grace is sufficient for you."

REPORT OF KOFU SCHOOL.

Kofu is one of the few places that seem not to have been yet affected by the general reaction against woman's education. Indeed, the past year's work has been most encouraging in every respect, the school having grown, not only in numbers, but in the confidence and favor of the people. We closed in July with thirty one students (all boarders but three), as against twenty-three at the same time last year—but this increase is over and above a loss of six during the year, showing that the growth has been natural; and, indeed, this has been the case from the beginning, for out of forty one students who have entered since the school was opened two years ago, ten, in all, have withdrawn.

The running expenses this year are a little in advance of last, the increase in fees not being quite sufficient to counterbalance the high rate of exchange and the addition of one to the teaching staff. But we are glad to be able to omit the item of rent from our estimates for the coming year, and thus reduce the amount by \$200.

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The interest that the founders, and especially the owner, Mr. Shinkai, have continued to take in the welfare of the school, has been very encouraging, and our relations with them have been most pleasant the whole year. Only once, during the consideration of the agreement about the building, was there, for a few days, a very anxious time; but the difficulties were overcome, and now we are all rejoicing in the prospect of opening school in a fine, new build-When it is finished, I will try to get an account from the founders of all the money they have put into the school from the beginning, so as to give you an idea of what they have done.

An increase of one lady teacher is the only change that has taken place in the staff during the year. She asked for baptism shortly before Easter, but her parents refused to give their consent, and so she thought it wiser to wait for a time. There has been a very marked change in her since her conversion. The sewing teacher was baptized shortly before Christmas. The new matron, a Christian, who came last September, is a great comfort and help, in comparison

with the former one.

There are at present nineteen Christians in the school, of whom five have received baptism; but of these, four were Christians when they entered. Of the seven Christian girls who have withdrawn since the school first began, three

knew nothing of Christianity before entering.

The various religious services held during the year, have, in a number of instances, been marked by a special outpouring of God's blessing, and have furnished signal examples of the guidance and work of His Spirit. The halfhour talk with the little ones on Sunday afternoon has been to me one of the most interesting and inspiring. The daily students have attended on the Sabbath more regularly than before. The Literary Society and the King's most interesting and inspiring. Daughters Circle are both prosperous, and have been a decided help to the students in the pursuance of their daily duties, and in their Christian life.

The words of the prophet seem to express exactly our feelings in regard to the work of the past year, "I will mention the loving kindnesses of the Lord, and the praises of the Lord, according to all that the Lord hath bestowed on us, and the great goodness . . . which He hath bestowed . to His mercies, and according to the multitude of His loving-kindnesses."

For myself, at the close of this my fifth year of experience in the work, I would say, disappointments and trials there are, great and real, to those who have been here long enough to get thoroughly into the work, but there are also joys and pleasures too deep for words, and that cause one to feel, again and again,

"O how shall words with equal warmth The gratitude declare That glows within my ravished heart? But Thou canst read it there."

REPORT OF EVANGELISTIC WORK.

S. AGNES WINTEMUTE, Principal.

The approach of another Annual Meeting makes one realize how time is

fleeting, and the necessity of "redeeming the time."

As shown by the Financial Report, the number of women engaged in active work, or in one of our schools preparing for future work, is fourteen. One, Mrs. Suzuki, of Hamamatsu, has withdrawn, and one student has been dropped from the Tokyo school. All of the fourteen women save two have taught in the Sabbath schools, while seven are class-leaders.

The examinations held in June were, in some respects, more satisfactory than those of last year. The whole year has been one of marked growth in

true wisdom to each Bible-woman.

In Yamanashi province meetings have been held regularly in seven different places; one weekly, one monthly, and the rest bi-monthly. During the fall and winter the attendance was very encouraging, averaging perhaps seven at a meeting. The silk season, however, compelled a rest. The work has been marked by an increased interest in the truth, and during the year by three baptisms. General meetings have also been productive of good, in creating an interest in Christianity, in bringing new members to the meetings, and in furnishing an opportunity for the sale of Bibles.

In Shizuoka province weekly meetings have been held in two places and bi-monthly in another. One of the weekly meetings had to be discontinued on account of the death of the owner of the house in which it was held, and consequent business troubles. New work has also been opened in two places, and the Sabbath schools are increasing in interest and numbers. The reports of the two Bible-women who labored in that district have shown that God was

with them blessing their labors.

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The work in Kanazawa has been so closely connected with that of the parent Board that it is difficult to estimate its results. Women's meetings have been held in two different places—a general meeting at one of the two places—and the Sabbath schools have been greatly aided by the united efforts places—and the Bible-worker under her. Now we have a woman of Miss Cunningham and the Bible-worker under her. Now we have a woman desirous of giving herself up to the Lord's work, and three others whose conversion may be largely attributed to their labors. Besides these, several Sunday-school scholars have also been brought into the fold.

Miss Cushing's helper has rendered no report as yet, but with that important exception the reports of the Tokyo Bible-women shew that over 1,900 visits have been made for the purpose of teaching the Gospel; that thirty-nine women have received baptism; that weekly Bible-classes have been held in each church, with an average attendance of six (the greatest average was ten); and that monthly meetings have been held in four places, with an average

In one place the Christian women have formed themselves into a King's Daughters Society. The meetings, held monthly, have been marked by the presence of the Holy Spirit, while their first report is most encouraging. One special result of these monthly meetings has been this: the women study their Bibles more, and are, in consequence, better Christians. Three have been called home, and all left a grand testimony to the saving power of the Gospel.

When commencing the year's work, a friend in a letter to me said, "Remember, 'He giveth power to the faint: and to them who have no might He increaseth strength.'" I can only say the promise has been proven true, and now as I stand on the threshold of a new year, the conviction that the words "Commit thy works unto the Lord and thy thoughts shall be established," mean just what they say, is stronger than ever before.

THE FRENCH WORK.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FRENCH WORK.

Having come to the end of another year, we pause to consider what has been accomplished, how far our prayers have been answered, and the hopes fulfilled that were entertained at its opening.

Two schools in Montreal have been carried on during the year, and two dissentient schools in the country have been aided by a grant. The school held in the Salle Evangelique, Delisle Street, has been taught by Miss Jackson, who has given great satisfaction to the Committee by her earnest, faithful work. There were 109 names on the roll during the past year; some only attended a few days. Part of the time the attendance was seventy, but the great amount of sickness prevailing during the winter reduced the average attendance to Miss Jackson has been re-engaged for this year, and commenced with sixty-three names on the roll. In connection with this part of the work, forty-five. Miss Anderson has been engaged as Bible-woman. From nine to twelve o'clock Miss Anderson has assisted Miss Jackson in the school, by taking charge of the youngest pupils. Her afternoons and Saturdays have been spent in visiting from house to house, and, as opportunity offered, reading the Bible, praying, or giving tracts to those she met.

In the east end of the city a smaller school has been taught by Miss Maynard. There were forty names on the roll, with an average attendance of nineteen. Miss Runnels, who has been educated in our school at Actonvale, and subsequently in the French Institute, is in charge of the school this year. She reports an attendance of thirty scholars. Mrs. Lamontagne is our Biblewoman in the East End. She visits daily among the French in this part of the city, has held mother's meetings, and in many ways tried to reach those who

know not the truth.

The school at St. Theodore is a small dissentient school, assisted by our Society. Miss Berloz taught last year. Rev. Dr. Williams and Mr. Pinel visited the school, and were much pleased with the result of their examination.

A grant of \$50 has also been made towards the support of a dissentient school at St. Jovite, through the urgent recommendation of Rev. Dr. Williams,

and we believe the money is well applied. How far the seed thus sown has brought forth fruit we cannot tell. We believe our teachers and Bible-women have been faithful workers, and rest in the promise that such work will be blessed.

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FRENCH METHODIST INSTITUTE.

The 30th of last April brought to a close a very pleasant and successful winter's work. We had seventy-eight pupils in attendance during the session, thirty-nine boys and thirty-nine girls. Nearly all were studious and attentive, and made marked progress during the time that they were with us. Three of our older girls prepared for the provincial examination for elementary diplomas held in June, and are now engaged in teaching, two of them in country districts and the other in a mission school lately established in the east end of the city.

Another pupil, who only left the Church of Rome a little more than a year ago, spent the summer as a Bible-woman, under the direction of the Rev. H. Benoit, of Rhode Island, formerly a pupil of the Craig Street Institute. She has returned to us this autumn, in order the more thoroughly to prepare herself for the work she has so bravely and successfully commenced. Although persecuted by the priests, and more than once expelled from houses by their orders, she did not give way to discouragement, but comforted herself with the thought that Christ has said, "Heureux aux qui sont persécutés pour la justice, car le royaume des cieux est à eux.'

This session has opened with a fair number of pupils, forty-six being now in attendance, and others coming in as soon as their parents can spare them from the farms. There is every prospect of a successful winter's work, though we greatly miss the pupils of our advanced class, many of whom had been with us since our organization two years ago. Nearly all are now away, either teaching or engaged in mission work, and we have once more to begin with a

very elementary grade of pupils. By the kindness of our lady Directors we have a piano of our own this year, not new, but in good order and quite satisfactory for the purpose required

There is great need for additional accommodation in the laundry department, and it is hoped that either the Woman's Missionary Society or the General Committee will equip us with suitable apparatus for drying the clothes in winter. The thoughtfulness of the Woman's Missionary Society has added much to our comfort in the Institute, perhaps most of all, in the covering of outside passages, last year. We trust that its kind consideration of our needs may ever be continued, and that we may be upheld and strengthened in our work this year, as heretofore, by the knowledge that many prayers are ascending in our behalf.

Other friends far and near still remember us. We desire through this means again to thank them.

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REPORT OF WOMAN'S WORK FOR THE WOMEN AND CHILDREN OF CHINATOWN, VICTORIA, B.C.

This work has been pursued only at intervals, occasioned by the absence of one or other of the workers here, holiday seasons, sickness in the "Home," and

other business.

After my arrival in the province and return from Port Simpson and Chilliwhack last autumn, weeks passed before I had an opportunity, properly speaking, to visit Chinatown. The first date in my note-book is that of November

25th, 1890, when Miss Leake and Sarah accompanied me.

To-day there are not so many men who leave their stores to watch and wonder, as we pass, seeking entrance here and there. I am persuaded, however, every movement is observed suspiciously by some one. The most interesting visit we made that first day was in a store where two women resided. One of them had a baby boy and a little girl of eight years; the other had four boys and one girl of seven, all very small. What delighted us was the evident pleasure of the two women. I called upon these two almost every time Sarah and I went out together, until first one and then the other moved away-to be found after some weeks, as a pleasant surprise, in quite a different neighborhood, and apparently changed circumstances. Sarah, and, when she was married, Carrie, and I were welcomed till they began to bind the feet of the little girls, and until our attempts at rescue work alarmed the husbands.

The change was very marked, especially when we failed to accomplish any thing by arresting a procuress who would not give us a girl who had appealed to us, with real or feigned desire, to come to the Home. The magistrate dismissed the case, because, he said, the woman's own admission could not be taken as evidence against her since it was not given under oath. Since then there has been other and stronger evidence that the authorities of the city donot intend to contend with the evil, consequently the evil-doers "wax worse and

worse," are far more impudent and defiant.

One of the worst courts in the city lies beside our new Chinese Church. It is hidden from the streets by fine new brick blocks in front and rear, the old houses having been moved back. The ruined lives of white and black, Chinese and Indian, are to be found here, and some of our baptized people living within

sight and sound. Do you wonder if earnest efforts have been made to bring about a change? You would rather wonder if there had been none. Yet gentlemen, forcing the police to see, are rewarded for their self-sacrificing determination by the question, "What can we do?" "What can you prove?" "If we drive them away from here, they will only go somewhere else." Oh! for men who will consecrate themselves to God for political work, both municipal and provincial,

for the salvation of the masses of our own Dominion.

Then, again, the High Binders, sharing in the profits and protecting this

business, arouse strong opposition to anything affecting its interests. The power of this influence we felt, when next we went our rounds after the with coldness, and the request not to come again.

My heart aches as I see the nervous, troubled look upon the faces of the little girls, who used to come to me with shy pleasure, and say English words as I would try to win them.

Of the twenty-four Chinese women, whose names I have succeeded in obtaining and whom I have visited once or oftener in their homes, I have seen eighteen this week. Out of these, and besides the five married girls from the "Homes," there are only three, perhaps four, others, where, now, I see a faint reason to hope I may be suffered to go, relying upon the Lord to work.

There are many women, and oh! so many little children in Chinatown. Numbers of them are of school age, showing the necessity of being ready, watching and listening for the "Sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees, and then bestir ourselves; for then shall the Lord go out before us." That time will surely come, and the Lord will give abundant fruit to the

We are not left without encouragement in the Chinese Sabbath-school, though it has not been thought best to encourage the attendance of the women,

We have attempted, though not succeeded, in forming the Christian women into a band for prayer and Bible study. Some are too busy, and the husbands of others object to their wives being on the street, and from home oftener than agrees with Chinese ideas of right for young married women. The women themselves do not feel their need keenly enough, and there is no use forcing things. It will be of more benefit when somebody comes who can instruct them in their own tongue. We have need of patience, till these Christian women know enough of the constraining love of Christ to be aroused to individual responsibility and effort for their friends.

From my heartfelt experience I pray, if the Lord sees best, that He will send us one for this work, whom He has prepared in the province of Canton, China, who will come among the people with a knowledge of themselves and their language.

Until that time comes, may His lot fall upon the right one to meet the present need of the "Home," and the work outside.

THE INDIAN WORK.

REPORT OF THE McDOUGALL ORPHANAGE AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

This year has been one of peculiar experiences in the history of our school, because of death, disease and desertion. We began the year with very few pupils, and as our quarters had been small and very uncomfortable during the past, and now the prospect of larger and more comfortable accommodation had dawned upon us, we concluded to not look for or receive any more pupils until the new building should be completed. This, largely through the persevering and kind efforts of Mr. Reid, the Indian Commissioner, was accomplished, so that in January we moved into the handsome and comfortable building we now occupy. Immediately upon opening the New Home our number of pupils ran up from nine to forty-two, and then our staff became too small and we were compelled to engage an assistant to the Principal, some one who could at times take charge of and work with the boys at the various occupations around the Home and on the farm.

In May, Mr. and Mrs. Youmans, who had held the position of Principal and Matron for the last five years, decided to leave this work, and it was not until the first of July we succeeded in securing the services of Mr. and Mrs. Butler, who are now Principal and Matron. In the interim the assistants, Miss McKie and Mr. Graham, had their hands full. Miss Gussie McDougall kindly went to their help, and remained with them until the new Principal

In the past we had too small a staff, and all honor is due to Mr. and Mrs. Youmans and Miss McKie for the manner in which they labored under great disadvantage. Now we hope because of Government help, and also trusting to your continued aid and generosity, to enlarge our staff from three to five. We expect a Miss Whitelaw to come to us on the first of October and take the position of teacher, and thus with better accommodation and with more help we expect to do very much better work in the future, not that we have any reason to discount the past in any sense, for in great poverty and with comparatively little help, we began and kept on through the years, and had it not been for the noble help given to us by your Society, we should have been in great straits.

We still have a debt of \$2,814.36, and while we are steadily acquiring stock and implements and property, yet this does not cancel the debt. During the last three years in which we have had a surplus on income as against expenditure, we reduced our debt from \$4,679.08 to \$2,814.36, and it was only by the strictest economy that we created a surplus, as we felt the burden of debt and wished to be free again.

Under the circumstances I have had personally to assume all the responsibility, and this has been a constant source of trouble and worry to my family and work, and I trust that until this debt is wiped out your Committee will graciously see fit to keep us under your patronage.

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REPORT OF CROSBY HOME, PORT SIMPSON.

Dear Mrs. Strachan,—Looking back to this time last fall, over the year that is gone, I feel we have very much to rejoice over. During the year we have taken into the Home ten new children, not one of whom at the time of entering could speak English or even understand it. They were almost as ignorant of all housework and sewing. Now every one can speak English fairly well, and have made rapid progress in housework, sewing and knitting. Yesterday Mr. Stone, school teacher, handed me the school report of the progress made by our children in the day school. It was most satisfactory. Of course, there are the dull ones, but even these have made an effort to push ahead. Several of the children are developing into very good students, and during playtime, I often notice some of them poring over their studies. Mr. S. takes a great deal of interest in them, and urges them on, but makes sure of thorough work.

On the whole, the children have manifested a more cheerful and contented spirit. Especially this fall I have noticed how very bright and contented they are, and some of them show a decided advance in spiritual things. Three of our older girls left us to take places in missionary families as servants, with the privilege of attending school half of each day. As far as I know all are doing well. Quite a number of children, I understand, are waiting till we get into the new building. Then they wish to enter our Home, as they know this house is as full as at all comfortable. I was glad to hear this summer of the marriage of a girl who left us eighteen months ago. She has shown by her life that the teaching received here has not been forgotten. She has married very well. Another, who left some time before, is to be married this fall.

Already the children talk of Christmas, and have commenced their fancy work. As several have learned to crochet very nicely, I promised them white cotton for aprons if they made the lace, and already one girl has finished quite a wide piece of lace. They take great pride in their white aprons, and like to have them clean and nicely ironed for school.

During the fine weather, we have been trying to pick our supply of cranberries for winter, but they do not seem to be as plentiful as usual; consequently we have not so many. Also, we are gravelling the road to our new Home. Lately, as the weather has been fine, I take all but the cook and her assistant out, and we get a load from the beach, and put it on the road before breakfast time. It takes so much gravel to make the roads at all firm that it means a good deal of work before it will be nice to walk on; but when the work is cheerfully done, it does not seem hard. The new house is progressing very fast, and we hape to occupy it in about a month.

REPORT OF THE COQUALEETZA HOME AND SCHOOL.

Year ending September 30th, 1891.

DEAR MRS. STRACHAN,—Again the Annual reckoning time has arrived, and it is with feeling of deepest gratitude to our kind heavenly Father for His overruling providence, that I submit the report of our school for the year just closed.

During the year, no material changes have been made in the daily routine; the boys, however, take turns in the kitchen as well as the girls.

The garden has been brought under more thorough cultivation, and consequently, has yielded abundantly. We won a first prize for potatoes at the

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Chilliwhack fair, and a second at New Westminster; also two first prizes and one second, for flowers, at Chilliwhack. The fruit trees set out last year are doing well, and three of them have borne a few apples this season. The garden walks have been gravelled and neatly bordered, thus giving to the place a decidedly trim appearance.

The Sabbath services, as well as the weekly prayer and class-meetings, are well sustained. The Juvenine Temple, also, lives and flourishes. Twenty-five children are met weekly in the two society classes. We cannot overestimate the benefit derived from the systematic study of the Bible in the Sabbath-school, of which Miss Elderkin is the Superintendent.

At the time of our last annual report, twenty-eight children were in the institution. The number, at times during the year, has been as high as thirtythree. Three removals have been due to coercion of the parents by Romanist priests, who care but little what becomes of the children so long as they are not under Protestant influence. The two deaths reported were of delicate children, who had been sent to their homes with the hope of deriving benefit Mary Ann, aged eight years, passed from their native air and surroundings. away in a few weeks, with words of trust in her Saviour and messages of affection for her teachers and school-mates, upon her lips. Charley, aged thirteen years, lingered seven months, and then; we feel sure, went to be with Jesus, the testimony of his lips, and, above all, the consistency of his life having borne witness of a renewed heart within.

Respecting the sewing department, Miss Somers says:-

"The girls in this branch of our work have improved very much during the past year, and their painstaking interest often turns care into pleasure while teaching them. The progress is very marked among our little girls of seven and eight years. They darn, hem and knit very nicely. Some have completed their first pair of stockings and are delighted with what they have accomplished. The stocking mending is principally done by them. The children have all become much neater in dress, and take good care of their lothing.

At the Chilliwhack fair this year our girls were awarded seven prizes. This included all prizes but one in the children's department. At the fair held in New Westminster, they were also awarded five prizes, three of which

In the school, as in the other departments, we are pleased to note progress; not so much in promotion to more advanced books, as in the mastery of those already undertaken. In reading, arithmetic, and geography, marked advancement has been made. The study of grammar has been taken up, and considerable progress made in that important branch. Instruction in the principles of temperance hygiene has also been given, the text-books used having been presented by the Sackville Woman's Christian Temperance Union. The school hours are from 9.45 a.m. to 12 noon; and from 1.30 to 3.30 p.m. During the winter months the older scholars are also required to study one hour each

Many perplexing cares and difficulties have come to us during the course of the year, still the discouragements have been far overbalanced by the encouragements. It has been comforting to note the gradual unfolding of youthful minds, and to feel that the Word of God, falling on some hearts, at least, has been "as good seed sown in good ground."

METHODIST ORPHANAGE, ST. JOHN'S, NEWFOUNDLAND.

Extract from a letter from Rev. Wm. Swann, ex-President of Newfoundland Conference.

The Woman's Missionary Society having, in the past, contributed toward the maintenance of this Orphanage, I desire to convey to them the warmest thanks of the friends of that Institution for the aid which they have so kindly and generously afforded; and in their behalf I beg to commend it to their continued sympathy, and bespeak for it their continued support. The Orphanage is still conducted in a rented house. Twenty-five orphaned girls, who would have been entirely neglected or but ill-cared for, have been in residence during the past year, and are being cared for and trained under Christian influences. The Newfoundland Government contributes \$24 per capita per annum, and the additional cost of food, clothing, education, etc., has to be provided by the committee. I am sure any lover of humanity, and especially any follower of the Saviour, must sympathize with the spirit and object of such an institution, and more especially in a country like Newfoundland, where so many are exposed to the hardships and dangers of the sea, where the sad wail of the widow and the fatherless is so frequently heard. The late Hon. C. R. Ayre bequeathed the sum of \$14,000 for the erection and equipment of a suitable building, for which a site has been secured, and the building will be commenced at an early date. It will provide accommodation for about seventy children. We trust that God who has helped us in the past will provide means for carrying on a work so truly in harmony with the spirit and purpose of our holy religion.

WESTERN BRANCH.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE WESTERN BRANCH, 1890-91.

In presenting this the ninth annual report of our Western Branch, we are grateful for the measure of success that has attended our efforts. Forty-five new Auxiliaries and fourteen new Mission Bands have been organized. The Auxiliaries are Acton, Arva, Berlin, Brucefield, Carlisle, Caistorville, Corinth, Cayuga South, Cooper's, Christie, Dunnville, Eden, Florence, Forestville, Flamboro' West, Fergus, Granton, Glencoe, Guelph-Dublin St., Hagersville, Kingsville, Kincardine, Littlewood, Lynnville, Luton, Merritton, Milverton, Newbury, Northfield, Old Windham, Paris Plains, Port Rowan, Preston, Salem, Southampton, Stoney Creek, St. Williams, Tilbury Centre, Tintern, Thorndale, Varna, Welland, Westminster, Windsor, Zion. The new Bands are Brantford -Wellington Street, Hamilton-Wesley Church, London-Dundas Centre, Oakland, St. Mary's, Waterford, Hespeler, Hamilton-Simcoe Street, Cayuga, Elora, Beamsville, Wilsonville, Ingersoll-King Street, and Harrow. In addition to these, Stratford, Nelson, Lowville, Wesley, Trafalgar and Teeswater have organized Auxiliaries lately, ready for work next year; Teeswater has also organized a Mission Band. Ebenezer Appointment (Holmesville), Selkirk and St. George have dropped out.

The reports for the year just closed show that it has been a prosperous year, not only in the number of Auxiliaries formed and funds raised, but also in the increased interest shown in the work.

We report 135 Auxiliaries, an increase of 42; Mission Bands 46, increase 12; we have annual members 3109, increase 862; life members 172, increase 13; total membership 3281, increase 875; Mission Band members 1797, increase 881; amount raised by Bands \$1505.69, increase \$229.12; amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$8,239.77, increase \$1,699.51; amount sent to General Treasurer, \$8,100.

The report, we think, speaks well for the work of our organizers. They also speak hopefully of the prospects of the coming year. We are thereby encouraged to believe that with God's blessing on our work we may be able to report even greater things next year.

Have much pleasure in reporting a good annual meeting. All the funds in and some \$20 increase over last year, which is very encouraging. Though we held no monthly meetings during the busy season, many came up to the annual meeting with hearts aglow for the work and well filled mite-boxes, proving that their interest was not checked in the good cause.

JARVIS

We very much regret having to report a decrease of one in membership, yet we have had new members added during the year. We mourn the loss of one by death, a few have removed, and three have dropped out. We are thankful to say our missionary zeal is not abating; we have some very earnest workers.

KINCARDINE.

This Auxiliary has just been organized nine months. We began with twelve members and have since had a slight increase. We regret very much the removal of one of our most active members, Mrs. J. Donahoe. Our prospects for the coming year are bright.

LONDON, QUEEN'S AVENUE.

We have had a good year in every sense. An increased membership, including two life-members. The meetings have been full of interest and there has been a growing desire evinced for the plan of direct giving.

LONDON WEST.

We are very grateful for our blessings. Though laboring under difficulties, our little band of workers is developing in faithfulness and earnestness, and each member is learning to put more of her own personality into this work, which comes closer to our hearts as we know more of its needs.

LONDON SOUTH.

With grateful hearts we record a year of great advancement, not only numerically and financially, but in the interest manifested by those who previously "cared for none of these things." Our average attendance at the monthly meetings has increased and we have found each meeting fraught with much spiritual help.

LONDON, WELLINGTON STREET.

We are glad to report an increase for our Auxiliary during the past year. The interest in the work is not as great as we would wish, but we hope, since the visit of our brothers and sisters who have gone to China, our zeal will be greatly increased during the coming year.

LITTLE LAKE.

REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES, CENTRAL BRANCH.

ALBURY.

Though not able to report so large an increase in our funds this year as last, we are glad to say the ladies of the congregation are becoming more interested in the work. We have five new members this year. Eight copies of the Outlook are in circulation. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$29.25.

CANIFTON.

We have a membership of fourteen. Have held ten monthly meetings, with an average attendance of ten. We are glad to report an increase of \$18.10 in finances.

COURTICE.

In sending this report we would like to state that we had almost given up trying to do anything as a Society, but are just now making a fresh start, with every prospect of success. The two members referred to as increase have just come in with us. We hope to have a prosperous year and be enabled to do good work for the Master.

COBOURG, KING STREET.

This year our Auxiliary has raised \$72.68, \$14.00 of which goes to the French Institute, Montreal, to assist in educating a boy. A box containing bedding, valued at \$25.00, was sent to the same institute, and quilts to the supply committee. Our Auxiliary has sustained a great loss during the year by the removal of Mrs. (Rev.) J. C. Wilson, whom we have made a life-member.

COLLINGWOOD.

This Auxiliary is of four years' standing, the first three years under the direction of Mrs. J. H. Locke as President, and the last year under Mrs. Barker, wife of our present pastor. The interest is well sustained by the original members. This year we number thirty members. During the year we held eleven monthly and two public meetings. At the latter we raised \$24.61. Amount raised during this year (inclusive of donation by Mrs. Johnstone of \$100) was \$155.96.

DEMORESTVILLE.

Our second missionary year has closed upon us with an increase of knowledge and responsibility. Our district convention was a great help, and the gate to heaven to five of our members who were present. Our monthly meetings are felt to be a blessing to all present by the presence of God's spirit. In our Bible readings we supplement some of those grand tracts with sentence prayers by way of programme, which brings the truth to our hearts. Our membership for 1891 numbers fifteen, our income \$31.09, giving an increase over 1890 of four members and \$15.81. May God direct the workers in all the "old fields" and bless the new station in China, and strengthen the sentinel workers at home, whose business it is to supply the ammunition.

EGLINTON.

This Auxiliary was organized December, 1888, with a membership of nineteen, which has since increased to twenty-four, with two life-members. We have held ten monthly meetings and one entertainment. We are pleased to report an increased interest, which has been much augmented by the presence of Mrs. Stevens, of China, and Mrs. Dr. Williams. Amount raised, \$51.55.

FRANKFORD.

The year just closing has been one of encouraging prosperity. We feel that we have every reason to thank God and take courage. We are glad to report an increase in membership, and our funds are largely in advance of last year. Three public meetings have been held, each being a decided success. We were gratified to have Mrs. L. Massey with us, and were strengthened by her enthusiastic appeal to women, the result being the addition of several new members to our number. Together with collections and donations we sent \$14.00 to the supply committee, to be forwarded to the Crosby Home. We are pleased to note a growing interest in this great work, and we are confident that we are engaged in an undertaking which must meet with Divine approval.

FENELON FALLS.

This Auxiliary was organized in April by Mrs. Broderick, of Lindsay.

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FOXBORO'.

Our Auxiliary has been fairly successful this year. Our membership shows a small decrease, yet our interest in this noble work has not abated. Our meetings have been interesting and instructive, and it is with much pleasure we add our mite, to forward God's message to our down-trodden sisters. Members, thirty-five; meetings, twelve; average attendance, sixteen. Remitted to Branch Treasurer, \$62.50. Subscribers to Outlook, nine.

GRAVENHURST.

In presenting our report for the year we are pleased to say we have an increase in members. Also a deep sympathy in the work is manifested. We have been encouraged by the Master's presence in our meetings, and are hopeful that missionary zeal will increase among us, and that the coming year may be a very prosperous one.

HAMPTON.

This Auxiliary was organized October 15th, 1890, by Miss Tourjee. We are not able to report much progress, being so short a time in the work. Interest is growing and meetings well attended. We are looking forward hopefully for better success in the future.

On looking over last year we feel encouraged with increase of members, and are glad to report a deepened interest in mission work, and those who have met together month after month have been conscious of a growing love for the Master, and although we have sustained a loss by removal of our President, who has been with us since we organized, still we feel that God is still with us, and we are ready to do our best for the cause and our Master.

HUNTSVILLE.

Though not making any striking progress this year, we have fully held our ground. Our regular meetings are times of interest and blessing to us all. The amount raised this year is \$41.

KETTLEBY.

During the year we have held five monthly meetings; average attendance of five members. Were organized in 1890-thirteen members-four of whom have removed. Efforts will be made to increase the interest in the work, and we hope to be more successful financially.

LAKEFIELD

Auxiliary has held this year twelve monthly and two public meetings. Interest growing. Membership, twenty-one. Amount contributed, \$47.72. Two quilts have been mada for the French Institute. It is our desire that the year upon which we are entering may be marked with greater prosperity.

LINDSAY.

We are sorry to have to report a decrease in our membership this year, being only thirty-seven. Still our monthly meetings have been fairly well attended, and the decrease in funds has not been from lack of interest on the part of the members. Amount remitted from Auxiliary, \$46.04, to which may be added \$40, sent by the Excelsior Mission Band, making a total of \$86.04.

LONSDALE.

When our Auxiliary was first organized, in 1889, we had a membership of twelve, but through the removal of some, we have only six members in 1891. However, the interest is now increasing, and we hope the coming year to have some added to our list. The Treasurer's report shows we have gathered \$20.14.

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Lindsay.

MILLBROOK.

Our Auxiliary is still maintaining its existence. It is our painful duty to record the death of our worthy Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Whitfield (Miss Hetherington), which is a great source of grief to our little Auxiliary, but we know that our loss is her gain.

MOUNT ALBERT.

The Mount Albert Auxiliary was organized February 5th, 1890, by Mrs. Crosby. Since that time we cannot report much success, numerically, yet our meetings are growing in interest. Since our organization we have raised \$84.87. We have sent \$79.39 to the Branch Treasurer, \$10.52 of which was raised by our Sunlight Mission Band, which has a membership of forty-eight members. We have one life-member in our Auxiliary, and eight subscribers for the Outlook.

MADOC.

This Society has been organized five months; we have great reason to be thankful to God, for we are getting along nicely.

MOUNT PLEASANT.

The Mount Pleasant Auxiliary was organized in March by Mrs. G. D. Platt.

MARKHAM.

Our Auxiliary was organized last April, by Mrs. Crosby and Mrs. McKay, with nine members. The five meetings held since have been seasons of refreshing to us all. We go forward to the work of the coming year, looking for great things at the hands of our Heavenly Father.

NEWCASTLE.

In presenting our eighth annual report, we are glad and thankful to report seven new members. There has been one death, Mrs. Barfett. We have held our regular monthly meetings, at which we have read the Missionary Leaflet for the month, or some missionary reading supplied by the committee appointed for that purpose each quarter. The roll call is responded to by a verse of Scripture from each member. We held a missionary "At Home" in April, and with some of the proceeds bought the material for the making and quilting of four quilts which the young ladies of the Mission Circle pieced.

NORHAM.

We are glad to report an increase in interest, members and finances for the past year. We have taken nine copies of the Outlook, and feel that the foundation of a true missionary spirit is being laid, the benefit of which we shall reap in the near future.

NAPANEE.

We have ten new members this year, have lost three by death and one by removal. Our ex-President, Mrs. Sidney Warner, has become a life-member. We were favored with a visit from our Branch President, Mrs. Dr. Williams, who gave us a public meeting with a most excellent address and good collection. We have remitted to the Branch Treasurer \$115.00.

NEWTON-ROBINSON.

We are sorry we cannot report much increase during the past year, though we were enabled at Christmas-time to send a box of clothing, bedding and other useful articles to the North-west mission. We held a public meeting at which Miss Crosthwaite gave us an interesting address on mission work in · China.

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NEWMARKET.

We have had quite a prosperous year. Membership is about the same, but attendance at the monthly meetings is larger and the interest deepening. Our finances are much improved through having parlor entertainments quarterly. We are also preparing to send a box of bedding and clothing to McDougall Orphanage this fall.

OSHAWA, CENTRAL.

We close the year in a spirit of thankfulness to God, and open the new year asking the guidance in and blessing on any work we may attempt to do for Him. We are glad to report an increase in membership and funds, and a very marked increase of earnestness in the work on the part of every member of our Auxiliary. All our monthly meetings have been characterized by a spirit of earnestness and strong desire to do better work for the Master. We have a membership of forty-three and have sent \$75.52 to the Branch Treasurer this year. ORONO AND KIRBY.

This Auxiliary was organized October 3rd, 1883. Our Auxiliary is in a flourishing condition. We have held eleven monthly meetings, and averaged a new member every meeting. We have two life-members and have raised during the year \$116.28, of which we sent the Branch Treasurer \$107.98. We have forty-seven names on our roll, but only report forty-one.

ORILLIA.

The Orillia Auxiliary, organized in February, 1888, shows a slight decrease this year in numbers and finances; but our meetings have been marked by more of the real missionary spirit. A "birthday box" has been one of the new features this year. The income of 1891 was \$63.54.

PETERBORO', GEORGE STREET.

It gives us great pleasure to be able to report a very prosperous year. We have had a large increase in membership, in finances, and a growing interest in the cause for which we are working.

PETERBORO', CHARLOTTE STREET.

Our Auxiliary was organized January 14th, 1891, by Mrs. Kendry. As yet we are young in the work, but prospects for next year are encouraging as to larger membership. Death has already entered our ranks and taken our Treasurer, Mrs. Sturton, a woman whose heart was in every good work.

PORT PERRY.

Our Auxiliary was organized in February, 1888. We have not been strong in numbers this past year, and suffering very much by removals. We have not done as much as we would wish to do. We have organized again, and hope by united effort and increased interest in this grand work, to have a better report next year.

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PICTON.

Our Auxiliary is still progressing. Several new members have been added, but owing to deaths and removals, have not been able to report a much larger As an Auxiliary our finances are very much better, although we have to report a small decrease, which arises from the Mission Band swelling its funds last year by each member making what they could with one cent. This proved to be a great success.

PICKERING.

Our Auxiliary was organized March 7th, 1888, with eight members. This year has not been as successful as we anticipated. We have only held nine monthly meetings. We sent a valuable parcel of miscellaneous goods to the McDougall Orphanage last Christmas, valued at \$28.00.

PORT HOPE.

Port Hope Auxiliary was organized October, 1886, with a membership of thirty. This year we have enrolled thirty-seven members, and remitted \$98.99. At the Annual Meeting we made Mrs. R. Fountain (organizer of the Society) a life-member. Although we report a slight decrease in numbers and funds, we are not discouraged, but intend to labor on and look to the Master for a blessing.

REDNERSVILLE, CENTRE CHURCH.

We rejoice in an increased membership and a larger amount of money raised. The past year has been very encouraging. We have twenty-seven members on the roll, twenty two active and five honorary. Our receipts amount to \$53.47, an increase of \$26.82. We have prepared a valuable box of bedding to be sent to British Columbia.

SHANNONVILLE.

Total number of members, eighteen. Meetings first Wednesday in every month. Amount raised by this Auxiliary during the year, \$37.49.

STREETSVILLE.

This Auxiliary was organized in 1884. In presenting our report for the year just closed, we are thankful for the success that has attained our efforts. We feel that much of our success is due to the interest manifested by our esteemed President, Mrs. Switzer, and we pray that God will bless her efforts, and now as we are about to enter on another year's work, we hope that God will give each one of us a true missionary spirit, and that our work may be crowned with great success.

SIDNEY.

This Auxiliary numbers sixty-one members, including one life-member. Ten monthly and three public meetings have been held during the year. Miteboxes have been distributed and we have seventeen subscribers to the Outlook. The year has been a prosperous one and we are looking hopefully and prayerfully to the future.

SOUTH BAY.

Our review of the year calls forth feelings of grateful thanksgiving. It is one year and eight months since Mrs. G. D. Platt organized this Auxiliary with a membership of ten. Since then we have added thirteen new names to our list; have lost three by removal, leaving us with a membership of twenty. Monthly meetings have been held regularly and well attended. We held an entertainment in February, from which we realized \$13.40. Remitted to Branch Treasurer, \$31.01.

SHELBURNE.

We have been organized one year, and although our meetings have not been as successful as we wished, the prospect for next year's success is bright.

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STOUFFVILLE.

Another year has gone and our Auxiliary is still prospering. We are glad to report some increase in our Auxiliary-if not in numbers, in finances. are also glad that death has not visited our ranks. Surely God is good to us. May we hear at last the Master's "Well done!"

SCHOMBERG.

We feel very sorry to report a decrease of sixteen in our membership, some through removal, and others lack of interest in the missionary work. We had Miss Crosthwaite visit us, with the hope of imparting fresh zeal. We have only raised this year \$28.64, but earnestly hope next year to be able to report a large increase, and pray success may crown our efforts.

This Auxiliary was organized in March last, by Mrs. Broad, with a membership of five. We are glad to report a growing interest in the work. We have now eighteen members, and are taking twelve copies of the Outlook.

SMITHFIELD

The membership here has not increased during the past year, but we trust there was work done for the Master, which we pray He may bless with actual results. Total amount raised, \$42.30. Members, twenty-six.

TORONTO, SHERBOURNE STREET.

The deep, spiritual tone of the meetings has been very marked, all the exercises tending to increased devotion to the interest and spirit of missions. Our Presidents constantly reiterated admonition to lay every qualification for service on the altar stimulated zeal that might otherwise have flagged, and all our members are more willing than ever before to do anything they can to promote the interest and welfare of our meetings. Income of Auxiliary during the year, \$205.65, being an increase of \$46.88 over last year.

TORONTO, METROPOLITAN.

This, the eighth year of the Metropolitan Auxiliary, has been a fairly successful one, yet we long for still greater things in this much loved missionary work. Ten meetings have been held, largely increased in interest by our monthly letters, which tell us of trials met and victories won by our sisters in the various fields. As there is in personal presence a magnetism that written words fail to bring, the address of Mrs. Large on "Consecration" at our April meeting was a benediction to each one, and will, we pray, bear fruit. Our membership is ninety, of whom seventeen are life members. Receipts, \$825.66.

TORONTO, YONGE STREET.

We have with sorrow to record the loss of three of our members, taken home to the realms of light—"God's finger touched them and they slept"—Mrs. G. W. Wood, Miss M. Williams, and our only honorary member, Mr. W. Forbes, who was so interested in our work that to show his interest in it insisted on becoming an honorary member. Our monthly meetings have been interesting and profitable, and have been of a varied nature. Very excellent Bible readings have been given; also readings, recitations, and solos by different members. We had the pleasure of listening to a most graphic and earnest account by Mrs. Captain Simco, of the Salvation Army, about the work in the Province of Quebec, among the French Roman Catholics, its difficulties and drawbacks, and its measure of success. Amount sent to the Branch Treasurer, \$68.71.

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TORONTO, BERKELEY STREET.

During the year we held ten regular monthly meetings and three public meetings. Average attendance at monthly meetings, sixteen. The membership for the year was forty-nine, twelve being life-members. Amount of money raised this year, \$175.28.

TORONTO, PARLIAMENT STREET.

This, the first year of separate existence of Parliament Street Auxiliary, has been marked by a year beyond the most sanguine expectations. Our initial meeting was held on September 4th, 1890, when the organization of the Auxiliary was effected. With a membership of fifty-one (many of whom joined late in the season), our average attendance of seventeen, and the collection of \$133.25, are evidences of success, for which we thank Him in whose name we labor.

TORONTO, NEW RICHMOND.

During the year we have held ten monthly meetings and four prayer-meetings. Also the quarterly meeting for the West End was held in connection with this Auxiliary in April. Mrs. Large was present and addressed the meeting. In May, Rev. Mr. Cocking delivered a lecture, with views, on Japan and the Japanese. During the winter we sent some clothing per supply committee to the McDougall Orphanage. Our membership is twenty. Sent to the Branch Treasurer, \$63.05. Subscribers to the Outlook, fourteen.

TORONTO, ELM STREET.

Elm Street Auxiliary mourns the loss of one faithful sister, a member since its organization. Has gained five new members, but lost several by removal. Sorry to report a decrease in receipts this year, though glad to believe there is no loss of interest in the work. Public prayer-meetings have been established and are doing good. Amount remitted, \$251.80, which includes \$60.45 from the Mission Band. The Band worked faithfully during the year, but had much to discourage it.

TORONTO, QUEEN STREET.

Our membership is eighty-one, including thirteen life-members, three new life-members being added. Three of our life-members have died during the year. Our funds have decreased this year owing to the union of the Mission Band with the Epworth League, and our receiving only a small donation instead of the usual \$100.00. We hope, by the help of the Master, to make up this deficiency next year. Held ten monthly meetings, with an average attendance of thirty-four, and six public meetings. Sent to Branch Treasurer, \$331.59.

TORONTO, CENTRAL.

The Auxiliary reports \$229.75, being an increase raised by Auxiliary of \$26.45.

TORONTO, PARKDALE.

Our Auxiliary was organized in February, 1888, with a membership of twenty-five. We have held two public meetings, at one of which we had the rare pleasure of an address from Mrs. Large, at the other, addresses from Mrs. Tate of the Chilliwhack Home, and Rev. Mr. Hall, also of British Columbia, all of whom stirred up our pure minds by way of remembrance. We report twenty-four annual members and three life-members, while twenty-five have subscribed to the Outlook. Amount remitted, \$70.45.

TORONTO, CARLTON STREET,

Reports two meetings of special interest, addressed by Miss Gibson, of Paris, and Mrs. Stevens, of China. We record the death of two members who have been in the Auxiliary from its commencement: Mrs. McCormick and Mrs. Brimstin.

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TORONTO JUNCTION.

This Auxiliary was organized September 15th, 1890. One public entertainment given by the Rev. T. Cocking; also the members of the Auxiliary contributed by private donation \$8.25 towards purchasing goods for the McDougall Orphanage, for which the collection from the prayer-meeting was used, and the whole amounting to \$17.50, the goods being made into a parcel and sent to the Mission Rooms.

TORONTO, WESLEY CHURCH.

We have cause for thankfulness in two respects, especially, this year, viz., increased membership and augumented funds. We have held four missionary prayer-meetings during the past year, at which addresses have been respectively delivered by Miss Crossthwaite, Mrs. McKay, and the Rev. Drs. Galbraith and Briggs. Our Mission Band again donated to us the handsome sum of \$75.00, and we enter on our new year's work with earnest hope and prayer that it may prove better in its results than any which have preceded it.

TORONTO, ST PAUL'S.

We are glad to be able to report, not only an increase in membership and finances, but increased interest. Seven monthly meetings were held, some of special interest, all of them helpful and inspiring, our average attendance being eighteen. One entertainment was given, at which the Rev. T. C. Cocking gave an illustrated lecture on Japan, which was not only entertaining and instructive, but which was highly appreciated. Early in the year the young ladies organized a "Helping Hand Society." A sale was held under their auspices, the proceeds of which, amounting to \$35.25, was passed over to the Auxiliary. Mrs. Woolsey's class of boys and girls also contributed proceeds of a "mite box" which amounted to \$6.00. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$79.25, being an increase of \$35.25 over last year. One of our number left us for the better land, but our loss is her eternal gain.

TORONTO, BROADWAY.

The interest in the Broadway Auxiliary has been well sustained throughout the past year, the meetings being well attended, averaging thirty-three. The total income was \$147.42, being an increase of \$10.25 over that of the previous year.

THOMPSONVILLE.

Thompsonville Auxiliary was organized January 5th, 1891, by Mrs. W. D. Walker, of Schomberg, with a membership of nine. During the eight months we have added three to our numbers, making a total of twelve members. Remitted to Branch Treasurer, \$9.37.

THOMASBURG.

This Auxiliary was organized 1889, which included our whole circuit. There being a division in our circuit this year necessitates a division in our Auxiliary. We have two life-members. Held twelve monthly meetings, one lecture and one entertainment. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$82.45.

THORNBURY.

Our Auxiliary has lost by removal several members during the past year. During the winter an appeal was made to a member of our Auxiliary in behalf of the Indian children of the Rossville Mission. In response to which a bale of clothing was prepared and sent in care of Rev. Mr. Semmens, of Winnipeg. This work seems to have roused the people to new interest. We find that attendance is always larger when there is special work to be done.

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TWEED.

Mrs. Maybee organized our Auxiliary on June 23rd, 1890, but there was no work done for some time afterwards. Some quilts and blankets were sent to Supply Committee to be disposed of as thought best, these, with a lecture delivered by Miss Crossthwaite, have been the only special benefits derived from us as a society.

UXBRIDGE.

We report fifty members this year, a decrease of three, which we exceedingly regret; but we are happy to state an increase of funds, \$59.05 more than last year. Our monthly meetings have been better and more interesting than ever before in our history, and we have added another life-member to our number. We have met regularly every month, and have held besides, one public and one semi-public meeting. As in times past our meetings have been spiritual seasons of refreshing. Besides the money sent to Branch Treasurer we donated \$5.00 for clothing to be sent to McDougall Orphanage. Our Mission Bands (two) have done good work this year and have raised \$63.00, an increase from last year of \$36.00, for which we are deeply thankful.

VROOMANTON.

The Vroomanton Auxiliary was organized by Mrs. Crosby, of Uxbridge, March 25th, 1891, with thirteen members, ten active and three honorary. At present we have thirty-four members. Five public meetings have been held, the amount raised being \$12.95. We have one life-member in our society. Amount sent to Branch Treasurer, \$50.00. Number of Outlooks taken, twenty four.

WILLOWDALE.

This Auxiliary was organized February 5th, 1889, by Mrs. McKay, with a membership of nine, and has since been steadily increasing until it has attained a membership of twenty-four. Our meetings have been pleasant and profitable, but we hope for better results for the year we have just entered upon. Amount raised, \$35.48.

WHITBY.

Our Auxiliary was organized in March, 1888. Since that time there has been a decrease in membership, but the interest taken in the work is decidedly greater. Amount sent to the Branch Treasurer, \$61.01.

WELLINGTON.

Our Auxiliary was organized last February, by Mrs. G. D. Platt, of Picton. In addition to our regular monthly meetings, the ladies meet to sew once a month, the articles made to be sent to one of the Homes. The sum of \$21.15 has been sent to the Branch Treasurer. We have now twenty-two members, and already there are several new names for the coming year; and we are hoping with God's blessing to do better work during the coming year 1891-92.

WARKWORTH.

During the past year our meetings have been poorly attended, very often only part of officers. Our last meeting was well attended and several new members joined us, and we are hoping for more this coming year.

WICKLOW.

Mrs. Broad met with a few of the ladies of Wicklow, in March, with a view of organizing an Auxiliary. Owing to the fewness of the number present, she left it in the hands of Miss Richards, who organized our Auxiliary on April the 15th, with a membership of thirteen, to which five have since been added. We have held five monthly meetings with an average attendance of eight. We have collected and forwarded to Branch Treasurer the sum of \$7.00. Our interest in the missionary work is on the increase.

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REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF MISSION BANDS—Continued.

We have much pleasure in rendering this our first annual report of Mission Bands. The separation of Mission Bands from Auxiliaries is a new feature of last year's work, and we feel assured the prominence given our young people will redound to much good. We have fifty Bands—the same number as last year—which may not seem any increase, but on closer examination really is, for while fifty Bands were reported last year, we found on writing to each of them that nine had been doing nothing for some time, so that in reality we had only forty-one live Bands, giving us an increase, therefore, of ten for this year. We have 1,750 members, and seventeen life-members; an increase of 386. The Metropolitan Mission Circle gives us fourteen life-members; Barrie, one; Brampton, one; Newcastle, one. The Bands that have dropped out are, Queen Street, Toronto, Orillia, Collingwood, Canton, Newton-Robinson, Queensboro', Downsview, Port Perry and Mount Zion. The Bands organized this year are, Mount Albert, Belle Ewart, Norham, a second in Picton, Bowmanville, Bensfort, Newmarket, Markham, and a fourth in Belleville.

The evening devoted to Mission Band work at Brampton was one of our most interesting evening meetings. A good programme, mostly furnished by Brampton Mission Bands, was presented, and much enjoyed. The conference of Band workers held there was also most inspiring; and we are looking forward to a year of increased usefulness and prosperity in this department of

work for our Master.

REPORTS FROM MISSION BANDS, CENTRAL BRANCH.

AURORA, "THE SUNSHINE WORKERS."

This is a Band of forty-five members, the youngest not less than fourteen years old. They are in a flourishing condition, and have held a Dairy Concert, which was very successful.

BARRIE.

This Band was organized in March, 1887, with a membership of sixteen, which has since increased to forty-nine, including one life-member. They meet the third Friday evening of each month, and once a year have an entertainment to celebrate the anniversary of their organization. Proceeds this year were \$37.15.

BATH.

This Band reports twenty members. They meet once a fortnight, and in February decided to try the talent scheme.

BELLEVILLE, "ALBERT COLLEGE."

This Band sends a very encouraging report, "increase in members, increase in money contributions, and a greater interest and zeal in missionary work." Three of the members have signified a desire to become foreign missionaries. Their membership is twenty-nine, and their meetings, at which they have taken up the study of different countries, are very interesting and profitable.

BELLEVILLE, "TABERNACLE."

This Band was organized January 11th, 1891, with a membership of forty-three, since increased to fifty-nine. They report growing enthusiasm for their work, and have remitted \$26.70.

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BELLEVILLE, "JUBILEE BAND."

This Band was organized in 1887, and at present consists of fifty members. They support a girl at the Rescue Home for Chinese girls, Victoria, B.C.; have sent \$10 to the new mission in China, \$10 for furnishings for a Home, and have sent \$12.50 to the Branch Treasurer. The proceeds of their work altogether amounted to \$86.66.

BELLEVILLE, "UNIVERSITY CHURCH."

This Band reports thirty-two members, and meets on Sunday afternoon after Sunday-school. In connection with it, there is also a "Working Band," which meets every other Saturday, and at present the girls are piecing a quilt.

BELL EWART, "LAKE SIMCOE MISSION BAND."

This is a new Band, only organized in June last. Their average attendance has been twenty, and they have raised \$5.

BENSFORT

Reports a Band of four members.

BRAMPTON, ST. PAUL'S "LIGHT-BEARERS."

This Band reports one hundred members, including one life-member, and have had great success in their work. In February, they held a Chinese entertainment, had Miss Crossthwaite to talk to them, who was dressed in Chinese costume, and sang in the Chinese language. After the close of her address, a Chinese tea was served, consisting of rice, jellies, cakes, nuts, raisins, dates, figs and tea. They have also written essays on different subjects, for which prizes were awarded.

BRAMPTON, GRACE CHURCH "SUNBEAMS."

This Band was organized in June, 1889, and their membership now amounts to fifty-six. They support a little girl in the Home at Chilliwhack, and have sent direct to the Home, \$25, and to the Branch Treasurer, \$35.

BOWMANVILLE.

This Band has only just started, with a membership of twelve, and will get thoroughly to work in the New Year.

BRIGHTON, "EBY MISSION BAND."

This is a Band of fourteen girls and thirteen boys, and they meet every alternate Tuesday.

DUNKERRON, "WHATSOEVER"

Reports twenty-one members. Their monthly meetings are not only interesting but instructive, and they have been greatly benefited in reading and studying about their heathen sisters.

FOXBORO'

Raised \$22.40, and reports forty-eight members.

GRAVENHURST.

This Band, in January last, sent a very encouraging report. They divided into two sections, senior and junior, the former meeting with the Christian Endeavor department. A programme is arranged for the evening by the missionary committee of Christian Endeavor, the subject being taken from topic cards of the society. A mission field is chosen, and members are asked to gather up material respecting that particular country during the intervals between the meetings. Then, at the meetings, four or five selected ones talk and read on the subject indicated. The junior part of the Band meets after Sunday-school, when the president gives them a talk suited to their years, and on Saturday afternoons part of them meet for the purpose of sewing. A very good work is being done, and all are trained to forget self and minister to others. They number seventy.

HUNTSVILLE.

This Band meets with the Epworth League, and numbers twenty.

LINDSAY, "EXCELSIOR."

This Mission Circle reports thirty members. They meet every two weeks, and spend their evenings in sewing for supply committee, and in reading missionary news. They have sent clothing to destitute missions and orphanages, have furnished a room in the French Institute, Montreal, and sent upwards of \$40 per year to Branch Treasurer.

LINDSAY, "CHEERFUL GIVERS."

This is a junior Band, and they meet every Saturday. With their money raised, after paying their fees, they buy material, and make clothing for mission schools and orphanages. They number eighteen. Held a bazaar before Christmas and realized \$26.00.

MADOC, "LACOREGOMA."

This is a Mission Circle of forty-five members. In September, 1889, they re-organized at a picnic party on the lake shore, hence their euphonious name, and since that time have been very much interested in mission work. Countries have been chosen for subjects of study, essays have been written on the different mission fields, and their meetings on Sunday afternoons, after Sunday school, are very interesting and profitable.

MARKHAM

Reports a Mission Band with fifteen members, recently organized.

MOUNT ALBERT, "SUNLIGHT MISSION BAND."

This Band was organized November, 1890, reports forty-eight members and an average attendance of twenty-five. They have taken mite-boxes, and are making articles of clothing, either for sale or for one of the orphanages. They engaged Rev. T. C. Cocking for a lecture on Japan, and although it rained the church was well filled, and over \$26.00 realized.

NEWCASTLE.

This Band reports fifty members, including one life-member, also a prosperous year, both as regards increase of members and finances. Their funds have been derived from members' fees, a public entertainment, and mite-boxes. They have sent \$45.58 to the Branch Treasurer, and a parcel of quilts and clothing to the Supply Committee.

NEWMARKET.

A Band was organized here during the year, and reports twenty members.

NORHAM, "HAPPY GLEANERS."

This Band was organized this year by Mrs. (Rev.) M. E. Wilson, in March last, and are in a flourishing state. They meet to sew every second Saturday, have fourteen members, and have raised \$5.03.

NORTHPORT.

This Band is a Mission Circle, composed of both sexes, and sent a good report. Countries have been studied and essays written thereon. Their membership is thirty-one, and they have raised \$37.19.

NORWOOD, "THE M'DOUGALL."

This Band was organized in 1889, by Mrs. Massey, and reports thirty members.

ORILLIA.

The "Pearl Gatherers," though small in numbers, have done considerable work through the year, having realized \$7.82 at a "sale of work" held in the winter. The total amount raised by the Band was \$9.69.

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ORONO.

This Band numbers thirty-nine, and they have raised during the year \$14.80.

OSHAWA.

This Band in January last reported eighteen members.

OSHAWA, "DEMILL COLLEGE."

This Band sends a good report, and have been blessed spiritually in their meetings. They number twenty-seven, and have raised over \$12 for the furnishing of a room in the French Institute, Montreal.

PARRY SOUND.

This Band in March last reported thirty-eight members. They have not been heard from since May, but on the 8th of May they intended holding an entertainment at which the mite-boxes were to be broken.

PENVILLE, "WILLING WORKERS."

This band was organized September 24th, by Mrs. W. D. Walker, of Schomberg, and has increased from seventeen to forty-four. It is composed of boys and girls, also a few married men and women. They have sent a box of clothing to McDougall Orphanage, valued at \$12, and have raised \$22.35.

PETERBORO', GEORGE STREET, "TIRELESS TOILERS."

This Band reported forty-two members.

PHILIPSTON, "THE BETHEL."

This Band has not reported lately, but we trust is doing well.

PICTON, "WAYSIDE WORKERS."

This Band was organized by Miss Rogers, who has since removed. They report meeting every second Saturday to sew for the poor in their own town, and the Homes and Orphanages. Numbers thirty.

PICTON, "KILBORN MISSION BAND."

This is a juvenile Band of boys, organized this year by Mrs. Platt, and reports a membership of seventeen.

PORT HOPE.

This Band reports twenty-one members, all active members, who take hold of the work with willing and enthusiastic hands. They raise their money by giving entertainments and doing sewing for different members of the Church. For three years they have been keeping a boy in the Chilliwhack Home, British Columbia, and \$50 is annually devoted to that purpose.

SCHOMBERG, "WILLING WORKERS."

This Band sends a most encouraging report, and have increased during the year from forty to eighty members. It is a juvenile Band, hardly any being over the age of fourteen. They meet every two weeks, take up the subjects of prayer on the monthly prayer cards, and have a programme of readings, recitations, etc., and several good essays have been prepared and read by the members. They are trying the talent scheme and are greatly interested in it.

STOUFFVILLE, "LIGHT BEARERS."

This Band was organized August, 1890. Since that time the interest has been well sustained, the children themselves providing much of the entertainment in the way of well-selected missionary readings, recitations and music. In addition to this short talks have been given at most of the meetings by the pastor, on some interesting missionary subject. The Band is in a prosperous condition at the present time, and gives an encouraging prospect for its future. Membership, thirty-three; raised during the past year, \$10.30.

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THORNBURY, "RUBY MISSION CIRCLE."

This Band has suffered the loss of their Secretary by death during the year. In February last she wrote reporting the membership, and a few months later she was called home, leaving many sad hearts to grieve for her, but also the comforting assurance that she was "safe in the arms of Jesus." When the Circle was organized in 1888, only one of the girls was a professing Christian, now, nearly every one of them has united with the Church. Membership, twenty.

TORONTO, CARLTON STREET, "KING'S DAUGHTERS."

This Band, in March last, consisted of eleven active and thirty associate members. They have sent during the year 227 articles of clothing to the different missions, and have raised a good sum of money by voluntary offerings. On their annual Flower Sunday, in June, between 400 and 500 bouquets were distributed amongst the poor and sick, and charitable institutions of the city, bringing pleasure to many weary ones.

TORONTO, CARLTON STREET.

This Band reports they have raised about \$100 this year. They have suffered from removals, having lost both their President and Treasurer. Membership, twenty-five.

TORONTO, ELM STREET.

This Band reports social meetings, partaking of a missionary character, held twice a month. They have used during the year the "Objection box" and adopted the plan of writing "missionary letters," one of the members finding out all about a certain mission station and writing a letter about it, to be read at the next meeting. Membership, thirty-two.

TORONTO, ST. PAUL'S.

Reorganized in December, 1890, and have met every Saturday afternoon for an hour. Their object is raising money for mission purposes or helping any who need, and are worthy of help. They held a bazaar in March, which netted \$35.25.

TORONTO, SHERBOURNE STREET.

This Band, always a banner Band in raising money, reports this year an increased membership, and also financial increase. Membership, eighty; sent Branch Treasurer, \$130. Besides religious and literary meetings, they have held weekly sewing meetings, to provide clothing for poor families in the city during the winter months.

TORONTO, METROPOLITAN.

Meetings were held every second week during the season, when missionary letters were read, and reports given of missionary progress everywhere; several interesting papers were prepared on our foreign fields also. Two successful socials were held, and about thirty members took talents (five cents), to improve, netting \$50.27. Amount raised, \$320. Members, seventy-five, including fourteen life-members.

TORONTO, WESLEY CHURCH.

The Mission Band of Wesley Church has contributed, through the Auxiliary, the sum of \$75; has also been doing home mission work, in the way of preparing garments for the poor within their own church, and have sent besides, \$10 to a poor mission amongst the Indians. Membership, 40.

TORONTO, CENTRAL CHURCH.

This Band reports a membership of thirty-three.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE EASTERN BRANCH.

The eighth annual meeting of the Branch opened in the Methodist Church. Prescott, October 7th, at 9 a.m. Devotional exercises were conducted by the President, Mrs. W. E. Ross. There were forty-seven delegates and several

visitors from neighboring towns present.

Reports were read from the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands, which were very encouraging. Mrs. Bigelow, of Aultsville, read a very carefully prepared and highly instructive paper on "The Easter Thank-offering," for which she received a standing vote of thanks. The testimony-meeting, led by Mrs. Kines, was a season of spiritual refresh-

ing and much enjoyed by those present.

Mrs. Blair presented greetings from the Western Division of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church. Notwithstanding the

heavy rain the evening meeting was well attended.

The President, Mrs. W. E. Ross, in her address, spoke briefly of the different mission fields, and stated that in the French Institute thirty have been brought into the light during the past year, and explained why it is so necessary work should be begun at once in China; that it has the largest population in the world and 35,000 die daily. She also reminded the young people that no literature is so fascinating as missionary literature, and mentioned

several as being particularly interesting works.

Mrs. Thos. Coates welcomed the Branch to the church, the town, the homes and the hearts of the people. Mrs. (Dr.) Hunter, of Montreal, made a very suitable reply. The Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. (Dr.) T. G. Williams, then gave her report: sixty-two Auxiliaries with less than 2,000 members, and over 10,000 Methodist women in the congregations, fourteen new auxiliaries organized, and she specially thanked the ministers who had so cheerfully assisted her in organizing. She also spoke of the princely gifts the heathen offer, and gave examples, and also reminded us that in heathen countries woman is unwelcome as a babe, untaught as a child, enslaved as a wife and despised as a widow, and said that sounding in her ears were the words "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do," etc. The Treasurer, Mrs. McRossie, presented her report showing the whole amount raised to be \$4,031.79, being an increase of \$854.72. The choir rendered several suitable selections during the evening. The

meeting was closed with prayer by the Rev. Mr. Stuart (Presbyterian). The invitation to Winchester for the next Annual Meeting was accepted.

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REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES, EASTERN BRANCH.

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This Auxiliary was organized in June. No report of work can be given, but we are desirous that we may have a share in this woman's work for woman.

We drop from last year's list two bands—one has during the year developed into an Auxiliary; two juvenile bands have become independent, and four new ones have been added: Willing Workers, Londonderry Band, Hamilton

Band and Wesley Centennial.

In the kindly reception given to our Conference representative, we have the assurance of the continued sympathy of our brethren of the Nova Scotia Conference, one of whom has honored us by becoming the President of one of our most flourishing Mission Bands.

Our camp meeting services were largely attended, and were of more than ordinary interest, resulting in the springing up of new life which is already bearing fruit unto God.

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REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES, NOVA SCOTIA BRANCH.

HALIFAX NORTH.

REPORTS FROM MISSION BANDS, NOVA SCOTIA BRANCH.

"REAPERS" MISSION CIRCLE.

At the close of another year, we have great cause for thankfulness, although financially we are behind last year. Our membership has increased from forty eight to fifty-five. Our meetings are well attended and profitable. The reading of our paper, the *Sheaf*, is always enjoyed. The November meeting was most interesting, as we had an inspiring report from the Annual Board Meeting, held in London, Ont. The feature of our year's work was an Industrial and Art Exhibition, held on April 5th. Total income for the year, \$239.03.

Our Band meets once a fortnight. The children draw maps of different countries, and bring information about them. They also make useful articles, such as dusters, dust caps, dish cloths, etc., and sell, to add to their funds. Amount raised, \$50.

"HAPPY THOUGHT."

The year has passed so swiftly that we can scarcely realize that it is again time to report our work. Some of our members have removed, others dropped out, giving us a decrease in membership. Our mite-box opening resulted in the addition of \$6 to our funds. We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for His help in our weakness.

FIRST METHODIST BAND.

Our work is increasing in interest. A boys' Branch has been organized, and many little ones of five and six years also meet with us. We meet on every alternate Saturday, and spend a pleasant and instructive hour in devotional exercises, reading missionary intelligence, etc.

"ROYAL WORKERS,"

We are happy to report an increase in our membership, but regret a decrease in our funds. The fortnightly meetings have been kept up during the year with scarcely an interruption. We have tried with good success the talent system. We hope, by divine guidance, to accomplish much more in the future.

"BUDS OF PROMISE."

This year more "buds" have developed than last. Our present membership is forty, an increase of eight. Juvenile meetings have been held regularly, and the interest is well kept up. Eleven copies of Children's Work for Children are taken, and seed is being sown that will surely bear fruit to the glory of the Saviour.

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"LIGHT BEARERS."

Our Band has not advanced during the year. We hope to send a more cheering report next year.

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"CHEERFUL WORKERS."

We report a decrease in members, and an increase in amount contributed. Though there seems to be much to discourage, we look forward hopefully to another and better year.

"OAK AND IVY."

The past year has been full of work.

Apart from the money raised, we are thankful for all that has been achieved.

The pain of separation has been keenly felt. We have no losses to report, save by removals. We have four life-

"ROSEBUD."

Our members are few, but we meet regularly and have much cause for encouragement. We have some quite earnest workers. We have had only one public meeting and sale during the year.

WILLING MISSION CIRCLE.

We have had an increase of five members during the year, and have held fifteen meetings. For a time we held semi-monthly meetings, but lately our meetings have been monthly.

"STARS OF KNIGHT."

(In honor of Miss Knight.)

We have held eleven regular meetings during the year, with an average attendance of ten. We have met fortnightly for a few months, and we find the interest better sustained by meeting oftener.

BARRINGTON BANDS.

We have two Bands, "Mayflower" and "Little Helpers." The former reports nine members, the latter eight.

MUSQUODOBOIT, "MAYFLOWER."

Our little Band is in a flourishing condition. We can report increased efforts and interest in mission work.

"WHAT I CAN."

We have done well during the year. We have raised enough to support a little girl at the Crosby Home, Port Simpson. We have a membership of twenty-two. Average attendance at meetings, fifteen.

"SEED SOWERS."

Although our income is not equal to last year's, yet the amount we have raised means more in every way. We have increased in membership, and are looking for larger results next year.

" HOPEFUL."

We can report success in our work. We meet fortnightly, from house to house, and our meetings have been fairly well attended. Our work seems to be willingly done, which is a great satisfaction. We pray that we may do much better in the coming year.

"OLIVE BRANCH."

We are thankful to report a growing interest in mission work. Our Band has at present a membership of twenty-three. We are looking trustingly forward, hoping to do good work in the Master's cause.

"GLEANERS."

The "Gleaners" have gathered Sunday-school papers to send to different mission stations, and in December dressed several dolls which were forwarded to Miss Hart for the Christmas tree at the Crosby Home. At the fortnightly meetings happy hours have been spent by the girls and boys in listening to missionary news, making scrap books, singing, etc. The "Gleaners" trust that their share of the work will be faithfully done.

"WILLING WORKERS."

We organized December 27th, 1890, with eighteen members; increased since to thirty-one. We have held eight monthly meetings, and showing our increased interest, we now meet fortnightly.

"WESLEY CENTENNIAL."

Our Band was organized July 13th by Mrs. (Rev.) Gee. At our first meeting, held in August, we had thirteen members; since that we have enrolled ten new names.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF NEW BRUNSWICK AND P. E. I. BRANCH, 1890-91.

In so confined a limit as ours it is a matter of much thankfulness that we are able to report any advance. There is no possibility of greatly enlarging our borders. Some of the few circuits yet to be entered require time for the process of evolution, and while to the others our Society will, doubtless, bring a blessing, they can at any time be but a tiny financial gain to us.

The work remaining to be done among the uninterested can only be accomplished by patient, persistent and consecrated effort. What seems the greatest need of this hour is a deepened sense of individual responsibility among those already enrolled. If our Branch could be raised to the royal standard where everybody would obey Christ's last command, we would do very very much more. If we could even now follow the example of our banner circuit, a country circuit whose total church membership is two hundred and twenty-nine. It has two Auxiliaries and four Mission Bands, uses fifty-eight miteboxes, reads seventy eight Outlooks, studies sixty-one reports, and had this year five life members. Why this success? Of course the great power is unseen, but it is largely due to the work of a frail hand and the faith of an invalid woman. When our women to whom God has entrusted that other talent of health shall have learned her secret and His, "The secret of the Lord is with them that fear Him," I shall come back and bring you the report the Master needs, expects and wants from our little Branch by the sea.

Our Bands have done nobly. We are indebted to them for the largest increase both in membership and funds.

Nothing seems to speak so loudly to us of the real presence in the home Societies as the obedience of our young women to His call. Miss Robertson's going from us to the Japan field has taken a quiet, earnest worker from the home field, and a devoted daughter from a widowed mother. We can but hope

the benediction of this sacrifice may rest upon our entire Branch.

Nine new Auxiliaries have been added: Port Elgin, Jolicure, Waterville, West Cape, Cherry Valley, Passekeag, Union, Northampton and North Wiltshire. Our membership is small, but we are expecting additions at our next meeting, and hope for a more prosperous year than the last.

MARGATE,

Our Society is in good order, and though we have not made any great advance, we are thankful for the past and take courage for the future.

MONCTON.

The early part of the year seemed full of promise for our Auxiliary, larger attendance and more interest; but through illness and other causes our meetings have not been so well attended. We have four new members.

MOUNT HERBERT.

REPORTS FROM MISSION BANDS, NEW BRUNSWICK AND P. E. ISLAND BRANCH.

ALBERTON, P.E.I., "RILL AND RIVER."

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BRITISH COLUMBIA BRANCH.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE BRITISH COLUMBIA BRANCH.

In presenting our first report, we, the sisters of this Western Province, wish to join hands with our Eastern sisters in uniting our efforts with theirs in the cause of Christian missions. Our Branch was organized by Miss Cartmell, May 22nd and 23rd. To those acquainted with that lady's untiring zeal and energy, it will not be surprising to know that we organized with nine Auxiliaries, since which one more has been added, viz., at Vancouver, in connection with the Princess Street Church.

It will readily be seen that our numbers are increasing. Those of our sisters living in the more thickly populated districts of the East can hardly over-estimate the amount of devotion to the Master's service that is required from the members of Auxiliaries in the country districts to keep up an interest in the meetings; but love for His service, and "not willing that any should perish," surmounts all difficulties. Our Auxiliaries are all in a healthy, active state, and are, we believe, being drawn closer together by means of this Branch, which, although much has not been done yet in the way of organizing new Auxiliaries, still, good has been done in uniting us more closely and making common cause for the advancement of Christ's kingdom.

Doubtless Port Simpson and Chilliwhack will send special reports in connection with the Homes, but, as we have had the privilege of visiting the Coqualeetza Home on two occasions, it seems a fitting opportunity to testify of the good results which must inevitably accrue to the children from the training which they receive, not only from their teachers, but Mr. and Mrs. Tate. A period of ten months elapsed between our first and second visits, and the progress and development of the children in that time was so striking that we felt that these same children to day receiving instruction at the hands of Christian teachers would, in the near future, go amongst their own people pointing out to them the way of salvation. Dr. Hart's visit to Victoria (en route for China) has been productive in the formation of a medical missionary class.

REPORTS FROM AUXILIARIES, BRITISH COLUMBIA BRANCH.

VICTORIA, B.C., PANDORA AVENUE.

In sending this, the fourth annual report of our Auxiliary, we are pleased to be able to note an increase of one life-member, twelve annual members, and the receipts more than doubled. The Mission Band has not sent in any receipts this year, nor any report. There is room for improvement in that department in the coming year.

CHILLIWHACK.

We have lost three of our members by removal, and two others by transfer, but have gained three new members. The distance between the homes, and the difficulty of access, cause our monthly meetings to be not very well attended. The public meeting on the camp ground has become an established event. We are rejoiced to report an increase in our finances of \$32.50.

CHILLIWHACK MISSION BAND.

In the Mission Band there were eighty cents distributed, giving ten cents each to eight of the members to use as talent-money during the year. The mite-boxes were called in, and a pleasant evening was spent by the members of the Mission Band and the Auxiliary in the Coqualectza Home, the 19th of August. Those of the Mission Band contained \$6.60, of the Auxiliary members, \$22.70.

NEW WESTMINSTER, B.C., LADY AH HAK.

This Auxiliary was organized July 21st, 1890, by Mrs. C. M. Tait, of Chilliwhack, so has been in existence a little over a year. On the day of organization we had with us Lady Hak, of China, on her way home from England, and accompanied by a young English missionary, Miss Mead. Lady Hak spoke to the ladies present, and so won their hearts by her gentleness, as well as intelligence, that they resolved to call their new Auxiliary by her name—the Lady Hok Auxiliary. Members have been gradually increasing, one or two at a meeting, till we now have nineteen. During the year we have had three public meetings—one each quarter—at which a collection was taken each time; the first meeting, in July, we raised \$14.95; the second, Professor Odlum, of Vancouver, lectured for us, by which \$14.35 was added to the treasury; then Dr. Sutherland lectured May 13th, collection \$17.60.

VANCOUVER.

We organized on the 25th July, 1890; have held three very interesting public meetings, at which we collected \$25.10; have held twelve monthly meetings, having an average attendance of eight. Our membership has increased to twenty-six, with one life-member and one honorary member. We are very much encouraged by the interest manifested in the work and the meetings held. The interest has grown so much that it was thought advisable to form another Auxiliary at the east end of the city.

PORT SIMPSON, B.C.

Our little Band of Workers formed themselves into an Auxiliary of the Woman's Missionary Society last November. We had only four members to begin with, but our numbers soon increased; but as many of our members live on other missions, some have not even been able to attend our meetings, which have been seasons of blessings to all who have had that privilege. We can only report two quarters, having formed the end of the first quarter, and during the summer months have been so scattered that no meetings have been held. But our interest in this work has not abated, and next quarter we hope to show by our income that we have not slighted this work during the summer months.

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RICHMOND, B.C.

This Auxiliary was re-organized in November, last year, and has kept up the monthly meetings, though the attendance is small in consequence of members being so scattered. We find the *Leaflets* very interesting, and distribute to those who are not members. We introduced the mite-boxes last quarter, and realized a little from that source.

MAPLE BAY, B.C.

Our Auxiliary was organized by Miss Cartmell, December 28th, 1890, with a membership of twelve; we have had two names since. We meet on the second Tuesday of every month—the meetings are both interesting and profitable. We are glad of the privilege of helping on the good cause, and wish we were able to do more. The monthly letters are very much appreciated. Most of the members subscribe to the Outlook. May God bless our efforts, and help us to cultivate the true missionary spirit.

GORGE CHURCH, B.C.

SEPARATE AUXILIARIES.

ST. JOHN'S EAST AUXILIARY, NEWFOUNDLAND.

It is with feelings of sincere gratitude to our heavenly Father that we present this our seventh annual report, with an increase in membership, as also in attendance and interest. Many of the members are waking up to the fact that we must work "while it is day." At the commencement of the year we had four life-members, but death has crept into our midst and called away two of them, little children of Mrs. W. F. Burns, two lilies transferred from the Church militant to the Church triumphant.

The Outlook is ordered through our Society, and renewed interest is manifested in our general work. We earnestly pray the members may be still more devout in the mission cause, and that wherever Auxiliaries exist the divine blessing may be abundantly bestowed, and humbly hope that the coming year may be fraught with more zeal and devout endeavor to further His cause, whose we are and whom we serve.

ST. JOHN'S WEST, NEWFOUNDLAND.

We are thankful to Almighty God for His boundless mercies through another year, that He has permitted us to come together again. Death has been very busy in our midst; we are sorry to report the death of one member, Mrs. Smith, who always took a lively interest in our Society, both by her presence and her means. Other members have been called to pass through deep afflictions in their families, still we are thankful for the interest manifested by the members during the past year; we thank God and take courage. Average attendance, sixteen; members, thirty-eight. Three members have withdrawn. Fifty dollars were raised for education of our Japanese girl. We trust the year we are just entering upon may be marked with greater zeal and love for the spreading of the glorious truth through the wide world, and that each member may feel more deeply the great responsibility of doing 1 in her power, by her prayers, means, and attendance at monthly meetings.

BONAVISTA, NEWFOUNDLAND.

This Auxiliary was organized on August 17th, by Mrs. J. E. P. Peters. We started with a membership of six; three have since been added, and we hope for a large increase soon. Officers were elected as follows:—President, Mrs. (Rev.) J. Nurse; 1st Vice-President, Miss K. Rowe; 2nd Vice-President, Miss M. Templeman; Recording Secretary, Mrs. R. E. Forbes. We hope that this "new departure" in our midst will be the means of awakening a greater interest in missionary work in general, and be productive of great good to the Woman's Missionary Society in particular.

GRACE CHURCH, WINNIPEG.

Our growth has been steady, although not as rapid as we could have wished. The average attendance at monthly meetings has increased, and there is greater interest taken in the work. A visit from Mrs. Kerr, of Toronto, whose daughter is our efficient President, was a great inspiration to us. We have two new life-members. Our Secretary has written several letters to towns in this province and the Northwest Territories, for the purpose of organizing Auxiliaries of the Woman's Missionary Society in the different churches. A personal visit by our Treasurer, Mrs. Roberts, was also made, with the result that two new Auxiliaries have been formed at Brandon and Regina, and a missionary prayer-meeting established at Moosejaw.

ZION CHURCH, WINNIPEG.

We find our song has to be of praise and rejoicing that our heavenly Father has enabled us to do a little during the year on behalf of our sisters who are not as highly favored as we are. On reviewing the work, we find it to be progressing. There is an increase in members and in funds. Notwithstanding many drawbacks, our monthly meetings have been held regularly; often of a very interesting character, when an earnest desire has been manifested to do more for the Woman's Missionary Society. Interesting papers have been written and read on the prayer topic for the month. Once in six months, we have a Woman's Missionary prayer-meeting, when our pastor gives up the Wednesday evening meeting for the members of our committee, some of whom prepare very interesting papers on mission work, and earnest prayers are offered up for the toilers and their different charges. Last March, a Mission Band was formed in connection with our Auxiliary. The young people have taken the name of "Onward." They number twenty four, with an average attendance of eighteen; have met every week, except during the holidays; have been working heartily, and hope soon to hold their first social. We think they deserve great encouragement. We are now considering the desirability of forming ourselves into an organizing Auxiliary, to work up some of the towns near here.

BRANDON.

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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Woman's Missionary Society

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THE METHODIST CHURCH.

ART. I.—NAME.

This Association shall be called "THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH."

ART. II.—OBJECT.

The object of this Society shall be to engage the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to aid in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers in connection with mission work, in foreign and home fields; and to raise funds for the work of the Society.

ART. III.—MEMBERSHIP.

The payment of one dollar annually, either at one time or in instalments, shall constitute membership; and twenty-five dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a life membership.

ART. IV.—ORGANIZATION.

The organization of this Society shall consist of a Board of Managers, co-ordinate Branches, Auxiliary Societies, and Mission Bands, to be constituted and limited as laid down in subsequent articles.

ART. V.-BOARD OF MANAGERS.

SECTION 1.—The management and general administration of the affairs of the Society shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of the Officers of the Society, the Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, the editor of department in *Outlook*, and delegates from each Branch in the proportion of one to every four hundred members, or major fraction thereof, which delegates, together with two alternates, shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meetings, said meetings to be held within two months before the meeting of the Board of

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Managers. Said Board shall meet annually or oftener, at such time and place as it shall annually determine.

SEC. 2.—The Officers of the Board of Managers shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting of the Board, and also the President of each Branch, who is by virtue of her office a Vice-President of the Board of Managers. Any vacancies occurring during the year shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SEC. 3.—The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee; she shall sign all drafts and orders on the Treasurer, authorized by the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee; she shall call special meetings of the Executive Committee at the request of three of its members, of which not less than ten days' notice shall be given, except in cases of emergency. She is ex officio a member of all standing committees. The Vice-President shall perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer. The Recording Secretary shall notify all meetings of the Board, and its Executive Committee, and shall keep a full record of the proceedings. The Corresponding Secretary shall conduct the correspondence of the Society with our missionaries and the different Branches; she shall prepare the monthly letters for publication, and the report of the work during the year for presentation to the Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Society, keeping proper books of account, and shall make such disposition of the funds as the Board of Managers and its Executive Committee may direct, each order of the Board and its Executive Committee being duly signed by the President of the Society; and she shall present an audited statement to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4.—To transact business during the year, the Officers of the Board of Managers, with the Corresponding Secretary of each Branch, shall ex officio form an Executive Committee, five of whom shall

SEC 5.—The duties of the Board of Managers shall be: (1) To take into consideration the interests and demands of the entire work of the Society, as presented in the reports of the Branch Corresponding Secretaries, the reports of the agents employed by the Society, and the estimates of the needs of mission fields; to ascertain the financial condition of the Society, to appropriate its funds, to devise the means for the carrying forward of the work to be undertaken by each; suggesting the amount to be raised, employing suitable missionaries, as the work may require, and designating their fields of labor. (2) To appoint a committee to arrange for the publication of an Annual Report of the work of the Society. (3) To transact any other business that the interests of the Society may demand, provided all the plans and the directions of the Board shall be in harmony with the provisions of the Constitution.

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ART. VI.—BRANCHES.

SECTION 1.—Branches may be organized according to Conferences. This plan, however, may be changed by an affirmative vote of threefourths of the Board of Managers present at any Annual Meeting of the same.

SEC. 2.—The officers of each Branch of the Society shall consist of a President, three or more Vice-Presidents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Mission Band Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, and an Auditor, who shall be elected at the Branch Annual Meeting, and shall continue in office till others are elected. These, with the exception of Auditor, shall constitute an executive committee for the administration of the affairs of the Branch, five of whom shall be

a quorum.

SEC. 3.—The President or one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings of the Branch and of its Executive Committee. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid. The Recording Secretary shall notify all the meetings of the Branch, and of its Executive Committee, and shall keep a full record of the The Corresponding Secretary shall, under the direction proceedings. of the Executive Committee, conduct any official correspondence with the other Branches, with its Auxiliaries, hereinafter mentioned, and with the Secretary of the Board of Managers, and shall endeavor, by all practicable means, to form Auxiliary Societies within the prescribed territory of the Branch. It shall also be her duty to prepare for the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers a report of the work of the Branch during the year, for publication in their Annual The Treasurer shall receive all contributions to the Branch, keeping proper books of account, and shall forward the money quarterly to the Treasurer of the Board of Managers.

SEC. 4.—The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the President and Secretary as often as may be necessary, to transact any business that may arise between the annual sessions of the Board.

SEC. 5.—No Branch shall project new work, or undertake the support of new missionaries, except by the direction or with the approval of the Board of Managers.

Sec. 6.—Each Branch may make its own by-laws, regulating its own meetings and those of its Executive Committee, also any others which may be deemed necessary to its efficiency, not inconsistent with this Constitution.

ART. VII.—AUXILIARY SOCIETIES.

Any number of women contributing at least one dollar each annually may form a Society auxiliary to that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society within whose prescribed limits they may reside, by appointing a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, and a Treasurer, who together shall constitute a local Executive Committee.

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ART. VIII.—RELATION TO THE MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

SECTION 1.—This Society shall work in harmony with the authorities of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, and be subject to their approval, in the employment and remuneration of missionaries or other agents, the designation of fields of labor, and in the general plans and designs of the work.

Sec. 2 -All missionaries or other agents supported or aided by this Society shall be approved, before appointment, by the constituted authorities of the Methodist Church, and shall be subject to the same rules and regulations as other missionaries or agents of the said

Church. ART. IX.—CHANGE OF CONSTITUTION.

This Constitution may be changed at any Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers by a two-thirds vote of each Branch delegation, notice of such amendment having been given to each Branch before its Annual Meeting; but Art. VIII. shall not be changed, except with the concurrence of the General Board of Missions of the Methodist Church.

By-Laws.

1. The Corresponding Secretary of each Branch shall be required to furnish in her report, in schedule form, to the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers, the following items:-

2. Each Branch Treasurer shall furnish the Corresponding Secretary an annual report, in schedule form, of moneys received by her quarterly, and the sources of income.

3. The General Treasurer shall publish each quarter, in the Outlook, the moneys received by her.

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5. Certificates of Membership may be granted to members of any Auxiliary who may be changing their place of residence, which shall constitute them members of the Auxiliary in the place to which they

remove.

6. It shall be the duty of the Editress of the Woman's Missionary Society Department of the "Outlook" to publish articles relating to our own work; and also to select and publish items of interest concerning the work and modes of working of the Woman's Missionary Societies of other denominations.

7. All solicitations for funds for Special objects, excepting those legitimately belonging to the Supply Committee, before being introduced to the notice of our members, through any agency of this Society, shall be referred to and receive the approval of the proper authorities,

namely, this Board or its Executive.

8. Any Branch may arrange for representation, by proxy, from the Branch within whose limits the Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers may, from time to time, be held.

9. All memorials and resolutions forwarded to the Board of

Managers of this Society shall be officially signed and dated.

10. Relating to Japan.—If any money be not required for the object for which it was appropriated, it may be used for any other purpose which the Council may recommend and the Executive approve; and any surplus funds from native sources may be used under the direction of the Council.

RESOLUTIONS PASSED AT ANNUAL MEETINGS.

1883. Resolved,—That all expenses of the Annual Meetings of the Board, and of meetings of the Executive, including travelling

expenses, shall be paid from the General Fund.

1884. Resolved,—That printed (or prepared) forms be issued by the General Board to all homes, refuges, schools, etc., supported by the Woman's Missionary Society, in order that proper returns may be made of the number, names, days' stay, age, sex, etc., of inmates, sources of income, and expenditure of the same, in detail, so that the cost of such institutions may be ascertained in order to have a basis on which grants may be made from the aforesaid Society to support such institutions, and that such reports be sent to the Corresponding

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1885. Resolved,—That the Annual Meeting be held in the third week of October, leaving power with the President and Corresponding Secretary to postpone to the fourth, if necessary.

Resolved,—That the Secretary of each Branch shall furnish a condensed account of their Annual Meetings, to be published in the Report.

Resolved,—That the members be requested to remember this Society in prayer, between the hours of five and six each Sabbath.

1886. Resolved,—That each institution under the care of this Society be requested to furnish quarterly reports.

1887. Resolved,—That the Auxiliaries and Mission Bands be requested to confine their efforts in mission work to the objects named by our Society at the last preceding Annual Meeting of the Board of Managers.

Resolved,—That, in order to equalize the distribution of supplies to missions, a Supply Committee be appointed, with whom missionaries wishing for goods, and Auxiliaries desiring to supply the same, shall be requested to communicate; and that the Auxiliaries shall be credited with the goods sent, but in no case shall the funds of the Auxiliary be used for the purchase of material or the payment of freight.

1888. Resolved,—That the names of life-members shall be printed with the Auxiliaries where they reside.

Resolved,—That in the election of delegates to the Branches and General Board, a majority vote be required.

1889. Resolved,—That when any change of Constitution is requested, notice of such change shall be published in the Guardian, Wesleyan and Outlook, not later than the middle of September preceding the Annual Meeting, and that this be considered sufficient notice to the Branches.

Resolved,—That members contributing over \$1.00 have the amount entered opposite their names.

Resolved,—That reports of Auxiliaries be limited to five lines.

1890. Resolved,—That the last Wednesday in September be observed throughout our entire membership as a day of special prayer for God's blessing on the approaching Annual Branch and Board Meetings.

Resolved,—That the names of life-members of Mission Bands be printed in the Annual Report.

Resolved,—That auditors be appointed to the Board of Managers and Auxiliaries.

Resolved,—That the authorized expenses of delegates to Board meeting include railway fare and all additional necessary expenses, such as berth in sleeping car or hotel bill, whenever it is necessary to spend a night on the way.

Whereas, believing the earlier publishing of our report will be more helpful to our work, therefore be it *Resolved*,—That the committee be instructed to engage the Book Room to publish our report in the month of November of each year; and that all matter for the report, except the minutes of the Board meeting, shall be handed to the committee not later than the last day of the Board meeting.

Resolved,—That the names of, and amounts given by contributors to special purposes, be printed in a separate column or columns of the Annual Report.

Resolved,—That the General Board make appropriations for all their work, and that no special appeals be made to our Auxiliaries, but that all our funds pass through the hands of Branch and Board Treasurers.

Resolved,—That each Auxiliary be responsible for the number of letters sent; the method of payment to be left to the Auxiliary.

Resolved,—That each Auxiliary inform the Corresponding Secretary of the Branch of the number of monthly letters required by it for the year.

Resolved,—That the salaries of those ladies who return to the work in Japan after the first full term of five years, be increased to seven hundred dollars for each of the first five years of the second term, and eight hundred dollars for each succeeding year.

CONSTITUTION FOR AN AUXILIARY.

ART. I.—NAME.

ART. II.—OBJECT.

Its object shall be to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church in its work of engaging the efforts of Christian women in the evangelization of heathen women and children; to assist in sustaining female missionaries and teachers, or other special laborers, in foreign or home fields; and to raise funds for the work of this Society.

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ART. III.—MEMBERSHIP.

Any person paying annually the sum of One Dollar, at one time or in instalments, to the funds of this Society, shall be deemed a member, and as such shall be entitled to be present at the Annual Meeting of the Society, and vote at the election of Officers. Twenty-five Dollars given by one person at one time, or in instalments during the year, shall constitute a Life-membership.

ART. IV.—OFFICERS.

The Officers shall consist of a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Treasurer, to be elected from among the members, at the Annual Meeting.

ART. V.—COMMITTEE.

A Committee of —— ladies shall be appointed annually, who with the Officers, shall constitute an Executive Committee, who shall conduct the affairs of the Auxiliary during the year.

ART. VI.—ANNUAL MEETING.

An Annual Meeting shall be held in the month of September, at which the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer shall be presented, an abstract of which is to be forwarded immediately to the Secretary of that Branch of the Woman's Missionary Society to which the Auxiliary belongs; Officers, *Auditor* and Committee elected for the ensuing year, and such services held as may tend to promote the objects of the Society.

ART. VII.—FUNDS.

The funds of this Society shall be derived from membership fees, the proceeds of missionary socials, sewing circles, or the like, and from voluntary donations by friends.

ART. VIII.—APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS.

After meeting necessary local expenses, the funds raised by the Auxiliary shall be transmitted quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, to be applied to the support of such part of the work as the Central Board of Management may indicate.

Note.—Any Auxiliary having a preference for any special department of the work is at liberty to designate it.

By-Laws for Auxiliaries.

1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings of the Society, and to supervise its general interests. She shall call special meetings upon the request of three members, and shall be ex officio a member of all Standing Committees. She shall sign all drafts upon the treasury before they are paid.

2. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Presidents to perform the duties of the President in the absence of that officer, and to aid in devising means for the efficiency of the Society.

3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a fair record of the proceedings at all meetings of the Society or Committee, and give proper

notice of all special and stated meetings.

4. It shall be the duty of the Corresponding Secretary to report quarterly to the Corresponding Secretary of the Branch the amount sent to the Branch Treasurer for the quarter, and any other items indicating the state of the Society. She shall, in connection with the Recording Secretary, prepare the Annual Report.

5. The Treasurer shall receive, hold and keep an account of all money given to the Auxiliary, and shall transmit the same quarterly to the Branch Treasurer, not later than the 20th of the month.

6. Meetings of the Society for prayer and business shall be held——of each month. Once a quarter, if practicable, a public meeting shall be held, in which reports shall be read, addresses given, and every effort made to increase general missionary intelligence and zeal, as well as earnestness in the special work of the Society.

7. There shall be a Standing Committee of three or more to provide literary exercises of a missionary character for monthly and quarterly meetings, one of whom shall drop out each month, and

another be elected to take her place.

8. If an office becomes vacant by death, resignation, or removal, it must be filled by the appointment of the Executive Committee,

until the next Annual Meeting.

9. Each lady connected with this Society shall try to induce others to become members, and shall do what she can to add to the general interest, remembering in prayer daily the Society, its workers, missionaries, orphans, or other special interest.

10. At the Annual Meeting of each Auxiliary in September, or such other meeting as may be most convenient, delegates to the Branch Annual Meeting shall be elected in the proportion of one for every Auxiliary numbering under fifty, and two for every Auxiliary numbering fifty or more.

11. A lady shall be appointed in each Auxiliary to obtain sub-

scribers for the Outlook.

ORDER OF BUSINESS FOR MONTHLY MEETINGS.

1. Reading the subject of prayer for the month.

2. Devotional Exercises.

3. Reading and Approval of Minutes.

4. Report of Treasurer in writing.

5. Report of Corresponding Secretary.

6. Reports from members of what they have done for the good of the Society during the past month.

7. Unfinished Business and Enrolment of New Members.

8. Miscellaneous Business.

9. Adjournment.

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MISSION BANDS.

1. An Association of young people, banded together to aid the Woman's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church, shall be called a Mission Band Auxiliary to the Missionary Society of the Church in which it is found, or to the Branch in whose territory it is.

2. The object of Mission Bands shall be, primarily, to develop a missionary spirit, and secondarily, to raise funds to send the Gospel to

the heathen.

3. Any one may become a member of the Mission Band by the annual payment of twenty-five cents, and may become a life-member thereof by the payment of five dollars.

4. The Officers of a Mission Band shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and a Committee to arrange the best methods

of work; these and an Auditor shall be elected annually.

5. The duty of the President shall be to preside at all stated meet-

ings, and to have a general oversight of the work of the Band

6. The duty of the Secretary shall be to keep a record of the proceedings of the Band, and make an annual report to the Missionary Society to which it is Auxiliary, or to the Branch in whose bounds it is.

7. The Treasurer shall receive and hold all funds, paying the same annually to the Treasurer of the Auxiliary or the Branch in which

the Band is formed.

8. Each Mission Band must select an appropriate name not already in use, and report the same to the Society to which its money is sent.

9. Any Mission Band numbering forty members or over shall be entitled to send one *delegate* to the Branch Annual Meeting, but she shall not be eligible to any office in the Branch, or election to the Board of Managers, except she be a member of an Auxiliary.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MISSIONARY CANDIDATES.

1. A missionary candidate must believe herself divinely called to the work of a foreign missionary, and assert her belief that she is actuated only by a desire to work in accordance with God's will.

2. She must here indicate her ability to work in a foreign field by

Christian usefulness at home.

3. She must declare her intention to make foreign missionary work the service of her effective years, and agree to give at least five of these years of continuous service, as a single woman, to the work

of the Woman's Missionary Society, unless prevented by ill health; she must also assert her willingness to labor in any field, though her preference is always to be taken into account.

4. She must furnish satisfactory testimonials in regard to scholarship, and we regard some experience in teaching and a knowlege of

medicine and nursing as desirable qualifications.

5. The age of a candidate must not be less than twenty-two years, A thorough intellectual training, with a nor more than thirty. facility in acquiring languages, and a remarkable ability for Christian work, may be considered as a sufficient reason for deviation from this rule.

6. Financial and executive ability, and power of adaptation to

circumstances, are essential qualifications.

7. She must present a certificate of health from a competent physician, and give satisfactory answers to medical questions.

8. Resolved, That every missionary candidate be required to sign

the following contract:-

-, agree to conform to the above requirements and conditions while in the employ of the Woman's Missionary Society, and failing in this, to refund the amount of outfit and passage money.

2nd. After the adoption of a missionary candidate, she shall be regarded as under the direction of the General Executive Committee.

QUESTIONS TO MISSIONARY APPLICANTS.

1. Do you trust that you are inwardly moved by the Holy Ghost to take upon you the work of a foreign missionary?

2. Do you desire and intend to make this your life work, and are

you willing to labor in any field?

3. Have you any experimental knowledge of salvation through the atonement of Jesus Christ our Lord?

4. Have you an earnest desire to win souls for Christ, and how

has this desire been manifest in the past?

5. Do you believe in the doctrines of the Methodist Church, as set forth in the Book of Discipline of said Church?

6. Have you a thorough English education?

7. Have you studied Latin or any modern language; what proficiency have you made, and do you readily acquire the same?

8. In what schools have you taught, and with what success? 9. Have you a knowledge of music, either vocal or instrumental?

10. What is the condition of your health?

11. Have you ever been married? If so, is your husband living?

12. Will you answer by testimonials to each of these questions?

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INSTRUCTIONS TO MISSIONARIES.

They shall incur no expense during the year to be met by this Society for which estimates have not previously been submitted to, and approved by, the Board of Managers at its Annual Meeting, or by its Executive Committee.

They shall credit to the Society all donations received for the support of their work, and annually report the same with their

financial statement.

All solicitations for funds for special work must be made through the proper official authorities, and missionaries are requested not to apply to private sources for aid for support of their work.

A medical missionary shall keep an itemized account of all receipts and disbursements. Such receipts may be used for necessary expenses in the medical work, and any surplus shall be credited to the Woman's Missionary Society.

We recommend that, when practicable, such arrangements shall be made for the duties of our missionaries, during their first year's service, as shall allow them considerable time for the study of the language.
