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FOURTH SESSION.

OTTAWA, June 5th, 1899.

In accordance with Canon III the Fourth Session of the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa was preceded by

Divine Service in Christ Church Cathedral, Ottawa. Evensong was said by the Venerable Archdeacon Bogert, The first lesson was read by Rev. Canon Hanington and

the second lesson by Rev. Canon Muckleston, M. A. M. A. The sermon was preached by Rev. Rural Dean Phillips,

Rector of Hawkesbury, from St. Matthew X1 verses 12, 16 and 17. "The Kingdom of Heaven suffereth violence, and the violent take it by force. But whereunto shall "I liken this generation? It is like unto children sitting in the markets, and calling unto their tellows, and saying we have piped unto you and ye have not danced; we have mourned unto you and ye have not lamented."

FIRST DAY.

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PRINTING OF BISHOP'S ADDRESS.

That the address of the Lord Bishop to the Synod be printed with the report to the Mission Board and the list of contributors to the Mission Fund as in former years. Carried.

STATISTICAL RETURNS.

That in the statistical returns from the Parishes there should be included columns showing the amount of indebtedness, if any, upon each Church and Parsonage in the Diocese. Carried.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND COMMITTEE.

That Clause 15 Sec. IV of Canon XVI be amended by the insertion of the following words after the words "of said Fund." "No widow shall benefit by this fund unless she has been a wife at least a year and a day, except at the descretion of the Bishop." Lost.

The Lord Bishop then appointed the standing and Provisional Committees.

AMENDMENTS TO AUDITS AND ACCOUNTS CANON.

It was moved by Mr. W. L. Marler and seconded by Rev. A. Phillips

That clause 7 of Canon X respecting the Audit and Accounts Committee be repealed and the following clause substituted : (7) "The accounts of the Synod shall be audited annually or more frequently by one skilled accountant, who shall be appointed annually by the Executive Committee at its first meeting after the meeting of the Synod. He shall make a thorough examination of the accounts and submit his report and statement to the chairman of the Audit and Accounts Committee within three weeks after the close of the financial year".—Carried.

It was moved by Mr. W. L. Marler and seconded by Rev. A. Phillips

* That Clause 8 of Canon X be repealed and that in sub-section 9 line 1 the word "the" be substituted for the word "each".—Carried.

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It was moved by the Chancellor and seconded by Judge Senkler

That the word "auditor" be substituted wherever the word "auditors" or "two official auditors" occur throughout the Canons of the Synod.—Carried.

RULES OF ORDER SUSPENDED.

It was moved by Rev. R. W. Samwell and seconded by Rev. A. H. Whalley

That Rev. Rural Dean Carey of the Diocese of Ontario be invited to take a seat on the floor of the house.—Carried.

AMENDMENT TO CANON XXXVIII.

It was moved by the Chancellor and seconded by the Clerical Secretary

That to Canon XXXVIII respecting the Interpretation and Repeal of existing canons be added the following sub-sections :

(4) Any proposition for the repeal or amendment of any existing canon, or for the enactment of any substantive Canon, shall not be considered nor voted on by the Synod unless such proposition shall have been first received by the Executive Committee at its meeting held next before the meeting of Synod; and the Executive Committee shall cause it to be printed and transmitted in the convening circular sent to each member of the Synod.

(5) Any such proposition for the repeal or amendment of any existing Canon if and when approved by the Synod shall lie over until the next meeting of Synod, and if then again approved by a majority of the members consisting of two-thirds of both orders present and assented to by the Bishop, it shall be thereupon enacted and take effect accordingly.

(6) Any proposition for the enactment of a substantive Canon not dealing with the subject matter of, nor conflicting with an existing Canon, may be adopted by the Synod, upon a vote of a majority consisting of two-thirds of both orders present and the assent thereto by the Bishop; whereupon such substantive Canon shall come into immediate effect and shall continue in force until amended or repealed by the Synod; but, notwithstanding the provisions contained in the preceding sub-sections, such new or substantive Canon may be repealed at the next ensuing meeting of Synod, upon a vote of a majority consisting of two-thirds of both orders present and the assent thereto of the Bishop.—Carried.

AMENDMENTS TO CLERGY TRUST FUND CANON.

It was moved by Rev. A. H. Whalley and seconded by Rev. J. F. Gorman Th quent of the nex J until

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That Canon XV be changed to read "An annuity of \$200," and that the consequent changes be made throughout this Canon, but not to effect the expectations of the next four expectants.

During the discussion of this motion the Synod adjourned until 2.30 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod met again at 2.30 p. m.

AMENDMENTS TO CLERGY TRUST FUND CANON.

It was moved in amendment to Mr. Whalley's motion by Rev. R. W. Samwell and seconded by Rev. T. J. Stiles

That section 3 Canon XV respecting the Clergy Trust Fund be amended by substituting "\$300" for "\$400," in the last line thereof, and by adding to said section the following proviso; "Provided that the amendment shall not apply to any Clergyman who has or may become an annuitant prior to the final confirmation of this amendment."

It was moved, in amendment to the above, by Rev. A. Phillips, and seconded by Rev. F. W. Ritchie

That the words "it is expedient" and "in the direction of reducing the grants for future annuitants to \$300" be struck out and the following substituted :

"That a Committee be appointed to consider the amendment of Canon XV and to report at the next session of Synod, the following to constitute such Committee: Chancellor Lewis, J. F. Orde, Judge Senkler, Col. Matheson, F. Hayter, W. H. Rowley, Mason Mills, the Dean, the Archdeacon, Canon Pollard, D. T. Clayton, S. G. Poole and the Mover." Lost.

Mr. Samwell's amendment was then put and carried.

CLERGY STIPEND BY-LAW.

It was moved by Rev. Rural Dean Phillips and seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Read

That the Synod having advised the Mission Board to adopt its Clergy Stipend By-Law do recommend the Board to send out to the Clergy and Wardens under the circumstances detailed in section 1 of the By-Law when a new arrangement as to the amount to be contributed by the congregation is to be made, a brief statement setting forth that the Synod has approved the By-Law and is persuaded that it will work in the interests of both Clergy and Congregations, and that although the Synod is not prepared to force the By-Law upon any congregation by making their grant from the Mission Board conditional upon its adoption, yet the Synod strongly urges congrega-

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tions to make trial of this "Clergy Stipend By-Law" as well calculated to remove many of the difficulties, not to say hardships, which attend the payment of the stipend of the Clergy under the voluntary principle. Lost.

D. & F. MISSIONS TREASURER'S REPORT.

Mr. M. W. Maynard, Hon. Diocesan Treasurer of the Domestic and Foreign Mission Board, presented his financial statement for the past year which on motion was adopted. (Appendix E.)

That the Secretary be authorized to insert as an addition to the report of the Sunday School Committee the scheme of Sunday School Lessons issued by the Inter-Diocesan Sunday School Committee of the Ecclesiastical Province.—Carried.

SUSPENSION OF RULES OF ORDER.

The Bishop's Address, delivered at the opening of the Synod.

My reverend brethren and my brethren of the laity :

We are happy in meeting once again, as the Church of Gop in this Diocese to offer unto the ever blessed Trinity, FATHER, SON and HOLY GHOST our united worship and to study the Church's needs and prospects amongst us and so far as in us lies, to deal wisely and well with both.

Death of the Right Reverend Dr. Sullivan, late Lord Bishop of Algoma.

During the last year the Church in the Dominion has been called upon to mourn the death of her second Missionary Bishop.

His gifts were of a high order and he used them well and truly in the Church's service. At her call he abandoned the charge of St. George's Parish, Montreal for the wandering, restless life of Bishop of Algoma. In response to his eloquent appeals our Brother Churchmen in England generously provided the Endowment which now supplies the stipend of the Bishop and sets us in our Dioceses in this Province free to do more for the Algoma Mission Fund. Our warmest sympathies are with the Bishop's widow and her bereaved family.

As we recall the faithful and unsparing labours of the Right Reverend Dr. Sullivan the question ought to be fairly faced: Did we in the Canadian Church, after sending him into our Missionary Diocese render to him that material support and moral encouragement which we undoubtedly owed to him and which our deliberate action entitled him to look for at our hands? I urge that we should as Clergymen and as Laymen and as Congregations require from our judgment, quickened by our conscience a deliberate answer to this question, for the Bishop of Algoma does not die. The office is filled by the Right Reverend Dr. Thorneloe, and we owe to him now all that his predecessor was entitled to at our bands.

The principle on which he works and the aim which he keeps constantly before his C'ergy are that every Congregation should do all they can for themselves, that every reasonable means should be systematically employed to encourage and

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induce every member of every Congregation to contribute as Gon hath blessed him towards the Church's ministrations. Let me say in passing, that in this Diocese we are labouring

assiduously with this same object in view for each of our twentyeight Missions. We have, however, to be very patient as well as persistent. Let us then have large and enduring sympathy with the Bishop of Algoma. His difficulties must be more trying than

Moreover let us be careful in our own Diocese that the ours. burden of insisting that the people must provide for themselves, does not fall upon the Clergyman or his family. When the necessary pressure is put upon the Congregation, it is almost unavoidable that the Clergyman and his family suffer. My claim is that we should be very vigilant and omit nothing which may serve to protect our Clergy while we are insisting on every Congregation doing their full share in supporting the ministrations afforded to them. When the stipends of some of our Missionaries drop down to a little over \$500 you will, I think, recognize that there is good ground for anxiety, lest the burden may be allowed to press too heavily on the Clergyman and his family.

Provincial Synod.

The triennial meeting of this important Council of the Church was held last September.

No Change in the Church's Marriage Laws.

An unhappy instance of a Clergyman, undertaking to invoke God's blessings upon a so-called marriage, one of the parties to which was a divorced woman, indicates the necessity of reminding you, that, whatever the State may have done, the Church has made no change in her marriage laws. She has made no provision for the marriage of divorced persons, nor has she ever sanctioned the marriage of any person separated by divorce, so long as the former partner is living.

It is necessary to repeat that the Clergy should be exceedingly careful in looking into all the circumstances connected with those who come to be married. The licence which they may bring from the Government, imposes no obligation whatever on the clergyman. Moreover, it cannot in any way shield him, if he should marry a couple in violation of the Church's law. The licence simply shows that the requirements of the law of the land are satisfied in the judgment of those who issued the licence. It cannot relieve the clergyman of his responsibility under the laws of the Church.

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While on this subject, I would impress once more upon the clergy, the duty of winning all to come to the Church to be married. Very few women will fail to respond to a kindly effort to surround their marriage with all the sacred and solemnizing influences of God's House, and of our Holy Religion.

I trust that marriages at private houses will soon become unknown amongst us.

Confirmations.

During the year, 865 persons have ratified their baptismal covenant with GOD and received in answer to prayer and through the laying on of hands the most precions gift of the HOLY GHOST THE SANCTIFIER. Of these 400 were males and 465 were females, 163 were brought up outside the Church of England,

Consecration of Churches.

On 28th. June in last year I consecrated the church at Pierce's Corners in the parish of North Gower.

On 27th. December last I consecrated St. Mary's church at Navan.

On 8th. Jany, I consecrated the stone church which the congregation at Westmeath have erected.

On 29th. of the same month I had the joy of consecrating the Church of St. John the Evangelist at Lancaster, the first Anglican church in Glengarry. It is a very satisfactory building and has an admirable S. school and Parish room close to it. Rev. A. H. Whalley, has in my estimation acted wisely and firmly and well in laying the foundation of this New Mission in our Diocese.

On 14 May, I consecrated St. Paul's church, Haddo, an outstation of Iroquois.

A Godfather or Godmother for each person in Confirmation.

You will remember that in my last address I directed your attention to the last sentence in the third Rubric at the end of Oatechism. which distinctly declares that every one shall have a Godfather or a God mother as a witness of their Confirmation. A year has gone by and only in one Parish has this plain order of the church been carried out. In Trinity Church Cornwall each of the 34 persons confirmed last December was attended by a Godfather or a Godmother as a witness of the solemn consecration of himself or herself to GOD in the renunciation of evil, and in the belief of all the articles of the Creed and in keeping GOD'S holy will and commandments. Throughout the some in sympanection is a reweak

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The benefit will not be limited to the passing help afforded during the Service. Rather will the benefit serve to open the way and prepare both parties for the enduring and oft repeated influence which the Witness may be able to exercise, just because he or she has been formally and publicly recognized as entitled to speak and act as occasion may arise.

The restoration of this excellent institution in all our Parishes ought to present no real difficulty seeing that it recommends itself at once to all as being necessary, helpful and attractive. Let me repeat my strong hope that all, Clergy, parents, communicants and young people will do what in them lies to bring back and restore amongst us this excellent institution and order of the Church of England.

The Widow's And Orphan's Fund.

My hopes in connection with this important fund would be brighter if I could recognize in our Clergy and Laymen a more general anxiety as to its position and prospects. The easy expectation which prevails amongst us that it will some how come all right, never yet accomplished anything, while it has very frequently prepared the way for failure and disaster.

The fact that other Dioceses have a capital sum of \$70,000 to \$80,000 at the credit of their W. & O. fund, while we have a little over \$13,000 ought to bring home to every one of us the pressing necessity for vigorous and persistent efforts. If in other Dioceses with a capital of \$70,000 they find it difficult to pay an annuity of \$300 to each widow where the clergy number some 115, what right have we to expect to be able to pay an annuity of \$200 to each widow even though our clergy number only 64.

It is simply a question of arithmetic and our easy going expectation that it will come all right, cannot alter the working out of such a simple problem. We cannot afford to lose a single day or to relax our efforts until our Capital is built up to such a sum as will suffice, with our other sources of revenue, to meet punctually the claims upon the fund.

It is an immoral and a cruel policy to hold out to our clergy and their fomilies the expectation that we will pay an

annuity of \$200 unless our determination is to place ourselves promptly in a position to fulfil that expectation without any risk of disappointment.

Only two courses are open to us. One is to reduce the pitiably small annuity. The other is to work hard and increase our Capital. Some of our Clergy and their people have already responded to the appeal forwarded to all last November to contribute their quota of \$4,500 so as to secure \$500 offered on certain conditions.

This \$500 will pass away from us unless we are in a position to claim it on 1st. December next.

A feature in our By-law adopted last Session, calls in my opinion, for careful consideration. A clergyman may marry at any advanced age a young wife and his widow may be an annui tant for many years upon our fund. There is no restriction. If the position and prospects of the fund will admit of this unrestricted course, it is doubtless right that we should follow it. We must not however listen to our generous instincts until we have placed ourselves in a position to be just.

Again there is no restriction in the case of a widow who may have a private income. Here too, we ought to be just before we are generous. Our risks of a disaster will be serious enough for a good many years to come without leaving the door wide open for such claims as we certainly shall not be able to meet.

It is far better to be sure than to be sorry. Let us exerourselves, to the utmost at once, to increase our capital so that we may be in a strong position to fulfil without disappointment to any all the reasonable expectations which our Canon of the W. & O. FUND may create.

The Education of the Children of the Church.

Fifty years ago the Bishops of the Anglican Church met in the city of Quebec and amongst other valuable utterances declared that religous instruction should form part of the education of the young and that the Creed, the LORD'S Prayer and the ten Commandments should be used in the Public schools.

Since that period many resolutions to the same effect have been adopted by many Synods, Diocesan and Provincial. Their purpose has been to promote such religions instruction as might unite the various Christian bodies by reason of its being sufficiently indefinite to avoid clashing with the definite belief of any.

This policy has now prevailed for half a century. It is still advocated by some leading and able men both clerical and Lay in our bi progr in the respon accom Chris

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t is still Lay in our branch of the church. It cannot be said to have made much progress. It is pretty much where the Bishops left it in Quebec in the year 1850.

No such policy can ever enable the Church to discharge her responsibilities as GOD'S appointed Teacher, nor will it ever accomplish its purpose of uniting the members of the various Christian Bodies. It will never satisfy the consciences of earnest people. It will never get beyond the resolutions which lie scattered along the pathway of our Synods during the last half century.

Meanwhile the Church's life has developed powers and energies which had been depressed by the Puritan reaction which followed on the Reformation. These powers and energies are forcing the church to recognize her Mission in the world to bear witness to GOD'S truth and to teach it definitely and fully and with authority everywhere and especially to the young. Her growing sense of responsibility will lead her in the near future to be utterly dissatisfied with that residuum of truth which will offend no one.

Her policy will be to secure for herself and for other Christian bodies ailke the right and the opportunity of teaching the truth and the whole truth as each may hold it. Voluntary schools, as each denomination may see fit to establish them, in affiliation with the Public school system of the country, examined by the Government Examiners and drawing, in proportion to results shown, their several proportions of the taxes from the Treasury, will ere long be demanded, where ever they are feasible, by the Christian people in every Denomination. They will not be feasible in the country districts where the various Denominations must have just such schools as we have now if they are to have schools at all.

Already voluntary Denominational schools are easily within the reach of the Anglican Church and of most of the Denominations in our growing cities. By utilizing their Sunday School buildings most of our city congregations are already in a position to start a voluntary Denominational school and thereby effect a saving in the school taxes for the city which is relieved of just so much outlay on school buildings.

Time forbids my dwelling further on this vital subject now. I hope however by a brief reference to it year by year to help you to become familiar with the plan of voluntary/ Denominational schools as the true and just policy for all, and the only one, under our circumstances in this country, which

will secure for parents the freedom to have their children taught, not the residuum of truth which all Christians may accept but the Faith once for all delivered to the Saints and which the Church having received from GOD is responsible for teaching fully and definitely and with authority.

Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

I have received the following letter, which calls for some definite reply from the church in this Diocese as represented by her Synod.

MY DEAR LORD BISHOP,

First let me say how gratefully we acknowledge the kind and even enthusiastic way in which the Bicentenary of our Society has heen celebrated throughout the world. The Church has cordially recognised the debt due to the Society for the work done at home and abroad during the last 200 years. It ought never again to be said that the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge is a mere book-selling Society, which has no claim on the liberality of Church people. Our efforts for Church building in the Colonies alone (to take only one branch of our work) con-

Church building in the Colonies alone (to take only one branch of our work) con-stitute a claim, which cannot be forgotten or ignored. But before our Bicentenary Year closes, we would make a further effort to transmute this burst of enthusiasm into a permanent and active force, and in this effort we must depend mainly on the good will and assistance of the Episcopate. Would it be possible in your Lordship's Diocese to fix one Sunday in each year (say the Sunday nearest to March 8.) when throughout the Diocese sermons might be preached and offerings requested for the premier Missionary Society in the Church of England? In this way, not only would a permanent result follow from this year's commemoration, but a constant annual flow of subscriptions and offer-tories would come back to the coffers of the venerable Society. If this suggestion found favour in your Lorship's eves, we should rejoice to hear that you were willing found favour in your Lorship's eyes, we should rejoice to hear that you were willing to put it into effect.

The Lord Bishop of Ottawa. It is not possible to place in too strong a light the value of the grants made by the S. P. C. K. to almost every church in

this Diocese. Without the aid of such grants many of our struggling congregations would never have undertaken the effort of building a church.

Moreover it is only three years since the S. P. C. K. made a grant of \$5,000 towards the endowment of this new sec. They have recently granted \$450 to the church at Aultsville and \$120 to Gollingerstown. Any request from them ought to receive at our hands the most careful and favourable consideration,

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. made a c. They and \$120 eccive at It will hardly be consistent with our own self respect that we should continue to apply for and accept their generous aid from year to year and refuse their request that we should send an annual contribution to their funds. Congregations in England who receive nothing from them in return make an annual offering which is expended on us in 'he Colonies.

I am slow to urge that we should add another annual collection to our list but can we continue to receive all that the S.P. C. K. bestow and give nothing in return !

The claims which we have now to set before our congregations are numerous and urgent. Diocesan and Domestic and Foreign Missions, the Widows and Orphans' Fund, the Divinity Students Fund and the Superannuation Fund and occasional special appeals present a formidable array to our congregations which have to provide for their own clergy and church buildings and parsonages.

Still we are not responsible for offerings larger than our resources can provide. A willing mind may be shown even by an annual gift, which may be very small and this is not beyond the reach of any of our congregations.

If all our clergy and people would give systematically and on principle a proportionate amount of their income or earnings, the sum would in the aggregate be very large. When intelligently divided amongst the numerous claims which are presented in the course of the year the amount for each would be large and encouraging. I appeal to every one of you, my reverend brethren, and to you, my brethren of the laity, to adopt the principle of proportionate giving and to divide, what you have thus to give, intelligently amongst the numerous claims which are presented to you by order of the Church year by year.

Duties of Church-Wardens.

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Sunday Schools.

The Report of Trinity University to the Bishop and the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa.

My LORD BISHOP,

For several years the authorities of Trinity College, the University of the Church of England, in the Province of Ontario, have taken such opportunities as offered of rendering to the members of the Church in the Province an informal account of their fulfilment of the trust committed to them.

The Council has recently decided, inasmuch as Trinity University belongs to the Church at large, that the Church in Your Lordship's Diocese, which, through your self and the members of the University Council nominated by you, has so important a share in the govenment of the University, has a right to expect an account of a more formal and official character. I may remind your Lordship of the fact, which is well known to you, that by the Constitution of the University the Bishops of all the Dioceses into which the original Diocese of Toronto has been, or may hereafter be divided are in virtue of their election by their Synods entitled to a seat on the Council, and it is their duty to nominate from time to time four persons, lay or Cleri-cal, to represent their respective Diocese on that body. I am therefore requested by the Council to forward annually to your Lordship for presentation to your Synod an Educational and Financial Report.

(1)-- During the Academical Year 1897-1898 the following Degrees, exclusive of Honorary Degrees, were conferred in the various faculties :- Divinity, 1;Law 8; Medicine 52;Music 3;Arts 33; Total 97. The total number of Stuents in attendance at Trinity College i.e. in the Arts and

Divinity Department of the University was 87 of whom 15 were students in Theology

Of these last 8 were ordained to the Diaconate, and are now working in 3 different Dioceses. The number of women Students was 20 and in this connexion it may be mentioned that permanent Buildings for St. Hilda's College to be used as a residence for women students in Arts are now in course of erection on a portion of the University property. Much might be said of the work of the various affiliated Insti-tuions, especially Trinity Medical College, but I am at present concerned only with that part of the work of the University which is under the direct control of the Council. It is the especial pride and aim of Trinity College to be the handmaid of the Church, and as such to be as comprehensive as the Church itself; this it must always be from the very Constitution of its Govering Body to which I have already referred. The Council therefore feeling itself to be thoroughly representative of the Church at large earnestly commends the University to Churchmen all over the Province, and suggests two methods especially by which they can assist the work of this their own University—First—by urging that the sons and daughters of Church people, who are proceeding to a University Education, should be sent to the Church University, and Secondly, by contributing to the Income Fund which, as will be seen from the Financial Report, it has been necessary to established in order to meet the reduction in the value of investments without the expenditure of Capital, and

I am very sorry to have to say that the amount promised in this City and Diocese is very small. I wish that I. could induce all of you to recognize the value of Trinity University to the Church in each and all our Dioceses in this Province of Ontario. It trains and educates our men for all the learned professions as well as for the Holy Ministry. Without it the Church, in this province would be in a very crippled state

It has cost us in this generation, hitherto, nothing. Some 50 years ago our fathers built it and with the kind aid of their friends in England provided some endowment for it. We are not doing justice to ourselves and we fail to appreciate the selfdenying efforts of our fathers when we turn a deaf ear to the appeals of Trinity University for our assistance. It is more essential to our church's extension than even our Mission Fund for this will be of little or no practical value to us unless we can have men well trained and equipped for our church's missionary work.

I would recommend you to appoint a standing committee to be known as Trinity University committee. Let them be charged with the important duty of pressing the claims of Trinity University upon all the congregations and families in the Diocese. I would suggest that they be instructed to meet this evening and report tomorrow what steps they would recommend the Synod to take in order to insure that every family shall learn about Trinity University and be invited to assist it by one annual contribution.

In the event of their being obliged to recommend that a Sunday be selected for informing our congregations about Trinity and for an annual collection towards its maintenance it would be well that you should have the opportunity of considering it at the time when the S. P. C. K. committee may possibly make a like recommendation.

Trinity University has employed an able clergyman to canvass our families for annual contributions. The response has been so small that the appeal to all on one and the same Sunday in each year seems now unavoidable Let the committee be appointed when the order for appointing committees is presently called and let them get to work in the happy conviction that the members of the church in this diocese will respond to their efforts and make an annual offering in proportion to their means

Last year the total reported was 3,615.22, showing a decrease of 1,109.09, but this is owing almost entirely to the smaller amount of vouchers sent in to the Diocesan Treasurer. It is possible that a great deal of money has been sent directly to the Mission field of which the Treasurer has received no record; yet it would enable him to keep the accounts more satisfactorily if the cash collected for Domestic and Foreign Missions were sent *directly* to the Treasurer, who would at once forward it to the proper person and it would then appear in his report.

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Since last June, the Missionary Society of the Ecclesiastical Province has met, (during the Provincial Synod in Montreal), and two important movements have been inaugurated. First it was resolved to recommend that at every Diocesan Synod or other meetings of the committees on Missions or Ruri-Decanal Chapters, some members of the Woman's Auxiliary should meet in conference, in order to bring about a closer understanding between all who are interested in missions. This has been carried out in part, and will be more effective doubtless in the future when the scheme is in good working order. The annual meeting of the W. A. of Ottawa Diocese was the occasion of a very well attended meeting of the Clergy and women workers of the Diocese, under the presidency of the Bishop, when the subjects of Diocesan Needs and Activities were considered.

The other point inaugurated at the meeting of the Board last September was the appointment of an executive committee to meet each month and transact any pressing business connected with the society's work, so that there may be no delay as now caused by the Board meeting only in April and October.

The question as to the payment of the amount promised from the Diocese for the Mission work in Algoma, was discussed at the May meeting and the chairman has corresponded with and received answers from all the Diocese except Fredericton. It appears that in Montreal there is a special assessment on each parish for the amount ; in Huron a special collection in October; in Quebec it is the first charge on all moneys and vouchers sent undesignated to the General Fund of Algoma and from the W. Aux. Algoma contributions. Toronto pays nothing now but used to take it out of the Ascension-tide collection; Nova Scotia has never promised it; whilst Niagara and Ontario do the same as Ottawa in sending all to the General Treasurer undesignated, from which a portion is granted to Algoma.

Report of the Board of Rural Deans.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa :

Three meetings of the Board were held during the year. At the November meeting some recommendations were made to the executive and adopted by that committee with a view to obtaining additional information through the Statistical Returns.

At its May meeting the B ard had under consideration the important question of uninsured Church properties and adopted the following resolut on :

"That the Board of Rural Deans recommend the Synod to instruct the Clerical Secretary to send out immediately after Easter in each year to all Churchwardens and also whenever requested to do so by any Rural Dean or Clergyman the following statement :

"I am instructed by the Synod of the Diocese to inform you that in the event of any loss by fire to your Church or Parsonage etc., you will, as Churchwardens, be held morally if not legally responsible for the amount unless you can show, by the minutes of the Vestry, that you have asked the Vestry to provide the money for the premium and that the money was refused."

The Board received and discussed the reports of the Rural Deans on the State of the Church in their special Deaneries, and directed that as passed by the Board they be incorporated verbatim in the Chairman's report :

I. CARLETON DEANERY-REV. GEO. SCANTLEBURY, RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean wishes to state that five parishes have failed to make their returns, St. George's, Grace Church, Ottawa East, South March, the Glebe. This neglect shows that the Clergy in these parishes have not carefully studied their statistics at the meeting of the Chapter. Owing to this it is impossible to make any comparative statements. During the past year the Rural Dean has canvassed three parishes. Two of them, Fitzroy Harbour and North Gower, were placed under the Clergy Stipend By-Law. Fitzroy Harbour promised \$600 and North Gower \$700. So far the payments have been fairly good. Nepean was also canvassed and about \$400 promised. It was expected that the amount here would reach \$500. Owing to the unstationary character of the population here it was found impossible to introduce the By-Law. The Rural Dean would earnestly recommend your committee to consider what seems to him a very foolish policy, namely the withdrawal of financial aid-or giving him too little-from any priest who may happen to be in charge of such very important centres of Church life as found in and near our cities and towns. These are the very places needing support most, until they become strongholds of the Church. Our Mission Board might well take the matter into consideration and increase the small pittance of many who while living in a mission

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have the expenses of the city. Some changes have taken place among the Clergy as well as in the parishes. Mr. Green has taken up the work in Crysler and Mr. Christie has been appointed to Nepean. Mr. Dumbrille is rector of North Gower. Mr. Shaw is rector of Bell's Corners. Mr. Garrett, Sr., is missionary at Janeville. Merivale has been attached to Janeville. Hawthorne and Leitrim have been made part of Ottawa East. Mr. Bousfield now attends to the congregation of Billing's Bridge. There are signs of improvement of Churches and Rectories in the Deanery. At Fitzroy Harbor over \$200 have been spent on improvement of rectory and building new carriage house, and it is hoped that St. George's Church will be restored this summer. An effort will also be made to put the Church at Torbolton in a fit state for winter services. At Ashton a carriage house has been built costing over two hundred dollars. The church has also been greatly improved inside and externally. Over \$1,400 have been paid out for improvements in Church property in Huntley this year. These are a few instances of what is being done but of which I am unable to write more now.

II. LANARK DEANERY-REV. A. ELLIOTT, RURAL DEAN.

The Church is steadily advancing in this Deanery as witness the following :

During the past year a new Church has been opened for Divine service at Canterbury in the mission of Tennyson; a new brick parsonage has been built and occupied at Balderson in the Mission of Lanark and steps are being taken to build a new church at Clayton in the near future.

It is hoped that during the present year a new mission composed of Bathurst, Maberly and parts adjacent will be opened and occupied by the Church. At Smith's Falls, church work is indeed very certain of a splendid future under the guidance of Rev. Canon Nesbitt assisted by Rev. E. A. Anderson.

During the autumn of 1898 the Rev. John Fairburn was sent by the Bishop to take charge of the parish of Clayton and Innesville and is doing good work. All the Church buildings throughout the Deanery are in good repair and all are, as far as I could learn, insured.

The Clergy Stipend By-Law is in force in the Missions of Franktown, Lanark and Clayton and Innisville and is an improvement on the old state of things.

The Rev. R. B. Waterman has surrendered 50 of the Mission grant. We trust that his large hearted generosity may incite others to greater liberality on behalf of the fund.

Last October the Bishop held the annual Deanery conference at Smith's Falls and the annual chapter meeting was held on the 2nd of May at the Rectory in Carleton Place. In the parish of Pakenham there are around Cedar Hill and White Lake about 17 Church families that may in the near future form the nucleus of a new mission and so carry the Church's work farther into the western parts of the Deanery.

Some day we hope to see the ground occupied by the Chruch in Darling, Dalhousie and Lavant townships.

It is pleasing to note, not simply in this Deanery but throughout the Diocese, that the clergy seem to have adopted as their watchword the command long ago given to Moses : "Speak unto the children of Israel that they go forward."

III. -- PEMBROKE DEANERY--- REV. W. A. READ, RURAL DEAN.

The past year has been one of great change in the Clerical force of this Deanery, no less than the four missionaries having been transfered to other fields of labour. All were good men and true, and left their missions in a far better state than they had received them, and therefore easier to work.

When the Rev. J. Arthur Shaw was appointed to the mission at Cobden he found it extending over a large area of country, now by subdivision it has been reduced to a workable size, and is supplied with nearly all necessary material plant, and it is comforting to hear that his work is being actively carried on by his successor the Rev. M. G. Poole.

Petewawa has been vacant since Sept. 1898, and Mattawa since Easter. The former mission has been fully cleared of debt by the ingenuity of the Rev. John Fairburn, working under difficulties in the latter mission, the debt has so been reduced that the new missionary should easily pay it off, without personal appeals to outside parishes as were made by Rev. E. A. Anderson. All church property insured, except St. Marys' church, Eau Claire.

The statistical reports were generally satisfactory, and in addition to the facts there disclosed the Rural Dean has much pleasure in drawing attention to other good works accomplished within the Canonidal and Synodical year.

In the mission of Beachburg, the Church of St. Mary, at Westmeath Front. commenced during the incumbrency of the Rev. W. J. Moody, has been finished, fully paid for and consecrated. It is a substantial stone edifice, (nearly completely furnished,) erected at the cost of \$2,460.00, a fact which speaks well for the energy and liberality of the few church families of Westmeath Front.

It is pleasing to be able to report the formation of a branch of the W. A. at Beachburg.

All the Church property is insured, but the Missionary says that there is "no proper register for marriages" a state of things which should be remedied at once.

In Cobden mission, the "Church of the Good Shepherd," at Haley's, commenced under the Rev. J. A. Shaw, has been so far completed as to be available for service. It is a plain wooden structure, to be veneered with brick, and ornamented by a tower and when finished will be seen for a considerable distance, being situated not only on a hill, but further raised by a basement, forming a commodious room for social purposes. even though aided by friends at a distance, (interested by Mr. Shaw,) speaks well for the liberal churchmanship of the families at Haleys.

At Cobden itself the debt ot \$1,000 resting on the Church and Parsonage has been reduced to \$600.

The Church at Haleys has not yet been insured, but no doubt will be in the near future.

At Mattawa, the work calling for every energy possible has been the payment of the paralyzing debt. The Rev. E. A. Anderson during his incumbency has practically wiped it out, accepting the liberal offer of Mr. Caverhill, of Montreal to accept \$1,000 for his claim of \$2,300, he, by the aid of church people in other parts, has paid off \$400, of the \$1,000 and left \$270 on hand towards paying the remainder.

At Petewawa the Rev. J. Fairburn during his three years' incumbency, under circumstances that were most depressing, and with an ingenuity that was amazing, not only finished St. Cuthberts' church and improved the various church properties, but paid off an apparently hopeless incubus of \$725, and had all arrears due to himself liquidated.

All the church buildings with the exception of St. Aiden's are insured.

Pembroke does not call for any extended notice. The cost of renovating the church has been fully paid. The various parish organizations are working well, there are no debts, prospects of a prosperous year. All church property inusred.

Stafford, the strong hold numerically of the church in the Deanery, presents a pleasing picture of contented prosperity. Long nursed by the church Stafford is now *beginning* to help others more in accordance to its means, and while no great parish work has been undertaken, the smaller requirements are being added to their church property, e. g. a driving shed at St. Patricks, and a good fence and Estey organ at St. Stephen's, but alas no church property, except St. Patricks insured.

It is a delight to the Rural Dean to allude to the rays of light manifest throughout the Deanery, but it is with sorrow that he is forced to draw attention to the shadows.

It is his opinion that the mission grants to Petewawa and Mattawa should be increased \$400 each. The poverty of the people, the extent of territory and the expense of living all call for it.

Over the mission of Beachburg there rests a very dark shadow. It has suffered very heavily by the removal of most valuable helpers from St. Augustine's and St. Mary's. It is at the latter, however, that the great trouble exists in the estrangement of practically the whole congregation from the missionary. So that there is the scandal of a church practically deserted a week after its consecration. The people who built and paid for it refusing to attend the services, or to pay anything towards the Missionary's support. The Rural Dean has done his utmost to break the dead-lock, but without success.

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IV-PRESCOTT AND RUSSELL DEANERY- REV. A. PHILLIPS, RURAL DEAN.

Reviewing the work done in this Deanery during the past year, it is very gratifying to be able to report a general improvement. Changes have taken place in the missions of Vankleek Hill and Bearbrock. The Rev. W. Y. Daykin, succeeding the Rev. John Hunter at the former and, at Bearbrook, the Rev. John Warren, Rev. J. Empringham.

Navan—At Navan, through the untiring energy of the Rev. R. Orr, the value of church property has been doubled and now stands at \$10,000.00. The fine new stone church has been consecrated with only a small debt of \$600 remaining on it. All the church property except at Cumberland has been insured in the sum of \$3,500.

The prospects for the church at Cumberland are decidedly discouraging. The absence of any industry, the consequent removal of church people and a general exodus in search of employment contribute to make the outlook unfavourable. Mr. Orr is of opinion that the time spent in reaching and holding service at Cumberland from Navan would be much more profitably spent in developing the Sunday School at Navan and, taking into consideration the large number of children there and their future influence upon the church, the R. D. cannot but feel with Mr. Orr that, if some other provision could be made for the people at Cumberland, they would be in the best interests of the church. The large number of church families concentrated round the new church at Navan and the out station at Blackburn would give the incumbent ample scope for his energies.

Bearbrook-Since Mr. Warren's appointment to this mission, no change has been made in the church property, though preparations are still in progress for the erection of the new church.

Necessary repairs and improvements, to which attention was drawn in last years' report, have been effected in the church at Vars costing \$130, but the Rural Dean has very reluctantly to state that only the church at Canaan has been insured. That at Vars as well as the Parsonage still remaining at the church's risk.

Mr. Warren by painstaking visiting, has been able to return the number of families this year as 88 instead of 66 as reported last year. The amount paid him as stipend is quite inadequate, and it is hoped that a new subscription lsit at present under contemplation, will improve it.

Oscoode and Russell—The mission of Osgoode and Russell is one of the most progressive in the Deanery. Rapidly following the erection and consecration of the church at Metcalfe Mr. Clarke reported a successful effort to provide in the same way for Vernon and money and material are already in progression for its erection. Money, not yet expended, has been required also for improvements at Russell and, since making his report to me, Mr. Clarke has succeeded in building a small frame church at Edward's, a new station on the railway with ten families and which has suddenly sprung into existence. This, Mr. Clarke thinks will necessitate a division of his large mi appropriated for

of his large mission so soon as the fund of the Mission Board will allow a grant to be appropriated for this work.

While speaking of this particular mission, the R. D. may be permitted to draw attention to the general fact that railway extension throughout this Deanery will in the future necessitate large appropriations for the development of the Church by occupying stations before others have anticipated us and where the results of railway construction are likely to be permanent. As an instance of this, the Rural Dean may mention that the Great Northern Ry. will soon intersect the Deanery in one direction, as the C. P. R. and the New York & Ottawa have already in others and and still another C. P. Ry., is contemplated from Point Fortune westward through Hawkesbury. An era has begun which, from the geographical position of these counties will in all probability mark a rapid increase in population and render the generous treatment of missions touched by these Ry's. both necessary and politic.

All the Church property in the mission of Osgoode and Russell is insured and is returned as of the value of \$10,000.

Plantagenet—For the mission of Plantagenet, the year has been one of prosperity. Improvements have been made in both Church and Parsonage at Fenaghvale and Plantagenet, the number of families returned is larger and the amount contributed for outside objects has been notably increased at Fenaghvale. The R. D. would like to see the amount contributed for the Incumbent's Stipend more in proportion to that raised for all other purposes and this, no doubt, will receive the attention of those earnest Church people, now that much-needed repairs have been effected and paid for. The indefatigable and self-denying Incumbent has been compelled to extend his work in the direction of Pendleton on the C. P. Ry., following up families drawn from their old homes by better prospects.

A very successful mission was, in March, conducted at Fenaghvale by Rev. C. F. Lowe, the fruits of which are seen in candidates for confirmation and deepened spiritual life.

At this Station, preparations are being made for the erection of a new and much needed driving shed. The property is partly insured and it is expected that it will be entirely so in the near future.

Vankleek Hill-Mr. Daykin's work at Vankleek Hill commenced under disadvantages and difficulties which, happily, are melting away under steady, persistent efforts. The Stipend has been fully paid up at East Hawkesbury, except subscriptions which have lapsed from unavoidable circumstances; but at Vankleek Hill, there is unhappily great room for improvement. The Parscnage, which is held by the Churchwarden in trust for the Parish, is insured. The Churches which are deeded to the Synod are not. There is no record of that part of the year previous to Mr. Daykin's appointment, and, consequently no comparison is possible.

Caledonia Springs-This new Mission has amply justified the expenditure by the Mission Board. There has been a decided increase in the amount contributed for

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Clerical Stipend—tor other parochial objects nearly \$250 and for objects outside the parish nearly \$120. No progress has been made in the Caledonia church undertaking owing to circumstances over which we have no control; but the amount actually paid has been placed in the Bank of Ottawa and other subscriptions will be sought to be added to those already signed. S. Peter's Alford has been refurnished at a cost of more than \$200 and the promised stipend fully paid up.

Hawkesbury—At Hawkesbury we have had losses and gains, during the year. Several families have migrated numbering in all 26 souls. And their places have been taken by others, many of whom, though considering themselves members of the Church of England, are not communicants.

During the last decade fully three-fifths of the English-speaking community at Hawkesbury have been members of the Church at one time, but unfortunately for some cause or other, have been lost to her communion and come to us arrayed against us instead of on our side. The standard of giving has been fully maintained both for Clerical Stipend, parochial objects and extra parochial.

The creation of the new Parish will, as soon as it is in charge of a Priest, permit an undertaking of pioneer work in the direction of Point Fortune, though, with the changes taking place at Hawkesbury, it will be impossible for services to be held without the assistance of a lay reader, whose salary at present must be partly provided for by the Board, as no returns can be expected where all at first must be experimental.

Preparations have been made for the erection of a new driving shed and the Church is to be enriched by the gift of a Memorial Brass Eagle Lectern.

V. RENFREW DEANERY-REV. C. V. FORSTER BLISS, RURAL DEAN.

The reports presented by the Clergy at the annual Chapter meeting in May indicate general progress during the past year.

The Annual Conferences of the Bishop with the Clergy and Laity have been of real benefit to the Church and the place of meeting each year is eagerly sought after by parishes. Increased attendance on the part of the laity is looked for as the object of these conferences becomes better known.

The visit in April of the Rev. H. Gomery, Agent of the S. P. C. K., was greatly appreciated by the parishes of Eganville, Renfrew, Rockingham and Combermere. It would benefit the Church to have a similar visit yearly. In Eganville parish a branch society was formed and an annual collection promised, the agent leaving collecting books for the purpose.

The parishes throughout the Deanery are, as usual, all occupied, five priests and one student from Trinity. From communication had with them the Rural Dean is able to report on the State of the Church in each parish :

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ly among his manufacturing town, the population of the parish fluctuates and the number of communicants varies considerably. The property is in excellent state of repair, the Rector seeing that each year such an amount is expended as will keep it as all Church property should be kept, a credit to the parish. Some considerable improvement to the Church, beyond the ordinary annual expenditure, is now in contemplation, but report upon it must necessarily be reserved until it is accomplished. Regular services are held at *Galetta* but as yet no effort is being made to provide a Church. At *Braeside* there are no services. There should be. The parish supports its Clergyman well, but the contributions to the Mission Fund are very small.

Douglas.--This mission is now worked in part as the Rural Dean last year recommended it should be, viz., as a separate mission, apart from the work up the line of the O. A. and P. S. Railway. These two widely separated fields are now operated from different centres and Douglas constituted a mission with outstations of Grattan and Clontarf, and occasional services among the settlers in the townships of Griffiths and Mattawatchan. The Rev. Mr. Garrett has been succeeded by the Rev. L. W. Brun, who entered upon his duties in February. Being a married man he has had to rent a house. The two pressing needs of this mission are a Parsonage at Douglas and a Church at Scotch Bush, and the Rural Dean strongly urges that the energies of the missionary be at once directed towards providing funds for a Parsonage, the question as to whether the Parsonage should be built on the Church lot, or built or purchased in another part of the Village to be decided by the Archdeacon and the provisions of Canon XXXV observed.

The Rural Dean has reported to the Mission Board on the pressing necessity of an increased grant to this mission if it is to be in charge of a married clergyman, and suggested that a part of what has been heretofore granted to the former missionary for travelling expenses over the larger field be now added to the grant of the Douglas Mission, there being but 40 families, and many of them poor. The Mission has been partly canvassed—the complete canvass will not produce more than \$175 per year.

Eganville—The property of this parish is now almost all in good repair, the Rectory excepted. So much else required attention and considerable outlay that by consent the Rectory has had only absolutely needed repairs. Improvements are contemplated this year. The parish is fairly prosperous, services well attended, and the communicants list having added to it new names, though the total is not in creased. The Clergyman is supported moderately well, but the parochial contributions to objects outside the parish are as yet small. During the year St. John's Church improvements were completed by the building being newly roofed and painted. A parish paper has been established and is now in its second year.

Killaloe—This is the new mission for which a grant of \$400 was made last year. Up to November last the Douglas missionary made periodical trips up the line of the O. A. & P. S. Railway, holding services at most of the places now embraced in this

mission. Since November the work has been done by a student from Trinity. The people can be held together for a time in this way, but definite work can scarcely be accomplished until the mission is in charge of a priest. The Church must show that she has come, not as a summer visitor, to be gone again in a few weeks, but as a permanent settler to dwell among the people. A student and his portmanteau is rather suggestive of the transitory visitor, and as a consequence the people hold aloof. Forty-three families are reported, but this does not represent what the Church has before her in this field. Families have strayed from but are not yet lost to the Church. They hesitate until they know whether the Church has come to stay. Aggressive missionary work is urgently called for. Given that, the result will soon be seen. There is here a splendid opening for a practical, common sense mission priest.

Renfrew-One of the most encouraging reports of the Deanery comes from this mission small in numbers but large in faith and good works. The forty-four families comprising the congregation of St. Paul's have contributed more than twenty-two dollars per family to the purposes of the Church during the past year and sixty of the eighty-five communicants have communicated more than three times; all have communicated once with very few exceptions. The Incumbent, Rev. W. M. H. Quartermaine, speaks in the highest terms of the faithful work of the women of the congregation and the ready response of the men to all appeals made. The Sanday school is well attended and the children are being taught to give I berally to the mission work of the Church. Last year they gave ten dollars to Algoma and nearly the same amount to our Diocesan Fund. The interest on Parsonage debt has been met, a small payment made on principal and the building furnished with incandescent light. The grounds also have been improved, fenced an I planted with ornamental trees and shrubbery. Mr. Quartermaine also attends to Calabogie, giving a monthly Sunday service and frequently walking back to Renfrew, a distance of 17 miles, for evening service. Two earnest laymen, Messrs. E. Newton Jory, principal of the Public School, and Trevor Grout, barrister, take the Sunday services in his absence. The work at Calabogie is said to be very promising though there are but eight families. Mr. Quartermaine holds also a monthly catechising class here and at Barry Vale. Three of the young people who attend walk eight miles to be present and six others four miles. Twelve miles beyond Calabogie is Flower Station. One Church family resides here. This family would be without any ministrations of the Church were it not for Mr. Quartermaine's visits in connection with his Calabogie work. At Horton, another outstation of Renfrew, there are four families. Fortnightly services are held here in summer.

Rockingham and Combermere—The Rev. J. D. McCallum is still in charge of this large mission. He reports the Church as making steady progress and speaks very highly of the good work done by his predecessor, Rev. Mr. Butler. Mr. McCallum reports the necessity for a Church at Bangor and expresses the hope that he will be able this year to make a move in that direction. His present congregation pretty well fills the school house.

VI. STORMONT DEANERY-REV. R. L. M. HOUSTON, RURAL DEAN.

The Church of St. John the Evangelist has been built near the village of Lancaster since the last report and was consecrated last January by the Bishop of the Diocese. It is a building of wood on a substantial stone foundation and of beautiful design and workmanship well worthy of imitation by many parishes. This Church is well equipped for the due and proper rendering of the worship of Almighty God and reflects great credit on all concerned in the building thereof. A commodious Parish Hall has also been built hard by the Church, suitable for Sunday school pur-A handsome Parish Hall has been erected at Moulinette at a cost of \$1,000. poses. The old Church of St. George at Gallingertown, after having served for many years. has been removed and a much more pretentious building is being erected on the site, very much after the design of St. John's Church, Lancaster. The debt on St. Paul's Church, Aultsville, has been, removed and preparations are being made for the completion of the building. Over \$600 has been spent on the exterior of Trinity (Memorial) Church, Cornwall. A spire has been erected on St. John's Church, Crysler, at a cost of over \$500. At Iroquois and Winchester many improvements have been made. From Morrisburg we learn that Holy Trinity Church, Williamsburg, now served by the Rector of Morrisburg, has been repaired and, much needed driving sheds built. At Mountain, the outbuildings in connection with the Parsonage have been removed and built up anew on a new foundation. The parishes of Williamsburg and Osnabruck have been re-arranged, relieving Rev. Mr. Samwell of the charge of St. Peter's congregation, Osnabruck Centre, which has been attached to Aultsville and Gallingertown. This arrangement has enabled Mr. Samwell to give an occasional Sunday service to the people on the 8th con. of Cornwall and has been instrumental in the formation of a new Sunday School at Mille Roches. Church of the Good Shepherd, East Cornwall, rejoices in the possession of a fine The new pipe organ. A very interesting and successful Deanery Conference was held at Wales in October last under the presidency of the Bishop. It was attended by many people from most parts of the Deanery, all Church workers, both male and female, having been invited, as is usual. The Annual Conference of the Deanery of Stormont is looked forward to with great interest and the attendance is generally near 100. In May the Chapter meeting was held at South Mountain and the statistical returns studied and all airangements made for the next Deanery Conference at Cornwall.

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The work of the Church in the Deanery seems to be prosperous and we feel perfectly sure that the Church of England is more than holding its own. We feel assured that a bright future is in store for the Church in this district and with unity, peace and true concord we look forward to the future with trust and confidence.

MISSIONARY DEPUTATIONS.

The list of Missionary Deputations have been posted in the Synod Hall for the information of those interested. It is important that the appointments made by the Board be not lightly interfered with and in this connection the attention of Deputations is called to the report made to and adopted by the Synod last year, as set forth. in the Journal of Synod pages 116-117.

Report of the Mission Board.

The Mission Board of the Diocese of Ottawa begs leave to present to the Synod a report of its proceedings for the year ending April, 30th, 1899.

The meetings of the Board were held on the 16th of November and 24th of May with a full representation of members.

Last year the Board had the satisfaction of reporting "its gratification that there had been no falling off in the contributions to the Mission Fund," and it would have been pleased if the same joyous strain could have been repeated this year, but owing to fluctuations which so often occurrin voluntary subscriptions, it is obliged to record a small falling off of \$415.44.

In the financial statement which is appended it will be seen that the receipts for the year, including \$1,382.72 the balance carried forward amounted to \$7.720.44

The expenditure was \$7,176.77, having a balancee of \$559.67.

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The readjustment of several missions has been carried out. Janeville and Merivale have been made one mission. The outstations, Leitrim and Hawthorne have been detached from Biilings' Bridge, and attached to Archville, and all three will in future be known by the name of Gloucester. Billings' Bridge becomes a separate mission and will in future be known by that name.

The Ryral Dean of Prescott recommended, "that if funds permit two grants of \$200 each be applied to enable the mission of Osgoode and Russell to be divided, the growth of the church necessitating such division." After discussion it was carried. "That in the event of the proposed division of Osgoode and Russell being carried out by His Lordship the Bishop, the parish of Metcalle, Vernon and Greely be placed in Class 2 at \$150, and the new parish of Russell and Edwards be placed in Class 5 at \$300, and that until the division is consummated the undivided mission of Osgoode and Russell remain in Class I at \$100."

The Board considered it advisable to form a new mission with head quarters at Maberley, and granted a sum of \$250 for that purpose, detaching it from the parish of Lanark which is placed in Class 2.

A grant of \$40 on the recommendation of Rural Dean Bliss was made to cover travelling expenses for services given at Calabogie in the mission of Renfrew. A grant of \$400 has been made by the Board to the Mission of Killaloe, to be

used by the Bishop at his discretion, for the supply of services until he is able to procure the services of an ordained Missionary.

The Board takes pleasure in expressing its satisfaction with the work done by the missionaries, who all seem earnest and active in pushing on the work in their several parishes and foresees under God's blessing, a bright futurel for the Church in the Diocese of the Clergy and laity can be brought to work together side by side in love and confidence in this work of God, committed to us in this Diocese.

Report of the Committee on the State of the Church.

The Committee on the State of the Church have very great pleasure in reporting that for the year ended April 25th, 1899, statistical returns have been received from all the parishes and missions of the Diocese without exception. It is true that in some few cases there is evidence on the face of the Returns of a lack of painstaking effort to make the Returns as accurate as circumstances will permit, yet on their general character your Committee have pleasure in remarking that they indicate a growing wish to be accurate on the part of those who have made them, showing a growing appreciation of the value and importance of these statistics. In so far as spiritual quantities can be expressed by figures your Committee are able to report a gratifying increase in almost all the Church's activities in the Diocese.

1. For the year ended April 25th, 1898, the number of families was reported to be 6,040. For the year just ended the number is 6,331, showing an increase of 291 families for the year.

This is a large increase when we consider that the population of the Diocese is not increasing, except in the case of the city of Ottawa. There is a shifting of population to some extent, from one part to another, from the country to the town, but

we may safely state that the population on the whole is not increasing. A few years ago there was an actual diminution in some places. Under these circumstances 291 families is quite a large increase for one year. May it not be in part accounted for by the fact that the Returns are a little more accurate than formerly and also that for the most part families are accounted as Church families who declare themselves such whether they are attendants upon the Church's services or not. There is also an increase in the total Church population of the Diocese. Last Synod the total was represented to be 28,692. This year the total is 29,356, an increase of 664 persons. It is a startling fact to learn from the Dominion census of 1891 that the Church of England population of the eight counties of the Diocese of Ottawa was at that time 37.393. From this we learn that in the Diocese there are probably to-day about 8,000 nominal Church people who are unknown to the Clergy. The Christian bodies around us have also been perplexed by the disparity between their Conference and Synod returns and the government census. The Presbyterian body reported a few years ago that throughout the Dominion there were between 150,000 and 200,000 people given to them by the census who were unknown to their pastors. The serious problem presses upon us that in every Rural Deanery there are from one to two thousand persons calling themselves Church people whom the clergy do not know or reckon. Your Committee consider it wise to mention these facts for it may have occurred to some members of Synod that the Diocese will soon be so well equipped that it shall not be necessary to push on the Missionary work of the Diocese with the same vigor as now. Let these figures dispel any ideas of this kind. It is plain enough to us all that we have much yet to do before we have succeeded in covering the ground committed to our care. The field of Missionary operations in this Diocese must be extended year by year for many years to come. Much ground has yet to be occupied and large mission fields to be divided and all this calls upon us for continued and increased exertions. It is our duty to supply all the Church's children lovingly and liberally with all the means of grace.

2. The number of communicants in the Diocese—the true test of Church life—is 10,253, an increase over last year of 651. Last year had an increase of 290 over the year before last, and the year before last an increase of 224 over the year preceding. There seems to be a steady increase going on year by year which should be a cause of great thankfulness. It may be of interest to members of Synod to compare ourselves with other Dioceses in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada in the matter of families and communicants. We have 6,331 families and 10,258 communicants. The Diocese of Nova Scotia in 1898 had 8,822 families and 10,254 communicants. There are no Returns available from the Diocese of Fredericton. Quebec had in the same year 4,374 families and 7,409 communicants. Montreal 8,619 families and 13,427 communicants. The Diocese of Ontario 5,835 families and 7,836 communicants. The Diocese of Niagara 6,995 families and 8,500 communicants. The Dioceses of Toronto and Huron are so much larger in extent and population than Ottawa can be s of this E The

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Ottawa that it is not necessary to refer to them. From this comparative statement it can be seen that the Diocese of Ottawa more than holds its own amongst the Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province.

There were throughout the Diocese 1,801 midday celebrations of the Holy Communion and 1,110 early celebrations, an increase of 45 in the former and of 105 in the latter.

3. There have been 8,153 services held on Sundays and 4,326 on week days. The year before 7,951 Sunday services and 4,181 week day services. Throughout the Diocese the Sunday services increased by 202 and the week day by 145. There have been 966 baptisms, 42 of which were adults. The previous year there were 988, 29 of which were adults, a decrease of 22. Seven hundred and ninety-four persons were confirmed. Last year 671; an increase of 123.

There are in the Diocese 100 Sunday schools, an increase of six for the year, but there is a slight falling off in the number of pupils and teachers. There are 103 pupils less than last year and nine male teachers and two female teachers less. One Missionary reports 12 Sunday school pupils and no school. Another reports one school and no pupils. In three missions there are no Sunday schools returned. Two of these are in the Deanery of Lanark and one in the Deanery of Renfrew (Lanark, Tennyson and Douglas). Thirty-seven stations return no Sunday schools, six in the Deanery of Carleton, 10 in Lanark, eight in Prescott and Russell, six in Pembroke, 12 in Renfrew and five in Stormont.

It must be remembered, however, that many of these stations have only occasional services, some of them only on week days. However, in a goodly number of them Sunday schools could surely be established to the great advantage of the Church. Our Sunday school work hardly seems to be satisfactory. We all wish most heartily for an increase year by year and when it comes not we are naturally disappointed. We fear there is not that lively interest taken in the religious instruction of the young that there should be. Is it not true that in many of our Sunday schools the work of instruction is left too much to young women who in the goodness of their hearts are doing what they can to instruct those committed to their care? But where are the men? Where are the parents? Some of them are in Sunday school, some few; but too many parents leave the interests of the Sunday school severely alone and never seem to give a thought to the religious training of their children. Might we not say to Christian parents and to those who stand in the place of parents "Where is the flock that was given thee, thy beautiful flock? 4. We come now to the Financial Returns reported from the different parishes of the Diocese. The total amount received for the erection or purchase of buildings or other property is \$25,979.92, an increase of \$17,025 over last report. The

The amount received for objects outside the Diocese is \$12,277.99. Last report gave us \$13,038.72. The total financial receipts foot up to the sum of \$103,559.52, an increase for the year of \$17,738.39. For Clerical Stipend the Diocese gave at the rate of \$5.48 per family. For all Parochial objects the Diocese rate of \$14.42 per family, and for all objects inter gave at the The Deanery of extra Diocesan \$16.25 per family. Diocesan and Deanery The Clerical Stipend \$6.70 per family. Carleton gave to The Deanery of Prescott and Russell \$5.70 per of Lanark \$4.28. family, the Deanery of Fembroke \$5.47, the Deanery of Renfrew \$4.57 and the Deanery of Stormont \$4.90. For all Parochial objects the Deanery of Carleton gave \$16.48 per family; the Deanery of Lanark \$9.42; the Deanery of Prescott and Russell \$17.44 per family; the Deanery of Pembroke \$17.94; the Deanery of Renfrew \$8 and the Deanery of Stormont \$15 per family.

5. Five new Churches have been built in the Diocese during the past year at the following places, viz: St. Matthews, Ottawa; at Canterbury, Navan, Westmeath and Lancaster. The present number of Churches in the Diocese is 120. Last report gave us 112. This item informs us that the clergy have been more careful in sending in their Returns. The number of Church sittings is 22,865, although the total Church population of the Diocese known to the clergy is only 29,356.

Two parish halls or school houses have been built within the last year, both in the Deanery of Stormont, viz: at Lancaster and Moulinette. Two new Parsonages have been added to the list, both in the Deanery of Lanark, one in the Mission of Tennyson, the other at Balderson. There are now 47 Parsonages in the Diocese. Last report gave us 44; another instance of greater accuracy in the Returns. The total value of all Church property in the Diocese is estimated to be \$681,300, not including the site on which All Saints Church, Ottawa, is now being built. This is an increase of \$55,745 over the year before. At this rate of progress we shall soon be up to the million dollar mark.

6. Your Committee submit the Statistical Returns appended to this report to the Synod of the Diocese trusting they may be of some interest and advantage to the Diocese, begging leave at the same time to state that their compilation was for the most part a pleasure and a profit, owing chiefly to the clear and happy manner in which the great majority of the Clergy made their returns. And although there might be an improvement in some quarters, yet on the whole we are glad to state that with just a little more care and thoughtfulness for the future these Annual Statistics of the Diocese might be almost perfect. Le: us all strive to make them so next year.

• 7. Taking a survey of the whole field of the Diocese, your Committee feel assured that a bright future is in store for the Church of England in this part of the

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Dominion of Canada; and with unity, peace and true concord amongst us, we shall look forward to the future with trust and confidence, believing that the great Head of the Church is with us in every earnest and houest endeavor and that He will bless the poor feeble work that is done in His name. And if at times we feel discouraged under the awful responsibilities resting upon us and the work to our dim eyes may seem to languish, let us call to mind the words of faith spoken long ago on the sea of Galilee, "Master ! we have toiled all the night and have taken nothing nevertheless at Thy word I will let down the net."

Now although the debit balance of last year has been converted this year into a credit balance, your committee beg to point out that this has not been caused by any diminution of the pension list, which remains the same as last year, nor by increase in the collections on fifth Sunday in Lent, for they are less by \$73.82. It has been caused by assessing the incomes of the clergy and the payment of arrears.

The present condition and the future prospects of this fund should be a subject of serious consideration. For we must bear in mind these three important points :

1. The interest on the present capital will never be more, but will probably be less and less as time goes on.

2. Judging from the past, we need not calculate upon any very marked increase in the aggregate of the Lent collections.

The outlook then is not very re-assuring. Any increase of our present pension list would put us to serious straits; since we cannot expect any very marked increase of our annual income. We must therefore look to some other sources; and the most needful of these is an increased Capital. In the Bishop's address of last year his lordship said :

"In other dioceses, such as Montreal, Huron and Quebec, the interest of \$75,000 to \$85,000 is available." It should be our ambition to make our capital vie with theirs. A pastoral from the Bishop has been read in the congregation announcing that the late Mr. Robt. Hamilton offered \$500 to their capital fund provided that the rest of the diocese would subscribe \$4,500, thus a sum of \$5,000 would be added the interest of which would secure the pension of one widow. The response to this appeal has so far brought in \$434.80 and it is to be earnestly hoped that the whole of the amounts asked from each parish will be made up before long. The offer of Mr. Hamilton remains good till the end of the year.

We entreat all our wealthiest churchmen to emulate the good deeds of the late Mr. R. Hamilton and remember this special fund in their donations and subscriptions and in their bequests.

2. The Church Catechism broken into short questions-and with Scripture Proofs (S. P. C. K.)

3. The St. Paul's Series-otherwise called Bishop Doque's Catechism.

The Committee are still of opinion that an hour spent in conference on the subject of Sunday Schools on some evening during the session of Synod would be of great service to all. But they concluded not to formally recommend it, knowing how hard it is to secure the needed time without interfering with other interests.

Report of Committee on Religious Education in Schools.

At the session of the Provincial Synod held in Montreal in September last, the subject of Religious Education in Public schools received a very full discussion, and the following resolution was adopted, by both Houses of the Synod.

"That whereas the General Synod at its second session held in Winnipeg in "the year 1896, adopted the report of the committee on the educational work of the "Church; and whereas the said report set forth (a) that it was essential for the "community and the children that there should be religious instruction in the primary "schools; (b) that a half hour each school day, and if possible, the first half hour, should be given to such religious instruction; (c) that reasonable arrangements should be made for such religious instruction being given by the clergy or their deputies to the "children of their own communion, or by the teacher in case of communions agreeableto this; (d) that when the above cannot be carried out, we shall rejoice at the introduction into the school "course of studies" of such religious instruction as shall "include the teaching of (1) selections from the Old and New Testaments, and (2) the "Apostles' Creed, the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments,

"Be it resolved that the Synod of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada at this session appoint a committee consisting of the Bishops and at least one clergyman and one layman from each Diocese, for the purpose of carrying out the views and recommendations of the General Synod; that the Bishops and other members of this Committee residing within any Civil Province shall constitute a Committee for that Province for the said purpose; that such Committee in conjunction with other-Christian bodies where possible, shall urge upon the Governments of their respective Civil Provinces the carrying out of the said views and recommendations of the General Synod, and that the concurrence of the Upper House in this resolution be "respectfully requested."

A committee was duly appointed in accordance with this resolution, our own-Diocese being represented by the Lord Bishop, the Very Rev. the Dean of Ottawa, the Ven. the Archdeacon of Ottawa and His Honour Judge Senkler.

The sub-committee for the Province of Ontario was called to meet on several occasions but up to last week no quorum of the committee had been got together.

Your committee understands that another meeting was called for last week, but has not yet learned the result of the meeting or whether it was held.

. Your committee would recommend the reappointment of the present Provisional committee. \checkmark

Report of the Committee on the Metropolitan See.

Your Committee beg to report that the following resolution was passed by the delegates from the Diocese of Ottawa to the Provincial Synod at a meeting of the Clerical and Lay Delegates to the Provincial Synod from the Diocese of Ottawa, held on the 15th September, 1898, at the Montreal Theological College, Montreal.

Present : The Ven. Archdeacon Bogert, the Rev. Canons Pollard, Low, Hanington and Muckleston, Rural Deans Houston, Phillips, Elliott and Read, and Rev.

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Messrs. Samwell and Mackay; and Chancellor Lewis, Registrar Bishop, Lay-Secretary Orde, Treasurer Eliot, W. H. Rowley, (Treasurer-Seneschal), Lt. Col. Matheson and Messrs. F. W. Avery, W. L. Marler, and F. A. Heney.

"Resolved that this delegation is prepared to support the following arrangement, if agreeable to the House of Bishops : "That if, upon the office of Metropolitan next becoming vacant, the present

"That if, upon the office of Metropolitan next becoming vacant, the present Bishop of Ottawa be appointed by the House of Bishops Metropolitan of Canada, then the Synod of the Diocese of Ottawa should agree to accept the proposal of the House of Bishops with regard to the future appointment by the House of Bishops of the Metropolitan Archbishop of Ottawa (as printed on page 126 of the Ottawa Synod Journal of 1896); provided (1) That the choice shall not be restricted to the members of the House of Bishops, but that all Bishops and Clergy of the Church of En land shall be eligible, and (2) That before any appointment to the Metropolitan See be thus made, the House of Bishops shall confer with the Clerical and Lay Delegates to the Provincial Synod from the Arch-Diocese of Ottawa.

"Provided also that, if the foregoing should meet the approval of the House of Bishops, both the Provincial Synod of Canada and the Diocesan Synod of Ottawa be requested to accordingly make the necessary amendments to their Canons as soon as practicable."

Accordingly, the Clerical and Lay Delegates to the Provincial Synod waited upon their Lordships the House of Bishops, in Montreal, on the afternoon of the 15th September, 1898, and submitted the foregoing resolution to their Lordships, the Metropolitan and the Bishops of Montreal, Toronto, Fredericton, Huron, Ottawa, Nova Scotia, Quebec, Niagara and Algoma being present. The subject was thoroughly discussed by the delegation from this Diocese with the House of Bishops ;: whereupon their Lordships stated that they would duly consider the suggestions contained in the foregoing resolution, and the delegation withdrew.

Subsequently the following letter was received from the Lord Bishop of Algoma, the Secretary of the House of Bishops, which speaks for itself:

HOUSE OF BISHOPS,

Montreal Q., Sept. 17th, 1898.

MY DEAR CHANCELLOR LEWIS,—I beg to inform you, as the representative of the delegation from the Diocese of Ottawa with reference to the fixing of the Metropolitan dignity in the See of Ottawa, that the House of Bishops has passed the following resolution upon the subject referred to :—

"The Diocese of Ottawa, having by a deputation communicated to this house "the conditions upon which it would concur in the making of that Diocese the "Metropolitan See of this Ecclesiastical Province in the future; and this house not "being willing to accede to such conditions, be it resolved that the deputation from "the Diocese of Ottawa be informed of this fact."

Report of Committee on S. P. C. K.

Your committee beg leave to report :

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That arrangements were made at its November meeting to have the Rev. N. Gomery visit the Deaneries of Lanark, Renfrew and Pembroke and the city of Ottawa.

It was decided later that it was inexpedient for him to visit Ottawa so that his work was confined to the Deaneries, mentioned.

A circular letter was sent to all the parishes interested, eleven of whom accepted the services of the agent, namely, Almonte, Clayton, Lanark, Perth and Smiths' Falls in Lanark Deanery; Cobden, Pembroke and Stafford in Pembroke Deanery; Eganville, Renfrew and Combermere in Renfrew Deanery.

In all Mr. Gomery held 25 meetings at 17 stations. The collections amounted to \$35.63. Nine depositories were started at Stafford, Coblen, Combermere, Eganville, Renfrew, Almonte, Clayton, Smiths' Falls and Perth.

The plan of campaign was based on the idea, that the most immediate benefit to the S. P. C. K. and the Diocese would result from the extended circulation of the society's publications. While the results are not so far very large, a beginning has been made.

But in order to keep these infant depositories in good shape it will be necessary for the Synod to consider the advisibility of providing a central officer who will be in touch with the various depositories and render such help as may be necessary.

Mr. Gomery concludes his report to your committee, in the following words. "Many books were ordered and catalogues asked for, but I am sure that if the books could have been turnished then and there a large number could have been sold." Consequently it was decided by your committee that it would be better if a small capital sum should be collected in order that the agent, might be able to carry around with him a renewal sample stock from which he could sell books, and not merely a sample stock which could only be exhibited, whetting the appetite for books but not satisfying it, which was all that the agent could do under present circumstances. The sample books he took out were those which were obtained by the forethought of our Clerical secretary, and for which we are indebted to the Society's kindness, and they have made us a further grant of wall charts, texts, etc., which will be of great use in showing the excellent provision for all tastes which is made in the publications of the society. It would be but right that the Synod should by motion show their appreciation of these gifts. The collection of the capital sum referred to will be undertaken by the Rev. T. J. Stiles. The only expenditure was for a box to carry the books in amounting to \$1.75 which your committee has directed shall be taken from the collections.

The request of the secretary of the S. P. C. K. referred to in the address of The Lord Bishop, and handed over to your committee for consideration was discussed by them and they have decided that it would be advisable that a sermon be preached and a collection be taken up on behalf of the S. P. C. K. annually, on the 8th Sunday after Trinlty.

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Report of Woman's Auxiliary to Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions. (APPENDED TO APPENDIX E.)

Thirteen new branches organized and two re-organized, making a total of 40 senior branches with a membership of 1,076. Junior workers 335 and total membership including Diocesan members 1,425.

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Four new life members enrolled.

Receipts in money during year \$1,401.13.

Forty-seven bales sent out, the cash value being \$775.17. Total for the year 1898 \$2,176.30.

The education of one child still continued in connection with Ontario and provision made for the entire charge of another.

Pledges undertaken in connection with lady missionaries still continued, besides special appeals—one being a memorial of Miss Brown's work in the Peigan Reserve taking the form of means to provide a team of horses and waggon, cows, etc., for the use of that mission ; \$132 have been secured by the treasurer.

Seven hundred and fifty Leaflets are in circulation and literature distributed among the various branches in the Diocese.

Forty subscribers for The Canadian Church Magazine.

During Lent missionary classes were held for the study of facts in early church history and missionary development. Great interest was taken by those who were able to attend and hopes are entertained of continuing the subjects next season.

The annual meeting held from May 30 to June 2nd was most successful. The thank offering amounted to \$145; \$6 was given to Algoma diocese.

On the afternoon of Friday, June 2nd, a conference of church women was held at which the Bishop of the Dioccse presided. Rev. A. E. Anderson (late of Mattawa, at present at Smith's Falls) addressed the meeting taking as his subject "The present state of mission work in the Dioccse."

He was followed by Rev. A. W. Mackay, who spoke on "The prospects and directions for the development of missionary work in the Diocese of Ottawa." This was the first conference on Diocesan missions held among our W. A. workers. Much interest was evinced and many interesting facts stated.

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Treasurer's Report.

The Treasurer begs to present the state of the Diocesan Funds at the close of the last financial year, 30th April, 1899.
