REPORTED OFF CAPE RACE

Danger of Barricade of Sydney and North Sydney Harbors Message From P. E. I. Car Ferry.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 26—(By Canadian Press)—News great ice field in the Gulf off Cape Race came yesterday in a wire less message from Captain Berlin of the steamer Cairnmona which less message from Captain Berlin of the steamer Cairnmona which reported being caught in the pack north of Cape Race. He said the ice was heavily packed and extended north and south in a field eighteen miles across, east to west. His message was timed at two o'clock yesterday afternoon and gave his position as latitude 48:02, longitude 49:15, on the eastern edge of the pack.

A message from Captain Read of the N. B.-P. E. Island car ferry, said extraordinary ice conditions prevailed and predicted that Sydney and North Sydney harbors would be barricaded within a few days. The Stanley is still off Ingonish in the ice pack but has not reported conditions.

HELPS MAN BANDITS SHOT. Detective Gives Blood to Former Of ficer Hurt Five Years Ago.

New York, Jan. 26.—Five years ago Joseph Korody, then a policeman, was shot by bandits and he received wounds which caused complications that have lingered with him since. Recently an operation was ordered and it was performed yesterday.

A blood transfusion also was necessary. The operations were performed at the Norwegian Hospital in Brooklyn. Korody came out of the ether at 6.30 o'clock last night.

Acting Detective Sergeant Joseph T. Shea was chosen from a large number who offered to give their blood to help Korody. He received no payment for the loss of his blood as Korody said he was too poor to give remuneration for it.

After the transfusion, Shea put on his coat and walked to the subway. He asked reporters not to give his act any publicity.

KILLS TWO, WOUNDS THREE Denver Youth Then Dramatically Ends His Life in a Theatre

Denver, Colo., Jan. 26— — While police were seeking Louis Cavellitti, for mer soldier and vocational training student of Fort Collins, Colo., for the slaying of two persons and the wounding of three others, one probably fatally, he entered a downtown motion picture threatre, took a front seat in the balcony and shot himself to death. The audience in the theatre was thrown into an uproar by the dramatic act of the youth. Police identified the body. (Cavellitti was being sought as the result of the fatal shooting of Mrs. Christian Nider, 25 years old, and Silvie Pioconi and the wounding of Jimmy Farillo, Mike Nider, husband of the slain woman, and John Darighi, 6-year-old son of a rooming-house employe, in a lower downtown rooming house.





Mr. Foster will retain his seat in the Legislature. The time when the changes involved will take place will be announced later. The gathering was held at the Cliff Club where the members were the dinner guests of Hon. Mr. Foster. Many of the members expressed regret that the Premier felt compelled to relinquish his post. An official statement issued after the meeting was as follows:

FIFTEEN MINUTES OF RADIO EACH DAY

By Edward N. Davis Formerly Technical Electrical Expert For U. S. Government

Lesson-No. 216.

SUCCESSFUL BROADCAST RECEPTION.

The enormous increase in the number of broadcasting stations, until the number reached several hundred, has resulted in the assignment of an additional wave length for broadcasting purposes. Broadcasting is now conducted on the wave lengths of 360 and 400 meters with 485 meters used for weather broadcasts. Tests have demonstrated that two stations may operate simultaneously, one on 360 meters and one on 400 meters without interfering with one another, WHEN THE RECEIVER IS PROPERLY MANIPULATED. In the immediate vicinity of two such stations difficulty may be experienced in differentiating between these two wave lengths, especially when the receiver is of the single circuit crystal type. Receivers having variable coupling between the antenna circuit and the detector circuit render a much greater degree of selectivity possible. This fact may be noted on any two or three circuit receiver by "tunning in" the 360 meter station with loose coupling and then tightening the coupling which will bring in the 400 meter station as well.

Another important factor in obtaining selectivity in the receiving system is the antenna. The coil or loop antenna gives very great selectivity and strong signals when employed with several stages of amplification. The amateur of limited means, however, must seek other methods of increasing the sharpness of tuning obtainable with his receiver.

The average amateur erects as high and as long a receiving aerial as his geographical location and his pocketbook will permit, on the theory that the greater the dimensions of the antenna the stronger will be the signals. This is true, a large antenna will bring in all the signals but considerable difficulty will be experienced in selecting any particular station and tuning out the others. In order to obtain sharp tuning an antenna of moderate size should be used. For example, a single wire 75 feet long and 30 feet high in connection with a good loose coupler or other two circuit receiver gives fairly good selectivity.

While it is true that the stren

will not be as great as with the 300 or 400 foot wire, the operators will find more satisfaction in being able to tune out unwanted stations than in listening to a bediam of noise from a number of stations. Operators at points distant from transmitting stations may find the long wire necessary in order to hear the desired station but operators in the same city where there are several stations operating on different wavelengths, at once, will appreciate the degree of selectivity which may be obtained with the antenna of smaller dimensions.

The commercial operator must get his messages through on 600 meters and there are thousands of ships and shore stations all using the same wavelength. He learns to adjust his circuits and coupling so as to reduce interference to a minmum, that is part his work. The broadcast listener must follow his example.

HUGE DREDGE RAISES COPPER LOST 3 YEARS

Mud-Covered Ingots Lost When Lighter
Was Sunk inthe Bay Are Being Fished Up.

"Movie" Fans Unaware of Film Fire as Operator Continues Programme. New York, Jan. 26-The quick wit

New York, Jan. 26—For more than a week one of the largest bucket diging dredges of the Merritt' & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Compay has been anchored in the main ship channel, between Governors and Ellis Islands, salving copper bars which have been lying under ninety-three feet of water for three years since a lighter was sunk by the United States transport Buford. The copper, which belongs to the Government, is worth about \$150,000. Divers searched the channel for two years before they could locate it.

The pigs are of two sizes, weighing 140 pounds and 250 pounds respectively. The first were brought up on Dec. 14. Since then nearly 400 have been recovered. Buckets hoist up the ingots covered with mud which is washed off at the depot of the wrecking company. They then are sent by motor truck to the Government warehouse.

It is expected that nearly all the lost copper will be recovered.



In drawing a distinction between the operation of Christian metaphysics, as taught and practiced by her and the various systems of mental therapy based on a belief in the power of human will, Mrs. Eddy has stated the case most clearly on p. 144 of Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, "Human will-power is not Science, Human will belongs to the so-called material senses, and its use is to be condemned. Willing the sick to recover is not the metaphysical practice of Christian Science."

WATERWAYS ARE BEING DEVELOPED

BEING DEVELOPED

Canals and Rivers in Poland to Supplement the Railway
Lines.

Plans for the development of waterways in Poland are progressing simultaneously with the reconstruction and expansion of the country's railway service. Among the important river and canal routes for which plans have long been in preparation are those connecting Polish Silesia with Danzig by way of the Vistula River and northeastern Poland with Memel by way of the Niemen River.

The reunion of the three parts of Poland which were for so many years under the domination of the governments of Prussia, Austria and Russia has made possible a more extensive use of water routes. Formerly the artificial frontier lines cut the nation into three parts in no one of which extensive development of waterways was feasible.


Silesia to the Baltic.

At the present moment the most important water route in use in Poland is the Vistula River from Warsaw to Danzig. It requires only further development to open the Vistula as far south as the Silesian coal fields. Once Silesia is connected by canal and river with the Baltic, transportation costs will be lessened sufficiently to stimulate both mining and manufacturing enterprises.

Development of the Niemen River will provide a direct water route to the Baltic for the Polish lumber industry. At present transportation difficulties are so great that only a limited exploitation of the immense forests in northeastern Poland has been profitable. The Niemen River, which flows from Poland through southwestern Lithuania to the Free City of Memelwas internationalized by the Treaty of Versalles, and consequently the difficulties which have stood in the way off the development of this water route have been of an engineering rather than of a political character.




