"The Canadian reciprocity bill is still on our statute book," Mr. Underwood suggestively continued, adding with a smile, "and we should not raise the slightest objection to the ratification of the agreement by Canada."

During the discussion of the wood schedule, C. Kitchen, of North Carolina, declared his intention of supporting what would amount to very drastic downward revision. "Do you not think," he asked one proprietor of a saw mill, "that if the working man were given free boots and shoes, sewing machines, and so on, he would be compensated for putting lumber on the free list? I am going to vote for it."

THE DEMOCRATS

"He would not," the witness replied, and Mr. Fordney, of Michigan, a lumber "king," added:
"If you give him all these things free, you will also have to give him free soup-

you will also have to give him free souphouses."

Mr. Kitchen is one of the members of the committee who are apt to make light of the influence of outside competition. He made light especially of the Mexican peril in the lumber trade. "During the three years under the Cleveland democratic administration," he asked a witness who has spoken of the Mexican forcets at some length, "is it not a fact that Mexico only exported 6,000 feet of lumber to the United States, valued at \$58? Was it not a fact also that during the same period Australia sent to the United States a little less than one foot of timber? Was it not a fact further that in the eastern provinces of Canada, lumber was scarcer than in the southern states of the American union?" Mr. Kitchen was developing his point with the statement that negro labor could be obtained in Mississippi for seventy-five cents a day, when Mr. Fordney excitedly interrupted with the sporting offer:



NEW TUNNEL IS PROPOSED FOR BOSTON

Includes Scheme to Abandon North Station as Passenger Terminal

A \$50,000,000 PROJECT

Electrification of Railroads Within 20 Miles of the City and South Station Used Exclusively - Is Merely in Suggestion Stage Yet

Boston, Jan. 13-The latest scheme for a unnel across the city to make a physical Maine and the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroads, includes the suggestion that the North Station be abandoned as passenger terminal and all trains be oprated from the South Station. Engineers of the New Haven have made

a study of the possibilities of establishing the South Station as the terminal as a part of the plan for the electrification of the several divisions of the Boston & Maine and the New Haven within twenty Maine and the New Haven within twenty miles of Boston.

Taking the demand for electrification of the suburban lines and the physical joining of the two railroads as the basis, the railroad engineers reason that the only comprehensive plan would be the establishment of a union station, with the operation of all Boston & Maine trains through the tunnel between the South Station and a point north of the Charles river.

The reason for the suggestion of a con-

It is estimated that the expense of making alterations in the approaches to the North Station that the war department desires would entail an expense almost equal to the cost of a tunnel under the river, without the advantages of the tunnel. The tentative plan of the tunnel is proposed as a more satisfactory settlement of the problem of satisfying the demands of the war department with respect to the spanning of the Charles river.

The tunnel would not be built nor the North Station abandoned except as a part of a plan to electrify the suburban lines of the Boston & Maine. The lowest estimate of the cost of the proposed scheme is \$50,-500,000.

Many Economies at Big Sandwich Plant Will B: Effected-Overhead Costs Reduced

J. S. STEEL TO CUT

PRICES IN CANADA

A New York despatch says:—

The announcement concerning the building of a plant by the U. S. Steel Corporation in Canada is regarded as highly significant, coming at this time when a tariff reduction is in prospect.

The United States ships a large tonnage of steel into Canada every year, upon which a considerable amount is paid in tariff duties. By the construction of a plant of its own in Canada the Steel Corporation will not only save these duties, but will be able to sell at much lower prices than it does in this country on account of the lower costs in the manufacturing end. From \$2 to \$2.50 per ton in ore costs will be saved, while considerable economies will be effected in coal and labor costs.

The Canadian plant will include a rail, plate, structural and blooming mill, and also a bar and wire and nail mill. All will be of sufficient capacity to take care of the Steel Corporation's share of Canadian business. In addition to the mills mentioned, the new plant will have four blast furnaces of 400 tons capacity each, six open-hearth furnaces, blowing engines and lighting plant. Although no mention of a tin plate mill is made in the Steel Corporation's announcement, it is probable that one will be added eventually, as there is a large and increasing demand for that product in Canada.

The initial cost of the plant will be about \$20,000,000. The property on which it will be located contains 1,500 acres, which gives plenty of room for expansion to meet the increase in business for some years to come.
