Vega is a shade brighter than the other two which are westly orange. to the earth, though there is some uncertainty as to its exact distance. It is placed between twenty-one and thirty-six light years A light year is equal to about six million miles and is the distance light travels in a year at a speed of 186,000 miles a second. Arcturus is also quite a giant sun, the stars being all suns, of course. Its diameter is nearly twenty million miles. This makes our sun with its diameter of only 864,000 miles look pretty small, though compared to our planet Earth, with its diameter of 8,000 miles, it seems large.




