FIFTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY.

The fifteenth Annual Meeting of the Synod of Montreal was held on Tuesday, 16th June, 1874.

Divine Service was celebrated in the morning in the Cathedral.

Morning Prayer was read by Rev. W. M. Seaborn and Rev. David Lindsay, M.A., Rural Dean of Bedford; the Lessons, by the Rev. J. Fulton, M.A., Rural Dean of Iberville and Rev. I. Constantine, M.A.; the Ante-Communion service, by the Metropolitan and the Dean; the Sermon was preached by Rev. Principal Lobley, M.A.; and the Holy Communion was administered by the Metropolitan, assisted by the Dean, Archdeacon Lonsdell and Canon Baldwin M.A., Rector of the Cathedral.

The lists of the Clergy and of the Lay Delegates were called by the Clerical Secretary.

The Very Reverend the Dean moved, seconded by Rev. J. C. Davidson, that the Rev. J. Empson be Clerical Secretary of this Synod.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. T. SIMPSON, seconded by Mr. Chas. Garth, that Mr. F. Mackenzie be Lay Secretary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hutton, seconded by the Chancellor, that Mr. C. J. Brydges be Treasurer of this Synod.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hutton, seconded by the Chancellor, that Mr. Sanborn and Mr. T. Simpson be the Auditors of the Synod.—Carried.

The Minutes of last session as printed in the "Fourteenth Journal of Synod" were, upon resolution, considered as read, and approved.

The Bishop named, eleven o'clock to-morrow for the election of the Executive Committee and twelve o'clock for the election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod.

It was resolved that the offertory at this morning's service in the Cathedral should be given to the Mission Fund.

The Bishop then named the members of the several standing committees of the Synod. (See pages 479—80)

His Lordship then delivered the following

ADDRESS.

My Reverend Brethren and Brethren of the Laity,—As the time of our annual gathering year by year comes round, I do not feel that the sense of my responsibility grows less. Rather I would say that my anxiety increases, that this Synod may be the blessed means under God of advancing His glory and the well-being of His Church. I am more and more impressed with its value and importance; for if conducted in a wise and Christian spirit, it may be productive of much good; but should that spirit be wanting our meeting together will be not merely useless, but positively hurtful.

May God by His Holy Spirit, fit us all for the work now before us; and may a great spur be thus given to the growth of the Church in this Diocese.

I have to record the removal from among us of two devoted and valued members of our Synod, Stanley Bagg, Esq., and Dr. Smallwood, both ever ready to aid the Church in its works of faith and labours of love.

STATE OF OUR MISSIONS.

The prominent subject which engages our attention, and calls out our anxiety, at the present time, is the state of our Missions. I have no hesitation in saying that the work is prospering. Several parishes are gradually emerging from a state of pupillage and dependence to one of manhood and self-reliance. Two, namely Waterloo and Bedford, have in the past year declared themselves independent of all extraneous aid, and have risen to the higher and more honorable status of Rectories. Some also of the most needy missions have shown a laudable determination to raise the stipends of their pastors, so that now in the majority of cases the clergyman is receiving \$800 per annum, or something close upon that sum. I hope that ere long there will not be one in full orders, whose salary is short of that amount. We have at the present time 10 city churches; and 2 churches and 3 temporary Missions, in the immediate neighborhood of the city. We have also 59 Country Missions, all supplied, and one Mission among the Germans. Further there are 8 Projected Missions, which would at once be occupied, if the

men were forthcoming and the funds for their support. One thing is certain, and that within our reach, that our Annual Mission Income must be forthwith enlarged if we would retain our position as a missionary Church. It is painful to be forced to speak year after year of our work languishing for lack of means. The question with us now is, How may our Mission Fund be at once increased? There is an abundance of money in this wealthy city, and there is no great lack in our country districts. But it lies there like unquarried metal—it needs to be dug up and laid out for the Master's use. Nay more, there are funds at our disposal if we can only reach the willing hearts that are ready to offer them, and if we can but show that they are required for the Lord's service. Our church members need to be aroused to their responsibility. Instead of giving small stated sums and regarding them in the light of a tax levied on them, they should give largely and liberally as God enables them. And instead of regarding the collection for the Missions of the Church as a matter to be thought of when other claims have been satisfied, they should feel that the support of the Church in their Diocese is the first and most pressing duty they have to discharge. I have always felt that there is no lack of willingness among us if we can but effectually call it forth; and that if we can only convince men that the Church needs their increased support, it will be given.

PLAN FOR THE INCREASE OF THE MISSION FUND.

In the valuable Report of the Executive Committee which will presently be submitted to you, you will find an important suggestion proposed for the adoption of the Synod, with a view to a more efficient mode of raising the required Mission Fund. Hitherto the amount has always been inadequate to the Church's wants, and the little that has been raised has been collected with difficulty. This has acted as a sore impediment to the effectual sustentation of our existing mission work, and a damper to its progressive character. The plan proposed by the committee will, I trust, be found to accomplish the desired object; but its success will mainly depend upon the vigorous exertions of the clergy and Church authorities, in carrying it out in their respective parishes. The three leading features in it are, that a large aggregate sum may be obtained by small weekly offerings; that these offerings will be made in the House of God'as a sacred gift to Him; and that the interest and aid of every individual churchman in our various congregations will be enlisted. I long to see the time when, at the close of each year, we shall have a balance in the Church's favor instead of a deficit, and when we shall be in a position to go boldly forward to do the work of the Lord. It seems to me as if there were this fault prevailing among us. Whilst our Church looks with a jealous and watchful eye, as she ought to do, on the consistency and individual piety of her actual members, she loses sight of an important part of her mission as the gatherer in of outsiders. Whilst she carefully tends the flock already within her fold, she is not sufficiently anxious to go after the ninety and nine sheep that have no pasturage but in the wilderness. I confidently repeat what I have often said before, that if our Church claims to be a living Chnrch she must and will be aggressive in her efforts to win

But whilst we speak of our Mission Fund, and how we are crippled from the deficiency of our resources, I would remind you that there may be another deficiency, which is still more sure to check our work. Perhaps we are not looking upwards for God's blessing, forgetting that whilst we sow and water, He, and He alone, can give the increase. We may swell our Church revenue, we may double the number of our Missions, we may strengthen our band of clergy, we may seem to prosper in all directions, but let us ever bear in mind—I am afraid we are apt to lose sight of it—let us ever bear in mind that it is only by the almighty power of God that we can do the real work of Christ, and build up His kingdom.

CONFIRMATIONS.

During the past year I have held thirty-one Confirmations, and admitted five hundred persons to full Church membership. I think the clergy understand that I am ready to visit their parishes, either for Confirmation or for any other purpose, whenever they desire my presence, so that I can do so consistently with other engagements. Our Confirmations are to me increasingly interesting, and I would fain hope increasingly useful. I cannot speak too highly of the pains taken by the clergy and the labour expended, in preparing candidates for this holy rite; and I think they feel with me that of all the ordinances of our Church none is more blest than this for the awakening and nurturing of spiritual life among our congregations. I believe that there are advantages in Confirmation yet to be developed, and that almost all our parochial work may well centre round it, as the definite point from which spiritual good may radiate.

ORDINATIONS.

The number of Ordinations during 1873 has been sadly small. I ordained on Trinity Sunday and at Christmas but two Deacons and three Priests. I hope that I shall never again have to record so scanty an accession to our ministerial ranks. Indeed there is a far brighter prospect in this respect before us.

THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

The Church now possesses in this Diocese a Theological College, which many already admit, and which all will I believe one day admit, to be one of the most useful organizations which have ever been introduced into the Diocese. It was opened for the admission of students in September last, and has, I am thankful to say, succeeded even beyond my expectations. At the close of the last term there were ten students, and some of them were of great promise for future usefulness in the Ministry. I am fortunate in having secured for the important post of Principal a clergyman eminently fitted for the work he has undertaken; and under his wise and able superintendence, a feeling of confidence has been established in the Diocese, and a system of training for Holy Orders has been introduced, which must tell beneficially on the future character and capabilities of our younger clergy. One of the Students was admitted to the Order of Deacons on Trinity

Sunday; and four or five others have been extremely useful in supplying occasional ministrations in places, which would have been otherwise destitute of the means of grace.

HARMONIOUS CONDITION OF THE DIOCESE.

That peace and harmony are at this moment reigning throughout our Diocese is a cause of unspeakable thankfulness. There is, I believe, no single mission or church which is otherwise than in a condition of quietness. And this state of things contrasts most favorably with the excesses, and consequent dissensions, which unhappily are harassing the Mother Churchso much so that the Bishops have felt it necessary to ask Parliament for fresh powers, or rather to give greater facility for carrying into effect the means which already exist, for repressing the spiritual anarchy which now prevails. The Bill proposed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and submitted to Convocation for its approval, was unfortunately open to certain objections, and met with favor from neither side. Still there is a pretty general admission that some legislation is needed. Whilst we lament that such is the case, especially at a time when the Church in England is acquitting herself so nobly in her great warfare, our duty here is clearnamely, to go on faithfully and earnestly with the work before us. Let each one of us adhere all the more closely to the rubrical and other directions of our Church. Let us observe strictly those directions, neither exseeding them on the one hand, nor abridging them on the other. Let those who feel that they have in any one particular overpassed the boundary marked out, immediately draw bank and let those who are conscious of having fallen short of what the Church requires rise at once to the prescribed standard. This is the best and safest advice I can give you; and if it is followed, we shall then be a Diocese at unity with itself; our people will be satisfied, seeing that the Clergy are guided by a uniform rule,' against which there is no appeal; and there will be a harmony in our manner of conducting the public services, which will commend itself to every worshipper. The Church of England gives legitimate latitude as to ritual observances; let us see that it is not overstepped. What we want is as much warmth and earnestness as possible in our public worship, without departing from the simple but elastic character and tone of the Prayer Book.

THE BISHOP'S POSITION IN THE CATHEDRAL.

There is a subject which it is somewhat painful for me to touch upon being partly of a personal nature, but which I feel it due to the Diocese to state thus publicly. I allude to the position which the Bishop holds at the present time in regard to the Cathedral.

According to the Queen's Letters Patent, authorizing the formation of this Diocese, and to the oath submitted to me on my first entrance upon the office which I now hold, it was clearly contemplated that the Bishop should have some status in that which is termed his own Cathedral. What I complain of is this, that the Bishop is at present recognized as little more

than an occasional visitor in the Cathedral Church of his Diocese, having not even a consulting voice as regards the arrangement of the Services. or the selection of the Assistant Minister; and that when he wishes to occupy the pulpit, he must do so merely by sufferance, and as an act of courtesy on the part of the Rector. What I claim is-not that the existing rights of the Rector should be abridged-but that such just and equitable concessions should be made to the Bishop as would place him in a right position in his own Cathedral. A correspondence has taken place on the subject; but I regret to say without success. The consequence is that, so long as the present state of things continues, my presence in the Cathedral cannot be otherwise than most anomalous. I have no wish that more time should be occupied at this Synod by the subject to which I have alluded; but I have felt it right that the Diocese should know thus much, in order that the position of their Bishop in his own Cathedral may be fully understood. Happily, when I look around me, I see no other cause of dissatisfaction : rather I have reason to thank God for His goodness in making me feel that my lines have fallen unto me in pleasant places, and that the goodness and mercy which followed me in my ministerial course tor thirty-three years, have continued with me in my more responsible career as a Bishop.

Before closing my address I must call your special attention to two important matters of routine, which occupy us at each Synod, namely, the usual election by ballot of members to serve on the Executive Committee, and also as delegates to the Provincial Synod. With regard to the former, it is of the greatest importance that such men should be placed upon the Board as will wisely and impartially administer the income of the church, and will have the full confidence of both clergy and laity. With a view of securing this end, a plan will be suggested to you by a Committee appointed at the last Synod, according to which plan it is proposed that a certain number shall always be selected from each of the tour Rural Deaneries. With regard to the other matter, the choice of Delegates to the ensuing Provincial Synod, notice has been given of an arrangement by which the evil which has hitherto existed, and which we all deplore, may possibly be remedied. I earnestly hope that in both cases our election may be made less in the interests of one party or the other. and more in the interests of the Church generally. In the course of the present session a proposal will, I believe, be made that we shall in some way show our interest in the good work which is going on in the sister Diocese of Rupert's Land. I cannot but think that it is our duty to do something to strengthen the hands of our brethren in that country, who are struggling against great difficulties and need our Christian sympathy, remembering, however, that our missionary Diocese of Algoma has, the first claim upon us. We might perhaps be willing to devote an annual collection, that for instance which will be made on the Day of Intercession, to some branch of work in Rupert's Land which is of a purely missionary character. A clergyman from that Diocese, the Rev. J. O'Meara, is now among us, and will give any information that will be asked for.

May He be with you in your discussion of them! And may He Himself so rule all our hearts that the Synod of 1874 may be the signal for new life in our Church, and for more devotedness to Christ our Lord!

The Rev. Mr. O'Meara was invited to take a seat in the body of the House.

The Bishop named Mr. Edward Carter, Q.C., as Church Advocate in accordance with clause 9, article III, Canon of Discipline. He also appointed two o'clock to-morrow for the election of the members of the Diocesan Court of Mont-(Clause 1, Art. III. Canon of Discipline.)

The following Report of the Executive Committee was read by the Clerical Secretary :-

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE TO THE FIFTEENTH SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

The Executive Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal submit to the Synod at its annual session in 1874, the following Report of its operations during the preceding year.

Regular meetings were held on Aug. 13, Nov. 12, and Feb. 11. There were three adjourned meetings, on Sept. 9, May 20, and June 15; and there was one special meeting on June 19. At this last meeting were named the various sub-committees, as printed on pages 368 and 369 of the last Journal of Synod.

The Treasurer reported at each meeting the state of the Mission Fund. At the meeting in August the total Receipts

In consequence of the unsatisfactory state of this Fund a Committee was appointed to mature a plan for the more effectual collection of subscriptions, and the following Report was adopted:—

The Special Committee, to whom was referred the question of the best means of increasing the collections throughout the Diocese, for Missions, beg to make their report, and recommend that the following, if approved by the Executive Committee, be brought forward at the next meeting of Synod for general adoption throughout the Diocese, viz.:—

"The Executive Committee feel it to be their duty earnestly to recommend that a much more persistent and organised effort should be made to collect funds for the support of Missions in the Diocese.

"The grants hitherto made from the S. P. G. are yearly decreasing; the salaries now paid are inadequate, and ought to be increased; the necessity for making new grants for the development of fresh Missions is specially urgent, and cannot be met from want of funds; and further the contributions come in so irregularly that the fund is constantly in arrear.

"It is believed that there is every feeling and desire throughout the members of the Church, to contribute to the extent of their ability; but it is quite certain, that every member is not made to understand the urgent wants of the case; and the consequence is that comparatively few in each congregation contribute.

"In lieu of the present mode of raising contributions, it is suggested that a small weekly contribution from each Church member would speedily raise a sum sufficient to meet all the wants of the Mission Fund, which are now pressing and immediate.

"It is accordingly recommended:-

"1st. That the Mission Fund being the chief means of carrying on the Church work of the Diocese, the duty of contributing to it, should be regarded as of primary importance.

"2nd. That each individual member of the Church shall be personally invited to pledge himself, as to what shall be the amount of his contribution to the Fund.

"3rd. That the sum promised shall be paid either by weekly instalments, which, being enclosed in an envelope, shall be given through the offertory; or by an annual payment in advance.

"4th. That in each Parish or Mission the sum so collected shall be trans-

mitted in quarterly instalments to the Treasurer of the Synod, on or before January, 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1, in each year.

"It is believed that by carrying out this system of collection, every member of the church will have an opportunity of making his offering, according to his means, to the work of God in the Church, and that this will conduce to the proper maintenance of the Mission work of the Diocese."

At the meeting in February the Secretary was instructed to address a circular to the clergy, urging them to make the annual collection of subscriptions to the Mission Fund, immediately, and also stating that the Executive Committee had applications from many new Missions which could not be opened until the income is largely increased.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The Treasurer of this Fund also made a statement at each meeting, shew ing the amount of cash in hand. He has now, deposited in the Savings Department of the Bank of Montreal, \$786.90.

SUPPLEMENTAL GRANTS.

The Committee on Missions were requested to draw up a rule for the carrying out of the resolution adopted at last Synod, in regard to the raising of the salaries of missionaries; and, (the case of the missionary at Milton being under consideration,) they recommended the following rule which was adopted, viz:—"That upon the church-wardens of the Mission of Milton, forwarding to the Treasurer of this Diocese the clergyman's receipt for the amount paid to him on account of the extra allowance of \$100 a year, the Treasurer will pay a similar amount in addition to the regular stipend due to him.

"And that the same rule be adopted in all similar cases."

GRANTS.

The following grants were made:-

\$100 to the Rev. George Allan, for an outfit, on his appointment to the Mission of Bristol.

\$40 to Mr. George Forneret, for services as a catechist for two months in

\$100 to the Rev. F. H. Clayton,—a special grant recommended by the Rural Deanery of Bedford.

\$300 towards the support of a Missionary, to be employed by the Rev. David Lindsay, within the limits of his Parish. Rev. D. Lindsay stated that he would not draw his annual allowance of \$365 from the Clergy Reserve Fund, but allow it to be added to the Mission Fund.

\$300 to the Rev. C. P. Abbott for the ensuing year. This grant was

\$600 to the new Mission of Glen Sutton, for its support for one year; so soon as the funds of the Synod will admit.

\$150 to the Rev. W. M. Seaborn, to enable him to procure assistance in his Mission of Rawdon.

\$150, for one year, to the Mission of Ormstown. This grant was made in May, 1874.

\$100 to Rev. W. Richmond, for an outfit, on his appointment to the Mission of Gore.

MISSIONS IN ARREARS.

The following resolution was adopted:-

"That in the event of the people in any Mission falling into arrears with regard to their promised salary to the Clergyman, the Secretary be empowered to inform them that the grant from the Mission Fund shall be withheld until such arrears shall be paid."

At the meeting in November it was resolved, "That this Committee have heard with deep regret, of the death of the much-esteemed widow of the late Metropolitan, and desire to record their sense of her many admirable qualities, and of their sympathy with the bereaved family in their great loss; and request the Metropolitan to convey this resolution to Mr. Fulford."

At the following meeting the Bishop read a letter of thanks for this resolution of condolence, from F. D. Fulford, Esq.

ABBOTTSFORD AND ROUGEMENT ENDOWMENT FUND.

In reference to the Report of this Committee on the Abbottsford and Rougement Endowment Fund, which was referred back by last Synod, it was resolved, "That in the absence of any further information on the subject, the former Report be confirmed."

ORMSTOWN.

The Rev. W. Hinde applied for a reduction of the assessment on this Parish, and, upon the recommendation of the Committee on Missions, the amount was reduced to \$75 annually.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

A Report from the Committee on the Superannuation Fund was adopted, as follows:—

The Committee on the Superannuation Fund beg to report, that they regret that so long a delay has taken place in carrying out the rule of the Synod.

They feel that the Canon of Synod makes all the arrangements that can be made, until a capital sum can be obtained, and even then each case must be dealt with according to its peculiar circumstances;—sometimes temporary help would be all that would be required; sometimes a Parish would assist in meeting any difficulty for a time, by providing board and lodging for an assistant. A clergyman may be able and anxious to do a certain amount of work, if he could be helped with the rest.

That they have met from time to time since their appointment, and selected such Tracts as appeared suitable to the wants of the Diocese. The Tracts so ordered have been widely distributed by the Clergy, judging by the demand for them; and your Committee now hand over to the Executive Committee Messrs. Dawsons' accounts from August, 1873, to the present date, amounting to \$142.04.

A request having been made by the Clergy of the Deanery of Bedford through the Bishop, that the Depot of the S. P. C. K. be changed from Messrs. Dawson Bros. to the Synod office, and attended to by the Secretary, your Committee consulted with the Secretary, and report that he is willing so far to carry out the recommendation of the Deanery of Bedford, as to accept the oversight of such a depot, provided a boy be employed to aid him in the general work of the office. Your Committee would recommend such a plan as being most suited to meet the general wishes of the Clergy.

REV. SIR.—Your letter of the 6th instant was referred to this office, the lands lying in this Agency, and in reply I have to inform you that,

My books shew lots 26 and 27, in 3rd Range of Bowman standing in the name of Ole Thorison, three instalments paid, two instalments past due. I hold a transfer for them from the purchaser to William Morriss of Buckingham, dated October, 1862. No action can be taken before the arrears are paid and proof of settlement fyled in this office.

Lots 26 and 27, in the 4th Range in the name of John Thorison paid for in full, a transfer from the purchaser to William Morriss of Buckingham made in October, 1862, is in deposit. The Reverend Mr. Kaapcké claims those, having made all the improvements and paid the last three instalments. No action can be taken in his case before fyling a proper transfer from William Morriss or his legal representatives, the registration fees and proof of settlement; otherwise the matter may be adjusted by the Agents report after visiting the lots at the cost of the party interested.

The Endowment Committee beg to report, with reference to the annexed application of the Venerable Archdeacon Lonsdell, of date the 6th Oct. last, on behalf of the Rev. C. J. Kaapcké, as follows:—

The lots in question, according to the Crown Lands Agent's letter of the 14th of February last hereto annexed, all stand in the name of the Rev. William Morriss, at one time Incumbent at Buckingham, and now dead. And, according to this same letter, two instalments remain unpaid to the Crown on lots 26 and 27 in the 3rd Range of Bowman, and that no Patent can issue, either to Mr. Kaapcké or the Synod, without a proper transfer from the legal representatives of Mr. Morriss and due proof of settlement and payment of arrears of purchase money and registration fees.

According to the Archdeacon's letter it would seem that the late Bishop Fulford paid one instalment on the four lots, and Mr. Kaapcké the arrears due on two of the lots. And, according to the Crown Lands Agent's letter, it would appear Mr. Kaapcké claims to have paid the three last instalments on these two lots.

The Committee have failed to ascertain out of what funds Bishop Fulford paid the money referred to in the Archdeacon's letter, or to trace, in any way, the connection, either of the late Church Society, or of this Synod with these lots.

There is, moreover, a total absence of information as to the value of these lots.

In conclusion, the Committee would suggest, that the Archdeacon should ascertain: 1st.—The real value of the lots. 2nd.—The precise amount the Synod would have to pay, in order to obtain a Patent for the lots in the name of the Synod. 3rd.—The possibility of obtaining proof of actual settlement of the lots, and of obtaining a duly executed transfer from the legal representatives of the late Rev. William Morriss.

That a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee during the year, as well as of all recommendations for the year to come, regarding matters under their control, be prepared by said Committee in the month of May of each year, and forthwith printed and forwarded by the Secretary of Synod to the clergy of the Diocese, and to delegates, as their certificates shall be by him received.

OFFICES OF THE ONTARIO AND QUEBEC TEMPERANCE AND PROHIBITORY LEAGUES.

TORONTO AND MONTREAL, 1874.

To the Synod of the Church of England, Diocese of Montreal, in Annual
Session Assembled.

Dear Brethren:—The undersigned as representing the several existing Leagues, united for the common object of suppressing intemperance, beg leave once more to call attention to this most vitally important subject. We are encouraged in this renewed appeal to your sympathies by the recollection of your former kindly reception of addresses from the Ontario and Quebec Leagues. New Brunswick now unites with us in this great moral enterprise, and there are assurances from other Provinces of the speedy formation of similar societies for the legal prohibition of the liquor traffic. For these reasons, and deeply impressed with the vast importance to the religious interests of the Dominion, involved in the success of our efforts, we most respectively solicit a renewal of your co-operative aid; believing as we do, that the final success of the temperance bodies very materially depends on the practical approval of our principles by the united Christian Churches.

We take the liberty of stating that the past year's labors of the societies we represent, have been followed with remarkable success in many respects. The public mind is stirred to the consideration of the evils of intemperance and the proper means to be adopted for their suppression. We believe that for the augmented force of the petition movement we are greatly indebted to the decided action of the several clerical bodies, and therefore as that movement must necessarily be renewed, we again solicit your action in this direction, that the people of the Dominion may be encouraged to persevere in their appeal to Parliament against the enormous evils of the liquor traffic. You having the best interests of the whole population at heart, will discern the signs of the times, and we doubt not will again arise "to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

We have been much gratified with the successful results which have followed the formation of temperance societies in connection with Christian Churches and congregations, and trust they will be continued and multiplied. We are sure that you will cheerfully direct and aid the formation of Juvenile Temperance Societies in connection with Sabbath School work, being convinced of their propriety and utility.

We beg also to suggest, as likely to prove exceedingly beneficial, the adoption of a practice prevailing in Scotland, that of ministers of the several churches, preaching simultaneously on the subject of Temperance on the Sabbath preceding the Annual Meetings of the Leagues. The practice has produced the best results, and we are persuaded that the same course in Canada would be followed with the divine blessing.

It is our prayer that all may be guided to right action in this great effort—"understanding what the will of the Lord is."

In the absence of the Bishop or vacancy of the Diocese the Standing Committee shall be for the time being the chief Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese, and they shall invite the attendance of such Bishop or Bishops from neighbouring Dioceses, as they may deem necessary or expedient to perform Episcopal Functions in the vacant Diocese.

Moved in amendment by Canon Anderson, seconded by Rev. D. Lindsay,

That part of the first clause beginning with the words "that a Standing Committee," and ending with the words "hereafter prescribed," shall be amended as follows:—"That a Standing Committee consisting of the Cathedral Chapter of this Diocese and four laymen, who shall be communicant members of the Church, shall be elected by ballot at the present meeting of Synod for 3 or 5 years, and in a similar manner in future, at the expiration of their period of service, or from any vacancy occurring in their number from death, removal from the Diocese or resignation."

Clause marked number I, in the printed notice of motion, to be amended as follows:—"They shall elect their own Secretary, the very Reverend the Dean shall be the President, and they shall act as a Council of Advice to the Bishop, whenever he may summon them, or require their assistance; and they may also meet of their own accord, and agreeably to their own rules, when called in writing so to do, by not less than three of their number and when they think it necessary to advise the Bishop."

Moved by Rev. I. Constantine, seconded by Mr. T. R. Johnson, That the Synod do adjourn.—Lost.

Rev. Canon Anderson's amendment was then put and lost.

Whereas great and manifold evils and hindrances result to the cause of religion from the many divisions and discords existing among the professed followers of the Blessed Saviour this Synod would hereby give expression to its earnest desire that under the guidance and blessing of the Holy Spirit some suitable measure may be adopted so that representatives of the various religious bodies, especially those among Protestant Christians may meet and consult how they may best advance the blessed cause of union in heart and in church membership.

That whereas it may be deemed beyond the proper jurisdiction of this Diocesan Synod to invite such meeting of the said Representatives, this Synod earnestly commends the object of this motion to the careful consideration of the Provincial Synod of Canada at its next meeting, and hereby agrees through the Rev. the Secretary to present this resolution to the Provincial Synod.—Carried unanimously.

Whereas it is advisable to subdivide the Parish of Montreal in the manner hereinafter mentioned, be it therefore enacted, under the authority vested in the Synod by the Provincial Statute, 35th Victoria, ch. 19, that the said Parish shall be, and the same is, hereby subdivided as follows:—

1.—The Parish of St. Martin's shall consist of all that portion of the Parish of Montreal which is within the following limits, to wit:—On the south-east, Sherbrooke street, on the north-west, the present city limits, on the north-east, St. Lawrence Main street, and on the south-west side, Durocher street, and its continuation, to the present north-west city limits.

2.—The Parish of Montreal shall consist of all such parts and portions of the Parish of Montreal as presently existing, as are not included in the boundaries of the said Parish of St. Martin's.

Mr. BRYDGES moved, seconded by Mr. HUTTON.

1. That the resolution passed at the 13th Synod of this Diocese, with reference to the communication from the Provincial Synod upon the subject of the election of a Metropolitan, be rescinded.

2. That this Synod having duly considered the Canon passed by the Provincial Synod, and sent to this Synod with the expression of a wish that it may meet with their views, regret that they cannot, without further explanation and consultation, concur in the said Canon.

3. That this Synod cannot ignore the existence of the arrangement under which it was understood that the Metropolitical See should be attached to the Bishopric of Montreal, but being most desirous to promote the best interests of the Church throughout the whole of the Ecclesiastical Province, request his Lordship to appoint a Committee to confer with the Provincial Synod at its next Meeting, for the purpose of endeavouring to suggest a satisfactory settlement of the question; such Committee to report to this Synod, at its first Meeting after the sitting of the Provincial Synod.

That the words the "clergyman shall be removed to another sphere of labour at the discretion of the Bishop," shall be substituted for the clause "the grant shall be withdrawn."

The members elected by the Deaneries to be elected not later than five days before the meeting of Synod in each year; such election to be reported forthwith to the Secretary of Synod.—Carried,

Moved by the DEAN, seconded by Rev. J. CARMICHAEL:-

That, in view of the wide-spread evils resulting from the habit of convivial drinking, whereby many otherwise well disposed persons lose their self-control and bring discredit on their christian profession; in view also of the protest raised against these habits by numerous organizations which may or may not be under christian direction, this Synod believes it to be a present duty of the Church to take special action in favour of Temperance, and in opposition to prevailing drinking customs. The Synod therefore respectfully invites all Clergymen to take the lead in abstinence from dangerous customs of hospitality; to press on their flocks the christian duty of self-denial for the sake of the weak and the tempted, and to organize Temperance Societies in connection with their Churches and Schools.

3. The sacrifice which he there offers by the hands of his priest to the Divine Majesty. And also

To make such other alterations as may strengthen and support the doctrines of the Reformation, as set forth in the Articles of the Church of Hugland.

Moved by Rev. Canon Baldwin, seconded by Rev. James Carmichael:

That a Committee be appointed consisting of the Very Rev. the Dean, Venerable Archdeacon Leach, Rev: Canon Anderson with the Mover and Seconder, to prepare and report to this Synod an address to the Archbishop of Canterbury expressive of the strong disapprobation with which this Metropolitical Diocese of Montreal regards the petition from 490 Ministers of the Church of England to the Convocation of Canterbury asking for the appointment of duly qualified confessors, in consequence, as the petitioners assert, of the wide-spread and increasing use of sacramental confession, and asking also for the authorization of several other novelties, all alike foreign to the customs and Protestantism of the Church of England.

The second motion withdrawn on condition that the House would permit the motion of which Mr. T. White gave notice to be proposed.

The rules of order were suspended on motion by Mr. WHITE,

seconded by the CHANCELLOR; and Mr. WHITE then moved, seconded by the DEAN:

That in view of the agitations which are at this time disturbing the Church in this Ecclesiastical Province, the Provincial Synod be respectfully requested to take such steps, as in their opinion, may tend to allay such agitations, and as far as may be, to remove the causes of difference in the Church.

A point of order was raised by Mr. W. B. Simpson and Mr. Carter, that it is beyond the jurisdiction of this House to discuss any question of doctrine.

The Bishop ruled Mr. White's motion in order.

Mr. L. H. Davidson raised another point of order against which his Lordship ruled.

Rev. J. B. Davidson made a motion seconded by Canon Ellegood, but as it had not any reference to Mr. White's motion it was not considered an amendment to it.

A motion for adjournment proposed by Mr. L. H. DAVIDson, seconded by Rev. Percy W. Smith, was carried.

His Lordship then pronounced the benediction and the meeting adjourned till ten o'clock to-morrow.

That this Synod views with regret any movements on the part of any Dioceses of British North America towards centralization, apart from the one General Council of the Church provided by the constitution of the Provincial Synod, and desires to place upon record its earnest anxiety that the Church should present one unbroken point throughout the length and breadth of the land, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and from the jurisdiction of our brethren of the Protestant Episcopal Church to the "utmost bounds" of the north.

The Deanery recommend that some one be appointed by the Synod to carry out the recommendations of the Council appointed last Synod, viz., to sell the Ste. Therese church and . property, and to fence in the burying ground and church at St. Martin.

ENDOWMENTS.

There have been additions to the Endowments in Sorel, Berthier and Rawdon only.

SUSTENTATION.

There has been added to the Sustentation Fund \$22 at Sorel and \$13.50 at Kildare and Brandon.

GENERAL VIEW OF THE DEANERY.

There are clear indications, that the general progress of the Church in the Deanery is satisfactory.

In the City of Montreal, the progress is very marked, besides the work of Christ Church which is not within the Rural Deanery. Trinity has a Mission Service and St. George's has two Mission Services. The new church in St. Urbain Street will be opened in September.

In the country parts—Sorel maintains its position for liberalty, but its church population has fallen, through death and emigration, to about 50 families. The other Parishes and Missions have showed in various ways spiritual life.

VACANCIES.

No Rector has as yet been appointed to St. Johns. The Mission of Brome remains vacant. Glen Sutton and East Farnham, both recommended by the Deanery and with grants made by the Executive Committee, are yet without Missionaries. The Bishop at present has no one to send. The proposed Mission of Opton and St. Hyacinthe has not been carried out. North Stukely with a part of Ely, was particularly considered at the last Deanery Meeting, and requires further consideration. It is most important that all these places should be occupied.

MISSION FUND.

The amount proposed by the Deanery, according to the last report of the Synod for the present year was \$1425.00, for the next year \$1470.00 There has been raised for the present year \$1270.18.

DEANERY SCHOOL.

Every arrangement has been made for the commencement of this work, and with the return of the Rector of Dunham, the various Committees will be able to go to work.

SABREVOIS.

The continued increase of the Roman Catholic population must be a source of anxiety, and causes us to take a deep interest in Sabrevois College, the only Collegiate Institution within the Deanery. The duty of making known the principles of the Reformation to our former Canadian brethren is becoming most pressing. We have not a single representative of our Church among the many thousands French Canadians in this Deanery. The efforts of Sabrevois College in sending out trained men for this branch of the Church work call for our sympathy, and upon the wise management of that Institution much of the future of our Church depends in this Deanery.

NEW MISSIONS.

This Deanery having a large field of Missionary work within its limits would most gladly help any efforts made by the Synod to promote Missionary zeal, whether in greater liberalty and system in the giving of money, or increasing the number of laborers. Next to the liberal sustenance of our own parochial ministrations, the sustenance of Diocesan Missions should be the thought and prayer of every member of the Church. The progress we have made in this Deanery is full of encouragement. The long settled county of Missisquoi has become almost entirely self sustaining, having only two Missions out of eight within its borders receiving aid;—a result which tells of faithful culture in the past, and is an earnest of the promise, that in due time we shall reap. In other parts of the Deanery old Missions are

becoming self-sustaining. We have, however, large fields unoccupied, calling for the labors of the Missionary to which if we do not respond, the privilege for the labors of the Missionary to which if we do not respond, the privilege will be denied to our Church of leading those people to Christ. These places must be for a time purely Missionary fields, and the Deanery would urge upon the Synod the adoption of some plan of classifying the Missions, so that new Missions may receive the most generous support, and hold out (so far as is right) inducements for men of experience to labor in these deeply nteresting, but difficult spheres of work.

DEANERY OF IBERVILLE.

FRANKLIN, April 29, 1874.

My Lord,—The annual ruri-decanal meeting of the Deanery of Poerville took place at Franklin on the 29th of April. As the roads were bad and the day stormy the attendance was small.

CHANGES.

No changes have taken place during the past year.

VACANCIES.

Sherrington with its church and grave-yard is still vacant.

PROPOSED CHANGES

Came under consideration, and it was decided to recommend that Sherrington, Napierville and St. Remi be erected into a Mission under some vigorous young man that can speak and preach in French.

That Valleyfield and Beauharnois be opened as a Mission and served in

GRANTS.

Next in order came up the subject of grants, and it was resolved and carried—that the earnest consideration of the Lay Committee be directed to the fact,—that the missionary of Edwardstown, who has now labored faithfully for over 27 years, is from the depletion of his parish from emigration, a worse position than many a Deacon, and it is recommended that the fifty dollars per annum be restored to him, together with an additional gratuity, as he was induced by the late Bishop to undertake the building of a residence which has been a heavy tax upon him, and the Mission is now too poor to avail itself of the Executive Committee's offer.

In order to avoid confusion and misapprehension, it is recommended that in the future all moneys expected from Missions for the support of the clergyman or otherwise be paid to the Treasurer in Montreal, and that the clergymen draw quarterly from Montreal for their stipend.

DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

Report for the year ending June, 1874.

My Lord,—The annual meeting of the Deanery was held at Hull, June 9th, 1874—eleven clergymen and three laymen were present. Holy Communion was celebrated in St. James Church previous to the business meeting.

The question of the representation of the rural parts of the Diocese on the Executive Committee was taken into consideration, and the following resolution passed:—

Moved by the Rev. J. Rollit, seconded by Mr. Bourinot.—Whereas it is desirable that every Deanery in the Diocese should have fair local representation on the Executive Committee of the Synod, with a view of promoting the interests of the Church in such Deanery; Resolved, That this meeting take measures to make known to the Synod, at its next session, their earnest desire that such representation should be carefully carried out henceforth, and that each Deanery should have the right to elect directly its own Clerical and Lay representatives on the said Committee.—Carried unanimously.

Attention was directed to the spiritual destitution of many parts of the Deanery. The number of clergy is inadequate to the wants of the district. Many places are but partially supplied, and others entirely destitute of the ministrations of the Church.

Moved by Rev. J. Rollit, seconded by Rev. P. W. Smith, That this meeting recommend that the Township of Templeton, the village of Chelsea and parts adjacent be, as soon as possible, supplied with a missionary.—

Carried unanimously.

Moved by the Rev. C. J. Kaapcke, seconded by the Rev. J. SEAMAN.—That this meeting recommend that steps be taken for supplying the Township of Portland and parts adjacent with regular Church services.—Carried unanimously.

The difficult question of the supply of ministrations to the lumbering districts was taken into consideration.

Moved by the Rev. J. Seaman, seconded by Mr. Lewis, That this meeting recommend that the duties of "the Committee on Church provision for the lumber districts" be discharged by the Deanery of St. Andrews.—Carried.

The Mission Fund of the Church next engaged the attention of the meeting. After careful consideration the following resolution was passed.

Moved by the Rev. Canon Johnston, seconded by the Rev. W. B. Long-hurst, That in the opinion of this meeting, the best interests of the Church would be greatly served by the appointment of a deputation, to visit at least once a year every mission in this deanery, with the object of bringing before our people the cause of missions and the support of the Church in general. That such deputation be composed of two clergymen and three laymen, to be named by the Bishop.—Carried.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

In presenting their report to the Synod the Committee on Education desires to record the conviction entertained by its members that the subject of education in the principles and under the auspices of the Church can be considered as second only in importance to the immediate work of the sustentation of our Church's missions. It is a subject of regret therefore that the Committee are able to report, in this large diocese, only three schools in existence of this character.

One of these is at Berthier under the care of the Rev. W. C. Merrick assisted by a competent staff of teachers. It is designed for a day and boarding school combined, and has had in attendance during the past year twenty-nine day scholars and twenty-three boarders.

The building, which is erected on land belonging to the Church at a cost of \$3182.32, was transferred to the Bishop in trust, by Notarial Deed, bearing date Nov. 12th, 1869. It has accommodation for twenty-two boarders.

The course of instruction comprises the Greek and Latin classics with French and the usual English branches together with natural science.

The other two schools are at Knowlton and Cowansville respectively. The Committee has no report from them, but they are believed to be in a healthy and prosperous condition. It is desirable that all Church schools should place themselves in connection with the Synod by making at least an annual report. This can be done without any sacrifice of independence and certainly with the best results to the schools themselves.

The Committee desire to express their safisfaction in witnessing the active efforts which have been made in the Deanery of Bedford to establish a Church Female School for that part of the Diocese.

If the subject of the education of our youth in general in sound Church principles he regarded as a matter of deep and vital importance to the well-being of our Church in the future, the special training of those who are destined to be the mothers of the coming generation must be regarded as possessing that character in a still greater degree.

All know how deep is the impression upon the young mind made by lessons inculcated in very early life by maternal teaching and training. A generation of intelligent and cultivated female minds deeply imbued with

The Committee therefore desire to record their opinion that the establishment of the Female School in Dunham, however successful it may be, by no means supersedes and renders unnecessary the putting forth strenuous efforts on the part of the friends of female education, to establish a Church Female School in or near the city of Montreal. The Committee would recommend that steps should be taken with as little delay as possible, to secure a suitable site and obtain subscriptions to a building fund.

With one or more female schools in successful operation in the country parts of the Diocese, and a thoroughly efficient establishment in or near the city of Montreal, we might then feel that we had reached in some degree the measure of a long neglected but imperative duty.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Intemperance begs to report that since last Synod, an Association known by the name of the Ch. of E. T. A. Society has been formed in the diocese with every promise of success, and proposes to hold an annual meeting at the time of Synod. Through this Association local parochial associations have been formed, and an impetus given to the greater considerations of the evils of Intemperance. This Committee would most heartily recommend the formation of parochial associations in every parish so as to make this branch of the Church's work more promising than it has hitherto been.

The Committee has also considered the letter from the Q. P. L., and would suggest that the Secretary of the Synod would acknowledge the

communication, stating that the Synod is taking every means to promote the growth of temperance within this Diocese, and trusts that the work the League has in view may be successful.

LAY AGENCY.

The Committee on Lay Agency in Missions beg to report that they have considered the subject with special reference to our Rural Missions, where the want of lay help is most urgently felt.

Your Committee are persuaded that the growth and prosperity of the Church in this Diocese greatly depend upon the care and attention given to outlying districts, where new settlements are springing up, which, if now cared for, may become the nuclei of new Missions, but, if neglected, will be a source of weakness to those already established. Your Committee believe that, in order to meet the necessities of the case, it is absolutely necessary to enlist the services of the Lay members of the Church to a much greater extent than has been hitherto done, as Lay Readers, District Visitors, Sunday School Teachers, &c.

It is the conviction of your Committee that the agency of Lay Reading may be much more extensively used, and made more efficient than at present, and to this end the following recommendations are submitted for your consideration.

1st. That one or more Lay Readers may be appointed in any Mission or Parish in the Diocese, at the request and on the nomination of the Incumbent of the said Mission or Parish.

2nd. That the duties of such a Lay Reader be (a), to read the appointed lessons in the church at the Incumbent's request; (b), to conduct services in the outstations of the Missien; (c) to aid in the formation and superintendence of Sunday-Schools, and (d) further to discharge such duties within the Mission under the direction of the Incumbent as by a layman may lawfully be done.

Your Committee further beg to suggest that, with the view of bringing this question more generally before the members of the Church, the Bishop be respectfully requested to issue a Pastoral on the subject, and that the attention of the Rural Deaneries be directed to the matter.

A. Clark, the senior representative of the Cuthbert family, the loved and respected co-seignioress of Lanoraie, who, following in the steps of her venerated mother, the late Mrs. Ross Cuthbert, was ever ready to promote, by kind sympathy and generous liberality, every good work for the Church and the Community, n this and the neighbouring Parish of Sorel.

AYLWIN.

Considering the limited space devoted in the Annual Report to reports from Missions, the Incumbent of this Mission can give but few details. This Mission includes three townships, where the services of the Church are regularly maintained.

In Alleyne the work of the Church is carried out in the same spirit as heretofore. The services on Sundays and chief Holy-days attended by are average congregations. The contributions towards all objects connected with the Church are liberal. The Sunday School at Danford Lake is regularly carried on, and is in conjunction with a Church Day school.

The congregation here have down to the youngest member done their best The congregation here have, down to the youngest member, done their best to increase their subscriptions to their minister. This effort, with one exception, has not been made elsewhere in the Mission,

tion, has not been made elsewhere in the Mission.

In Aylwin the new church was consecrated last September under the name of "St. John in the Wilderness." The services here have much improved. The visit of the Bishop, accompanied by the Dean of Montreal and the Rural Dean of St. Andrews, was one of unusual interest and profit. We have no Sunday-school here. One was attempted and carried on for a few weeks, by the Missionary; but, having engagements in the Mission which prevented his regular attendance, it fell through. The lack of a Sunday-school is in part made up by the Church Week-day School, in which the Catechism is taught, and other religious instruction given.

In the township of Wright the services of the Church have on the whole been more regular, but the people labour under the great disadvantage of

In the township of Wright the services of the Church have on the whole been more regular, but the people labour under the great disadvantage of having no place where the services can be regularly held. Four times during the past year have we had to remove our Station. Mrs. Hall, of Montmorenci, Quebec, has made liberal proposals towards erecting a church, but there the matter has stopped. A Sunday-school is maintained here by ladies of the congregation.

BOLTON.

INCUMBENT'S REPORT FOR 1873-74.

At the close of another ecclesiastical year I have to acknowledge the goodness and manifold favors of the Most High continued and multiplied. The contributions of the people, as a whole, have increased, and were given with that cheerfulness which bespeaks a growing interest in God's work, a consciousness of the responsibility devolving upon them, and, I trust, the inward working of the Holy Spirit.

Our debts, which have weighed heavily upon us for several years, have within the past year almost quite disappeared, for which, under the blessing of God, we are indebted to the noble and united efforts of our ladies, and the energy of Dr. H. W. McGowan, who collected from many kind peo-ple, whose names will be found on the lists of subscribers.

There is a debt of about \$60 upon the Church at South Bolton As regards the Clergyman's stipend, I have been in the Mission now three years; for the first two years I did not receive within \$200 of the amount promised, but I am thankful to be able to report better for the past year, for South Bolton and East have made up their full amount cheerfully, and without any urging upon my part. Bolton Centre still owes for the past year between forty and fifty dollars, which, I trust, will be made up.

But I must add that the weight of the debts paid has been upon Bolton Centre. And the people have subscribed fairly towards the erection of a Church, which is now in course of building, the site being given by J. C.

Pickle, Esq., upon the most valuable part of his property.

As many of the subscribers have not yet paid, the list cannot be published

with this Report.

Nor can I forget to mention the thoughtfulness of our people at Christmas. They vied with each other to show us kindness at that season.

BRISTOL. June 1894

Rev. George Allan reports :-

I entered upon my duties as Missionary here on Sunday, September 14th. In the Mission there is one church, St. Luke's, Bristol; which we hope to have consecrated this summer. We have obtained the gift of a site for a church at Bristol Corner from W. Craig, Esq. The greater part of the lumber is now on the ground; and we hope to have the frame up and ready for use by the fall. At present service is held there in a school house. Our third service, at Clarendon Front, is also held in a school Since September 14th, 17 services have been held at St. Luke's, Bristol,

15 at Bristol Corner, and 18 at Clarendon Front-making 50 in all Holy Communion has been administered twice at St. Luke's Bristol, and

Bristol Corner, by Rev. G. C. Robinson.

There is as yet no Sunday School in the Mission; but I hope, before long, to be able to do something towards establishing one in each place.

The amount of money raised in the Mission has, on the whole, rather exceeded my expectations. The people have not, however, made up the \$100.00 required of them towards the stipend. The total amount raised towards it is \$44.90. Under the arrangement which, with the Bishop's sanction, I propose to adopt, the equivalent of the full amount can, I think, be easily raised. The total amount raised for every purpose is \$84.54, including my own subscription of \$10.00.

CHRISTIEVILLE.

he Parish of Christieville there is but one church, and, owing to the number of church people, there is no point within the Parish where ld be advisable to open an additional station. But the Rector of arish has been very much cheered by the good attendance at the ig services which he has been holding fortnightly during the winter, mhouses several miles from the church.

less gratifying is the fact that within the year a Church Temperance ciation has been formed, and is now in good working order, with a bership of over fifty.

Strawberry Festival, held by the ladies of the congregation in July, , was a decided success, realizing \$106.00; which sum was for the most expended in improving the interior of the church and of the Parochial lool.

A movement on the part of the Congregation, prior to Easter, to augment eir clergyman's salary, (the Rector thankfully states) was very success-l. \$112 were subscribed and paid to him in full at the Vestry Meeting, the abscribers intimating that, provided they remain in the Parish, their sub-

criptions will be yearly.

The Parish of Christieville, also, was the first in the Deanery of Bedford o offer a bonus to secure the proposed church school for young ladies. In addition to a beautiful site, the property of Wm. McGinnis, Esq., the amount offered rose to four thousand six hundred dollars; the adjoining Parish, St. John's, subscribing handsomely towards this sum, and the amount guaranteed can now be considerably augmented, should the way be open to us to establish a first class school for girls in this Parish.

CLARENCEVILLE AND ST. JOHN'S.

The year now under review has passed away with the usual variety of joy and sorrow. Through the blessing of God I have been enabled to hold two services every Sunday besides frequent services during the solemn season of Lent, which I have reason to believe have not been unblessed. The attendance at both of our churches has been regular, and that at St. George, so steadily increasing that the Vestry last Easter passed a resolution to put in 8 additional pews, in order to meet the increased demand for sittings

Our local efforts in the erection of horse-sheds for both churches, St. George's and St. Thomas, involving an outlay of \$600 has caused a small falling off in our contributions to the Mission Fund, which I hope to make up next year.

I have again to thank my people for many presents in kind, and especially for a handsome donation at Christmas season.

I cannot conclude this Report without bearing testimony to the activity of the Wardens of both churches, and especially to Thomas Hunter, Esq., on whom devolved the (anything but pleasant) duty of collecting arrears on Parsonage subscription list.

COTEAU DU LAC.

The Annual Vestry Meeting of St. Lawrence church was held on Easter Monday. The Church-wardens presented their accounts for the past year which showed that the finances were in a satisfactory state, the church being entirely free from debt. During the past year \$30 were laid out in repairing the fence round the church, and in making some other repairs. At the Easter Meeting it was decided to make some repairs to both the Church and Parsonage during the summer. Both buildings are insured or \$1200 each in the Royal Insurance office.

ELY AND NORTH STUKELY.

Rev. J. W. Garland reports as follows:-

Boscobel.

During the past year a neat little wooden church of Gothic structure, has been erected, 50ft. by 25ft. in size, with porch 10ft. by 5ft.

A new cottage organ has been purchased for the church at a cost of \$185. About the sum of \$100 has been collected towards paying for it, chiefly by the ladies—Mrs. Wm. Hackwell, Miss Sarah Hackwell, Mrs. George Copping, and Mrs. Lot Hackwell.

A Bible-class has been established in connection with the church, which meets every Sunday evening at the Parsonage, young and old attend it; and such interest has been shown in the conversations on the Word of God and Church doctrine as promises results of much good.

The debt on the Parsonage has been cleared off. All Saint's Church, North Ely.—Two chairs have been placed in the chancel, the gift of the Rev. George Slack. The children of the Sundayschool presented a new surplice and stole to the church as a Christmas present. The sum of \$43.05 was subscribed towards fencing the burial ground and church property, and the work has been completed well and tastefully,

The members of this congregation are very earnest, and I heartily recommend their case to the Bishop and the Executive Committee of the Diocese; they do not receive the attention they ought to have. I can only give them a Sunday service once every two weeks, owing to the large extent of my Mission, but I have endeavored, at the request of the Church-wardens, to

keep up a week-day service during the year, whenever I could do so.

Mr. Wm. L. Davidson, Lay Reader, and Church-warden, has worked with christian zeal for the building of the church. His unassuming but earnest manner gains for him the confidence of all who know him, and he has rendered me most valuable help.

The Sunday-school numbers 24 scholars, and is doing well.

Mr. George Davidson, people's Church-warden, made an effort to increase the amount subscribed towards the clergyman's salary, and has succeeded in making an advance on what was subscribed last year.

The following gentlemen have rendered me valuable help during the year in various ways: Wm. Hackwell, George Copping, Wm. L. Davidson James Oborne, Wm. H. Churchill, David Oborne, and Benjamin Truax.

GORE AND WENTWORTH.

The missionary is thankful that he is able to report the progress of this Mission, in things spiritual as well as temporal. A "Mission" was held in the winter of seventy-three, the fruit of which is now visible in attentive congregations and mutual good feeling.

The church of West Gore has been painted, thanks to the zeal of the members of that settlement, and the liberality of friends elsewhere. Another church building is much needed in the township of Wentworth .-The missionary also acknowledges the gift of a purse containing one hundred and thirteen dollars.

GRANBY.

The great extent of this Mission, the distance apart of its churches, the of unsettled state of the roads and weather, especially during the winter months, render the ministerial duty on the Sabbath very laborious, and the close pastoral oversight of the scattered flock throughout the week, quite impossible.

Our Sunday School, for which we have lately purchased a new Library, is very well attended. A Bible class, conducted by Mrs. Lockhart, has also been established; the attendance is very encouraging. The Evening service at Lacolle on alternate Sundays, which had been discontinued during the bad roads, has been commenced again.

MASCOUCHE.

During the year there have been good congregations; the New Year'seve Midnight Service and the week evening Lenten Services were also well attended.

We would embrace the opportunity of acknowledging good service received from the Diocesan College during four months, in sending Mr. Forneret to serve Mascouche once a month.

This gave me more time for work in the adjoining Mission of New Glasgow and Kilkenny, which urgently needs a resident clergyman. In Kilkenny alone there are between thirty and forty church families; -and at the Confirmation on Whitsunday there were twenty-seven candidates from that part of the Mission.

Owing to the rebuilding of the Church of St. John the Baptist, the Bishop held the service in St. John's Church, New Glasgow; there were nearly two hundred present.

With regard to the erection of the new church, we have to acknowledge the grant of fifty dollars, through his Lordship, from the Ladies Missionary Association, which paid for building a stone foundation. I hope this manner of expressing our gratitude may not be considered out of order:-we are further indebted to other friends in Montreal for subscriptions towards the same object, amounting to \$102, which I hope to publish, together with the local Subscription List, in the next Report. The latter amounts to \$150. The contract for the new church amounts to \$400; the old building which has been removed to the new site supplies a good deal of material, thus reducing expenses. The land (two acres) was the gift of Mr. Thos. Dunbar. Mr. Tucker, of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, has promised to assist in carrying on the two Missions during the vacation; and we are looking forward to a visit from the Dean, for the opening services of the new church. Necessary repairs have been made on St. John's Church, New Glasgow, and on the Parsonage and out-building in the Parish of Mascouche.

A splendid new organ, from the factory of Messrs. Warren & Sons, has been placed in the church during the past year, which, in the hands of our excellent organist, Mr. Henry Robinson, is giving very great satisfaction.

It has also been found necessary to place new furnaces in the church at an expense of one thousand dollars. To meet this increased expenditure extraordinary liberality has been shown by individual members of the congregation, who have always been ready in the hour of need. The young men have displayed great energy, as will be seen from the large amount raised by them. During the past year they have acquired, in the upper part of the parish, a lot on which they intend, as soon as practicable, to erect a Sunday school building in which to carry on missionary work. They have also paid the salary of our lady City Missionary, Miss Froste, whose report, in connection with the Ladies' Association, tells of over one thousand visits paid within nine months, and of relief administered whereever needed. Much praise is due to Miss Frost and the ladies, and especially to Mr. Barton, the devoted treasurer of the District Visiting church.

We enter upon another year full of hope and confidence in God. In looking back upon our first beginnings we cannot help exclaiming, what hath God wrought! To Him be all the praise and the glory!

NELSONVILLE.

During the past year the affairs of this parish have been encouraging

To Trinity Church, Cowansville, Mrs. C. Adams has presented two beautiful offertory-plates; and Mr. P. Cowan, jun., has given lamps with improved burners. The church fabric has been repaired outwardly under the superintendence of Mr. G. K. Nesbitt, at a cost of \$60, covered by voluntary contributions.

At Sweetsburg, Christ Church has been furnished with a bell at an expense of \$254; and, through the exertions of Mr. Lafayette Jones, the front fence of the church-yard has been renewed, at a considerable outlay. Mr. George Boright, Churchwarden, has supplied fuel through the winter, and performed many offices for the comfort of the congregation gratuitously.

The Rev. T. W. Fyles thankfully acknowledges valuable presents from members of Sweetsburgh congregation, at Christmas, and from members of the Cowansville congregation at Easter.

The Missisquoi High School has been carried on with success.

The increased interest taken in the Sunday Schools, and the attendance of younger members of the congregation at the Holy Communion, are pleasing and hopeful signs of spiritual life. A spirit of good-will prevails in the parish. May He who is the Prince of Peace continue to prevent and nullify therein all disturbing influences.

NORTH WAKEFIELD. Report of the Rev. J. Seaman.

It is now ten years since this Mission was first established. During that time we have built two churches, (both of wood) and purchased a parsonage house and nine acres of land attached to it, all of which are now free of debt. Both churches have been consecrated to the service of Almighty God. The collections this year do not come up to what we would wish, but the mission has had to put forth extra efforts to raise the \$100, to enable it to claim the grant from the Sustentation Fund.

The regular celebration of the Holy Communion has had the good effect of increasing the number of communicants. The increasing desire for the Sacrament, of those who through age or infirmity are not able to attend the regular Sunday celebrations, is most encouraging.

I feel thankful to see the work increasing even slowly but, we trust surely.

SOREL

The Rev. Canon Anderson reports: The past year exhibits a chequered history of mingled good and evil. In the death of different heads of families, and specially of the late Mrs. E. A. Clarke, one of the two ever generous sisters, of the Manor House, Lanoraie, and of the late Mr. Thomas Woolley, of Sorel, the Parish has to mourn not only the continued serious diminution of its membership, but also the removal of those who, whether in the Parish, in the Diocese, or in "the field of the world" at large, were "always abounding in the work of the Lord." The sum of \$368.75 was raised in the Parish during the past year, and is now held in trust by G. Bramley, Esq., deposited in Bank, for the erection at St. Robert of a small Mission Church and Schoolhouse, postponed for a short season, but which

it is hoped may be completed before the return of another Synod.

The contribution to the Diocesan Sustentation Fund was this year, by the addition of a few more subscribers, made up to the total of of \$700, a practical proof, from a now greatly impoverished and feeble Parish, that there are some at least within the bounds who are mindful of the Apostolic injunction, "Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others."

A very heavy burden, greatly discouraging for the time, has unexpectedly come upon the Parish in the unpleasant discovery that the roof of the church, after years of repeated and costly repair, imperatively requires a total new re-covering. And when this work has been completed, the interior of the Church then requires painting and repairs, to the extent probably of \$600 more. Some of the Parishioners, however, have already generously responded to the appeal made to them for the repair of the roof, and it is confidently hoped that God will induce them all to contribute, the poor of their poverty and the better of their abundance, and that, with God's help and blessing, the next Report will record the accomplishment of this work also, with the list of its generous subscribers.

The church in Sorel is indebted to Messrs. A. D. Durnford and A. A. Taillon, managers respectively of the Molsons and the Merchants Banks, for their uniform courtesy and willingness to transmit to their destination, whenever requested, free of all charge or risk of loss, the various sums raised from time to time for different Diocesan, Missionary, or other benevolent purposes.

The Rector cannot close this Report without further recording his deep obligation to an excellent friend of the Church at large, and of this Parish in particular, Captain H. G. Anderdon, formerly of H. M. S., and now, of Bath, England, for the continuous gifts, through now many years, of most valuable books, pamphlets and tracts, scattered by him broadcast through the Parish and the Province, and frequently also, through the shipping frequenting the port, sent to the distant parts of the earth. In several instances these "leaves from the tree of life," always grantfully appreciated, are known to have been individually and savingly blessed. The Parochial statistics are now appended, and the Report is gratefully closed, with the erection of our Ebenezer, "Hitherto hath the Lord helpsd us."

ST. VINCENT DE PAUL.

The Rey. J. Allan reports:—A Sunday school for Protestant Children is now in operation here, as also a School once a week for their secular instruction. The sum of \$7.75 has been collected by Miss Allan from subscribers to the Mission Fund, and the sum of \$4.00 was collected, chiefly from the Protestant convicts, after a sermon by Rev. Geo. Allan.

Terrebonne:—Aided by a grant of \$20.00 from the Colonial Church Society a Day school has been established under the superintendence of a very efficient teacher. A Sunday school has also been established, and a Lending Library is connected therewith. A porch has been added to the Church; and, besides considerable subscriptions for the support of the Day school, the congregation has raised for the Mission Fund and other similar objects the sum of \$21.21.

SUTTON.

Rev. J. Smith writes:—At our Easter Vestry Meetings it was unanimously resolved that this Parish become self-sustaining from the first of July next.

A resolution was passed expressive of gratitude and thankfulness to the venerable Society of the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, and to the "Mission Fund" of the Diocese, for the bountiful aid rendered to this Parish for so many years.

To the fostering care of these two Societies, under the blessing of God, the Parish is greatly indebted for its present favorable position, that enables

it to pass from a state of dependence to one of self-support.

As regards the annual subscriptions of seventy-five dollars to the Diocesan Mission Fund, from this Parish, it is to be feared this sum cannot be raised at present—of course nothing has really ever been paid into the Mission Fund by this Parish, because all that has been raised has been received back. It is only from the present time that the Parish will enter upon the more privileged state of being a giver and not a receiver. The sum of not less than fifty dollars is promised for the current year, with a hope that it will go on increasing.

The thanks of the Congregation of All Saints, Abercorn, are due to Mr. R. W. Oliver, the Senior Warden for the past year, and to an unknown friend for the thoughtful gift of lamps for the lighting of the Church-

kindly providing for a want long felt.

The Incumbent cannot close this Report without thanking his people for their generous and considerate Christmas offering of seventy-two dollars by the hands of Mrs. Nield and Mrs. Dewitt Anderson.

As the villages increase in population, we are obliged to give them more care, and our out-stations must become the centres of new Missions as soon as possible. If we do not occupy the land others will, and we shall be denied the blessing which has been vouchsafed the Church for her missionary labors in these townships for so many years.

Our special Mission services during the past year I think have done much good, and awakened thoughts in many minds about more seriously engaging in some work for Christ's sake and the Gospel. The impulse of this motive is apparent in our different Associations, and I trust will

The increase in grants \$611, and the falling off of receipts in the city of Montreal \$261 and \$343 in the country parishes, absorb the whole of the interest received from the Sustentation and Clergy Trust Funds.

NOTE.—The receipts from some parishes have been increased by sums paid to the Treasurer since Synod; an account of which is appended to his general statement, page 541.

SUSTENTATION FUND.

The amount collected of the third instalment of this fund is \$5713, making a total of \$38,653 of which \$37,675 is invested, yielding a yearly revenue of \$2,637 25. There is about \$1,700 of the third instalment still to collect and about \$14,000 of the 4th and 5th instalments.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The balance in hand at last Synod was \$1,740 99; and \$2088 interest, and \$755 27 subscriptions and collections, making together \$2843 97, has been received. The payments of pensions amount to \$1260, leaving a balance on hand of \$3324 96. The amount invested is \$34,644, yielding a yearly revenue of \$2,370, and with the investment of the \$3000 now on hand \$2580.

REMARKS.

It will be difficult to continue holding service once a fortnight at Thorne Centre and North Clarendon, unless more can be raised. Several in North Clarendon have not yet paid anything, and two or three at Thorne Centre. There is no glebe here, but horse feed was furnished last winter chiefly by Thorne, in part by the other places. Many have done well in this respect. If the people had ever made the proper effort they could have secured land for the pasture of a horse and cow, and fenced it so as to keep the cattle

of the surrounding country out of it.
It will be seen by the report that
Leslie congregation has given about as much as the other three in money ; and Thorne Parsonage, besides hay and oats, more than North Claren-don and Thorne Centre together. A clergyman will find it impossible to live here except some effort is made to raise all the salary expected from the place.
