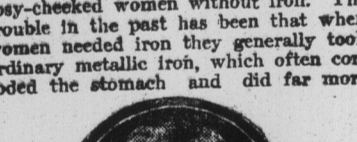

TO BAR ALL ENGLISH FROM SUCCESSION

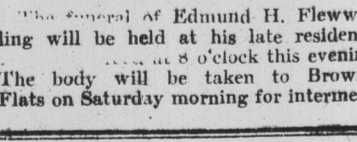
Amsterdam, Mar. 15.—The Berlin Local Assembly says that a government bill was adopted at a joint sitting of the Diets of the Duchies of Coburg and Gotha excluding from the succession to the Ducal throne members of foreign princely houses who now, or in the future, were against Germany. The bill is understood to be aimed at the English relatives of the present Duke. The present ruler of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha, Prince Leopold, is a grandson of Queen Victoria, of Great Britain, and has the British title of Duke of Albany. He is the father of four small children, two of whom are boys, so that the direct line to the throne is not at present in question.

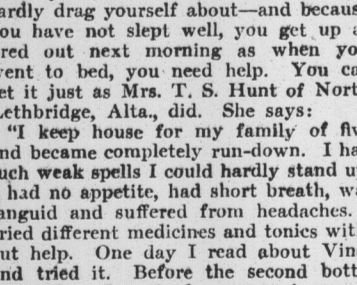

The keel, the stem post, the stern post and the timbers are now in the shipyard at Shelburne (N. S.) for the new Cann line steamer the Keith Cann, to be placed on the Yarmouth-St. John route as soon as she is completed. This was the information given The Telegraph last night by J. E. Hopkins, assistant manager of the Shelburne Shipbuilders Ltd., of Shelburne (N. S.), the same company that turned out the Robert Cann, now on the Mulgrave-Canso route. Mr. Hopkins said that the new ship would be the finest vessel in the fleet. She will be 180 feet long, 25 foot beam, with a draft of 11 feet. She will have a freight carrying capacity of about 1,500 barrels and should be admirably suited to the St. John-Yarmouth route. The builders hope that she will develop a speed of about eleven knots an hour.

A resolution was adopted requesting the dominion board to look into the railroads in Toronto, Montreal and other upper provincial cities collecting the freight from manufacturers, wholesalers, etc., and charging for this on the freight bills, as merchants claim the shippers should pay the cartage.

Adjustment was made without any place being decided upon for the holding of the next convention. This matter was left to the executive.

In yesterday's report of the convention, H. Chevrier, president of the dominion board was quoted as saying: "The minister of trade and commerce does not know what he should do about trade and commerce, because he has had no practical experience. Mr. Chevrier has asked that this be corrected to read, "the minister of trade and labor." There are certain matters under the jurisdiction of the minister of labor which, Mr. Chevrier pointed out, should come under the supervision of the department of trade and commerce. In this way the mistake occurred."

The Czar of Russia Steps Down from the Throne

Parliamentary Party, Backed By Army and People, Now in Control

REVOLUTION WAS ALMOST BLOODLESS

Led by Representatives in the Duma, People Revolted and Provisional Government Was Formed — Good Faith of Former Ruling Party Was Questioned

London, March 15—Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, announced in the house of commons tonight that Emperor Nicholas of Russia had abdicated, and that Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch had been appointed regent. The soldiers sided with the Duma in the recent revolution but there was no serious loss of life.

The chancellor added that it was comforting to know that the movement was not directed at securing peace by Russia, the committee in charge affirming their determination to carry the war to a successful conclusion.

A telegram received by the royal attache of the Russian embassy in Paris reported that the railways and public services in Petrograd had resumed work, said Mr. Bonar Law.

"Only tonight," the chancellor of the exchequer said, "a message has been received from our ambassador to the effect that a statement from the Duma announced that the emperor had abdicated, and that Grand Duke Michael Alexandrovitch has been appointed regent.

"There is some comfort for us in the comparative tranquility with which this change was conducted. There is also real comfort that all the government's information shows that the movement was not, in any sense, directed toward an effort to secure peace by Russia.

"On the contrary, the discontent was not against the government for carrying on the war, but for not carrying it on with that efficiency and energy which the people had expected."

London, March 15, 3:30 p.m.—A successful revolution has taken place in Russia. The reactionary party has been overthrown.

Reports from Petrograd state that the Duma, backed by the army, has successfully overthrown the government completely. The revolution centred in Petrograd and Moscow. Prominent reactionaries, including former Premier Sturmer, and M. Prottopoff, minister of the interior, have been imprisoned, some reports say, murdered. The government is now in the hands of a committee of safety.

The garrison at Petrograd and Moscow went over in a body to the revolutionaries. The revolution was comparatively bloodless. Some fighting took place on the first day, during which bridges in Petrograd were blown up in order to isolate certain sections of the city. Virtually all the so-called pro-German reactionaries are in custody.

The present government.

The government of Petrograd is now in the hands of a committee, consisting of representatives of the Duma, the Zemstvo and municipalities, presided over by President Rodzianko, of the Duma, and the council of the empire in Duma. This body met yesterday (Wednesday), with five cabinet ministers attending, and sent to Emperor Nicholas a request for the establishment of a parliamentary government.

The military in Petrograd is taking orders from the committee, and is patrolling the city, which is quiet. The fighting which occurred was in the barracks, and a number of officers were killed.

The chief of the council of the empire was imprisoned, with M. Sturmer. The people sacked M. Prottopoff's house and

are seeking him. The committee is in control of all government buildings.

News of the revolution reached London too late for the evening papers, but it will not be altogether a surprise to the public. The sudden closing down of the Duma, and the council of the empire in Petrograd, news of which reached London on Sunday, together with news of food riots in the Russian capital, which although according to telegraphic reports were not of a serious nature, caused considerable suspicion here as to how events would progress.

Liberalism vs. Pro-Germanism.

The struggle between the Duma and the reactionary party in Russia has been known to be proceeding with great bitterness for a long time, and repeated changes in the ministerial ranks showed

that matters were far from settled. Little was permitted to appear in the English papers, but from time news percolated from different quarters as to how Liberal Russia was struggling against pro-German influence in the persons of Sturmer, Prottopoff and other high personages. The assassination of Rasputin was another proof as to the lengths the struggle was proceeding, but the ill-appearance of this notorious personage appeared still to leave the German reactionary influences exceedingly strong in the high places.

The Duma was dissolved by imperial order, effective March 11, the imperial issue reading as follows:

"The sittings of the Duma are adjourned owing to the extraordinary circumstances until further notice. They will be resumed not later than April."

On Monday the Duma members, except the Rightists, met in executive session, notwithstanding the dissolution order. The result was a virtually unanimous vote to place the Duma squarely on the side of the revolution, and to authorize the executive council of that body to declare the present government overthrown, and organize a provisional government. President Rodzianko, who presided, sent a telegram to the emperor, informing him of the developments, and asking him to listen to the voice of the people.

The immediate occurrences leading to Monday's developments began at 5 o'clock Sunday evening, when the men of the Volynsky regiment shot their

been swept out of office. One minister, Alexander Prottopoff, head of the interior department, is reported to have been killed, and three other ministers, as well as the president of the Imperial Council, are under arrest.

A new national cabinet is announced, with Prince Lvoff as president of the council and premier, and the other offices held by the men who are close to the Russian people.

INCREASED HARBOR BUSINESS SETS NEW RECORD FOR PORT.

The official statement issued by the C.P.R. regarding the trans-Atlantic business handled at this port so far this season shows a great increase in both imports and exports. Since the beginning of December to the end of February, the imports have totalled 53,280 tons, an increase of 15,264. During the same period, the exports have reached a total of 618,187 tons, an increase of 103,886 over the corresponding period of last season. This represents a greater volume of business than ever before has passed through the port.

The New War Minister

London, March 15—Admiral Lacaze, minister of marine in the French cabinet, was today appointed minister of war, pro tem, according to a despatch from Paris to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

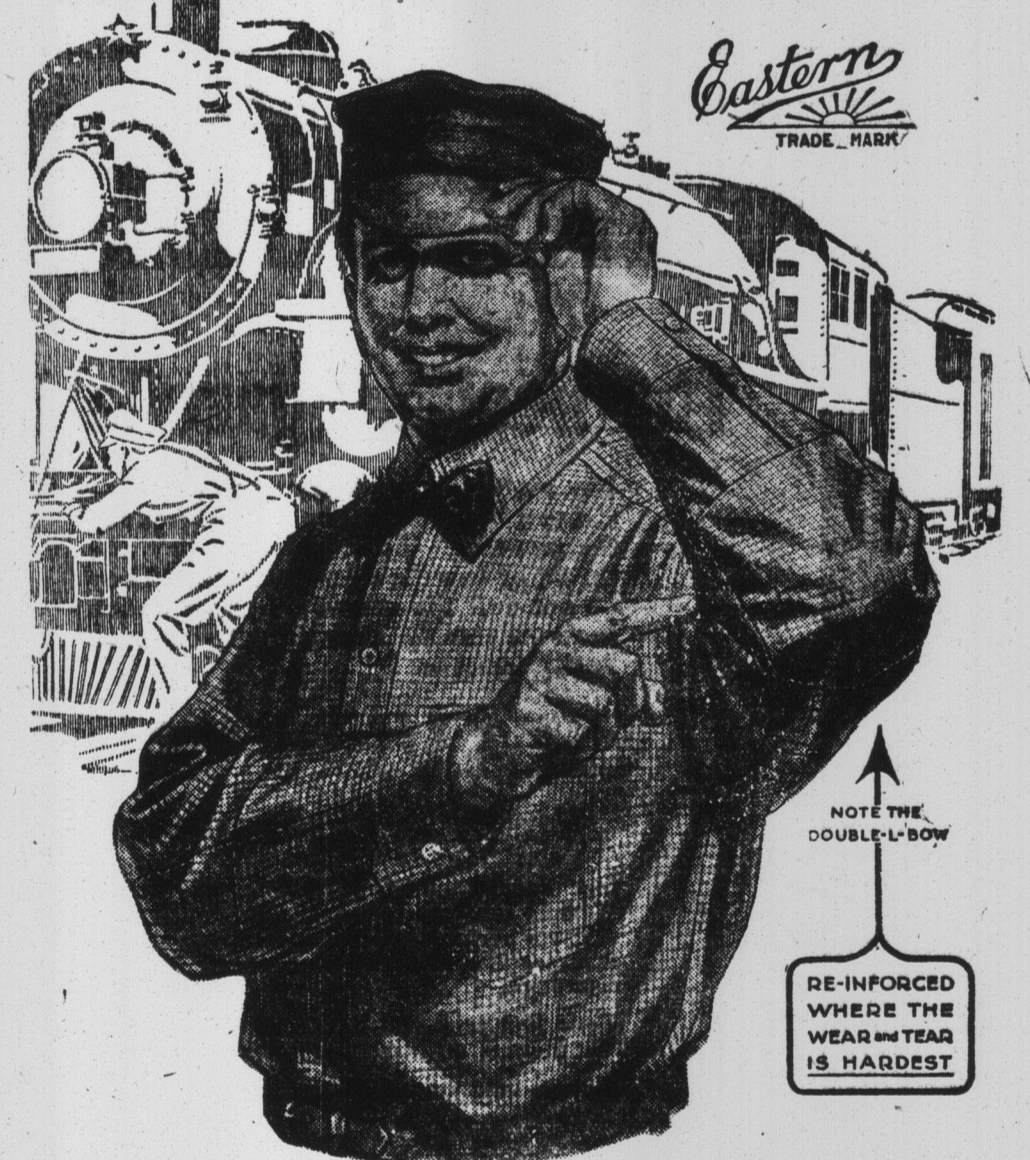
Admiral Lacaze succeeds General Louis Lyautey, who last night tendered his resignation to Premier Briand.

GENERAL STRIKE ON U. S. RAILWAYS IS CALLED FOR SATURDAY NIGHT

New York, March 15—Representatives of the four railroad brotherhoods announced at 6:45 o'clock, after rejecting a counter-proposition made by the railroad, that a general railroad strike would begin at 6 o'clock Saturday night.

The brotherhoods presented to the conference of railroad managers a demand that the provisions of the Adamson law be put into effect at once. The railroad declined and submitted a counter-proposition.

The counter-proposition of the railroads was that the entire controversy be submitted to the Goethals eight hour committee. This proposition was rejected by the brotherhoods, and the announcement was made that the strike call would go into effect.

It was semi-officially announced that all freight employes on the New York Central system, Baltimore & Ohio and the Erie would cease work at 6 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

BRITISH CONTINUE STEADY ADVANCE

London, March 15—Another important gain has been made by the British troops between Peronne and Bapaume, according to the official statement issued tonight. Trenches on a front of two and a half miles, running from the south of the St. Pierre-Vaast Wood to the north of the village of Sallisiel have been occupied. South of Arras the Germans entered British trenches.

Reviewing the military situation of the Belgium line even faster than expected, and probably soon will give up entirely the forward slope of Bapaume Ridge and retire to the reverse slope where they are not so exposed to the police.

P. E. I. LEGISLATURE OPENS PLANS PROVISION FOR SOLDIERS

Charlottetown, March 15—The provincial legislature opened today. The speech from the throne foreshadowed legislation having in view organization and preparation for the settlement of unused lands of the province as one means of providing for returned soldiers. Technical education for fishermen is also proposed.

An extended report is to be submitted of the development commission organized one year ago for the development of natural resources and dealing with problems arising out of the war.

Reference was made in the speech to the island's prosperity. "At no period in our history was agriculture so profitable and so intelligently prosecuted," is one of the paragraphs.

POLICE HAVE FULL BAG.

The local police were kept quite busy last night. M. Doucet and Claud LeBlanc were arrested at 11:30 o'clock by Policeman Corcoran, charged with lying and lurking in an alley off Dock street. They could not give a satisfactory explanation as to why they were there. A woman and a fifteen-year-old girl were taken to police headquarters (charged with street walking and an Austrian, Nichol Juvner, was arrested on the strength of a telegram for failing to report to the police at Fredericton. A thirteen-year-old boy was taken in charge on suspicion of stealing a pair of gloves valued at \$7, and two men were arrested for drunkenness. Against both of these men an additional charge was placed. One is charged with using profane language and the other with refusing to move on when ordered to do so by the police.

JUVENILE COURT WORK IN SOUTH

(Jacksonville, Florida, paper)

The following report is given of the number of cases handled during the month of February in the juvenile court of Duval county, before Judge Guthrie and Probation Officer J. C. Lanier:

A total of thirty-eight cases, involving fifty-six children, of which forty-three were delinquents and thirteen dependent.

Of this number thirty-four were white and twenty-two colored; forty-seven males and nine females. The dispositions of the cases were made as follows: Twenty-three on probation, seven to relatives, six to Children's Home Society, five to Florida Industrial School for Boys, four to Army of Rescue and Religion, three to Florida Industrial School

For Girls, two to Boys' Home and two to individuals.

The record shows that a majority of the cases were "first offenders" and most of them placed on probation, or given another "chance." This work the probation officer has to follow up at the same time keeping up with the new cases. Mr. Lanier says that 75 per cent. of those placed on probation make good and never have to be brought back to the court for further order.

The girls' school at Ocala opens today



The officers of the court have worked hard and are largely responsible for the opening of the temporary home for girls, pending the time that the state will supply funds for the building of the permanent home. The opening of this school will mean a great help to the court in one of its biggest problems.


