Liberals Have Only Three Members Returned With 43 Candidates in The Field-Labor Unrepresented

PREMIER ARMSTRONG IS DEFEATED

Premier-elect Rhodes Secures Great Personal Victory-Victoria County Elects One of Each Side-Barnjum Goes In on Tidal Wave in Queens

HALIFAX, N. S., June 26.—Nova Scotia found itself this morning in the hands of a Conservative administration-elect for the first time in 43 years, while the Liberal forces which had wielded uninterrupted power during that period found themselves with but three sure representatives in an assembly of 43, as a result of the most astonishing political upheaval recorded in Nova Scotia since Confederation, achieved at the polls in yesterday's provincial general election. The Liberal government went down with only three survivors, and Premier Armstrong went down with it, when Shelburne county, which he contested, returned two Conservative LUUL DLI UUIIU

Only one Liberal member of the last House was returned, Hon. William Chisholm, Minister of Works and Mines, who with his colleague was elected in Antigonish county. Alister McLeod, a newcomer to the political field, was elected in Victoria county.

LABOR OBLITERATED.

Labor was obliterated and eight of candidates are believed to have lost their deposits. In this connection it may be noted that Archibald Terris, Labor member of the last House, was returned in Cumberland county, where he ran under the endorsation of the Conservative party.

Great enthusiasm greeted the victory of the Conservatives throughout the province, wherever returns were publicly posted, but the celebration was greatly curtailed and moderated by a drenching downpour of rain that started early in the afternoon and continued until midnight, especially in Halifax, where newspapers had made elaborate arrangements for showing the returns on screens.

The storm, which was accompanied in some districts by thunder and lightning, rendered quick transmission of the returns difficult for the telephone and telegraph companies, but the result was not in doubt after 11 o'clock.

PREMIER ARMSTRONG. Last night Premier E. H. Armstrong at Shelburne gave out the following

at Shelburne gave out the following statement:

"Latest information unmistakably indicates that a substantial majority of the electors have come to the conclusion that a time for a change had arrived. The outstanding majorities in many of the counties clearly show that a popular verdict has been rendered against the government. It is quite impossible at this distance, and without the full facts before me, to arrive at any well reasoned cause for the defeat of the government. The Liberal party had as fine a lineup of candidates in the field as ever presented themselves to the electorate for support, and that they put up a gallant fight against overwhelming odds, will be admitted. The decisive character of the verdict would seem to indicate that there is no very practical desire for a redress of our economic ills. I am satisfied, however, that the determination of our people to secure a redress of their grievances will have to be dealt with.

EXPRESSES THANKS.

"I wish to express my sincere and warmest thanks to all candidates and party friends for their splendid support and hard work during the campaign. The government appealed to the people with a constructive programme that we felt deserved support. It can only bow to the popular will. I am convinced, however, that the policy which the government put forward and supported must, in the interests of the province, some day be ripened into action.

"There is little doubt that there were many causes contributing to our defeat for which the government was held responsible. It, was more than evident that many irrelevant issues were raised by the opposition for which the government was neither directly nor indirectly responsible. These all had their effect. The opposition have sown to the wind—they must now reap the whirlwind."

"It is a veritable opposition sweep from end to end of the province. The opposition have elected forty of their candidates, and only three of the Liberal candidates have been returned. Not only have the opposition secured a majority in the House of Assembly, which has not been approached since the general election of 1901, when 36 Liberals and two Conservatives were elected; in practically every case the Conservative candidates have been returned by majorities so large, as to be quite abnormal if not phenomenal — majorities which count up into the thousands in several counties, and in Halifax, Colchester, Cumberland, Cape Breton and Pictou, run into very large figures. The opposition have won close fighting constituencies, and they have carried as well old-time Liberal strongholds.

"However greatly we regret the outcome, we have no desire or intention of minimizing the extent either of the victory for the opposition or of the reverse suffered by the Liberal party throughout the province. It is too early to estimate the influences which brought about the downfall of the government, but probably the chiefest of these was the prevailing business depression, and cry of 'hard times,' which always is the strongest and most deadly foe of a government, and the party in power, notwithstanding the fact that the provincial government was not responsible for and had no control over the state of business, and industrial inactivity, attributable largely to world-wide conditions."

OTTAWA, June 25-The Rural Credits Bill was given second reading in the House of Commons today. Hon. J. A. Robb, Acting Minister of Finance, explained that the fundamental principle of the bill was coreperation between the Dominion and the provinces. It was made very clear that any advance under the act should not be made to any province unless that

DEBT TO DOMINION. The advance constituted a debt of the province to the Dominion secured by provincial bonds. F. M. Logan Says the Lack

"After several years in the western prairie provinces," Mr. Logan said in an interview, "I decided to visit my old home in Nova Scotia, traveling back by auto with my wife and three children. As you are aware, there is not any road around the head of Lake Superior so we came by way of St. Paul, Milwaukee, Chicago and Detroit, crossing into Canada at Windsor, Ont., and thence to Toronto, Niagara Falls, Montreal, Quebec and Fredericton.

SITES EQUIPPED

"The tourist camp idea," said Mr. Logan, "is certainly popular in the United States. In the average town or city, it is as much of an institution as the town hall and much wore widely advertised. The sites are usually located in the parks or in some place casy of access with sigus along the way, directing tourists where to find them. They are usually fitted up with a small house or kitchen with a stove, sink, water supply, toilet etc., installed

the convenience of the tourists. This are about an outlay of only a few dreds of dollars yet they easily supthe needs of the average tourist."

Moderately-priced automobiles and tourist camps, Mr. Logan believes, enable the man of moderate means to give his family a vacation and change of scenery that they would otherwise not get, as many of them cannot afford to put up at hotels for several weeks. At some of these western camps, he says, you will meet tourists from California, Seattle on the west coast and as far east as Maine. They all like the free lift outdoors.

"It is the general opinion that camp sites detract from hotel revenue," Mr. Logan said. "Well, it is possible that they do in some cases but not to any large extent. Without tourist camp sites, there would not be half as many motor tourists, so it about events itself up. An attractive camp with a good view and pleasant surroundings will cause a tourist to remain two or three days, whereas they never would start from home if they had to live at the hotels. They are bound to leave some money in the town or city.

SMOKERS' TASTES CHANGE INDUSTRY A primary difficulty with the tobacco-growing industry in the Connecticut valley is the change in the habits and tastes of smokers that has developed so rapidly in recent years.

leveloped so rapidly in recent years. Cigarette tobacco is not grown in Vestern New England. Yet cigarette onsumption has increased some 2,000 per cent. in the last twenty years. Connecticut valley tobacco remains

Connecticut valley tobacco remains the wrapper tobacco which must find its market in the cigar-making industry alone. The consumption of cigars, however, has been stationary for a long period, and has declined sharply relative to the growth of population. More recently there has been an stable falling off in actual cigar production owing to the phenomenal growth of the popularity of the cigarette.

In the face of these conditions, growers of wrapper tobacco in Western New England have been the victims of overproduction. With very high tobacco taxes levied by the Federal Government, with feetilizer and labor still high, and with tobacco storehouses carrying crops two years old which cannot be sold at a profit, even co-operation in marketing has its limits. It is no surprise to find the acreage being planted for the new crop this season very substantially diminished. The movement to reduce the acreage is wise and the policy of construction should be adhered to while there is a need for it. The tobaccogrowing industry as a whole in this


